Cheryl and her husband Laurence Roe, who now live in Western Australia. visited the Allora Advertiser last week to the delight of the current staff who were intrigued to learn first-hand about an early owner of the paper.

Con. who was an experienced compositor from Brisbane, purchased the Advertiser when he came out of the Army. For the next 3 to 4 years he published the paper for the Allora locals.

Unfortunately matters compelled him to relocate to Brisbane so reluctantly sold the paper around 1948 to Arthur Hammond.

Con Carling passed away in 1972 after lengthy problems with his heart.

Cheryl was proud of her Dad's achievements and she knew what the paper meant to him - hence her visit to Allora.

Ink must have run in the family veins as Cheryl who is a journalist has worked at Universities in Brisbane and Western Australia as well as Freelancing for Corporate organisations.


National Playgroup Week is about celebrating and promoting the benefits of playgroups for children, families and communities.

Southern Downs Regional Council is conducting community consultation in relation to proposed changes to the approved water supply areas and invites residents to have their say prior to recommendations being considered by Council in April.

Under the Water Supply (Safety & Reliability) Act 2008, Council must declare the service areas for water in its capacity as a water service provider and has updated the water service area plans to identify urban and rural areas separately.

Council has identified potential areas of expansion to urban areas and included them in the urban plan, while the plan for rural areas only covers existing connections and does not allow for additional rural supply connections.

Council recently approved an updated Water and Wastewater Customer Service Standard which reflects the level of service for urban and rural areas. In addition, Council approved the Rural Water Connection Policy which addresses how and where any new water connections in the rural areas will be administered.

Council's Chief Executive Officer Dave Burges expected minimal community impact from the proposed changes and said the review was aimed at improving the management and efficiency of water supply in the Southern Downs.

"When the original water service areas were approved. they encompassed both urban and rural water connections without differentiation between the two," Mr Burges said.

"Urban and rural areas have different infrastructure requirements and service levels, and this updated review gives Council the opportunity to establish these zones separately.

"In urban areas, the water mains are generally larger in diameter, usually 100mm or more, which provides hydrants and water mains with capacity for sufficient pressure and flow for firefighting.

"In some situations where a rural lot is developed directly adjacent to an urban zoned area, the reticulation has been extended to service the rural lot but the water main is generally much smaller, usually 20mm to 50mm in diameter.

"These smaller mains cannot deliver adequate pressure for firefighting or residential use, and customers on these rural zoned lots are still required

to install tanks on their properties to provide adequate pressure.

"Pending Council's want decision. to emphasise that rural residents will not be forced to connect to the water mains. On the contrary, water mains in rural areas are very small and currently offer very limited capacity to existing customers."

Applications for a new connection within a rural supply zone as a result of a development will be carefully assessed by Council to ensure that existing customers are not negatively impacted prior to Council approval of proposed amendments.

Residents in the urban water supply areas with a property within 100m of a water main are charged a half access charge if the property owner chooses not to connect to the network.

Any properties outside of the rural water supply area are assumed to not have access to water mains and therefore will not be charged.

This will be a different type of visit for the Allora and District Garden Circle when they gather for their garden tour next Tuesday 2nd April.



Let's Peek At Our Hall Renovations

Contractors have been busy working on the Allora Community Hall however the rain seems to have slowed down progress this week.

The Manager of Community Services for the Southern Downs Regional Council, Michael Bell provides details on the



remedial work that is being undertaken.

"However, like all building projects, this one has also thrown up its challenges, with the septic tank that treats the wastewater from the building being found buried 100mm under the footpath (see left picture). This identification, including the works required for the adjoining footpath, has highlighted the reason the toilets have had to be closed temporarily, being due to the lack of appropriate pedestrian access to the toilets and pedestrian safety in this area generally." Mr Bell said.

The building is expected to be safe and ready for community access later in the year.

The Back PADDOCK **MLA Launches Livestock Transport hub**



А one-stop shop for livestock transport information has been launched by Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA) at the combined Queensland and Australian Livestock Transporters' Associations National Conference in Toowoomba last week.

Developed in consultation with the livestock transport supply chain, the MLA Transport hub helps to navigate rules. roles and responsibilities for livestock transport anywhere in Australia.

MLA Project Manager Animal Wellbeing and rural transporter Sharon Dundon said the hub was a proactive and collaborative effort to help everyone in the supply chain understand how to prepare livestock correctly for transport.

"We met with transporters, agents, lot feeders and producers in 2023 to find out how we can continue to improve the



livestock transport process,³ Ms Dundon said.

"There was united agreement in the need for a central location for livestock transport information leading to the development of the Transport hub.'

The hub includes information on transporting cattle, sheep and goats by road in Australia, with specific advice on different classes of animals and links to other relevant sites.

"We will continue to refine the hub as we receive feedback from users. We want it to be relevant, easy to access and useful for people needing to transport





livestock every day," Ms Dundon said.

Using new and existing resources, the hub equips producers with tools to identify and implement best practice in dispatching and

receiving stock, including the latest industry trends, hands on practical advice and scientific research.





