

## ADDB Update

Members of the Allora and District Development Board (ADDB) held their regular meeting with the Mayor, Councilor Glyn Rees and the Council CEO to discuss district needs and gain an update on projects and initiatives currently underway.

Items discussed are as follows:

Allora Water Supply - planning is well underway and works should start soon. The project will be completed by June 2014. The project involves the Warwick water supply being connected to the Allora pump station east of the town. Cost \$5million dollars.

Sewerage - planning is underway. Work will commence in late 2014 and stage one (main street and immediate surrounds) will be completed mid 2015. The remainder of the town will be sewered 12 months later. Cost \$15million dollars. The sewerage will be pumped back to Warwick for processing.

Main Street upgrade - pushed out to 2016

Stormwater issues, main street - will be fixed during the upgrade of the main street in 2016.

Allora Parks - currently under review. Facilities and maintenance are currently at a high level. ADDB is seeking additional recreational and BBQ facilities for locals and visitors.

Allora and Regional signage - is currently being planned and discussions are underway with State Government for a themed shire wide upgrade of all town/village identification signage. Aim... within 5 years.

Regional Roads - council is undertaking a shire wide review and will submit ideas, programs and seek submissions from constituents as plans progress. Meanwhile we need to persevere with the level of service we are currently receiving due to budgetary constraints. As usual, if you have a particular road

or verge mowing issue council are very approachable and will assist if possible, Make the call to Council or contact ADDB for assistance. alloradistrictdevelopmentboard@gmail.com

The regularity of verge mowing on regional roads was discussed and Council is confident that the current service is sufficient. ADDB disagrees but cost is the issue if more mowing is required. This is an ongoing issue ADDB is continuing to debate with Council.

The issue of regional roads being further damaged by the recent Federal Government road upgrade program contractors and the state that the heavy equipment (trucks, tractors etc) left the rest of the roads in after the road works were complete is of concern to Council but there is no current solution. Once again, there is no money in the budget to fix what damage the Federal Government contractors did to the roads. The Federal Government is not willing to fix all the roads their contractors damaged!

Allora Community Hall - Council has allocated money for repair and the upgrade of certain assets and fixtures. The issue of the roof damage due to hail 2-3 years ago is still being pursued and ADDB is working to ensure money is budgeted by Council to fix or replace the roof in the future.

ADDB will continue to meet with Council to discuss, plan and push for Councilor and or Council Officer attention relevant to Allora and the surrounding regions. ### Allora's Past 75 years ago September 1938 Betting Plunge

Having his first run in a race, and backed as if there would be no settling, Allora's Hope spreadeagled the field in the Seventh Division Handicap at Bundamba yesterday. His performance was very impressive and he ran record time for the five furlongs. Until a bookmaker laid £50 to £10 about Allora's Hope in the city that morning, nobody appeared to know anything about the colt. The best price with most bookmakers on course was 2 to 1 and when one bookmaker, who had never heard of the horse, offered odds of 4 to 1 he was nearly knocked off his stand with takers. Within seconds punters were taking 6 to 4 on the half brother to the well performed Brown Force, both horses being bred by Mr. Harry Geck of Allora.

# Council approves refurbishment of Stanthorpe council offices

Southern Downs Regional Council recently approved a \$350,000 refurbishment of the Stanthorpe council offices to update and modernise the community contact centre and Council Chambers.

SDRC Cr Peter Blundell said local builder Rob Wilkinson had been awarded the contract and the project would start in mid-September with completion around the end of November.

"During this time the community contact staff will move over to the Stanthorpe Library across the road from council chambers. "We apologise for the inconvenience however once the project is completed we will have a purpose-built space for the community contact centre as well as providing disability access to the refurbished area and Council Chambers. The Economic Development Unit (EDU) will move to the main office area, allowing the creation of a `people's place' in this area.

"I'm pleased to see the creation of the `people's place' where community groups can hold small meetings with either myself or Councillors, attend Council meetings or drop in just to talk," he said.

SDRC Manager Community Facilities and Stanthorpe Place Manager Michael Bell, who will manage the project, said Council was delivering on a project that the Mayor and CEO Andrew Roach had felt was urgently needed.

"The Stanthorpe Council offices needed to be updated and our plans make good use of the space we have available.

"Stanthorpe Place is a busy hub for ratepayers, developers and business people and the refurbishment will ensure we have better work flows and efficient use of office and meeting space," he said.

The new design ensures Council delivers on its promise to its people to provide safe, accessible and equitable facilities to the community as identified under the Community Plan 2030.

## **Robbie McEwen encourages Allora** residents to ride alongside him at cycling festival & community day

Allora residents are gearing up to ride alongside cycling great and three-time Tour de France green jersey winner Robbie McEwen, as the countdown begins for the Gold Coast Festival of Cycling & Community Day, 28-29 September.

After receiving a large portion of registrations from the region last year, McEwen is encouraging all Allora residents to once again get active and get on their bikes for a good cause- to help raise awareness and much needed funds for RACQ CareFlights and 4ASD Kids Charity, whilst also promoting tourism to Queensland and raising community spirit.

"57 percent of registrations that came through last year were from regional Queensland, as opposed to Gold Coast residents, and there was a large fraternity of cyclists from Allora that I hope will ride alongside me again this year," McEwen said.

"I was so happy and inspired to see so many regional residents travel to the Gold Coast to get active and involved in what is not only a worthy cause but also a fun weekend that the whole family can enjoy."

In its second year, the two-day cycling festival and free family fun day held at Metricon Stadium has seen the mass cycling participation tour grow to a full-scale festival this year, featuring a full day community festival and a line-up of multi-sport action including a fun run, a kids mini fondo and an AFL Grand Final Party.

The event is growing at an exponential rate, from securing major corporate sponsors, to attracting international cyclists from the Tour de France, elite riders from Cycle Asia-the events major international cycling partner-and cycling enthusiasts Australiawide.

Event managers aim to attract similar participation numbers to that of major sporting events such as the Gold Coast Airport Marathon, and the Australian RACV Ladies Masters golf tournament, after the success of last year's inaugural launch, and the exponential number of cycling registrations already received for this year's event.

"Cycling tours are a major tourism drawcard and Australia has seen explosive growth the past decade, thanks to our beautiful scenic landscapes," McEwen said.

"While we are only in our second year, we are fortunate and humbled by the overwhelming support we have received from Queensland cycling fraternities, the council, the community in general and, of course, all our partners and sponsors," McEwen said.

"1000 riders took part in last year's inaugural Gran Fondo and Piccolo Fondo events despite poor weather conditions, so taking this into account along with the support from our



sponsors and the community we are looking forward to building year on year to eventually become one of the premier cycle events in Australia," he said.

"However, it's not just about cycling, it's about offering something for everyone, engaging community spirit and encouraging people of all ages and abilities to get active and get involved.

"That's why this year we are proud to announce new additions to the event including the 4ASD Kids Charity fun run, the family and community festival, the AFL Grand Final Party and the 500m Kids Mini Fondo," McEwen said.

The Fun Run, four courses designed by appointed charity founder and league international Mat Rogers, features a 500km bolt. 2km. 5km or 10km fun run, and money raised through participation will support the 4ASD Kids charity, which cares for children with Autism Spectrum Disorder.

"Cyclists of all ages and abilities will get to experience the excitement and adventure of the event by taking part in a variety of circuits," McEwen said.

"Those up for a challenging yet breathtaking ride will revel in the 117km Grand Fondo or the 50km Piccolo Fondo, while the leisure cyclist will enjoy the 25km Tourist Ride-these are three of the most amazing courses showcasing the scenic Gold Coast Hinterland.

John and Bridget had 11 children: John (Jack) married Mary Paul; Kevin married Harriet (Happee) Horton; Martin married Mary (Doreen) Chard; Mary married Jack O'Dempsey; Joseph (Joe) married Isabella (Violet) Ash; Thomas (Tom) married Mary Carmel Keane; Frances (Francie) married Don McLellan; James (Jim) married Cora Cloherty; Michael (Mick) married Elsie Margaret Barker; Edward (Ned) married Ilma Patricia Rauchle; Catherine (Dolly) married Jack Kenneth (Ken) Yuide. A book titled "Eleven Chapters" has been written to depict and record the lives of these eleven children and their families. Only Ilma. Ned's wife is still alive and continues to reside in Allora.

Other milestones to be celebrated at the re-union are that it is 150 years since John Cavanagh and John O'Dea. the fathers of John and Bridget, both arrived in Australia in 1863 and settled on the southern Darling Downs around Glengallan-Upper Freestone and near Allora at Spring creek and also near East Greenmount.

Glengallan homestead for 11years, they then lived for two years at Pilton. In 1923 they moved to Berat, with another milestone to be celebrated the fact it is 90 years since the Cavanagh family moved to the farm at Berat east of Allora, that farm still owned by well known local dairying identity Peter Cavanagh.

A Mass will be held at Allora's St Patricks Catholic Church at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday September 28th to commemorate the fact that Bridget and John were married there in October 1900, and that a number of their descendants were baptised, made first communion, made confirmation, went to school and were married there in the subsequent 113 years since. Other related families and the general public are invited to attend to start off the weekend of celebrations.

Later on Saturday photos and lunch will be hosted at the Allora Showgrounds, and then celebrations move out to the farm at Berat to sample farm life and dairying before a barbeque supper.

Sunday will feature a bus trip visiting the Allora cemetery to visit John and Bridget's grave, Bridget's parents graves and three of the eleven family who are buried there being Tom, Francie and Ned. From there the bus will head to Glengallan Homestead for morning tea where John and his father both worked and lived, while a number of the eleven children attended school there. The trip then moves up to Upper Freestone where John's father owned four farms from 1868 to 1911. A visit to the Upper Freestone cemetery is planned where a plaque is to be unveiled to commemorate the death and burial of a Cavanagh child at the existing cemetery area, the first descendant to be buried on Australian soil.





From there those on the family tour will have lunch at the Warwick RSL Memorial Club before heading to the Warwick cemetery where John's Irish parents John and Mary are buried, along with John's three sisters and their husbands, Margaret & Con Carmody, Mary & Dan Mahony and Catherine & Tom O'Dempsey also an infant child Martin.

The Cavanagh family re-union weekend ends when the tour returns to Allora that afternoon.
