Allora Playgroup Grant \$uccess

The Allora Playgroup have received a significant boost with the recent announcement of their successful application for a \$5,000 grant under the Volunteers Grant 2012 program offered by the Federal Government's Department of Families, Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs.

The Minister for Families, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs, the Hon Jenny Macklin MP, and the Minister for Community Services, the Hon Julie Collins MP, recently announced that more than 166,000 volunteers across 4,800 organisations throughout Australia will benefit from funding of \$16 million under Volunteer Grants 2012. Grants of between \$1,000 and \$5,000 each were available to enable organisations to purchase small equipment items to assist volunteers

Elated Allora Playgroup spokesperson Mrs. Hayley Mason said "We applied for the maximum grant of \$5,000 in late July 2012, and it was granted recently". There are specific categories relating to funding availability, with the Playgroup, who are based at the former Allora Girl Guides facility in Warwick Street, using their grant to upgrade or acquire cleaning equipment, first aid equipment, outdoor furniture & fire safety equipment.

Ratepayers in the Southern Downs region are reminded that the deadline to receive the discount on payment of your water rates is 5.00pm this Friday 16 November 2012.

plants.

"The landowner was astounded that volunteers from around the world willingly visited his property to help the environment," she said.

"Groundcover is one of the most important ways to protect against soil erosion so the volunteers' contribution to revegetation is extremely valuable."

Similar work will soon be completed on the remaining two sites beside Glengallan Creek at Maryvale and Dalrymple Creek at Allora.

The gully stabilisation activities are part of a wider relief effort by Condamine Alliance funded through the National Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements via the Queensland Reconstruction Authority.

Gully repair mission on home stretch

Condamine Alliance has passed the half way point in its mission to repair the catchment's five worst flood-eroded gullies. One of the selected sites is in Allora and repair work is due to start at that site soon. Heavy rain and flood



waters during the 2010-11 storm season ripped large gullies in areas especially near waterways, roads and irrigation equipment.

To stop further erosion of these gullies, Condamine Alliance identified five priority sites under the Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Program.

Since the excavators rolled in two months ago, three of the five sites earmarked for urgent attention have been repaired. Greenmount, Ramsay and Peranga sites were restored

according to site-specific surveys and modelling prepared by international engineering firm Cardno ENTRIX in collaboration with local soil conservationists of Ninderry Associates.

This involved installing rock chutes and re-establishing vegetation to prevent further erosion.

"At its worst, the damaged Greenmount gully had widened to about 40 metres and 2.5 metres high," Condamine Alliance Principal Project Officer-Community Alexandra Kennedy said. "It took about 10 days for the excavator to flatten the slope and install the rock chute," Ms Kennedy said.

A team of international volunteers from Conservation Volunteers Australia then revegetated the site with 800 native Lomandra

About fifteen members and friends of the ALG were invited to the property of fellow members Jenny and Ross Gardner in the Goomburra Valley last Sunday. The intent was to inspect progress on the "Land for Wildlife" project that the Gardners



have been conducting there for the past two years. The project is sponsored by Caring For Our Country, as a voluntary conservation program that supports participants in protecting, enhancing and rehabilitating native flora and fauna on their property by the establishment of a dedicated wildlife corridor. This involves management advice, workshops, field days, regular newsletters and opportunities to meet other likeminded landholders. Also, fencing relevant sections of land, weed eradication and new plantings, land improvement methods and animal husbandry are included in the mix of options open to participants. Benefits

are obvious and can include property-specific advice, workshops and field days. The ALG spent the morning walking and inspecting the section of the property which had been turned over to achieve the corridor.

Indigenous weeds and noxious plants were recorded and signs

of animal activity noted. Wallaby and echidna were in evidence as were nesting birds. Methods and techniques for eradication of dominant privet and blackberry were discussed as well as future directions for the project. The day finished with a social function, away from the flies that appear to have surfaced with the advent of the weekend rain.

The day was considered a great success, technically as well as socially and this was due in no small part to the generosity of Steve Blakemore on behalf of the David Evans Group in Warwick who generously provided a people- mover to assist those ALG members who are no longer as nimble on their feet as they would like. 

Council checks out Killarney's Condamine River Road

Southern Downs Regional Council conducted an inspection tour of the Condamine River Road. Killarney on Monday. 5 November, as a result of discussions on Council maintenance of the road. Councillors undertook this inspection to familiarise themselves with the area and condition of the road.

Taking part in the inspection tour were all Southern Downs Regional Councillors, the CEO. Mr Andrew Roach, as well as staff from Council's Engineering and Planning Directorates. Council intends to hold meetings with interested groups, including residents and environmental groups, regarding management issues surrounding the Condamine Gorge and the road.

"This will inform Council's decision making in relation to Council policy on maintenance of this road and the associated management issues." advised the Mayor. Cr Peter Blundell. "This area is a very special part of the region and our discussions need to include the concept of preserving the amenity and natural beauty of the area," the Mayor added. A report will be prepared for Council's consideration following the discussions.

Council's CEO introduced at **Business Breakfast**

Southern Downs Regional Council held the first of its Business Breakfasts last Tuesday (6 November), to introduce the new CEO. Mr Andrew Roach to the Warwick area business community.

The Mayor said that the breakfast, held at the Warwick Golf Club, provided a great opportunity to introduce the new CEO to business owners and to offer the opportunity for networking leading to a better understanding of the relevant issues between Council and the business community.

"It was fantastic to have roughly 20 business representatives attend the breakfast to meet with Andrew," the Mayor said. The Mayor provided a brief introduction and CEO, Andrew

Roach gave a key address in which he outlined plans for the next 12 months.

"The plan over the next 12 months is to achieve financial stability, improve customer service and instil a culture of 1 team throughout Council's organisation," Mr Roach said.

"It is important as a Council to achieve these goals," he said. The Mayor added, 'I am very keen to continue to forge the links between Council and the business community across the region."

Council held another business breakfast for the Stanthorpe area business community last night, Wednesday 14 November.

Council considers action on parking study

Southern Downs Regional Council has this week considered a report into a parking study of the Stanthorpe and Warwick Central Business District (CBD) areas.

Council engaged Osborn Lane Consultant Engineers early this year to review current car parking in these areas with a view to developing a long term plan to guide the future provision of additional CBD car parking. Council will then be able to consider these requirements in future budgetary considerations. The study incorporated anticipated requirements through to 2021.

"The study has indicated that there is adequate car parking in both the Warwick and Stanthorpe CBD areas," said the Mayor, Cr Peter Blundell

"In Warwick during peak times, the under-utilised car parking in Acacia Avenue, which is less than a block from the CBD, will more than adequately meet demand," he added.

"Council will look to better signage for the Acacia Avenue car parks to raise awareness of the availability of car parking in this area."

Council will also consider the possible development of vacant sites adjacent to existing car parks in Warwick should there be a demand in future years to warrant this.

The report also indicated that there was capacity for growth to meet future demand in Stanthorpe.

"Council will now need to consider the issues raised in the report and will also need to make a decision primarily around the regulation of parking into the future," the Mayor said.

"Council will consult with the community prior to any changes being made, with the outcomes of that consultation to inform Council's decision," the Mayor advised.

"It can be difficult for some to 'keep-up' with the latest technology but the workshops are designed to make learning easier." she said.

Changed traffic conditions at West School to apply soon

Southern Downs Regional Council advises residents that changed traffic conditions around West School will apply as from Monday 19 November 2012.

Education Queensland's building renewal project has seen the need to review access arrangements to Warwick West State School.

The Hudson Street drop off/pick up zone is being relocated to Clarke Street near the access gate. The attached map outlines the changes to be made.

Council, in consultation with the School, will undertake the works after school hours on Friday 16 November so that there is minimal disruption to normal school traffic. The new drop off/ pick up zone will be operational for the start of school on Monday 19 November.

"Relocation of the drop off/pick up zone to Clarke Street will not only solve the current access issues the School is having, it will also reduce traffic concerns in Hudson Street," advised Peter See, Director Engineering Services.

"Hudson Street is guite a narrow street and can be very busy especially before and after school," he said.

"Clarke Street, on the other hand, is much wider so traffic bottlenecks can be more easily avoided."

Additional line marking and parking bay works in Clarke Street adjacent to the school will also be carried out as part of the change.


