
The nationally acclaimed Caxton Street Jazz Band will perform at the Tenth Anniversary annual Allora Jazz Cabaret on Saturday evening.

Annual Rates Notices the best option

Southern Downs Regional Councillors have considered a report into the effect on ratepayers if the issue of rates notices was to change from annually to either half yearly or guarterly. "Council felt that it was important to consider this issue as it is aware that a lump sum annual rates payment can be very difficult for some ratepavers to manage financially." said the Mayor, Cr Peter Blundell.

The report advised Councillors that issuing rates half-yearly instead of annually would cost Council an extra \$532,284 per year (based on 2011-12 costs). To issue rates notices quarterly would cost Council an extra \$883,119 per year. These amounts are comprised predominately of lost interest revenue. Other costs not factored into these figures include setting up costs and additional staffing costs to process the additional volume of work required.

"The figures indicate that the financial costs to issue rates notices more regularly would place too high a burden on ratepayers who are already dealing with increasing costs of living," said the Mayor.

"To cover this extra cost, rates would need to increase by 2% to issue half yearly, or 4% to issue guarterly," explained the Mayor.

"This additional increase is not something Council wants to impose on its ratepavers." he said.

The Mayor advised that there are many payment options available to ratepavers.

"Ratepayers do not have to visit Council's offices to make payments. Payments can also be made in many other ways, including BPay and on Council's website," Mayor Blundell explained.

"Payments in advance by instalments are also an option and are a great way to make sure you don't lose your discount," he added.

"If ratepayers are experiencing difficulty making rate payments approval can be sought for paying off rates by instalments. No interest will be charged on the overdue balance if there is a current rates arrangement in place but you will lose the discount."

HIGH SCHOOLS CAN WIN \$5000: **GREAT SPAGHETTI BRIDGE** CHALLENGE AT THE EKKA

Iconic Queensland based company Thiess is throwing down the challenge to all Queensland high schools and their years 9 to 12 students to enter the 2012 Thiess Spaghetti Bridge Competition at the Brisbane Ekka.

Budget preparations continue

In planning for the 2012/2013 budget, Council has instructed officers to prepare a budget based on a lower percentage increase than projected on the 10 year financial plan.

"Increased efficiencies and the community's concerns about cost reduction are issues which Councillors are trying to address while still attempting to maintain service levels," said the Mayor Cr Peter Blundell.

In preparing the budget Council takes into consideration the Council Cost Index which bears little relation to the Consumer Price Index (CPI) which most people are familiar with. The CPI is a price rise index based on householders consumption, while the Council cost index is industry related and reflects the costs associated with construction. The Council Cost Index is generally higher than the CPI as it contains the cost of building materials such as road base, concrete and steel.

The difference in these figures explains the necessity for Council adopting higher than the general CPI increase. "A reduction in the level of Council's borrowings is also being reviewed together with a reduced capital works program to accommodate a reduction in borrowings," the Mayor said. Council's Fees & Charges for 2012-2013 have already been adopted with no greater increases than 5%, except for those areas impacted by significant cost increases to Council. Council is continuing its budget considerations and is expected to adopt the budget by the end of this month.





This earlier presentation highlighted the overall benefits of the industry to the country with DNRM presenting their view on the regulation and control of the industry.

"Council heard the Southern Downs Protection Group's presentation to gain a balanced perspective on the issue," said Mayor Peter Blundell.

"It is imperative for Council to be aware of all sides of this matter prior to any decision making," he said.

Council will be further considering the issue of Coal Seam Gas mining at a more in-depth session at a future special meeting.




