



ANZAC Day display was taking shape in Jon Constable's Pharmacy window, Society members Graeme McMillan and Graham Anderson are focused on preparing a rare 1941 Sunshine milking machine with Historical Society President Allan Darr. The milking machine comes complete with a separator, milk pump & wash up tub, and has an accompanying Sundial engine, all generously donated to the Historical Society by the Telford family, and all to be displayed on April 20th at the Society's Display & Demonstration Day.

The Historical Society shed reveals many more historical gems of machinery from the rural past, and while the milking machine won't be operating for the coming display event, a Moffat Virtue single stand shearing plant manufactured in 1898 in Europe will be in action shearing sheep for all to see.

Another significant attraction of the Display & Demonstration Day on April 20th is the restored former Allora Shire Council meeting room in the old Allora Shire Hall that now serves as a museum and research centre under the control of the Allora Historical Society. The meeting room was recently repainted thanks to volunteers Graham Anderson and Bob Lawson, and the photographs of the 28 men who served as Mayor or Chairman of the Allora area from 1869-1994 are soon to be remounted on the walls. Of those, 21 served as Mayors of the Allora Municipal Council from 1869 until 1915, and nine served as Shire Chairman of the Allora Shire Council from 1915-1994, including two who had previously served as Mayor.

The old Allora Town Hall itself was built on 1907, becoming the

Dalrymple Creek Road floodway reconstruction

The Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) advises flood reconstruction works will soon begin on a damaged floodway crossing on Dalrymple Creek Road, 13 kilometres west of Allora.

These works will involve reconstruction of the floodway structure, including removal of debris, backfill of scour locations and new batter protection.

Work on the floodway will commence in the week of 15 April 2013 and be completed by mid-May, weather permitting. The works will be carried out by the RoadTek on behalf of TMR.

Southern Downs Regional Council will also be carrying out pavement stabilisation on Dalrymple Creek Road between the floodway and Hansens Road intersection from Monday 8 April

During these works, a detour using Hansens Road and Hendon Victoria Hill Road will be in place.

Motorists are reminded to obey all signage and drive to conditions for their own safety and the safety of road workers and other motorists.

These works are being delivered through Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements (NDRRA), a joint federal and state initiative. Under NDRRA, the Australian Government provides 75 per cent of the funding, with 25 per cent from the Queensland Government.

Allora's Past 25 years ago 1988

Station Demolished

Allora district residents were upset at the hasty demolition of the 119 year old Hendon railway station. Queensland Railways, the owners of the building, had given no indication of its impending destruction. The station had been erected in 1869 with the construction of the railway from Toowoomba, and was the terminus of the line until it reached Warwick in 1871. The station serviced the Pratten goldfields during the boom years of the 1870's and was the loading and unloading point for goods, passengers and mail to and from Allora until the branch line was built in 1897.

A spokesman for the Q. R. office in Toowoomba defended the Department's actions and said that the building was riddled with white ants and impossible to repair.

A vote of confidence in Mr. Groom and thanks for his many services to the district was proposed by Mr. W. Deacon, seconded by Mr. G. C. Clark and supported by Mr. F. Grayson M. L. A. It was carried by acclamation.

The Allora Historical Society is holding a Demonstration & Display Day with the theme of *The Dairy Industry* on 20th April 2013. The following is from a series of articles telling the story of the Dairy Industry in the Allora district each week...

MEMORIES AND STORIES OF THE DAIRY INDUSTRY

John Geitz at aged 17 was the cream carrier from the Victoria Hill district to the Allora Butter Factory. At that time there were 61 suppliers. John remembers some of the other locals who also carted cream from other districts as well as others associated with the butter factory. John was the cream carrier for a period of 5 years. Ron Pettigrew took over from John then Max Pitkin had the run. Prior to that Max lived at Inveramsay and carted the cream from that area down the Goomburra valley to Allora. Allora's Don Denny had the Pilton cream carrying run before he started his engineering business. Johnny Barr was Pilton's next cream carrier then Ron May. In later years, Errol May carried cream in the Table Top area in the back of a utility.

John remembers the wood carters, Eric Henschell, Mick Davies and Col and Keith Rix. John tells the yarn about Mick Davies fooling the Manager of the Allora Factory, "Daddy"





Lickiss by coming in late with a load, having it weighed but not unloading then turning up the next day and having a same load weighed again!

John can remember the engine drivers, Edgar Gwynne and Dick Slatter, butter maker Herb Volker and factory workers, Bill Ellis, Ernie Gartner and Barry Geitz.

Tom Huston used to bring his cream in from Mt. Marshall in the 'trotter' spring cart with the rubber tyred wheels. Others who carried their own cream from their dairies were the Hills, Chalks, Jim Crookey and Stan Erich. Mick Byrne drove his horse and cart, delivered the cream, picked up the butter and other supplies then tied the horse up under the trees at the back of the picture theatre. His next stop was the Royal Hotel where he spent a good part of the day before making his way home

There were Dorrie and Dick Byrnes in the store along with Pat Connors, John Hamilton, Denny Butler, Betty Barr and Bill McKay who was exceptionally good with figures, adding the sums up in his head.

One local identity who John remembers well is John Paholke who always wore a suit. He drove a Ford truck bringing the older primary school children into Rural School from Victoria Hill and Ellinthorpe. After picking them up at the end of lessons, he drove the truck to the store where the children purchased goods for their family. John timed them with his fob chain watch.

Peter Cavanagh's great grandparents were Irish. They were part of the great numbers of Irish people who came to Australia during the years of 1860s and 1870s.

His grandfather, John known as Jack and his wife Bridget (nee O'Dea) had a farm at Upper Freestone. The farm was lost at the time of a major bank bust in the early 1900s. Like many others they borrowed money from money lenders and could not make repayments. Jack worked on Glengallan Station from 1909 where he was in charge of the horses. Their home was where Virgil Willett later lived near Glengallan Creek. Jack's sons also worked on the station. In 1920-21 the family went to Pilton to work for the Berniche family. They started sharefarming on Dean's dairy farm at Berat in 1923. James Dean was the Manager of Barnes & Co. at the time and later became a Mayor of the Allora Council. The small herd was milked by hand and the separated milk fed to the pigs. Jack and Bridget had a family of eight sons and three daughters. All the older sons worked on the farm before moving away. Daughter Francie worked with her family till she married when she was

in her early thirties. Bridget was a seamstress prior to her marriage. She would have been busy caring for her large family, sewing, making bread, churning butter and cooking and general household chores.

The farm consists of approx. 180 acres originally purchased from the Government by William Dean as a Agriculture Land Purchase and a 120 acre block purchased by him from the Picken family who moved further up the Goomburra valley. The farm was worked by a team of horses.

During a drought in 1926, the creek dried up. There was no water in the creek from the bridge at Goomburra to the bridge at Berat. Peter recalls that this happened again in the year 2000. In the 1926 drought all the cows died except two or three. The horses were spared and Jack worked on neighbouring farms to make a living for his family. The drought was broken with rainfall of four inches that fell on Boxing Day 1926 and the Cavanagh family were able to plant corn. Thankfully the corn was sold for a very good price. Improvements were made with the purchase of a 1020 tractor.

The share farming arrangement continued and in 1946 a six bail dairy with a Ridd Milking Machine with three sets of cups was installed. This building is part of the milk room in the new herringbone dairy used by Peter on the farm today. The end of the Second World War saw an improvement in prices. There was great demand for butter, beef, pork and grain throughout the Commonwealth.

Peter's father Ned who married Illma (nee Rauchle) in 1948 took over the share-farm from his father in 1952. The arrangement with the Dean family was half share of the income from the crops and half the cream cheque with the Deans receiving the bulk of the sale of the pigs.

A new piggery was built in 1954 by Jim Byrne near the site of the old dirt floor piggery.

Ned and Illma had ten children. Illma and the children helped in the dairy. At this time about thirty cows were being milked and 100 acres was under grain crops. Changes came to the dairy industry with the change-over to milk production in 1967 and bulk milk in 1968. A milk vat was installed. The milk initially went to the Warwick Co-op Dairy Factory then later bulk tankers went to Toowoomba. Peter now sends his milk to the Lion Nathan owned factory, Dairy Farmers at Crestmead in Brisbane.

After a share-farming arrangement of 45 years, the farm was sold by James Dean's sons to Ned and Illma Cavanagh. The original herd was the Illawarra breed then a change was made to the Fresian breed. Peter has introduced the Brown Swiss dairy breed. This breed had its origins in Switzerland and is popular in America and Europe. The Brown Swiss is a big framed cow that calves with very few problems. This breed is more suited to the open grazing that Peter prefers.

Legend Visits Museum That Punches Well Above Its Weight

The Allora Sports Museum is experiencing a steady stream of sporting enthusiast traffic of late, the guest book at the entrance recording visitors from far and wide taking in liberal dose of the tremendous amount of sporting history that has emerged from the Allora region.

Last Sunday was no different, only one guest was a legend himself, a name recognisable to many across Australia, especially if you were keen to test your pugilistic ability at the local agricultural Show, or whether you were just watching the active participants.

The guest's name is Fred Brophy, the last boxing tent showman in the world, a man who has become a legend at events around the outback. Fred had his tent set up at the annual Warwick

Show late last week, and on his way back north he pulled into the Allora Sports Museum and spent some time with museum guide and Allora Regional Sports Museum committee President Perry Cronin. It doesn't get much better for Perry, ushering a legend around a museum full of legends.

Fred Brophy, who is the current owner of the Crocow Hotel in Central Queensland, is a fourth generation showman; his dad was a side-show operator and his mum a trapeze artist. For four generations the Brophy Boxing Tent has toured the countryside challenging local brawlers to take on the might of a Brophy boxer.

Tent boxing was an amusement seen at agricultural shows throughout Australia. Along with Brophy's, the more famous of tent boxing troupes, are the ones created by Roy Bell and Jimmy Sharman. Born in England, the boxing tent is now an endangered phenomenon, banned in Britain and the United States. The Australian outback is today the only place such an attraction can survive. Bureaucracy and legalities have whittled down the tents in Australia with only Brophy's Boxing Tent remaining, with rules and regulations dictating that the tent only appears in Queensland and the Northern Territory.

Starting in the late 19th Century boxing troupes of professional fighters would travel the mining towns and outback of the country, following fairs, carnivals & Shows, putting up big top tents and taking on all-comers for cash in the ring.

In their heyday during the 1920s and 1960s, dozens of boxing tents regularly toured the country show circuit. With the sounding of a drum, the local talent lined up to take on the travelling troupe of boxers.

Everyday men were elevated to heroes as punches were traded in the ring. Local lads were lured into the ring by big

Warriors Snare Eagles at Gold Park

The Eagles raced to a 10 – 0 lead after just ten minutes, before Wattles' hooker Josh McIntosh gave another example of his obvious class, taking a tap kick fifteen metres out before bursting through defenders and popping a round the corner pass to an eager Aaron Vietheer who nailed the Warriors opening try. Among a rising penalty count both ways, fiveeighth Regan Howells added another Eagles try to the total, his side leading 16 - 4. Powerful back-rower Michael Nauschutz was always a difficult package for the Eagles to contain, and added a try to his season total running off experienced fiveeighth Burwood Robinson to keep Wattles in touch on the scoreboard. 
