



Looking Back...

WHITE'S GARAGE

The notice of the sale of White's Garage to Tim and Rhianna Hentschel in last week's Allora Advertiser prompted me to write a short history on the block, building and business.

The 1 acre block on the corner of Drayton and Herbert Streets was sold to Michael Erhart in February 1861. For a short time Allora's first Post and Telegraph Office occupied that portion of the land adjoining the water lane. Michael Erhart had the Queen's Arms Hotel built on the other portion in 1866. C. H. Wills bought the hotel and land in 1879 and built Wills' Hall adjoining his renamed Royal Hotel. Part of the old hall is still standing in the much altered White's Garage. By the 1890's John Holmes owned the Royal Hotel and his son Esau operated a cordial factory in the hall building.

In 1929 Joe White started up the business of White's Garage. Sometime later, until he bought into Allora Motors in 1949, Dick Hansen conducted J. C. Hansen Motor Repairs in the rear part of the building. This part of the building was later occupied by Matt O'Dea.

Following the death of Joe White, the business was sold to Phil Hall in December 1965. Phil retained the name and carried on until his death in January 1971. It was then taken over by his brother Noel Hall until sold to Frank and Gladys Peardon in February 1974.

Doug and Merrilyn Heslin bought the garage in August 1985 and it was later taken over by their son Matthew and his wife Tracey. Coincidently, the Heslin family lived in Joe and Connie White's house at Spring Creek.



It is something special when brothers make music together and there are plenty of famous sibling groups making it big on the world stage.

The Vellacott Trio are hoping that their blend of music will strike the right chord with audiences when they launch their first EP in Warwick on March 6.

The brothers, Ben 18, Clayton 16 and Morgan 14, who are well-known for playing community events, charity work, and "parties, weddings, anything", are excited to be launching an EP of original music to their home crowd.

Front man Ben, who is currently studying a Bachelor of Popular Music at Griffith University on the Gold Coast, is utilising all the learnings of his course in this venture.

"I've been writing a lot, and we have had help with recording, mixing and mastering the tracks from Alex, of the Flame Fields, who has been a great help in getting this project off the



ground," he said.

"It's been fantastic to be able to discover what it takes to make it in the music industry and to have the guidance of wellrespected musicians and industry leaders to guide us in our first major music project."

Ben said that the songs on the new EP are just a small sample of what they've written since the band's inception.

"Some of the songs we've had for over a year and some were written a week out from recording."

The boys believe the songs have good audience appeal, a catchy hook, and great rhythm that will hopefully have people singing along.

"We're pretty proud of what we've done, and we just hope people can enjoy what we've created," Ben said.

"My favourite track on the EP is 'Don't Break It'. I think it's got a cool little riff, you can move to it, and it's just heaps of fun to play live," he said.

Ben plays guitar and sings, while Clayton drums and harmonises and Morgan provides the funky bass lines.

The boys have music pedigree, having taken their inspiration and talent from dad Phillip, a popular and well-known musician and guitar teacher, who has done his own share of touring, plaving major events and recording work.

There will be a bill of three acts on the night with local favourites Port Paradise kicking off the evening, followed by Gold Coast band The Flame Fields.

The EP launch party will happen at the Stockyard Hotel's outdoor venue on Friday March 6 from 6.30pm, with entry just \$5. CDs and t-shirts will be available for purchase on the night and for those who can't make it along to the launch, the Vellacott Trio's EP will be downloadable from iTunes.

Council reminds ratepayers about payment of second instalments

The Southern Downs Regional Council is reminding ratepayers who chose to pay their rates in two instalments, that the second payment is due on February 13.

Mayor Cr Peter Blundell said Council agreed in July last year that ratepayers would have 30 days from the date of issue on their 2014/2015 rates notice to pay their full rates bill if they want to receive a 7.5% per cent early payment discount. "However Council realised some ratepayers might have

difficulty paying the full amount and gave everyone an option to pay in two instalments.

"These payments by instalments do not qualify for a discount however the instalment payments do not attract interest on unpaid instalments unless the payment is overdue.

"It's important that ratepayers meet the February 13 deadline," he said. Ratepayers have a number of options for payment includina:

- Make a payment from your Cheque, Savings or Credit Card Account using the Bpay Biller Code and Reference number on your notice. Allow two extra working days before the due date when using Bpay.
- In person at any post office (incl. Dalveen & Leyburn), phone 13 18 16 or go to www.postbillpay.com.au.
- · Take your rate notice intact to any Warwick Credit Union branch for payment.
- · Visit www.sdrc.gld.gov.au and follow the links. Please guote the Billing number found on the front of your rate notice. Minimum payment \$20.00.
- · Tear off the deposit slip and mail with payment to Southern Downs Regional Council, PO Box 26, Warwick Q 4370.
- · Credit card payment detach the bottom portion of rates notice, complete details and forward with your payment, or phone any Council office to make a payment.
- · Pay by Cash, cheque, money order or credit card at any Council office.

Council building has generator power for storm season

Southern Downs Regional Council has taken a lead role in helping local residents get ready for storm season and has also been very proactive in ensuring its own staff and services are ready with contingency planning.

Disaster Management Co-ordinator Mark Saunders said Council has implemented many "get ready" strategies and one of the most important was an alternative power source for Council's Warwick office.

"In the event of a natural disaster Council sets up the Local Disaster Coordination Centre in the Warwick Chambers. This centre is vitally important for co-ordination, logistics and communication.

"In December we commissioned our new generator, supplied and installed by local contractors, for a total cost of \$50,500. This equipment will power the whole building during a power blackout or other power outage emergency.

"The system automatically detects a power outage and provides power within a minute of an outage being detected.

"The system is also powerful enough (150KVA) to run all key function areas within the Warwick Administration building to maintain business continuity during disaster events or even non disaster periods when power outages occur.

"This project was funded in partnership with the Commonwealth and State Governments through the Natural Disaster Resilience Program," he said.

CRICKET: Australia Day Weekend -The Blue Cow XI




