Letter to the Editor...

Dear Editor

Enough's Enough! Wondering if I may make some comments regarding Monday's tragic double fatality at the Eight Mile Turn Off south of Allora.

These comments are my personal opinions, and I am not in any way speaking on behalf of the Southern Downs Regional Council.

I am making these comments as a concerned citizen, and a former career fire officer of over 25 years who feels, (borrowing the catch phrase from Gough Whitlam's 1972 Labor campaign) 'it's time'

"It's time" for those who are in the seats of power with the authority and ability to address the issues of the deadly Eight Mile Turn off to get their heads out of the sand and fix a situation that extensive upgrades of some years back have failed to achieve. How many more people are to lose their lives, futures destroyed and have families wrecked while indescisivness runs rampant on how to address an ongoing problem that can boast a lengthy and gruesome history.

When the alarm sounded at the Warwick Fire Station in my time on staff, and the loud speaker announced the Eight Mile as the emergency area, we Firies were well aware that what we would likely encounter included loss of life and/or serious/horrific injuries. The eight mile has provided the venue for so many vehicle accidents, so many tragic, over the 25 years I have lived in the Warwick/Allora area.

I travel through the Eight Mile Turnoff at least once a day, at times more often than that. Human error occurs at times, we are all human and we make mistakes everyday in our lives but at the eight mile it can end a life

I have heard the stories of the eight mile near misses over the years, and understood why some tragedies occurred, in many cases from those involved.

Yes there is a stop sign for traffic entering the intersection from the north, and another from the east for traffic turning north. This situation creates uncertainty, especially with inexperienced drivers and those experiencing the Eight Mile for the first time. Vehicles can sit parked at both stop signs for some time while guessing who should move off first. The problem for many stopped at the sign from the north and heading to Warwick is they focus on the other vehicle while guessing who should move first and their attention is taken from the traffic heading from the south to the east towards Brisbane. It's just a momentary thought, the vehicle at the other sign is waiting, and off we go, without another glance to the right. I have witnessed this indecision, which includes both vehicles moving from the stop signs and almost colliding.

This indecision should not exist at an intersection that can be so busy, where vehicles

are moving at possibly 80 kms per hour, an intersection which plays host to a phenomenal volume of heavy transport traffic.

Traffic traversing the eight mile turn off must be separated and the uncertainty created by two stop signs addressed.

Yes it will take a load of money, but what price are the lives of innocent people. Unless action is taken, and sooner rather than later, it is only a matter of time before more injury occurs or more lives are lost.

Monday's tragedy is another deafening call to those with the power to change an area of our highway that will breed more road carnage.

Those that have lost their lives at the notorious eight mile, should not pass on in vain. their tragic event has proven the dangers of the intersection, sending a clear message that something must be done.

Our community in the 21st century are bogged down with the regulations and constraints of various safety legislation to supposedly protect people in day to day life. Tagging electrical leads, tripping hazards, safety clothing, the list is endless but the perils of a proven safety hazard on our highway appear to be ignored.

People are losing their lives with regularity at the Eight Mile Turnoff, we have the engineering technology and highly skilled people to address the situation, when will the safety concerns of this highway black patch be noticed and to borrow a workplace health and safety phrase, have it "tagged out" of service.

No this isn't post tragedy hysteria, this is lives that could just as easily be family members

My family members, children & grand children navigate the Eight Mile numerous times weekly, as do the families of countless other community members, and equally countless travellers

We are currently swimming in a sea of federal election promises, policy speeches, debates and all else that comes with the election carnival. We are advised in the press that the cost of election promises are currently running at \$1 million a minute, Mr Scott, Mr Abbot, Mr Rudd, can we have 15 or so minutes of your time out our way and make a decision and a financial allocation that will save lives.

In the press recently Member for Maranoa Mr Bruce Scott is guoted as saying "he will use his political clout and long-standing in the joint party room to kick goals for the Warwick area" if re-elected to the Federal Parliament. Well the ball is here Mr Scott, it has "Eight Mile Turnoff" emblazoned on it, kick away please. For the sake of the victims, their families and where heavy vehicles are involved, those innocent drivers who struggle to sleep at night for the remainder of their lives with the memory.

Community members of the Southern Downs and further afield, please lobby your State & Federal politicians, and current Federal candidates.

I have been an avid supporter of the NRL Manly "Sea Eagles" Rugby League Club for well over 40 years, but I'm sure the pledge by both the Coalition & Labor of \$10 million to upgrade the Sea Eagles' home Brookvale Oval, would be better spent at the Eight Mile Turnoff so more people may live get the opportunity to go to Brookvale Oval or similar some day, or for that matter, just to get home.



Back to Allora Day

In one of the biggest public gatherings ever to take place in Allora, more than 2000 people attended the "Back to Allora" celebrations on the 20th August 1988. An estimated 1000 former residents and visitors joined with locals to celebrate the day which had been organized by the Allora Bicentennial Committee headed by Shire Chairman Jim Deacon and co-ordinated by hard working secretary Geraldine Ashton.

The day commenced with the historic re-enactment of a bullock team negotiating "The Crossing" to depict the origin of the town of Allora. The team was supplied by Merv Wickham of Killarney and handled by Eric Reis. The day's entertainment included Cobb & Co coach rides, dray and sulky rides, old machinery displays and cross cut saw and broad axe demonstrations. There were also historic photo and family displays in the RSL Hall, historic bus

tours and some historic homes and landmarks were open for inspection, with 1500 people passing through the Talgai doors of Homestead which was open for the day.

In the afternoon Wayne Bennett led the planting of 80 native trees by pioneer families in the Bicentennial Grove. Entertainment was provided by Denny's Bush Band and the

August 1863 **Allora Land Values**

Speaking in the Legislative Assembly in favour of increasing the size of the area to be included in the new Gladfield Agricultural Reserve, the Hon. J. Douglas said that the land would probably average from £2 to £3 per acre at auction. In the neighbouring Allora reserve which was about 8 miles from Gladfield, and the soil was equally rich, the land had fetched the latter price, some of the township allotments fetching as much as £20 per acre. It was one of the most beautiful reserves in the Colony. and at the present moment some of the farms would bring perhaps £10 per acre, he said.

(Using an Historic Price Converter, £10 per acre in 1863 equates to about \$2,000 per acre in 2013).

Warwick ULP cheapest in Queensland

Warwick motorists benefitted from the cheapest unleaded petrol prices in Queensland last month, paying four cents per litre (cpl) less than their Brisbane counterparts.

RACQ Executive Manager Public Policy, Michael Roth, said the Club's latest monthly fuel price report revealed that while Warwick sold the cheapest ULP in the state, its monthly average price of 150.4cpl was 9.8cpl higher than in June. "Warwick motorists paid the least in the state for ULP last month, but they were not immune to the effects of rising oil prices and the weaker Australian dollar, which reached a three-

year low by the end of the month," Mr Roth said. "Motorists across the state have been hit with higher fuel prices, with Brisbane, Ipswich, Cloncurry, Mt Isa and Cairns all setting new monthly average price records.

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
