

Bare paddocks tell soggy tale

The large, bare patches amongst Graham and Geraldine Kirkland's summer crop are a daily reminder of what they have

This time nearly two years ago Glengallan Creek swamped the couple's 400 hectare property 20 kilometres north of Warwick, washing away tonnes of valuable top soil.

It is hard to believe that today's sunflower crop that wilts in the paddock under a scorching sun was under water during that

The couple took many photos of the flood and shared them with neighbouring farmers who gathered at the property recently to learn how they are slowly recovering from the damage.

Mr and Mrs Kirkland were among a number of farmers in the district and across the Condamine catchment who received assistance as part of Condamine Alliance's flood recovery program, funded by the Queensland and Australian government's natural disaster relief and recovery arrangements.

The farm visit, coordinated by Condamine Alliance, was a chance for surrounding farmers to get together and share what they had learned from the 2013 Australia day flood and how they were repairing the damage.

Mr Kirkland has lived on the property his entire life and said it was the worst flood he had experienced.

"About five feet of rain fell in the upper catchment which is about 50 kilometres from our place," he said.

"It was too much for the creek and the water quickly spread out over my paddocks washing away up to one metre of good top soil in some places."

"The water left deep gouges in the paddocks which were treacherous to walk over and impossible to drive a vehicle on.

"The erosion has left large patches of my productive paddocks unusable because the exposed subsoil is extremely alkaline, saline and sodic which makes it difficult to germinate seeds let alone grow a mature crop," he said.

Soil tests revealed the surface soil in the damaged paddocks had 42 times more sodium than potassium and have lost around 0.5 percent of organic carbon.

He was forced to mechanically level the pockmarked paddocks before applying tonnes of gypsum to improve the soil structure and fertility.

The application of products like gypsum, composts and other nutrients are part of the long process of helping the soil regain some of its health.

The floodwaters also gouged out the creek and left steep banks that were unstable and prone to further collapse.

The Kirklands worked with two neighbouring farmers to share an

excavator and repair more than 500 metres of creek bank by reinstating a stable batter slope. When it rains, they plan to cover the bare banks with lomandra and suitable trees to help protect the soil from further erosion.

Condamine Alliance flood project contractor Greg Ringwood said landholders involved in the natural disaster relief and recovery arrangements for the Glengallan and Swan Creek catchments have estimated their loss and damage from the flood to be \$5.4 million.

"The cost of major flooding like we saw in recent flood events is substantial and a serious financial burden for farmers," Mr Ringwood said

"Not only do farmers have to repair vital infrastructure like

irrigation equipment but they also face the ongoing cost of lost productivity from their soils," he said.

Some properties in the region with established healthy riparian vegetation along their creek frontage suffered less damage due

The vegetation helped to slow the speed of the runoff, which reduced damage to soil and infrastructure both along the creek and across the floodplain paddocks.

"We have a lot of evidence that tells us that good riparian zones help to reduce the amount of damage caused during flood events," Mr Ringwood said.

"We are working with farmers as part of this program to increase the amount of vegetation along our creeks and rivers,"

"Not only does riparian vegetation help protect our waterways from erosion but it may help to reduce the cost of floods into the

The initiative was part of Condamine Alliance's flood recovery work, which has helped more than 300 land managers over the past 18 months in the Chinchilla, Warwick, Cecil Plains, Dalby and Jandowae districts recover from flood damage.

In that time, 70.5 kilometres of fencing has been fixed, 83.7 kilometres of waterway has been cleared of debris, 119 kilometres of stream bank has been revegetated and 15,824 hectares of agricultural land has been improved so it can return to full productivity.

The Ex-Tropical Cyclone Oswald 2013 On-Farm Productivity and Riparian Recovery Program is funded by the Queensland and Australian Governments through natural disaster relief and recovery arrangements.

ALLORA'S ANZACS REMEMBERED:

SERGEANT JOHN VICTOR BLACK **ENLISTMENT NO. 244**

26th Battalion "A" Coy 1st AIF 2nd Div 7th Brigade

John Victor Black was born at Back Creek near Pittsworth now known as Millmerran, Darling Downs Queensland on the 25th June 1893 to parents Thomas and Annie Black. Thomas Black married Annie Winifred O'Neill in the Catholic Church Allora on 20th October 1892. Employment for Thomas included working on various farming properties in the Allora and Millmerran districts, but Annie was a school teacher following in her own father's footsteps. The O'Neill family including their eleven children had recently migrated from Ireland when Annie's father John Thomas O'Neill was appointed the head teacher at the original Goomburra Valley School from 1889 until 1895. Prior to her marriage in 1891 at the age of eighteen, Annie was appointed Provisional Teacher at the new Glengallan School and served there until her marriage. In 1905 after the birth of six of her seven children she returned to teaching in order to support the family and was duly appointed a Provisional Teacher at the Goomburra School until 1910.

Although John was born at Millmerran, records show John's childhood was chiefly connected to the Goomburra /Allora

districts. The eldest of seven children, Jack as he was fondly known as, enjoyed "manly sports", was a great leader and excelled academically. At the age of fourteen, he and two of his brothers were gathering fern on a Goomburra mountain when his vounger brother of six years was bitten by a large brown snake. By using a bootlace and belt for a ligature, then cutting and sucking the wound, Jack saved the life of his brother. He then carried him a distance of two miles over rough country, up one side of a mountain and down the other side for help.

Jack's passion for teaching started at the Teacher's Training College in Brisbane. When John enlisted for war service on 22nd April 1915, records show in 1912 he was a school teacher at Mount Levshon near Charters Towers and in 1914 transferred to the Muckadilla State School. Next of kin was his mother and the address was - State School, Amby via Roma Queensland. The 22nd of April 1915 is the enlistment date from the Nominal Roll, but his Date of Enlistment is also recorded as 25th April 1915 - the first ANZAC DAY. Jack was 21 years and 9 months, 5ft 31/4 inches tall, weighing 132 pounds, of fair complexion with clear skin, grey eyes and brown hair. Service number 244 - with the Australian Imperial Force.

For the next sixteen months Private John Victor Black was to

Boxing Tournament

Excellent patronage was accorded the opening night of the amateur boxing tournament on Saturday night, and those who paid the price of admission received full value for their money. Many of the contests were fought to the finish, in a fashion which afforded maximum entertainment to the crowd which thronged the hall. One of the bouts was characterised by the only knock-out which has occurred in the history of amateur boxing tournaments in Allora. Mr. Tom Collins acted as referee in his usual fair and efficient manner.

In the 10 stone 7 pounds class, the first bout was between Bert Blacklock and N. Williams and the proceedings were of a lively nature. Blacklock severely injured

his thumb in the first round but fought on and eventually got the better of his opponent in the third round when after a series of right uppercuts sustained at close range, Williams skied the towel.

These were two everyday stories which appeared in the Allora Guardian of 5th December 1914, but within the space of three years, double tragedies would strike two of the ordinary Queensland families mentioned in the articles.

Bert Blacklock was born in Brisbane in 1893, the son of Mary Ann Blacklock. He was working in the Allora district when he enlisted in the A. I. F. on the 29th of December 1914. Private Herbert John Blacklock was serving with the 15th Infantry Battalion when he was killed in action at Gallipoli on the 8th August 1915. Stan Blacklock, his seventeen year old brother, enlisted just over a month after Herbert was killed. Private Stanley George Blacklock was killed in action on Anzac Day, 1917, while serving with the Cyclist Battalion in France.

James and Margaret Kilpatrick were share farming at Forest Plain when their three eldest sons Alick, Jim and Jack enlisted for active service. Private

Alexander Irwin Kilpatrick served in France and survived the war. Private John Frederick Kilpatrick was assigned to the 12th Machine Gun Battalion in France when he was killed in action on the 11th June 1917. Trooper James Murray Kilpatrick was killed in action on the 31st October 1917 while serving with the 12th Australian Light Horse in Palestine.

The Allora and District Historical Society is seeking personal details and photos of about 60 men with connections to the Allora district killed in WW I. These will be published in a book dedicated to those men and to be released for Anzac Day. 2015. We have received some responses from some local families but we need more information about others of the men. By personal contact, we have received information from three members of the Beakey family, and two replies with photos and information from Yenda and Leeton in N. S. W. about the Kilpatrick family. If anyone has any material that can help us with the book, please contact me on 4696 4139.

serve his country training in the Middle East and endure fierce fighting in Gallipoli and France. His tour of duty started with one month's pre-training at Enoggera in Brisbane. He was appointed to the 26th Battalion, "A" company (1st AIF, 2nd Div, 7th Brigade) and along with Twelve Officers and Four hundred and Forty-One other recruits from both "A and B" companies, he embarked from Pinkenba on the Troop Ship HMAT "Ascanius" on the 24th May 1915. Arriving at the Suez Canal in the Middle East on the 2nd of August 1915, the troops were quickly entrained to Zeitoun then marched to Polygon Camp in Abbassia. John Black was subsequently promoted to Lance Corporal within days of arriving at this camp.

After intensive training in the Egyptian summer and due to the pressing need for more soldiers in the Gallipoli campaign. A and B Companies along with signallers and stretcher bearers embarked on the HT "Minnewaska" @ 8.30am on the 4th of September 1915 for the port of Mudros on Lemnos Island near Turkey. Four days after arriving they were again on the move boarding SS "Abbasieh" for Anzac Cove, Gallipoli. Under the cover of darkness at 3am on the 12th of September 1915, the troops landed on the beach at Anzac Cove making "Taylor's Hollow" on the Gallipoli Peninsula their base camp for the next two months. The Brigade was sent as reinforcements for the Allied Forces that had landed there on 25th April 1915. They moved camp during the bitterly cold month of November with the relentless campaign of war forever on their doorsteps. The 26th Battalion played a purely defensive roll and at times were responsible for defending Courtney's Post, Steele's Post and Russell's Top. During this time John Black was temporarily promoted to Corporal. Also fighting in Gallipoli was John's uncle, Lance Corporal William O'Neill. A Gallipoli hero, William was part of the 5th Battalion Light Horse. He was killed by a Turkish sniper on November 5th 1915 and is buried at the Shell Green Cemetery, Gallipoli.

By mid December 1915 the Anzac Garrison was reduced to 36.000 men when the entire ANZAC force was withdrawn from the Peninsula. Christmas Day was celebrated with a Divine Service at 9am at Mudros, Lemnos. Every soldier was given a "Christmas Billy", each eagerly opening them like children with a Christmas stocking. On 6th January 1916 aboard HMT "Hororata", John Victor Black was on his way back to Egypt arriving at Alexandria three days later. During this time, the AIF was expanded and re-organised along with a further period of training. On the 10th of February 1916, John's promotion to Corporal was confirmed. After a brief period of defensive duties around the Suez Canal, the 7th Brigade was among the first Australian troops deployed to the Western Front sailing in March 1916

Disembarking at the Mediterranean port of Marseilles in the south of France on the 21st March 1916, the troops were entrained to Thiennes in the north east district of Dunkerque.

Arriving two days later in freezing conditions and with the ground covered in snow, the Brigade marched 10 kilometres to Morbecque also situated in the district of Dunkerque. By early April the troops marched 40 kilometres from Morbecque to Armentieres where they took over the firing line in the trenches. John was promoted to Sergeant on the 11th May 1916, almost 12 months after leaving his Australian homeland.

During the following months the German offensive was becoming intense at Kortepyp, Messines and at Pozieres in the Somme valley. Pozieres was an important German defensive position, as close by was the highest point on the battlefield. This plateau was to be the scene of a two week struggle of bitter and costly fighting starting on the 23rd July 1916, known as the Battle of Pozieres. The 1st Australian Division clung to their position despite continuous artillery fire and repeated German counter-attacks. The 2nd Division of which John was a part mounted two further attacks - the first was a costly failure for the Australians, partly due to lack of communication and also to a field of craters from the weeks of intense bombardment that had made it impossible to distinguish where a trench line had run, but the second attack on the 2nd August 1916 resulted in the seizure of further German positions beyond the village. The Germans initiated a severe, sustained artillery bombardment and the Allies suffered heavily. Suffering 6,846 casualties after 12 days on the front line, exhausted Brigades of the 2nd Division were relieved on the 6th August 1916 by the 4th Australian Division. The very next day, on the 7th August, the 4th Division defeated a German counter-attack and this was the last attempt by the Germans to retake Pozieres. Though British divisions were involved in most phases of the fighting, Pozieres is primarily remembered as an Australian Anzac Corps battle and as an official historian has guoted "Pozieres is more densely sown with Australian sacrifice than any other place on earth", unquote.

One of the casualties at Pozieres was Sergeant John Victor Black. He was reported Missing in Action on 5th August 1916 then confirmation was received that he had been Killed in Action. He was aged 23 years. Personal effects at the time of his death were: Identity Disc, a Damaged Torch, Matchbox, Medals awarded for his service include: 1914/1915 Star, the British War Medal and the Victory Medal. His parents also received a Memorial Plaque accompanied by a letter from King George V stating 'I join with my grateful people in sending you this memorial of a brave life given for others in the Great War'. Around the outer edge of the dead man's memorial plaque are the words "He died for freedom and honour". Also a Memorial Scroll with the following inscription: He whom this scroll commemorates was numbered among those who, at the call of King and Country, left all that was dear to them, endured hardness, faced danger, and finally passed out of the sight of men by the path of duty and self-sacrifice, giving up their own lives that others might live in freedom. Let those who come after see to it that his name be not

Gasification (UCG) as it could be in this case. This is occurring right now in the Allora region, indeed in the beautiful productive farming and tourism region of Goomburra Valley.

Southern Downs Protection Group representative and Secretary, Marianne Irvine is greatly concerned for the area given that the simple drilling/exploration for CSG or UCG by any company is just a precursor to much more serious issues later on, which include large drill pads, vent pipes which vent methane into the air, pipes to carry the gas and water away, and large holding and evaporation ponds that are necessary to hold the "produced water" which is a by-product of both CSG exploration and production. If UCG, the impacts are still great, although the area used isn't so large. UCG uses a similar process to surface gasification, but the coal is burnt underground instead of at the surface. Risks to underground water is large, as well as to air quality. And no-one wants to risk water quality surely in amongst the farming lands that dot this lovely valley? That risk alone is totally unacceptable.

It would appear that tenements that had previously expired have been renewed, and the letters sent to Goomburra locals is the first this area has heard of any prospective drilling activity.

The Southern Downs Protection Group was originally formed 3 years ago to undertake representation for locals and also education for people in the region in regards to CSG and coal mining (including UCG) in the whole region. but a lack of current exploration leases has had the group in watch and listen mode, which now appears to need to be changed to action mode.

It is anticipated that a public meeting may need to be held urgently to talk to affected locals and see what can be done to protect the region now and into the future.

SDPG advice to anyone who has received a letter is "Don't talk to them. Don't sign anything, just basically say and do nothing until you have the whole facts" And other piece of advice – quite simple really – Lock The Gate.

Council proactive in warnings about flood emergencies

Southern Downs Regional Council is distributing its newly printed Flood Emergency Action Guide for Stanthorpe and Killarney to residents who live in flood-prone parts of these towns.

The Warwick guide, which was printed and distributed last year, will be distributed again as a reminder to residents and new information for new tenants or new owners. The guides will be hand delivered to those properties that are identified in probable flood zones as well as mailed out to property owners so that Council captures both the tenants and land lords of rental properties.

SDRC Mayor Cr Peter Blundell said Council had developed the guide after the January 2013 floods having seen the devastation of that flood event and knowing future floods could occur.

"The guide is a comprehensive booklet with historical information, tips on how to prepare for flood events, descriptions of flood warnings, flood severity classifications and what to do before, during and after a flood.

"Most importantly the guide contains a series of flood evacuation maps which show flood zone in a moderate and major flood. Residents can identify if they live in an area that would need to be evacuated in a flood event.

"Specifically at Killarney the guide also includes information relating to the new Flood Emergency Warning System located at the Killarney Fire Station on Ivy Street.

"It is vital to understand that the best way to protect ourselves and minimise the effects of floods is to be prepared.

"Council and the Bureau of Meteorology work collaboratively to operate a flood alert system for Warwick and our Local Disaster Management Group swings into action immediately it is needed. We have extensive knowledge and skills in this group and will work with our communities in preparing for the storm season." he said.

Cr Blundell said the guides are useful for numerous reasons including the handy information on household emergency kits which are not only useful for flood events but other disasters as well, as demonstrated by last week's storm in Brisbane.

"Already we are seeing extensive storm damage across Queensland. There is no more clearer a warning than this - we need to be ready," he said.




