# **Enrich turns one**

The Condamine Alliance Enrich project's first birthday was celebrated with birthday cake in Allora last week (30 July). Since the project began, 2286 extra native plants have been added to the Condamine catchment landscape and eight landholders have become involved.

Jayne Thorpe, Condamine Alliance Manager-Biodiversity and Enrich Project Leader, said the five year project was making good progress.

"It is really exciting to see the project take off and more landholders want to become involved because of the many benefits of improving native habitat on their land," Mrs Thorpe said.

"As well as 2286 native plants, in the past year we have also

managed weeds, feral animals and fire across 1950 hectares and created agreements to allow natural regeneration of 112 hectares of native bush land," she said.

"Now is an ideal time to celebrate what's been achieved so far and thank everyone for their commitment and participation."

Local landholders involved in the Enrich project attended the event to share their experience and what has occurred on their properties since they joined.


The project aims to improve biodiversity at select locations throughout the Condamine catchment.

Landholders in these locations receive assistance to revegetate, control weeds and feral animals, plan for fire management and monitor improvements in flora and fauna.

Experienced contractors are undertaking the work in consultation with participating landholders.

The project is supported through funding from the Australian Government's Clean Energy Future Biodiversity Fund.

Facts concerning the proposed Water Scheme for Allora from the Chamber of Commerce

- (1) An adequate supply of water for domestic purposes becomes available to all members of the community, and the days of buying water for empty tanks would be over.
- (2) Water is available at high pressure, which brings in many uses not available with low pressure systems.

(3) High pressure water and mains makes it feasible for the establishment of a volunteer Fire Brigade in the town.

(4) Water mains open the way for the establishment of more septics, without the need for a rise in sanitary collection rates.

# Allora's Past 75 years ago August 1938 Wheat Crop

The prospects for the wheat crop in the Allora district are good. The wheat is mostly in ear. The Allora district is one of the oldest wheat growing areas in the State, wheat having been grown here for 60 to 70 years. It is still being grown in the heavy blacksoil paddocks without the use of fertilizer. This year some of the farmers are experimenting with fertilizer in the lighter soil and the crops are responding well.

Nearly 100 persons have been vaccinated in Allora since the smallpox scare started last week. On Wednesday there was a hiatus in Dr. Pain's vaccine supply and on Thursday there were 20 to 30 people waiting at the surgery for a fresh supply. It is good to see such a positive response to a perceived crisis. More than 100 years ago there were people who argued against vaccination, not one of those people is alive today.

About 40 years ago there was a similar smallpox scare in Allora. We had no doctor then but nearly every child was vaccinated by local residents who knew how to do the job. There are several old people alive today who carried vaccination matter around between two pieces of glass and vaccinated children. Some of the bigger girls at school started in with a needle and vaccinated each other. It is just as well that we now have a doctor to look after that and the day of the amateur vaccinator is past.

The decade was coined the "roaring twenties" given the affluence of many and the introduction of jazz music, new fashions, motion pictures, wireless and motor cars. Jazz music came from the United States and along with it came some of the atmosphere of America in the 1920's.

That atmosphere will be alive and well at the "Great Gatsby and Gangster Ball", and adding to the festivities, if you are out and about on Friday afternoon late keep an eye out for the gangster vehicles getting around Allora's streets. Locally based





vehicles will be on the streets, images of the era with Lincolns, Packards & Cadillacs with the likes of the Capone's, Dillinger's, Australia's own Squizzy Taylor & Snowy Cutmore on board. Or perhaps the notorious yet mythical "Goatee" Frizzell, who is said to have provided Allora with its own mobster experience. A tall leering figure was "Goatee" with a penchant for the Charleston, who boasted a trademark goatee beard and haunted the Railway Hotel and the bank opposite.

Lets not forget the 'Flappers', who in the 1920's were a "new breed" of young women who wore short skirts, bobbed their hair, listened to jazz, and flaunted their disdain for what was then considered acceptable behavior. Flappers' behavior was considered outlandish at the time and redefined women's roles, but they can rest assured they will be more than welcome at the Allora Community Hall on the night of the Ball.

Local group Chairman Gary Smith couldn't have been happier with what was the 21st Historic Motor Cycle Club of Queensland Warwick Area Frostbite Rally held recently at the Allora Showgrounds. Two days of motorcycle rallies by enthusiasts and a collection of magnificently restored vintage & veteran machines had the Showgrounds & Allora's streets humming in time with classic motorcycle history.

Rally Saturday saw 140 classic cycle enthusiasts settle into the Allora Showgrounds accompanied by over 100 motorcycles, from across Queensland and New South Wales, as far afield as Newcastle & Rockhamton.

With registration completed, riders set off on a social trek through the Allora district surrounds before heading back to the showgrounds for a night of live music, movies and the cutting of the Frostbite Rally's 21st birthday cake.

After a hearty country breakfast rider's headed off on another rally on Sunday morning before event presentations after lunch.


