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

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

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Letter to the Editor...

Dear Editor.

Since the councillor who resides in Allora favours the addition of fluoride to the water supply via the "new" pipeline, it is timely to have him answer a comparison of figures. The Free Times stated on 8th May 2014, that the cost to fluoridate Warwick and Yangan was \$18,300, so the councillor must explain the F.O.I. document that was dated March 7, 2006.

The costs of the original installation of the asolution feed fluoride plant in Warwick was estimated between \$350,000 and \$400,000. A separate facility needed to store fluoride. Costs unknown. Each 1000 litre bulky bin costs \$3,000 each, with the chemical 20 percent acid and fluoride in the acid is 79 percent. There is 160 kg of fluoride in each bulky bin.

Estimated 12 to 20 bulky bins required for Warwick costing beteen \$36,000 and \$60,000 annually. Power costs for mixing and pumping would be approximately \$1,000 annually. Extra testing would be required costing between \$7,000 and \$10,000

The amazing story in this so called "forward thinking", is that in 2006 Allora was to be included! Fancy that!!

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NEW WEBSITE LINKS VETERANS TO SUPPORT WHEN THEY NEED IT

The Minister for Veterans' Affairs, Senator the Hon. Michael Ronaldson has officially launched a new dedicated website for the Veterans and Veterans Families Counselling Service (VVCS) at the South Australian RSL Congress in Adelaide on Saturday.

VVCS is a free and confidential service that offers eligible veterans counselling, group programs, and after-hours crisis support 24 hours a day.

"Tackling the mental health challenges facing veterans and their families is a key pillar of the Government's plan for veterans' affairs. The Government's priority is to ensure that we have in place the mental health services and supports that are needed for veterans and their families."

"VVCS is at the frontline of mental health and wellbeing support for the Australian veteran and ex-service community. The services provided by VVCS are particularly important as they also support the families, who significantly support veterans."

The launch of a new dedicated website for VVCS builds on the Minister's recent announcements to improve access to mental health treatment, including access to counselling and support. From 1 July 2014, former serving members who have border protection service, served in a disaster zone either in Australia or overseas, served as a submariner, were involved in training accidents resulting in serious injury or were medically discharged can access VVCS services.

VVCS services are also available to partners and their dependent children, up to the age of 26, of these newly eligible service men and women. Along with the partners, dependent children, aged up to 26, and parents of members killed in service-related incidents.

"The Government spends around \$166 million a year on meeting the mental health needs of Veterans and their families. The funding for treatment is demand driven, and it is not capped - if treatment is needed, it is funded."

"This Government is determined not to repeat the mistakes of the past. This means we need to develop a strong understanding of the issues and challenges faced by veteran and defence communities including their families, and to have a robust evidence base to inform efforts to reduce stigma around mental illness and to keep improving our services." This week's photo comes from Tom and Lawrence Telford's albums. It shows Mick Butler's Chev truck with a load of wiretied lucerne hay bales passing the Railway Hotel on the way to the railway station in the early 1940's. Tom says that Mick's truck was one of the few local trucks not requisitioned by the army during the war years because it had a home fabricated cabin rather than a factory built

steel cab. There are a couple of interesting points about the photo. The detached kitchen of the Railway Hotel can be seen. In the 1960's, down the passage way between the hotel and the kitchen, in the present day dining room, Alec Busteed had a boot repair shop. Warren Holmes worked for him there.

A horse and sulky can be seen in the street. Tom and Lawrence say that it was probably Mrs. Bill Gilmore of "Temuka" near Allora (grandmother of the Spring Creek Gilmore's) who was one of the last people to travel into town in a horse drawn vehicle.

Mr. Jones Esq., on Friday last, very ably defended a prisoner named Robinson, who was charged with stealing a watch and chain from Margaret Burrows at Allora on February 20th. During the absence of the jury, who had retired to consider their verdict, the proclamation appointing the learned gentleman to conduct cases for the Crown, that still remained to be tried, had been read out in the court. On the verdict of guilty being returned by the jury in the case of Mr. Robinson, Mr. Jones, by virtue of his then position as public prosecutor, prayed that the sentence of the court be passed on the prisoner. 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Breast screening best chance of survival

Queensland women whose breast cancers are detected through screening are more likely to survive a diagnosis than those detected otherwise, according to new research.

A new study* from Cancer Council Queensland, QUT and BreastScreen Queensland has found breast cancers diagnosed through mammographic screening have a two-fold survival advantage.

The study examined population-based datasets of more than 23,000 Queensland women aged less than 90 years at diagnosis, between 1997 and 2008.

The findings show the survival benefits of mammographic screening remained consistent across Queensland, regardless of where women lived.

Cancer Council Queensland spokesperson Katie Clift said participating in recommended screening would give women the best possible chance of beating breast cancer.

"Women whose breast cancer is diagnosed through a breast screening program tend to have a better prognosis because they're detected at an earlier, less-advanced stage," Ms Clift said.

"This study shows women screened by BreastScreen Queensland have better survival than those not screened, even after adjusting for tumour stage.

"The research also found a lower risk of death from breast cancer for those living in urban and socio-economically advantaged regions in Queensland.

"Women living in rural and remote areas of Queensland are at higher risk of being diagnosed with advanced breast cancer.

"Despite slightly higher rates of breast screening participation in rural and remote areas than urban areas, an urgent need remains to encourage regional women to access screening, to improve survival outcomes."

Cancer Council Queensland recommends women aged 50-74 have a mammogram every two years through BreastScreen Queensland.

"Queensland women should be breast aware and familiarise themselves with the normal look and feel of their breasts." Ms

"All women should also see a doctor immediately if they notice any unusual breast changes."

Breast cancer is the most common cancer diagnosed in Queensland women - around 2900 new cases are diagnosed each year, and about 500 women die from the disease.

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
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
Young dancers are the highlight of the work day for staff at SDRC

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Warriors Do it Tough to **Outlast Brothers**

With just five Rounds remaining in the 2014 Toowoomba Rugby League 'Hutchinson Builders' Premiership the 'National Farmer's Warehouse' Wattles A Graders continued on their winning way on Sunday at Toowoomba's Glenholme Park with a

convincing 46 – 26 victory over the Brothers 'Leprechauns'.

Wattles' Coach Luke Duggan could be excused for approaching the match in a confident frame of mind given Brothers are languishing at the base of the competition ladder having not won a game this season, and Wattles careering six points clear of their nearest rival at the head of the TRL ladder. Supporters were taking notice though when both sides were locked at 14 all at half time, and the fact that Brothers held a 10 – 4 lead after twenty minutes

The 'Leprechauns' drew first blood when their centre Jason Treherne scored after five minutes to have his side ahead 6 - 0. Halfback Ryan Duggan offloaded to galloping second-rower Conor Swinton to touch down for Wattles

> first points after fifteen minutes, but the home side hit back almost immediately through skipper Mitch Betros to lead 10 - 4.

> It was all hands on deck for Wattles when opposition winger Todd Porter sailed in for Brothers third try and a 14 - 4 lead ten minutes before the break, the 'Leprechauns' supporters present were somewhat excited at the thought of a boilover against the premiership heavyweights.

> Wattles captain & workaholic lock Aaron Scheid rocked the 'Warriors' into action with a mighty charge in the shadow of halftime, halted just short of the Brothers try line before fullback Jackson Green scampered over to score. It was Green again increasing Wattles total seconds before the break, taking a gem of a pass from Ryan Duggan and racing 25 metres around the defence to claim his second try and lock the scoreboard at 14 all. In a carbon copy start to the first stanza, Brothers

Minutes later it was Green again starting a try scoring play when he found centre Dan Manley in support, Manley then off loading to winger Dale McAntee who scorched the sideline for thirty metres to touch down and have Wattles leading for the first time after 60 minutes of play, 24 - 20.

Brothers were determined they had the goods to topple the top side though, another try reinstating there lead 26 - 24.

With Coach Luke Duggan on the last of his nerve pills, Wattles finally took control of the game when Green floated a long cut out pass to McAntee who was to quick for defenders and scored his second try.

Leading 28 – 26 with five minutes remaining, Wattles found a few more gears with giant forward Michael Bermingham, Aaron Scheid & Ryan Duggan all scoring in the dying minutes of play.

Bermingham had a cracker of a game and has added so much additional quality to Wattles pack since arriving at the club late in the first round, while backs Dale McAntee & Joel Koina impressed in a game that was for the most part a struggle for the Warriors.

The 'Leprechauns' stacked on another three touchdowns to be leading 20 – 4 minutes prior to half time, when halfback Joe Morris popped a short ball to





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




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
