

Wattles Win in a Nailbiter

The Wattles 'Warriors' were forced to draw on the back-up store of grit & determination to hold off a gallant Warwick 'Cowboys' challenge at Platz Oval on Sunday, winning 30 – 22 to continue their seven match undefeated run towards the Toowoomba Rugby League final series.

As mentioned earlier this week, matches between the two sides bring out a special brand of competitiveness that has few equals in the Toowoomba Rugby League competition, the southern region league neighbours, always lifting in a clash of passion and loyalty resulting in a more than spirited encounter. Captain/Coach Jason Bradfield set a fine example as he led a 'Cowboys' side that appeared more committed to gaining the premiership points as they strive for a final five spot in the coming finals.

Wattles threw done the gauntlet in the opening minute of play when centre Jamie Dodt finished a slick play to weave his way to the try line with his first touch of the ball after an injury absence since Round 4. Coach Luke Duggan is more than a little pleased to have Dodt back in his back in his backline, adding to the Wattles attacking arsenal as a challenging finals series approaches.

Warwick struck back minutes after the Dodt touch down through fullback Jacob Morgan to lock the score at 6 all, both sides battling it out until Wattles Brodie Ciesiolka set off on an elusive run of seventy metres to touch down. It was a brilliant effort by Ciesiolka, finding avenues through a defensive line that was at sixes & sevens trying to rope in the gifted young five-eight.

Centre Dan Manley added another touchdown for the home side to lead 16-6, and while Warwick winger Declan McLoughlin kept the 'Cowboys' well in the chase after he scored late in the first stanza, Wattles took a 16-10 advantage in at half time.

Back-rower Dylan Ebneter raised a few eyebrows when he snatched possession in a one on one steal fifteen metres from the Warwick try line and raced in to score under the uprights with no one in chase. Referee Dan Ryan had no doubt it was a try, and the 'Warriors' eased ahead 22 – 10, however

a few loose comments saw tough Warwick front-rower Gary Ellery dispatched to the sin bin, the 'Cowboys' reduced to twelve on the paddock.

The reduction in numbers seemed to serve to inspire, and veteran five-eight Matt Gainey decided it was time to stamp his

The deadlock was broken when Wattles' lock Aaron Schied ran into a gap that saw him score almost untouched.



with the first half efforts of his 'Railway Hotel, Allora' Wattles reserve grade side on Sunday against the Warwick 'Cowboys', but after Wattles trailed 6 - 12 at half time Warwick emerged

It was Somes again just after the restart, another try seeing Wattles ahead 18 - 10. Warwick having touched down earlier in the half.

And along with great music there will be free skirmish, sausage sizzle by Warwick Gymnastics Club, SDIEA (Southern Downs Industry Education Association) art activity, face painting and temporary tattoos and the Warwick Collective stall. EDGEfest is organised by Southern Downs Regional Council, WIRAC, SDIEA, Headspace Warwick and Warwick Collective.

EDGE (Encouragement, Development, Growth and Experience) Southern Downs is a series of innovative workshops for young people aged 13-30 who are interested in the music industry. Looking Back...

Settlers or Speculators?

Last week's article mentioned Allora's first land sale on the 5th March 1860. This sale was for the land bounded by Raff, Jubb, Arnold and Drayton Streets containing 30 x 1 acre allotments and a number of small farms surrounding the town. The three ten acre town blocks were divided by a water lane to allow the landholders access to the Water Reserve for their stock. The sale was held at the Police Office in Warwick and there was a large gathering of settlers. Despite fears that the surrounding squatters would turn up at the sale, flush with cash to try to keep the small land holders out, the majority of the town land and a fair percentage of the small farms on offer went to genuine settlers. The 30 "Suburban Lots" on offer had an upset price of £4 per acre and the 32 "Country Lots" had an upset price of £1 per acre.

The first allotment offered was that on the corner of Raff and Drayton Streets and was knocked down to Warwick storekeeper, Simon Meyer, for £16. Meyer also bought the adjoining allotment in Raff Street and it was on those two allotments that Donald Clark built Allora's first hotel, the Dalrymple Hotel, later in the same year. It is interesting to note that the five highest priced town allotments in the sale all faced Dalrymple Creek in Raff and Jubb Streets. The highest price of the sale was £25 for the allotment on the corner of Raff and Jubb Streets which was purchased by G. Walker & Co. All of this land was shown to be subject to flooding during the record 1864 flood.

The majority of the remaining town allotments were purchased by private buyers at prices ranging from £9 to £15.

Names familiar in Allora history were William Anderson, Charles Lambley, Thomas Birkett, William Andrews, John Scott, David Hutton, William Duggan and Bryant Rix. Two interesting buyers were for the 1 acre allotment on the western corner of Jubb and Forde Streets which was knocked down to "Henry Sauls", and the adjoining allotment on the corner of Jubb and Arnold Streets which went to "Michael A. Hirst". I believe these to be Henry Saal and Michael Erhart, two recently arrived German immigrants who may have had trouble getting their names across to the clerk at the Police Office.

across to the clerk at the Police Office. Of the small farms ranging from 19 to 76 acres offered at the sale, 8 were sold to R. & F. Tooth (owners of the adjoining Clifton Station) and 1 to Charles Clark (Talgai Station). Warwick District Police Magistrate, J. C. White, got in on the act with the purchase of a 30 acre farm but the rest of the buyers appear to be genuine settlers. Names still associated with the district include Ewan McMillan,

R. K. Black and J. Müller (Sinton family)
The Moreton Bay Courier of 22nd March
1860 commented that the proceeds of
sale were £2,400 which would be the best
argument that could be advanced for
opening other reserves.
