# **ALLORA'S ANZACS REMEMBERED:** A project by the Allora Historical Society

#### **RALPH CONLEY**

George and Margaret Conley came to the area in the 1860's. George was a carpenter, joiner and building contractor. He was engaged in bridge building before contracting to build residences on East Talgai for Messrs. G. & C. Clark. The family moved to Warwick where George established a joinery works.



He was engaged on building the Town Hall and some of the larger churches. In the 1880's the family moved to Allora and took up a selection on the Exchange Lands. George still operated his business in Warwick and came home to "Avondale" at weekends. There were financial problems and the farm was sold. They moved to a farm owned by Francis Kates naming it "Poverty Ridge". George and his sons built the new Roman Catholic Church in Clifton and when Headington Hill Station was cut up for selection, were responsible for dismantling the extensive stables and re-erecting them near Clifton as a shed. George and Margaret Conley had fifteen children. Three sons enlisted for military service. George Bertram was killed in action in the Boer War. He was with the 1st Contingent and was

#### **Highway Upgrade**

The Transport Minister, Mr. David Hamill, announced that the 1.7 km Allora bypass section of the New England Highway is to be upgraded at a cost of \$908,000. The completed works will provide two 3.5 metre traffic lanes with sealed shoulders. Extensive work will be carried out on the intersections of Upper Spring Creek Road and Dalrymple Creek Road and the Highway. "This major highway link with the southern states is carrying increasing volumes of commercial and tourist traffic and these works will improve the safety and traffic flow on the bypass" Mr. Hamill said.

New Hospital

The sick have always been with us, unfortunately, and it is good to know that at length, facilities are available for their proper treatment in Allora. The Miegunyah private hospital has been opened in Warwick Street in the spacious premises lately occupied by the Whitman family, and is in the charge of two highly qualified and experiences nurses. The building, which was in the first place particularly suitable to the purpose which it is now to be put, has been renovated inside and out, and fitted with the most modern appliances and conveniences. The opening of such an institution in our midst is a boon to the inhabitants of the town and district

(The above article appeared in the Allora Guardian of 27th March 1915 but because a photo of the 'New Hospital' appeared in The Brisbane Courier of 24th July 1915 I decided to include the article to clear up some doubt as to the ownership building. Because the building had been previously occupied by the Whitman family, I, and descendants of the Whitman family, assumed that they had owned it. Margaret Rackley tells me that the only name on the deeds at the time is that of its builder. William Leggatt. The Whitman's must have rented the house from Bill Leggatt who then leased it as a hospital)

## **Ploughing Match**

The annual Allora & Spring Creek ploughing match, conducted under the auspices of the Central Downs Farmers Association, was held in Allora on Thursday. The competition attracts the best ploughmen in Southern Queensland and has been conducted for more than twenty years. No competitors were present from below the range this year as the railway commissioner refused to grant free passes for ploughs and horses as he had done in previous years. In spite of it being a raw and bitterly cold day, at least 500 people were present, nearly all of them males. At one o'clock the committee and visitors sat down to a really good lunch provided by Mr. S. Gordon at the Princess of Wales Hotel.

Results were: Champion Match - Open to all comers. W. E. Wright (Allora) 1st £15 W. Dalton (Spring Creek) 2nd £7 **District Match** 

John Wilson (Spring Creek) 1st Chas. Gillam (Spring Creek) 2nd. Colin Newport

killed at Sanna's Post in March 1900. Charles enlisted in New Zealand during WW1 and Ralph enlisted on the 3rd June 1916 at Mackay. Ralph was born in Warwick in 1887 and worked for a time as a traveller for A. D. Siebenhausen, the Allora tailor. He joined the Survey Department and at the time of his enlistment was a store manager in Mackay. He was 29 years of age and was assigned to the 47th Battalion with the regimental number of 2543. He left Brisbane on board "Seang Choon' and A49 disembarked at Plymouth, England.


Ralph had a period in Parkhouse Hospital in England before proceeding to France He was taken on strength with the 47th Battalion on the 7th March 1917 and was at the front in Belgium for the next 10 months. In May 1918 he was transferred to the 46th Battalion. He was initially reported as being wounded in action on the 8th August. The entry on his



Casualty Form dated 28th August 1918 reads "previously reported wounded now reported killed in action". (He had received a direct hit from a shell and had been blown to pieces) A letter was sent to his sister Mrs. Julia Brearly as his next of kin advising her that she would be issued with Ralph's medals and personal effects. In a Roll of Honour notice in the Allora Guardian it is mentioned that Ralph's brother was an officer in the A. I. F. and was previously the managing editor of the Sydney Morning Herald..

The acquisition of Denny's Engineering & Welding Pty Ltd



Bob's friendly face and jovial manner will remain for a time, staying on as an advisor to management for a two year period. There is to be a strong focus from both sides that the nature of the existing company is to be preserved, retaining the elements that have made Dennys a successful business over three generations.

Satake Director Craig Doorey acknowledged that while management had changed, "we want Denny's to continue to run like a family business, there are no plans to disrupt the business just help it grow further."

Expansion is on the agenda for Dennys, which will benefit all parties involved. Satake will have an opportunity to enhance their sales portfolio within Queensland while Denny's will be provided with the perfect growth platform.

Allora locals might feel a little insecure at the news of the sale of one of their Allora landmarks, but Bob assures his community it will still be business as usual and more jobs within the community.

For Bob and his family the sale came with sadness but not regret, the decision to hand over what has been his way of life for half a century as 'bitter sweet deal to make'.

The Dennys tradition commenced in 1956 when Bob Denny's mother Mrs Marian Denny uttered five humble words to husband Don, "let's give it a go". Those words saw the birth the town of Allora's first engineering business, the Denny name becoming synonymous with Allora, the business helping to shape the industrial foundations of the quaint Darling Downs municipality.

Bob's father Don Denny moulded the fledgling operation into a successful venture, 'D.L. & M.J. Denny', that evolved to be known today on an international front as Denny's Engineering and Welding Pty Ltd with a workforce of 65 skilled people that service clients throughout Australia.

The business that has become such a significant part of what is the fabric of Allora started off tending to repairs in a shed in the Denny family's Arnold Street backyard. On advice from an accountant the business was changed over to a company, Denny's Engineering and Welding in 1980. It was at that time Bob was appointed as a company director and the business flourished.

Don Denny worked in the business he and wife Marian established until he was 86 years old. Bob joined the staff in 1965 fresh from the Warwick State High School Year 10 class, signing on as an apprentice fitter & turner. 

Souths never scored another point as Wattles ran in a further four tries after the Kerr touchdown.


