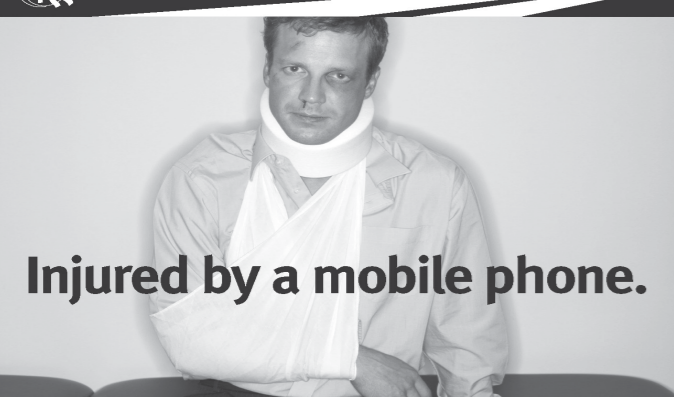

Jumpers & Jazz survival kit a must

With over 80 events on offer over 10 days, Jumpers & Jazz organisers thought it timely to put together a 'Survival Guide' in the iconic event's 10th year.

Warwick Tourism & Events CEO Tracy Vellacott contacted some JJJ stalwarts seeking their advice on tips to make the most of the festival.

"My colleagues Gen Y'er Shona Gibson, tree jumper artist Helen Gross and festival champion Sue Hamlet have come up with suggestions ranging from what to wear to gift shopping, to being organised and booking for the events you really want to attend, even tree jumper preparation," Mrs Vellacott said.

Tree jumper artist Helen Gross aims to have her creation ready at least a couple of weeks before the festival so she can enjoy the build-up. Her hot tip is that both visitors and locals should study the program carefully and highlight what they want to attend, before booking early to avoid being disappointed at full houses, which are common over the festival.

"I also make sure I have plenty of woolly hats ready," she said. "It's a bit like being the Queen. You don't want to be seen in the same woolly hat too many times!"

Still on wardrobe, Sue Hamlet says the best thing about Jumpers & Jazz is that conservatism is totally out of the window.

"At this festival, you can dress to suit your personality and not look like an oddball. You have to go brighter to fit in and colour rules! Your survival kit should include scarves and hats in much brighter hues than you might usually wear, but be careful not to wear earrings that tangle in your scarf," she added.

Sue is adamant though that the most important JJJ accessory is a smile. "If you are not grinning from ear to ear at the funky arty vibe, then you won't fit in at all."

She also tips that 'hand made' rules supreme.

"This is the perfect time to drag out every hand made thing you own, especially a quilt that can double up as a cosy snuggler or a rug to claim lawn space at the outdoor festivals."

Jumpers & Jazz team member and Gen Y'er Shona Gibson has her own fashion tip.

"Make sure you dress in layers. There are always days when the weather demands a full winter outfit including hat, scarf and coat. The sun, when it is out, can be very warm but out of the

A good place to do business!

The findings of the recent business survey conducted by Council's Economic Development Unit (EDU) are in and reveal that our region is viewed as a good place to do business. Our close proximity to the major centres of Brisbane and SE Queensland as well as our welcoming communities, liveability and affordability are major factors for locating a business in our region.

The survey found that 80% of respondents are very satisfied or satisfied with the business outlook for the coming year however the availability of suitable employees is a problem for many businesses.

The region wide survey was conducted on behalf of Council by Professor Paul Hyland, Queensland University of Technology and Mr Phillip Curtis, Annexco Pty Ltd. The survey report identified nine recommendations based on the findings and an action plan has been developed to address the recommendations. Many of the recommendations from the report are currently activities already being undertaken within the EDU.

A summary of the recommendations and planned actions from the survey are as follows:

1. Continue to promote the comparative advantage of the SDRC region.

Proposed action: Continue with strategic investment attraction activity and continue promotion of regional advantages.

2. Promote lifestyle and livability factors to potential residents and new businesses

3. Increase the marketing and subsequent visibility of the Economic development Unit.

Proposed action: Continuation of business page in newspapers, launch of EDU website and redevelopment of an EDU newsletter to meet business information needs.

4. Contact Businesses that responded to the survey and conduct focus groups.

Proposed Action: Focus groups to be formed organised as business skills and innovation.

5. Provide interested businesses with material that describes support offered by council for economic development activities.

Proposed Action: Package of relevant information to be provided to interested businesses.

6. Establish an industry advisory committee from business people throughout the region.

Proposed action: Advisory groups may be formed pending the outcomes of the focus groups and as the review of the current economic development strategy gets underway.

7. Update and improve existing data bases of businesses and continue to measure and benchmark business activity.

Allora's Past 25 years ago July 1988

Records Broken

Several long standing records were broken at the recent Allora State School sports day. Brooke Gilmore was the champion record-breaker for the day, bettering three previous records. She took .03 seconds off the girls born 1977, 100 metre event record set in 1980, and took out the girls born 1977 long jump with a record leap of 3.79 metres. Brooke also took over 2 seconds off the record previously set by her older sister, Leah, in the 200 metres sprint.

Donna Willett shattered the record for the girls born 1978 shot put with a throw of 7.2 metres, almost 1 metre more than the previous record set in 1984, and bettered the long jump record by 15 centimetres. Julie Bell beat the previous record for the girls born 1978, 800 metres race by 4.67 seconds, with her time of 2 minutes 59.67 seconds.

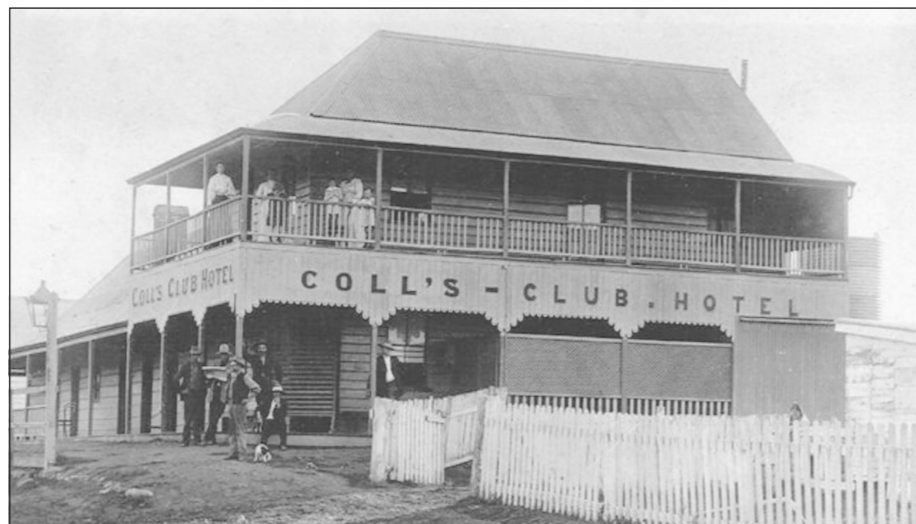

The Club Hotel



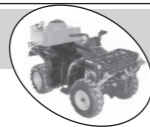

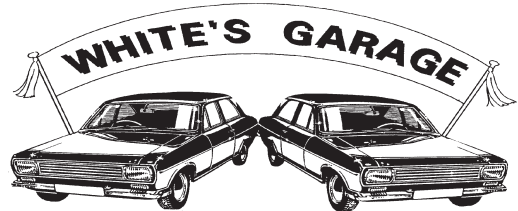
