





Allora's Past 100 years ago July 1912 EDITORIAL Half-day Holiday Poll

On Wednesday next at the Allora Court House, a poll will be taken on the half-day holiday question. The point at issue is whether the weekly half-day holiday is to be observed on Wednesdays as hereto, of a change be made to Saturdays. In our opinion the arguments are overwhelming in favour of the retention of the present mid-week holiday. We submit that Allora cannot afford to place any disabilities in the way of people desiring to do their business. For many years Saturday, from early morning till closing hour at night, has been Allora's principal business day and the arguments for change are unconvincing. Main sporting events are on Saturdays and people are able to witness these and also do their shopping.

Wednesday's vote will be taken on the State electoral roll; all voters residing within the municipal area being entitled to vote, and we look forward to a large majority in favour of the present conditions.

(In 1912 the Allora Shire was three years off coming into being. Those able to vote on the above issue would have been the people living in the town area and residents of the Allora Exchange Lands to the south and east of the town which was included in the Allora Municipal area. The area contained 460 eligible voters and the issue was decided in favour retaining the Wednesday half-holiday by the narrow margin of 164 votes to 161. The decision was to be valid for three years unless changed by legislative decision)



If you currently receive the rebate and your details are unchanged since last year, you do not need to reapply.

Council administers the scheme and the Department of Communities reimburses the Council.

The recipient MUST hold a current State Government Pension Concession Card issued by Centrelink or a Repatriation Health Card for All Concessions (Gold Card) issued by Department of Veteran Affairs.

Mayor happy with budget progress to date.

"We are rapidly approaching the end of the financial year, and budget discussions are well underway" said Mayor Peter Blundell following recent budget deliberations by Council.

"Council will continue to look at increased efficiencies and the reduction of costs in every department to keep rate rises down," Cr Blundell said.

"While I am urging everyone within the Council team to carefully review spending, the need to provide the appropriate level of services expected by the community must also be considered," he said.

"While the 10 year financial forecast adopted last year predicted a general rate rise of 6%, we are on track to deliver a lower increase," advised Cr Blundell.

Councillors will continue their consideration of the budget at special meetings in July. Recommendations from the independent Southern Downs Ratings Consultation Group will also be taken into account when considering levels of rates. Council is expected to reach agreement and adopt the budget in July. Until the budget is adopted the final rating figure is not confirmed.

Jumpers & Jazz set to benefit from regional event program

Warwick's quirky winter festival Jumpers & Jazz is one of 64 events throughout Queensland set to benefit from a \$1.8 million boost in grant funding announced by the State Government last week.

Street Numbering Can Save Your Life!

"Lives may be at risk!" is the stern warning issued by the Queensland Ambulance Service (QAS) over the lack of adequate street numbering, especially in the town of Allora.

The lack of proper numbering has the potential to cost someone their life.

QAS has advised the Southern Downs Regional Council that many properties in Allora have no uniform numbering system and while some houses have numbering they were not in a standard format and very few were reflective.

This can make it extremely difficult to locate the correct property not only for the ambulance service, but also other emergency services vehicles. While most ambulance vehicles are equipped with GPS systems it is still vital to verify the correct address, certainly when there is a need to knock on someone's door in the middle of the night.

The Southern Downs Regional Council encourages all residents to ensure that their properties have adequate, reflective numberina.

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Magic ends Firebirds season

Going into the final round of the ANZ Championship, the Mission Queensland Firebirds (the team of Allora's own Laura Gietz) had a tough job ahead of them to have a chance of making the finals.

Heading up against Waikato Bay of Plenty Magic who had just as much on the line, the Firebirds couldn't bring home a win and went down 53-43

They went into the game ready to do it for injured Wing Defence Keirra Trompf, but the Firebirds struggled against a strong Magic outfit who were playing in front of a sell-out home crowd.

Starting this crucial match was Romelda Aiken (GS), Natalie Medhurst (GA), Chelsea Pitman (WA), Elissa Macleod (C), Shannon Eagland (WD), Jacinta Messer (GD) and Laura Geitz (GK).

In the first guarter, shooters Medhurst and Aiken were cool under immense pressure shooting at 100 per cent up against hard defence from Leana de Bruin (GK) and Casey Williams (GD).

At the other end of the court, Firebirds defenders Jacinta Messer and Laura Geitz were working overtime to stop Magic shooters Irene van Dvk (GS) and Julianna Naoupu (GA).

Despite their best efforts across the court, the Firebirds couldn't end the guarter ahead, trailing by one 14-13.

In an attempt to stem Wing Attack Khao Watts, Jencke brought Amy Steel into Wing Defence to replace Shannon Eagland in the second quarter. This seemed to work, with the Magic's attack severely affected, but it was not enough for the Firebirds to sneak ahead. This was Steel's first outing as WD during the season and she has showed her versatility as a defender. Jencke said she brought in Steel to make use of her height and

put extra pressure on the Magic's attackers. "We just needed to be patient and wait for it to open up, I have been happy with the way the team has been controlling the ball," she said.

Aiken continued to shoot at 100 per cent with Medhust dropping just one goal in the quarter, but immense pressure in the centre court from the Magic, was just stopping the Firebirds getting the ball into the circle and they ended the half behind by three 27-24. Coming into the third quarter, it was a fired up Firebirds who came on court, starting with a spectacular intercept by Jacinta Messer to help her team take the lead.



Across the court the Firebirds were working in unison to try and shut down the Magic and maintain their lead, but the Magic had just as much to fight for. They fought back, going hard against the Firebirds to take the lead again and end the quarter ahead by four 40-36. In the fourth guarter, Jencke brought on Lauren Nourse to replace Elissa Macleod in Centre.

At first Nourse's impact was clear on court with her aerial passes to Aiken working to the team's advantage, but the Magic continued to wear down the Firebirds across the court. Trailing by eight with just over six minutes to go, Nourse called a time out and Jencke mixed it up again moving Nourse to WA to replace Pitman and bringing on Macleod into Centre to try and get back into the game.

But it was not enough. Magic continued to dominate upping the ante and the pressure showed with Aiken missing her first goal of the night with just under six minutes to go, dropping another just minutes later. Both Aiken and Medhurst played excellently just dropping six goals across the entire game.

The Magic won the game 53-43, ending the Firebirds hopes of a chance in the finals and ending their season. They will finish the regular season in sixth place.

Captain Lauren Nourse said it was disappointing to lose, but she was proud of her team.

"It's always a big ask coming over her to play the Magic and this was not the result we were hoping for." she said.

"We let the ball go and had high expectations on ourselves: unfortunately we dropped a few crucial games at the beginning of the season and let ourselves out of the game."

In the history of the ANZ Championship, no team has gone on to make the finals in the year following their premiership win. The Firebirds sixth placed finish is the best result any team has had and is equal to the Adelaide Thunderbirds following their premiership win in 2010.
