

In 2015, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples' unique and timeless connection to land is the special focus and theme of NAIDOC week. Mayor Peter Blundell said that as a rural community, this is a theme most Southern Downs residents would be able to relate to.

The local NAIDOC Week working group comprises representatives from Council, Centrelink, local schools, Mission Australia, Red Cross, Condamine Alliance, Queensland Police and Queensland Health. as well as local community groups. The Mayor thanked the NAIDOC Week working group for organising this year's events.

"It's good to see positive partnerships between government and non-government organisations, working together to raise the profile of NAIDOC week in our region.

"It is also important for us as a community to recognise NAIDOC week and by celebrating together we can do just that. "I would strongly encourage all residents across the region to feel very welcome to participate in the celebrations and activities listed in the calendar, as these events have been organised for the enjoyment of all members of the Southern Downs community.

For residents looking for a fun way to kick off the school holidays, there'll be something for everyone at the free NAIDOC Family Fun Day on June 29 at Leslie Park, on the Guy St side, between 10.00am and 2.00pm.

Animals are the winners with re-homing rates on the rise

Figures released in a report to Southern Downs Regional Council's General Council meeting today show the region's impounded animals are the winners, with the rate of rehoming of animals on the rise, and euthanasia rates at an all time low. Mayor Peter Blundell said that in May 2015, of those dogs impounded at the Warwick Animal Pound, no dogs were euthanised, 35% of dogs were released, and the remaining 65% were rehomed, in comparison with March 2011, which saw 80% of impounded dogs euthanised, 10 % released and 10 % rehomed.

"Similar positive results were achieved at the Stanthorpe Animal Pound in May 2015, with zero dogs euthanised, 45% released and 55% rehomed, in comparison with figures from March 2012 which reflected 80% of impounded dogs euthanised, and 20 % released.

"These vastly improved figures are a result of the close working relationship between Council's Local Law Animal Control Officers and animal welfare organisations based in and outside of the region, to ensure that release or rehoming of animals to loving new owners is the highest priority.

"Sadly, euthanasia does still occur. However it is pleasing to see that it's increasingly the last resort when it comes to dealing with impounded animals.

"Through responsible pet ownership, residents can play an important role in combating impoundments and the need for euthanasia, by ensuring their own pets are registered, desexed, micro-chipped and kept in secure and safe enclosures that limit their ability to wander," he said.

If you're thinking about adding a pet to your family, please consider rehoming an animal from Council's Animal Pounds. Condamine Alliance and Queensland Water and Land Carers (QWaLC) have signed a three year memorandum of understanding to work together to coordinate better outcomes for volunteers in the Condamine catchment.

Condamine Alliance is the recognised regional body for delivering government natural resource management (NRM) programs in the Condamine catchment and QWaLC is the independent body for NRM volunteers in Queensland so the memorandum will see industry and community working hand in hand to make it easier for NRM volunteers to be active.

The memorandum will allow Condamine Alliance and QWaCL to inform the community of the NRM services available to it, to promote NRM work undertaken by its volunteers and establish and strengthen relationships within the NRM community.

It will also collaborate on evaluating and monitoring trends within the sector and influence NRM debate by contributing well thought through information.

Condamine Alliance CEO Phil McCullough welcomed the landmark memorandum.

"The is the first of its kind since both Condamine Alliance and QWaLC were formed and will give us a better framework to work together and deliver better services for our volunteers," he said.

"Often there are people willing to put their hands up to help out and volunteer, but they aren't sure where to start so this will make it easier for volunteer groups to get the most results in the region where they live." QWaLC Chair Rhondda

Alexander said the memorandum will help volunteers who work in the agricultural and resource management industries.

"This provides QWaLC with a real direction about how we can best service our volunteers to achieve the best NRM outcomes," she said.



Toowoomba Assizes Unnatural Offence

William Mayott was charged with committing the above offence at Allora on the 14th February. Mr. Gore Jones, instructed by Mr. Stable, appeared for the defence. The evidence Christina Weber, of Elizabeth Thornlev and Frederick Weber was taken. The jury, after retiring for an hour and a half, returned the verdict of quilty of the attempt only. The prisoner, who had already been five months in jail, was sentenced to one month's imprisonment. (Darling Downs Gazette 19/7/1865)

Charles was also sent to France with the 26th Reinforcement 15th Battalion as a T/driver. He fought at the front until he was wounded in action. He had shrapnel wounds to his right hip and to his ribs. The shrapnel was not removed. Charles was sent back to Australia to recover. A Medical Report on an Invalid form dated 22nd June 1917 reads - Wounded (1) Shrapnel above right hip flesh wound; (2) Shrapnel wound over ribs F.B. stiil in. now no disability Sqn. Charles Spanning. It was recommended that Charles be remobilized. The form was signed by R Winterbottom, Captain and W R Kelly, Major (Medical Officers, confirmed by S A Sutton, Colonel and signed off by D E Trumpy, Captain. When the war ended Charles

"We hope the plants take pride of place in the gardens of our new citizens and grow alongside them and their families.



Five-eighth Brodie Ciesiolka underlined his fine form of late with another stand-out effort, scoring the Warriors initial two tries to establish a 12 - 0 lead by the twenty minute mark. After scoring under the posts on the end of a forty metre dart, Ciesiolka's second touchdown minutes later was a gem that saw him gather a Gatton lost ball and kick ahead from sixty metres out to regather and score in the corner.
