

Ratepayers in the Southern Downs region should have received, or will soon be receiving, their water rates notices. The deadline to receive the discount on payment of water rates is 5.00pm on Friday, 17 May 2013.

"We do remind people, particularly those paying by BPay, to make sure their payment is received by Council by 5.00pm on the due date," said CEO, Andrew Roach.

In 2008 the few remaining Apexians handed the reins over to the Allora Show Society, guiding them all the way. Items are sold on commission if not donated and the profits are shared between the Show Society & all the organisations volunteering their services throughout the weekend. Last year 29 local organisations received funds. Approximately 200 volunteers assist over the 3 days. The showground is amassed with items for sale on Saturday & Sunday, ready for auction on Monday. Twelve auctioneers, working 3 at a time, share their workload throughout the day which begins at 8am sharp. Approximately 1000 bidders try their luck to snare the bargains. Dear Editor.

I would like to say, how interesting I found your "early day stories"; and how the people of Allora worked so hard to start the town of Allora. I found the Butter Factory, and the Volker family most interesting. I did know the Volkers rather well. Then to read where they won the "Franco British Gold" medal

was most exciting. I only wish I had known about it in my early days in Allora. I only knew of two of them.

Some years ago I went with my daughter, Cr. Anne Glasheen to a conference in Bundaberg; and before we came home we did a tour of the Bundaberg Rum Company. I found it most interesting when I a long look at their Museum Room especially as hangng on the wall was a 1909 "Franco British Gold" medal. I asked if I could see the manager or secretary, but the staff said "No". Even though I explained why I wanted to see them.

The only other one, was belonging to my father, Charles Edward White Jr., who won it for being the first person to grow cotton in St. George, in 1910. It always hung over the sideboard in our dining room. When I inherited it, I took it out to the opening of the new St. George Cotton Ginnery, to put in their office. The Head (M.D.) of the Cotton Marketing Board, wanted it to go in the Head Office in Brisbane. As it was a great honour to win, I felt it should stay in St. George.

Allora Salutes the Fallen, those who Served & Those Who Continue to

Serve

When attending Allora's Memorial Park on ANZAC Dav morning one cannot help but be drawn to read the lengthy roll of names, of those that made the supreme sacrifice in conflict, listed on the Memorials that rise from the neatly cut lawns. Those names later echo in the silence as they are recited, along with the names of those who have departed this life since. One of the etched

black marble plaques at the base of the towering World War 1 memorial recognizes the military exploits of Private John Leak VC, Queensland's first recipient of a Victoria Cross, the highest award for acts of bravery in wartime. Few towns would be able to recognize a local Victoria Cross recipient in their special area of remembrance, Allora most fortunate to have that honour. While John Leak was born in 1892 at Portsmouth, England, the former soldier and teamster was a soldier settler in 1919 and 1920 at Berat, a farming area located between Allora and Goomburra. A memorial in his honour is erected at the site of his former Berat home, another magnificent mosaic erected in the city of his enlistment, Rockhampton. He was fortunate enough to survive the war, come home, raise a family and pass away peacefully at the age of 80.

Twenty-two year old Leak enlisted as a Private in the Australian Imperial Force on January 28th 1915, and joined his unit, the 9th Battalion on June 22nd at Gallipoli, before being posted to France and the Western Front in early 1916. As a result of his incredibly heroic actions at the Battle of Pozieres in France on the 23rd July 1916, he was awarded the Victoria Cross for conspicuous bravery.

The former Berat resident was discharged from the AIF in May 1919, but not before being wounded in August 1916 at Mouquet Farm and severely gassed at Hollebeke, Belgium in March 1918

After leaving the Allora area he resided in New South Wales,

Looking Back... Allora's Past 25 years ago April 1988 **Dairy Deregulation** Warning

Chairman of the Warwick Co-operative Dairy Association, Mr. Len Weier, warned that moves by the Minister for Primary Industries, Mr. Neville Harper, to deregulate the dairy industry in Queensland would have long term adverse effects. The decision to lift the freeze on the transfer of dairy entitlements from one processor to another would disadvantage smaller Queensland dairy co-operatives, because they would be required to pay more for milk to retain their suppliers, Mr. Weier said. He warned that unless serious consideration was given to the proposals, it could lead to the demise of the dairy industry in south-east Queensland.

The above paragraph appeared in our issue last week in an interesting account on the doings of the Mawson Expedition in Antarctica. We are informed that Jeffryes who was spoken of as doing splendid work in connection with the wireless telegraphy outfit, is none other than Syd Jeffryes, son of the late Mr. H. J. Jeffryes for many years postmaster in Allora. The expedition is at present in the winter headquarters in Adelie Land on the mainland, on which Australians were the first to set foot.

Our young friend Syd is coming into prominence in the new and wonderful world of "wireless" a fact on which we heartily congratulate him.

(Unfortunately Syd Jeffryes suffered a mental breakdown soon after this article was published and became a passenger to the Mawson Expedition which, when

the relief ship failed to reach them the following summer. was forced to spend a second winter in Antarctica before returning to Australia the next year)


Painting the Town

PRATTEN **RE-VISITED**

When gold was discovered at Pratten in 1865, it precipitated a rush of miners to the area. At the height of mining activity a township of 3,000 workers had been established with a hotel, school, church, doctor and blacksmith. The discovery of richer, easier-to-access gold seams at Gympie quickly drained the workforce from Pratten which almost became a ghost town.

Last month the Clifton Photographers visited Pratten to capture images of the present community and its historic buildings. The results of their visit are to be displayed in 'Pratten Re-visited', an exhibition at the Clifton Library Gallery. Members of Clifton Creative Writers have joined forces with the photographers to add texts, tales and poems relating to Pratten.

"Just place any unwanted items neatly by the kerbside and Council will do the rest" he said.

Articles placed on the footpath must be able to be lifted safely by two people and items such as refrigerators and wardrobes must have doors removed prior to placement on the footpath. To enable recycling, Council also asks that items be separated into stockpiles of green waste, scrap metal and other materials. Please note that the following items will not be removed:

- · chemicals and chemical containers, including paint · wet or putrescible materials (food scraps, liquids etc)

NATIONAL KELPIE FIELD TRIAL AUSTRALIAN CHAMPIONSHIP AT ALLORA SHOWGROUNDS 26 -28 APRIL 2013

Dogs and handlers are coming from all over Australia to Allora to compete in this utility trial, a combination of yard and paddock work. Each year the trial is held in a different state. This year Queensland is organising the trial. It was last held in Queensland in 2007 then also in Allora.

The Working Kelpie Council was formed in 1965 to ensure the future of the breed as a working sheep dog, as well as to record, register and promote the working skills of the Kelpie. Today the W.K.C. represents members from throughout Australia and internationally.

The Championships give spectators a chance to see some of the best of the Kelpie breed, while competitors vie for the honour of being the National Champion. This is the elite of the Kelpies competing against each other, with the overall goal to improve the breed. These trials are only open to registered Kelpies. Major sponsors of the event are the Working

Kelpie Council of Australia, Southern Downs Working Dog Club, Coprice Dog Food and working dog enthusiasts from throughout Queensland.

Our judge will be Mr John Rosten, Armidale, NSW. John is a renowned handler, trainer and judge of working dogs throughout Australia.

Allora Rural Neighbourhood Watch: POLICE REPORT (covering February – March 2013)

03/02/13: A 39-year-old Deuchar resident was charged with driving an unregistered & uninsured Ford bearing false plates along Hendon Deuchar Road following interception by Warwick Traffic Branch. The driver was fined a total of \$1056 by the Warwick Magistrate.

Hentschel Fires as Warriors Snare **Rvan Shield**

The "National Farmers Warehouse" Wattles 'Warriors' flexed muscle at Toowoomba's Glenholme Park this afternoon to dominate the Brothers 'Leprechauns' across the ground resulting in a 48 - 24 victory, a third successive Toowoomba Rugby League fixture win in as many weeks and the added prize of the elusive Dan Ryan Memorial Shield.

It was the first time Wattles had won the prestigious shield since its inception in 2005, and as the final hooter sounded` it was the first time for six years that Wattles have registered a win over Brothers.

Lock forward Aaron Scheid activated the scoreboard after six minutes when Matt Duggan sliced through before offloading to the Warrior stalwart for the opening try of the game. Brothers upped the ante somewhat after the restart, given the prospect of the Dan Ryan Memorial Shield's tenure at Glenholme coming to an end, and the need for vital competition points to keep the sixth place 2012 Premiers in touch with the top five on the ladder. The first ten minutes reaped no points until the 'Warriors' backs decided to move the ball around, Ryan Duggan and Michael Duggan featuring to the lead up to a try by 'Wandoan Wonder' Luke Baker. Baker, recently selected in the Toowoomba 'Clydesdales', packed into

the second-row this week and had to work for his try, reaching out while held in a tackle to advance Wattles score to 32 - 10.

It was the Michael & Matt Duggan show again minutes later that resulted and rampaging centre Matt McCarthy touching down for Wattles' seventh try.

Two quick tries by Brothers kept them in touch with a win, trailing 20 - 36 with seventeen minutes on the match clock.

Wattles band of loyal supporters who had Glenholme Park looking a picture of green & gold may have developed some jitters, were the 'Leprechauns' staging a late revival ? Or perhaps memories of fulltime in Round 17 last year when Wattles and Brothers last clashed, the boys from Platz Oval on the wrong end of a 94 - 12 calamity. 

Mountain Reserve. This was recently concluded using money from a "Clean up our Backyard" grant to employ two expert consultants. The results will inform further weeding and planting priorities, which will be carried out over the next 12 months, in accordance with grant conditions. We intend to plant up to five hundred trees and shrubs native to the area, using information from the survey. Early data from the flora survey indicates approximately 35 new species not on view when the last survey was undertaken in 2002 during the drought.

Anyone driving by the Forest Plain Road entrance to the Reserve will notice vigorous tree and shrub growth, the legacy of the plantings undertaken by the students of Allora State School last year under the supervision of the group. The entrance is now becoming quite welcoming to visitors. Appropriate signage and picnic tables will be installed soon using money from SDRC grants. We are awaiting further input from council with bollards to be installed at the entrance to the car park.

The ALG paid for grading and surfacing of a road to give alternate access to the reservoir level of the reserve. This runs from the gates of the transfer station along the existing gazetted road. A number of Southern Downs Regional Councillors have inspected this, and more visits with other SDRC personnel are planned. We are awaiting council work to open the entrance to this road.

At the reservoir itself, we intend to use grant money made available from the Warwick Credit Union to develop car parking and picnic facilities, and to install fencing for stock control. The ALG spent a morning there recently to review the plans on site. The attached photos are a record of the day. Membership of the "Friends of Allora Mountain" group currently stands at

approximately one hundred and seventy. The group was developed to demonstrate community support for our activities, a necessary condition when we apply for grants monies. We thank all of you who have signed up. We are conscious we have not communicated directly with members since the signon last year but we are working on methods of doing so and hope to have regular dialogue in place shortly. 
