Jumpers & Jazz survival kit a must

Still on wardrobe, Sue Hamlet says the best thing about Jumpers & Jazz is that conservatism is totally out of the window.

"At this festival, you can dress to suit your personality and not look like an oddball. You have to go brighter to fit in and colour rules! Your survival kit should include scarves and hats in much brighter hues than you might usually wear, but be careful not to wear earrings that tangle in your scarf," she added.

Sue is adamant though that the most important JJJ accessory is a smile. "If you are not grinning from ear to ear at the funky arty vibe, then you won't fit in at all."


She also tips that 'hand made' rules supreme.

The findings of the recent business survey conducted by Council's Economic Development Unit (EDU) are in and reveal that our region is viewed as a good place to do business. Our close proximity to the major centres of Brisbane and SE Queensland as well as our welcoming communities, liveability and affordability are major factors for locating a business in our region.

The survey found that 80% of respondents are very satisfied or satisfied with the business outlook for the coming year however the availability of suitable employees is a problem for many businesses.

The region wide survey was conducted on behalf of Council by Professor Paul Hyland, Queensland University of Technology and Mr Phillip Curtis, Annexco Pty Ltd. The survey report identified nine recommendations based on the findings and an action plan has been developed to address the recommendations. Many of the recommendations from the report are currently activities already being undertaken within the EDU.

A summary of the recommendations and planned actions from the survey are as follows:

1. Continue to promote the comparative advantage of the SDRC region.

Proposed action: Continue with strategic investment attraction activity and continue promotion of regional advantages.

- 2. Promote lifestyle and livability factors to potential residents and new businesses
- 3. Increase the marketing and subsequent visibility of the Economic development Unit.
- Proposed action: Continuation of business page in newspapers, launch of EDU website and redevelopment of an EDU newsletter to meet business information needs.
- 4. Contact Businesses that responded to the survey and conduct focus groups.
- Proposed Action: Focus groups to be formed organised as business skills and innovation.
- 5. Provide interested businesses with material that describes support offered by council for economic development activities.
- Proposed Action: Package of relevant information to be provided to interested businesses.
- 6. Establish an industry advisory committee from business people throughout the region.
- Proposed action: Advisory groups may be formed pending the outcomes of the focus groups and as the review of the current economic development strategy gets underway.
- 7. Update and improve existing data bases of businesses and continue to measure and benchmark business activity.






