Increased land valuations do not =

increased rates

Increased land valuations do not mean Southern Downs Regional Council rates will rise by a comparable per cent. This is the message from Mayor Ron Bellingham after the release this week of the latest land valuations by the Department of Environment and Resource Management (DERM). "Rises in the valuation of land in our region will not necessarily mean equivalent jumps in council rates," Cr Bellingham said. "When a rise in valuations occurs, there is often a mistaken belief in the community that if land valuations increase by 50 per cent, their rates will also increase by 50 per cent," he said. "This is incorrect."

"Council determines through its budget deliberations, how much it costs to provide services and infrastructure to the community, and the amount it needs to raise in rates. "Land valuations are used as a mechanism to distribute this

overall cost equally to ratepayers," Cr Bellingham said. Only general rates are calculated through land valuations. Utility charges such as water, sewerage and garbage collection


are levied at the cost to provide the service to residents under the user-pays principle.

Cr Bellingham said that Council would conduct financial modelling to determine the impact of the valuation changes before formulating its 2010-11 rating policy.

He also flagged the impending introduction of differential rating across the whole Southern Downs region in the 2010/11 financial year, as a means of addressing spikes in valuations within particular land categories.

New valuations were calculated to reflect the property market as at October 1, 2009, and will take effect from July.

Kill your speed this Easter - not our wildlife

Wildlife veterinarians are calling on holidaymakers to kill their speed and keep a watchful eve out to stop the slaughter of Australian native animals on the roads this Easter.

"It's really important that drivers kill their speed over the Easter break, not only for their own safety, but also for the sake of native Australian species," said Dr Anne Fowler from the Australian Veterinary Association.

Each year millions of animals are killed, injured or orphaned on Australian roads, with whole populations of endangered species under threat from vehicle strikes in some areas.

"Wild Australian animals such as kangaroo, wombats, wallabies, and emu are the main victims, but many of our endangered native birds and reptiles are also killed," said Dr Fowler.

These deaths and injuries can easily be avoided by motorists reducing their speed (especially at night) and staying alert to the presence of animals on the road.

Nationally around 5.5 per cent of all serious road accidents involve animal strikes, with many thousands more going unreported.

"There are a number of things that drivers can do to prevent injury or deal with injured animals that they find on the road," said Dr Fowler.

"Firstly, and most importantly if you do hit an animal or come across an injured animals on the road, make sure it's safe before you stop to assist.

"If you are unable to stop and assist try to take note of the position of the animal and contact your local Wildlife carer group or a local vet for assistance," said Dr Fowler. Other things to remember:

- · Don't litter as this attracts wildlife to the road and the roadside where they are in more danger of being struck.
- · Slow down at night the majority of road kill happens between dusk and dawn when nocturnal animals are active.
- Take note of road signs these will often highlight areas where wildlife-vehicle collisions have happened in the past.



Mulcahy Stars as "Cowboys" Dominate Barrett Shield.



Dave's Delectable Dísh... Chicken Mayonnaise

INGREDIENTS

1 large chicken 1 cup long grain rice

- 1 cup mayonnaise ½ cup soft breadcrumbs
- 2 tbsp lemon juice
- 1 oz butter
- 1 large onion
- 4 sticks celery
- 15 oz can cream of chicken soup 15 oz can cream of mushroom soup

METHOD
