Crown Inn/Criterion/Club Hotel

One man who stands out in the progress of the development of business in Allora is Francis Kates. He came to Allora in 1863 and opened a general store. A few years ago Geraldine Ashton did a thesis on this enterprising man who built and financed businesses in Allora and beyond so creating opportunity for townspeople and grain farmers. He opened a flour mill in Allora and either opened or had an interest in others in Warwick. Toowoomba, Ipswich and Roma. Geraldine compiled a comprehensive study on him. He was born in Germany and was university educated. Clifton has honoured Francis B Kates with a Kates' Street but there is no acknowledge of his contribution to Allora's early commercial success.

Francis Kates also saw opportunity in the victual trade. He had the Crown Inn built in 1867. This hotel and adjacent yards were situated on a block of land at the northern end of Herbert Street where "Jubilee Gardens" now stands. John Holmes, who had previously owned the Dalrymple Hotel and then became a farmer was the first licensee after selling his farm. The hotel was the meeting place when Allora residents were lobbying the Government to open up Allora Town Commonage in 1869. The name of the hotel was changed to the Criterion by licensee Patrick Cranitch.

In 1890, James H Gwynne applied for a license to operate the hotel which was being furnished and the stables finished. He had a two storey part added to the old Crown Hotel. This was the first two storey building in Allora. James Gwynne changed the freehold

A report in the "Guardian" reads "The Club Hotel, Allora an old wooden building, one half of which was two storey, was burnt to the ground shortly after 2am on Tuesday morning, a small detached kitchen being all that remains to tell the tale... The building, which has only recently been painted...."

"Collins" sales yards were used by Deacon & Co. for their cattle sales from 1904. Later the yards were shared with Donovan and Son until the Municipal yards were built in 1975.

Note: There will be further articles on Francis B Kates and his son Francis H Kates who built "Richmond' house on the rolling hills just south of Allora.

"The hotel is excellently situated and commands one of the most charming views of the neighbourhood of Allora". Further renovations were carried out by licensee/

> manager, Captain H Masson . in 1900. He announced in "Guardian" that the hotel will be shortly renovated and "most commodious sale yards will be open for public accommodation free of charge". On offer at the hotel were oysters, plunge and shower baths and stalling with a groom in attendance.

> In 1913, after the

Licensing Court withheld approval for renewal of the license, the hotel was again renovated. The building was 'renovated both inside and out and brought into line with modern requirements..." Thomas Collins had become the licensee in 1902 and the hotel was under the management of C J Gorry. When the hotel burnt down in 1916, Thomas Collins owned AVAILABLE DELIVERY

Allora State School P & C: **President's Annual Report**

The Allora State School P & C has been very active throughout the year raising money to assist with new or to upgrade equipment for students.

Events for the year that have been organised to raise money are the annual Spring Fair which again has been very successful, BBQ at the Bush Christmas which is always well supported and the annual drink stall in conjunction with St Pats at the Heritage Weekend and the popular mother and fathers' day stall at the school.

The school tuckshop is the mainstay of income for the P & C generating approx \$10,000 net profit per year.

Items of expenditure for the year have been the annual contribution to the classroom to assist with the purchase of items like ribbons on sports days, installation of synthetic turf on the cricket pitch, projectors for 2 classrooms, assist with renovations to the tuckshop, performing arts shirts that will lift the profile of students when representing the school, installation of basketball hoops and the annual sausage sizzle meet and greet which is an event where teachers, parents and students get a chance to meet and talk informally.

While fundraising is very important the P & C has a much greater role to assist with policy and the direction of the school, some of the areas where the P & C has involvement are dress

codes, behaviour, purchase of equipment for the school and support teaching staff to educate students.

Allora's Past 150 years ago 1864 **MARRIAGE**

On the 26th February, at Allora. by the Rev. James Matthews. Alexander Cameron, late of Killearnan, Ross-shire, Scotland, to Esther Ann Johnston, daughter of Mr. Samuel Gordon of Allora. (Queensland Times, Ipswich, 15/3/1864)

(Alexander Cameron came to Allora in its very early days and worked at various occupations before being appointed to the position of Town Clerk when Allora was gazetted a municipality in July 1869. He held this position until his death by drowning in Dalrymple Creek on the 8th July 1882. He left a widow and seven

Esther Ann Johnstone was the daughter of Mrs. Mary Woodhouse Gordon and came to Australia from Northern Ireland in 1855 with the Gordon family. "Granny" Cameron as she was universally known had an excellent memory of the early days of Allora and wrote historical articles in the Allora Guardian under her initials "E. A. C." She recalled that she was married at 17 years of age and that their wedding was the first to be conducted in the two-roomed building erected on St. David's grounds and used as a school room during the week and for church services on a Sunday. It had slab walls, a shingle roof and dirt floors. "Granny" Cameron lived in her cottage next to St. David's Church for 60 years until her death on the 30th September, 1944, at the age of

Council to remove six trees at Wallace Street (Warwick) as part of water main replacement program

Southern Downs Regional Council will need to remove six large eucalyptus trees from Wallace Street, Warwick, to ensure its \$350,000 water main replacement program can continue. Manager Water and Wastewater Tendekai Mapeza said the water main replacement program was vital work and would initially involve the installation of 1,015 metres of new pipe along Wallace Street.

"We started the program at Wallace Street between Bracker and Law Roads in west Warwick. During our work on the west side of Wallace Street opposite Carmody Street we found the tree roots were in the path of the pipeline. After discussions

with Main Roads Department it was agreed the pipes could not be diverted around this section.

"We will use a contract aborist to remove the trees safely in the next fortnight.

"It is unfortunate the trees need to be removed however we will plant replacement trees. These will be Crepe Myrtle, which are the standard type around Warwick," he said.

Mr Mapeza said Council's water mains replacement program aims to replace the oldest pipes and those pipes in poor condition in a priority order.

"We are using High Density Polyethylene (HDPE) piping, which is recognised as being easier and quicker to install as we progressively renew the water main system.

"Council will endeavour to minimise any disruption to residents and traffic while this work is underway over the next few months." he said.

From the bare grass paddocks of 50 years ago, and over 4000 students later, the school has developed into a respected educational institution featuring landscaped gardens, sporting fields, and modern learning facilities.

Recreational fishers warned, stay away from commercial fishing gear

Recreational fishers are being warned to stay away from commercial fishing equipment following an increase in reports of equipment being interfered with.

Queensland Boating and Fisheries Patrol district officer Graeme Broughall said it is illegal to interfere with fishing equipment.

"Recreational fishers caught unlawfully interfering or using commercial fishing equipment risk an \$1100 on-the-spot fine," Mr Broughall said.

"It is illegal to move, take or damage fishing equipment that isn't yours.

"You also shouldn't take home a net you have found washed up on shore to keep or use.

"Any equipment found should be reported to the local QBFP office or the Fishwatch hotline on 1800 017 116 so that it can be returned to its rightful owner."

Mr Broughall said there were a number of nets that can be used recreationally.

"In Queensland tidal waters, recreational fishers can use seine or cast nets.

"A seine net must not exceed 16 m in length, 3 m in drop and must have a mesh size no greater than 28 mm. The net must not contain a bag, pocket or similar device.

"Cast nets must be no more than 3.7 m in length and have a maximum mesh size of 28 mm.

"For freshwater fishing, scoop or dip nets and dilly nets are permitted for use.

"A recreational scoop or dip net must not exceed 1 m in any dimension and a maximum mesh size of 25 mm.

"A recreational dilly net must have a diameter of no more than 125 cm and a maximum mesh size of 25 mm.

"Breaching these laws is a serious offence and can attract an on-the-spot fine of \$1100 and a maximum penalty of \$33,000." Mr Broughall said the public are encouraged to report suspected illegal fishing activities.

"Anyone who suspects or witnesses illegal fishing activities should immediately report it to the 24-hour Fishwatch Hotline on 1800 017 116 or via the Facebook online form.

"It's important not to engage the person, as this can compromise an investigation.'

Good news for health of Mayor after two week wait for results

Southern Downs Regional Council Mayor Peter Blundell will be back home in the next few days after ongoing test results revealed he has a manageable condition called Sarcoidosis. Following successful heart surgery in December last year, Cr Blundell had come back to work in January but doctors had asked him to return to the Mater Private Hospital on February 11 for further testing on his lungs.

Cr Blundell, his partner Sarah Reeves and his family received confirmation on Monday that the diagnosis is Sarcoidosis.

"We are extremely relieved at the diagnosis which, though requiring careful management, is easily treatable with steroids," Cr Blundell said.

"I am recovering well and although the recovery time will be two weeks, Sarah and I are both looking forward to coming home.
