CAPTAIN W.J.T. NEAL D.C.M.

(As presented at the ANZAC Commemoration, Allora Memorial Park, 25 April, 2014)

William John Thomas Neal, better known as Billy, was born right here in Allora in 1897, the son of William and Emily Neal. William, or Billy, was an only son in a family of five children including sisters Olive, Mary, Ivy & Betsy.

He was educated at the Allora State School, after which he completed an apprenticeship as a saddler with Allora based business, William Burge Saddlery. The Saddlery was located on the vacant allotment between Allan & Barbara Bell's residence and the former restaurant at the corner of Herbert & Jubb Streets, and the northern end of Herbert Street, number 67 to be precise.

Having previously served two years in the Citizen Military Force (CMF), he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force (AIF) on the 30th of August 1915 in Toowoomba when aged 18 years and three months, and encamped at Enoggera, posted to the 9th Battalion.

The 9th Battalion was among the first infantry units raised for the AIF during the First World War. It was the first battalion recruited in Queensland, and with the 10th, 11th and 12th Battalions it formed the 3rd Brigade.

William Neal departed Australia from Brisbane on His Majesties Australian Transport 'Warialda' on the 5th of October, 1915, heading to Egypt, where the young saddler was transferred to the 13th Machine Gun Company. The 'Warialda' was designed for the East-West Australian coastal service, but following the start of the First World War, she was converted into a troopship and later, in 1916, she was converted into a hospital ship that would suffer tragedy.

On 3 August 1918, the 'Warialda' was transporting wounded soldiers from France to Southampton, England when she was torpedoed by a German submarine and lost.

In March 1916 the 9th Battalion sailed for France and the western front. The battalion's first major action in France was

at Pozières in the Somme valley, and it was during this action that former Allora district resident Private John Leak won the battalion's only Victoria Cross.

William Neal was promoted to Corporal on May 2nd, 1917, and then Sergeant on May 31st, 1917 while fighting in the Battle of Messines Ridge.

The Battle of Messines (7–14 June 1917) was an offensive conducted by the British Second Army, on the Western Front near the village of Messines in Belgian West Flanders during the First World War.

German losses at Messines numbered 25,000, of which 7,500 were prisoners. British Empire casualties were 17,000 killed or

In preparation for the allied summer offensive in Flanders, the Messines salient had to be eliminated. For years, tunnellers had dug mines beneath German trenches in the area and packed them with explosives. Before dawn on 7 June 1917, 19 mines were blown, obliterating the German positions.

The explosions, heard across the English Channel, were the largest planned detonations until the advent of the atomic bomb. It is thought that 10,000 Germans

were killed in the initial blasts. British, New Zealand and Australian troops advanced to take the devastated ridge.

Captain William Neal DCM

It was due to his actions in this battle that the young man from Allora was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal (DCM). During the Great War the DCM was second only to the Victoria Cross (VC), recipients considered to have just missed out on being awarded the VC at that time.

In the London Gazette of the 24th of August 1917, it was published that "His Majesty the King (George V) has been graciously pleased to approve of the award of the Distinguished Conduct Medal to non-commissioned officer Sergeant W. J. T.

Neal, for acts of gallantry and devotion to duty in the field.

Sergeant Neal's citation read...

"For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of a machine gun detachment. Within 100 metres of the objective he brought the guns into action inflicting many casualties. On the infantry failing to secure the objective, he showed remarkable coolness and judgement in withdrawing and siting his guns".

This advice was promulgated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette of the 20th of December, 1917.

Sergeant Neal was presented with his Distinguished Conduct Medal in England, where he was undertaking a course for promotion to the rank of Second Lieutenant.

He was promoted to Lieutenant on the 10th May, 1918.

Sailing on the "Argleshire" from England to Australia, Billy returned to Allora in 1919, his army career completed after World War I on the 23-11-1919.

He married local Allora lass Ivy Dickenson, the couple raising five children, Douglas, Rita, Shirley, Joan & Ray

He & Ivy settled into family home at 60 Forde Street, Allora, that house still standing beside the current Homestead Aged Person's Hostel, now known as 'Dalrymple Cottage B & B'

In February 1920, only a few months after returning from the first World War, William Neal entered in to a partnership with William Burge resulting in a saddlery business under the name Burge & Neal which traded until the 30th of June, 1923.

As mentioned William Neal had served his saddlery apprenticeship under William Burge prior to his military service. In 1923 Billy sold his share in the saddler partnership and commenced working with the Allora Shire Council.

At the outbreak of World War II in 1939 William Neal enlisted again in the army, the then Lieutenant Neal holding many

positions in South East Queensland. He was promoted to Captain and left the army after the War in 1946. Billy then returned to Allora vet again, and continued his employment with the Allora Shire Council until his death in 1962.

Today our heroic local veteran of two World Wars is at rest in the Allora Cemetery.

Captain Neal's two sons served in the army, Douglas in artillery

from 1948 - 52 and Ray who served in the 6th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment (6 RAR) in Viet Nam in 1966-67.

Ray's two sons are also in the army. Sergeant Kevin Neal served two deployments to Timor, 2000 & 2006/2007 and Sergeant Justin Neal deployed to Timor in 1999-2000 and Iraq in 2006-2007.

Their Smiddy mission - to add to the \$4 million already raised under this incredible cycling program to raise fund for world-class research at Mater Medical Research Institute (MMRI).

Midi-Smiddy riders pedal into Warwick

Cyclists from across Australia and New Zealand are putting the pedal to the metal to help fight cancer as they embark on the three-day 580 kilometre Midi-Smiddy Challenge from 16 to 18 May 2014. A team of 50 cyclists will leave Brisbane on a longweekend circuit, cycling South East Queensland's most scenic and challenging terrain.

Challenge Director Mark Smoothy said the Smiddy events attract riders determined to take on a huge cycling challenge and help raise funds for world-class research at Mater Medical Research Institute (MMRI).

"It's a sad thought but chances are most people have fought cancer themselves or seen the disease affect someone close to them, whether it's family, a friend or work colleague," he said. "That's why it's fantastic to see such a dedicated community of riders, support crew and donors united by a common goal-to cure cancer- come together to feel the Smiddy spirit and tackle this challenge.

Smiling for Smiddy is an annual program of cycling and triathlon challenge events which support cancer research projects at MMRI in the areas of melanoma, prostate and ovarian cancer as well as complementary therapies to improve quality of life for cancer patients.

The first Smiddy event was held in 2006, when three cyclists embarked on an epic journey from Brisbane to Townsville to raise funds for cancer research and honour the memory of their

> mate, Adam Smiddy, who had passed away from an aggressive melanoma at age 26.

From that initial Townsville ride, Smiling for Smiddy has grown to include six events throughout the year, raising more than \$4 million since the program's inception.

Warwick residents and sportsmen and women are urged to support the Smiddy team in their fight against cancer when cyclists arrive in Warwick as part of the Midi-Smiddy Challenge on May 17.




