


Dorothy Haig's Tree for Jumper for Jumpers & Jazz

Our Youth Bleeds ... again !

Many stretcher-bearers and medical personnel recalled that

the worst part of the work in collecting the wounded was hearing them cry out for their family, especially mothers, which brought home to them how young most of the soldiers in World War One were (AWM).

This artwork is in recognition of one of Allora's War Heroes, Les Masters, who was a recipient of the Military Medal for his bravery during battle as a member of the 6th Australian Field Ambulance in World War One.

It makes reference to the blood being continuously spilled through involvement in seemingly pointless conflicts during the past century – our youth bleeds again!

Lesley Frederick Claude Masters was born in 1897. He enlisted and left Brisbane on the troopship Itonus in December 1915. He served his country admirably and fortunately he returned safely, continuing his career as a barber in Allora where he is fondly remembered.

ALLORA'S ANZACS REMEMBERED: A project by the Allora Historical Society

MAURICE NELSON BARON

Birth

BARON – On the 5th October at Allora Rectory, the wife of the Rev. C. W. Baron, of a son.

The above announcement in The Brisbane Courier of the 10th October 1898 chronicled the start of the short and tragic life of

Maurice Nelson Baron, the son of the Rev. Charles William Baron, rector of St. David's Church of England, Allora, 1895 -1899 and his wife Hilda Madeline (nee Hancock). The rectory in which the birth took place was on the site of the present rectory, but in the building presently occupied by the Shaun Henry family, which was moved to make way for the new rectory in 1901. Maurice Nelson Baron was named after his great-great-great-grandfather the Rev. Maurice Suckling whose daughter, Catherine, was the mother of Admiral Lord Nelson from where his second name came. The Rev. Charles Baron was the rector of St. Mary's Church in Brisbane until 1903 when the family returned to England.

Looking Back...

In researching the life of Private Ralph Conley for last week's ANZAC story, we came across a letter from his brother Philip Conley to Roy Neale dated 1973. Philip was aged 91 at the time and reminisced on his early days in the Allora district. Here are a few interesting things from that letter.

The Conley family shifted from Warwick to a farm on the Ironbark Ridge to the south of Allora about 1883. They ran a few sheep, dairy cows and pigs and grew wheat. Philip went to school at Hendon and his teacher in the first year was Miss Kate McKenna who went on to become the head of correspondence education in Queensland.

Finding themselves in financial difficulties the Conley family were forced to sell the farm and they moved to a farm belonging to Frank Kates which they called Poverty Ridge. Their neighbours were the Geitz family, Mulcahy's and Rooney's. Philip went to school in Allora. He remembers Ted Cowley working for Mr. Chapman the the castrating, two nicks with the knife plumber, in the building next to the school (Donovan's Building)

Philip remembers the Hendon ("Widow Nevlan's") Easter Sports. Old Tom Maher of the Log Road (Michael's great grandfather) and an old fellow named Dinny Halley used to compete in Irish jigs times Philip helped his father and brothers

on a 6ft square board. He didn't remember who won but they always went over to the pub afterwards. Foot races, hurdle races, high jumps etc. were keenly contested. Bill Maher generally won the high jump and some races. He said that if those fellows had today's training methods they would have been world beaters.

Philip's first job was planting corn at old Sam Rooney's farm. Young Sam was the ploughman with a single furrow mouldboard and two horses. He planted every fourth row and he got 3 florins (6/-) for ten days work. His next job was in the shearing shed at Talgai West with Toby Mason. They penned up sheep over night for the shearers and were 'pickers-up' during the day. The shearers that Philip could remember were Tom Muir, Bill McMillan, Mr. Davis and Jim, Frank and Bert Conley

Philip had a job lamb marking on Talgai West once. Jim Caskey had a wagon load of hurdles and shifted from paddock to paddock erecting yards. There were two ear markers and old Deilemann Smith did and pulled the stones out with his teeth and cut off the tails. Philip applied the tar and kero with a brush. Being a small boy he often got a splash of blood and tar on his face. In later year he shore at Pilton, East Prairie and Yandilla. In between

in the building line. When Headington Hill Station was sold they had the job of demolishing the original stables and re-building them as a shed for Logan's of Clifton.

Philip drove the first aeroplane ever seen on the Downs in about 1912. It was a model designed by Walter Hawes, at that time a wheelwright at Tom Maher's blacksmith shop. He spent a week making it and it was 25ft long with a 15ft wingspan. The propellers were geared to a bicycle chain and sprocket and a small boy worked this. Another boy sat in the back and used to throw out small packets of flour and bang on an oil drum. It was rigged up on Bill Neale's produce wagon on a frame 5ft high. Philip's horse was the motive power. There was a procession to the showground but they were a bit late in arriving and attached themselves to the tail of the procession. When they got to the showgrounds they found that they could not fit through the entrance gates. Philip says "What an anticlimax! Poor Hawes, not more than a dozen people saw the plane". They drove back to Walter Hawes' house and unloaded the plane.

Philip Conley died in Maryborough on the 11th October 1974 at the age of 92 years 7 months.

Maurice attended school at Queen Elizabeth's Grammar School in Alford, Lincolnshire, and Christ's Hospital School in London. On leaving school in 1916 he joined the Royal Navy as a Flight Sub-Lieutenant in the Royal Naval Air Service (the naval equivalent of the Royal Flying Corps). On the 14th August 1917 he was transferred to 9 (Naval) Squadron in France and had his first flight on a Sopwith Camel fighter plane. The flight only lasted 15 minutes, not sufficient time to master the controls of the notoriously difficult-tocontrol plane or to familiarize himself with his surroundings. That same afternoon, against all common sense, Flight Sub-Lieutenant Baron was ordered up on his first operational flight. The last that his comrades saw of him was when he was engaged in combat with a



German fighter plane. He was no match for the experienced German and was shot down to the west of Slype, behind German lines. He was buried in the German cemetery at Gistel but after the end of the war his body was moved to the British

Council continues transition to equalisation of water charges across the region

Provision of high quality water to residents and industries is a major focus of Southern Downs Regional Council's water business.

Council's Mayor, Cr Peter Blundell said as with all water service providers in Queensland, the provision of high quality water is not without its challenges.

"Council has introduced changes to the water pricing structure through which we're seeking to achieve a number of objectives. "Firstly, Council must be able to generate sufficient revenue to allow the water business to finance its functions.

"We need to ensure prices are cost-reflective, meaning our prices cover the full cost of providing a water service, and that customers in similar locations pay similar prices.

"We're also seeking to ensure a level of equity between the different customer classes, with equal charges for equal services, but also having consideration of charges based on the ability to pay," he said.

A transitioning of the current ten water supply areas into two supply areas started in 2014/15, and will continue through the 2015/16 and 2016/17 financial years.

"Supply area one will cover areas receiving fully treated water including Allora, Warwick, Yangan, Killarney, Stanthorpe and Wallangarra.

"Supply area two will encompass all partially treated water supply areas including Dalveen, Karara, Leyburn and Pratten," said Cr Blundell.

The water pricing structure in Council's 2015/16 Revenue Statement represents the second year of the transitional pricing.


While all of the water charges have increased, Cr Blundell pointed out that, in this transitional period, the charges for the current ten water supply areas will change by different percentages, so by 2016/17 all of the locations in the two supply areas will have the same charges applied.

"As a result of this transitional period, water charges for some areas will increase by more and some areas will increase by less than the 10 per cent figure promoted in Council's 2015/16 budget." he said.

A comparison of 20mm water access charges from 2014/15 to 2015/16 for each current water supply area is provided:

Making a difference for youth homelessness across the Southern Downs

The Southern Downs Youth Housing and Homelessness Working Party was established in October 2014 in response to increasing numbers of youth housing and homelessness enquiries and incidents in the community.

The working party, led by Southern Downs Regional Council's Youth Development Officer and Community Services Department, acknowledges the great work currently being done across the Southern Downs region in relation to these



issues

Council's Manager Community Services, Mrs Sheila Stebbings recognises that youth homelessness is not a new issue.

"Many efforts have been made in the past to respond to this issue. The working party is aiming to combine community capacity with the current needs that have been identified to establish collaborative and relevant models and services. "A Southern Downs Youth Homelessness /Social Housing and Support Services Audit has recently been conducted and will

be valuable to our region in providing a clear understanding of current capacity.

"The audit will also enable a process for developing future projects/strategies across the full spectrum of service delivery including prevention, early Intervention, crisis Intervention, intervention and postvention." she said.

Initial audit discussions were conducted as part of the Southern Downs Youth Network, and were fully workshopped at the Warwick Interagency network meeting held in June.

"The audit was distributed to these networks and targeted community groups, and the working party is currently compiling the audit report, including mapping the services across the service continuum, and identifying the gaps and needs for the regions young people.

"This report will enable collaborative planning to establish sustainable and relevant models and services for the region," said Mrs Stebbings.

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
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
