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

Seeking the input of the school families and parishioners, it was local history buff and parent, Phill Higgins who provided what seemed to be the perfect dovetail solution in this special centenary year: The surnames of the WWI fallen from the St Patrick's Parish, immortalised in the unique Shrine which is built on the school grounds.

With the help of the local Historic Society, the decision was made to name the new houses Rynne, Hughes and Lynam. The following Sporting Creed has been developed, along with a torch, to be read out by and handed on to one of the current families before each major sporting event so that the significance of the names is always remembered and that their fighting spirit lives on

Henry trained with the 4th Reinforcements at the Australian Machine Gun Training depot until 10th March 1917 when he proceeded overseas to France ex Folkestone. He was taken on strength with the 3rd Machine Gun Company in the field on 1st May 1917.

Henry was at the front for a period of five months before he was killed in action in Belgium on the 20th September 1917.

Mrs. Dora H. Hall of Pennant Hills. Sydney, had advised Base records that following the death of her father, she was Henry's next of kin. A Base Records guery to her regarding nearest blood relations was dated 7th March 1921. On receipt of her reply, Base Records forwarded Henry's medals to her.

In an obituary it was reported that Miss R. McIntosh, Pratten Street, Warwick had received melancholy information that Private Henry Dickey had been killed in action and that much sympathy would be felt for his sister. He was liked by all for his good character and manly qualities.

Blue Care warning – attempted fraud against clients

Blue Care Executive Director Robyn Batten has warned against giving out personal and financial information over the phone.

Blue Care has received reports that someone impersonating a Blue Care worker has made phone calls to Blue Care clients asking for their personal bank details.

"The clients knew to end the calls and reported it to our staff immediately, however it is important all our clients and wider community are aware of these calls and take all precautions," Ms Batten said.

"Several clients have been contacted in the past few days in the Wynnum area of Brisbane and now Toowoomba by someone asking for their personal and bank details.

"We are reminding our clients and the community to please not give your personal details to people you don't know.

"If you get a call from someone claiming to be from your bank or any other organisation, don't give them your details. Instead, end the call, and then call the organisation in question to check it is really them calling.

"If you think that you've accidentally given out too much information check your bank statements carefully, and if you see anything unusual please contact the police, as well as your bank, credit card provider or super fund immediately."

Blue Care has reported the phone calls to the police and Scamwatch, run by the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC).



Council encourages residents to use MY SDRC app

Southern Downs Regional Council's Mayor, Cr Peter Blundell is reminding residents of the benefits of using the MY SDRC app, which offers greater efficiencies in reporting issues and lodging customer requests with Council.

Council received the June Executive Performance Statistics at its General Meeting today and were pleased with the continuing increase in the level of usage of the app, with 494 users, up by 52 from last month.

The Mayor encouraged more people to download the app and start accessing the benefits.

"Along with the 'Fix It' tool, which enables residents to lodge and track their customer requests, the MY SDRC app provides users with access to the latest Council News, the ability to contact Councillors at a touch and access to Council's contact information.

"Additional features include an Alerts page, an extremely useful tool which can provide information in a disaster event, details on available Council jobs and quick access to Council's social media.

"The app not only provides residents with a 'one stop shop' access to basic Council information, but also keeps people up to date on what is happening in our region.

"Council is happy that so many people have decided to use the app, and we would strongly encourage more residents to make use of its many features," said Cr Blundell.

SOUTHERN DOWNS REGIONAL COUNCIL OPPOSES COAL MINING

At its July 2015 General meeting, Cr Jamie Mackenzie moved that Council accept the declarations presented to him and Cr Ross Bartley at a Goomburra Hall community meeting on Saturday 25 July 2015. The declarations by the community are that roads in Goomburra, Berat and Allora are coal mine and gas field free.

In accordance with a previous community meeting resolution, Council resolved in January 2015 to universally oppose coal seam gas, oil and coal mining in its prime tourist, rural lifestyle and productive agricultural areas.

"The last thing we want is an Acland coal scenario on the upper east side of the Southern Downs" Cr Jamie Mackenzie said. "Why not protect Goomburra? Outside of this hall is some of the most scenic and productive country in the Southern Downs Region."

"Council does not approve coal mines. That is a State Government responsibility" Jamie said.

"Just like the Scenic Rim Regional Council in 2012, we took the message in January this year to the State Government on behalf of the region that alarm bells are ringing about the potential impacts of resource sector development on the 'right to farm', slippage, amenity, the road and rail network, fragile underground water supplies and on the environment."

"In my view, there needs to be a balance between economic development and preserving the environment" Jamie said.

"We all would like to see the mining sector develop in appropriate parts of Queensland and for agriculture to prosper" Cr Mackenzie said. "The Darling Downs Regional Plan goes some way to separating mining, agriculture and urban centres but it is almost impossible that the two can co-exist on the Southern Downs."

"Unlike Central Queensland, the Southern Downs Region features comparatively dense rural settlement so mining would be on someone's door step. The Southern Downs' clean air, fabulous vistas and top quality agricultural land makes it prime tourist country, a great place to live and has important agricultural qualities" Cr Mackenzie said "so I am not sure how a coal mine can be compatible."

"Council also resolved to halt any permits for resource sector development on its road reserves and other lands in its control" Cr Mackenzie added.

Council goes 'Casual for a Cause'


Residents will start to see Southern Downs Regional Council Administration and Library staff dressing casually, with Council recently adopting a new 'Casual for a Cause' initiative which will start on the first Friday in August.

Southern Downs Regional Council's Chief Executive Officer, Mr David Keenan said there are a lot of not for profit organisations doing great work in our community and Council wanted to make it easy for staff to show their support through a coordinated donation program.

"Staff based in our administration centres and libraries are encouraged to dress down on Fridays and make a gold coin donation to help local not for profit community groups in our region.

"Council's field staff are welcome to make donations too, however for their safety they will be asked to continue wearing their full uniform and associated personal protective equipment. "A notice will be placed at Council's Community Contact Centres and Libraries each Friday promoting to the public the not for profit organisation that will receive the donations during that month," said Mr Keenan.

Southern Downs completes construction of strategic fire trails

Southern Downs Regional Council, in conjunction with the Queensland Fire and Emergency Service (QFES) and Rural Fire Service Queensland (RFSQ), has completed construction of 22 kilometres of strategic fire trails within the region.

Southern Downs Regional Council's Mayor, Cr Peter Blundell said Council had been successful in receiving \$42,400 in funding under the Queensland Disaster Mitigation and Resilience program in 2014 for fire trails project.

"These newly completed fire trails are primarily situated in the Braeside area of our region. They will facilitate access for fire-fighting personnel and resources to areas of strategic importance during fire-fighting operations to protect local

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communities, property and infrastructure from the spread of bush fires.

"The new fire trails have successfully broken down what was a very large and generally inaccessible area into smaller more manageable blocks, which will help fire-fighters to control fires in days, not weeks, as has been the case in the past," Cr Blundell said.

A commissioning drive was undertaken on Saturday July 18. Council's Disaster Management Coordinator, Mark Saunders said that a number of different appliance types travelled the breaks.

"All of the fire-fighters involved in the commissioning drive were happy with the result and believe it will be a big help in providing access into this area to combat bushfires, said Mr Saunders.

Council spent approximately \$50,000 last year supporting RFSQ operations at the Ballandean fire which burnt approximately 5000 hectares.

Mr Saunders went on to say that the establishment of fire trails offers a range of benefits to the community.

"Fire trails provide a more effective and safer means of access for fire-fighters to combat a fire which, in turn, helps prevent the spread of the fire and minimises the damage caused.

"Volunteers don't need to be out fighting the fires as long, so they can get back to their employment sooner, and employers don't have employees away from the workplace for prolonged periods.

"Land owners are likely to incur less damage to fences, stock, feed and infrastructure, and fewer resources will be required to fight a fire, resulting in a reduced cost to the community in general." he said.

The completion of this project has been made possible through the collaborative efforts of a range of stakeholders including Council, QFES, RFSQ, local Rural Fire Brigades and property owners

The newly constructed fire trails do cross private land and are not open to public use.

The Strategic Fire Trails project is a joint initiative of Southern Downs Regional Council, the Commonwealth Government and the Queensland Government.



New novel follows two soldiers' intertwining fates in WW1

In 'The Last Chapter,' Eleanor Collins' historical fiction story follows events stemming from wartime encounter.

Author Eleanor Collins tells a tale of historical fiction set in the First World War. In July 1916, in the closing hours of the Battle of Fromelles, two enemy soldiers one German and one Australian - face each other in the trenches. Only one man can survive. "The Last Chapter" (published by Partridge India) traces the lives of these two men and the impact of their life-and-death struggle on four generations of their



families, culminating in the dedication

of the War Graves Cemetery at Fromelles in 2010.

The Australian soldier. Thomas Stanwell, is the son of wealthy English parents. He travels the world, and after falling in love with an Australian girl, Morag, he sets up home in Sydney. When war is declared, he enlists in the 56th Battalion and sails for Europe. Somewhere on the battlefields of France he disappears. His family waits in vain for a message from him, but none ever comes. His son, Edward, has only faint memories of him. In 2007 Edward's grandson. Tom. learns of the discovery of a mass grave in Fromelles. Edward hopes that he might at last have news of his father. Tom travels to Britain to see what can be discovered about his great grandfather's disappearance and soon finds himself working in the Centre for Battlefield Archaeology at the University of Glasgow.

The German soldier is Karl Schuster. Having enlisted in Prince Rupert's 6th Bavarian Reserve Regiment, he fights for the Kaiser, believing Germany will win the war, but after the Armistice in 1918, he returns home to Augsburg in Bavaria, defeated and dispirited. Karl marries Margarete and struggles in post-war Germany to bring up his children. The Nazi Party rises and Karl watches as his son, Franz - along with most of Germany - becomes enthralled with Adolf Hitler and the prospect of Germany returning to its former glory. Ninety years later, Franz's granddaughter finds a small parcel which reveals the fate of Thomas Stanwell. Suzanne sets out to trace Thomas Stanwell's relatives. Her search brings unexpected results, and soon, out of the horror of war and death, there comes a new beginning.

Eleanor Collins is a retired schoolteacher with a deep love of history, especially the history of the First World War. She has travelled extensively and taught in England, Scotland, and Australia. "The Last Chapter" is her first novel.

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Council introduces new online cemetery booking system for local funeral directors

Making a funeral booking at Southern Downs Regional Council's cemeteries is about to get easier for local funeral directors, with a new online cemetery booking system soon to be introduced.

Council's Manager Community Facilities, Mr Michael Bell said that the online cemetery booking project came about after it was identified that funeral directors were making bookings with Council through a manual system that was labour intensive and presented some time limitations.

"The manual system meant that if grieving families approached a funeral director on a Friday evening or on the weekend, they could not make a cemetery booking until the Monday.

"Many families were left feeling uncertain about their funeral arrangements, adding pressure at a difficult time, particularly where those families were arranging for family members to attend from interstate.

"The new online system will allow the funeral director to identify immediately what booking times Council has available at a cemetery, and then reserve a time on the spot.

"It is hoped that the new system will give families a lot more certainty around planning funeral arrangements for their loved one," said Mr Bell.

Mr Bell went on to say that the new system is expected to create a number of efficiencies.

"The online system will reduce the amount of paperwork required for cemetery bookings, and allow Council staff to process requests out in the field, instead of waiting until they get back into the office," he said.

Council's Information Services and Technology Manager, Cassie Martinez said her team recently provided training to two local funeral directors. Warwick Funerals and Carnarvon Funeral Services, who were said to be 'over the moon' with the new online cemetery booking system.

Other funeral directors will come on line with the new system over the next couple of weeks.

Homelessness services play an essential role in reducing the affects of homelessness. Services provide support such as accommodation, meals, counselling, advocacy, laundry and bathroom facilities, material aid and brokerage that enables people to get back on their feet.

Opposition leader Lawrence Springborg stated: "Queensland is one of only two states in Australia not to have signed up to the latest agreement, jeopardising \$57 million in Federal Government funding to support our most vulnerable Queenslanders.

"The only new conditions that the Federal Government has placed on the funding is that priority be given to homelessness programs focused on domestic and family violence and youth homelessness and that the Queensland Government be clear and transparent about how funds are spent."

Council on track to debt reduction

Southern Downs Regional Council is on track with a long term financial plan to decrease Council's level of debt.

In response to calls from the community for Council to clarify details of its debt, a report was tabled at Council's General meeting today, and provided an analysis of Council's currently held debt and the areas that it is funding.

The report also summarised details of a \$14 million debt inherited from the Warwick Shire and Stanthorpe Shire councils at the time of amalgamation. Southern Downs Regional Council's Mayor, Cr Peter Blundell

said that although Council is carrying a current debt level of \$29.9 million, there is good news on the horizon.

"This debt can be managed. As we promoted in Council's recent budget, we have developed a long term financial plan for the coming ten year period.

"If Council continues to focus on and operate within the scope of the long term financial plan, then we will be on track to achieve a significant reduction in the level of debt to \$10 million at the end of the ten year term," said Cr Blundell.

Finding Hope for Australia's Missing Persons

This year's theme "follow your instincts" aims to dispel commonly held views and misconceptions within the community around missing persons, such as the idea there is a 'right' time to search for a missing person and that people 'choose' to go

"There is never a right or wrong time to search, people have to do it when they can cope with the outcome whatever that might be," the Special Search Team Leader of The Salvation Army's Family Tracing Service, Maria Merle said.

"Some people have a strong belief that the missing party might want to cease contact with them but that is not always the

Operating in Australia since the 1920s, The Salvation Army Family Tracing Service has a long and proud history in reducing the emotional trauma that families and communities face when relatives go missing. The Salvation Army Family Tracing Service has a 75% success rate in locating missing relatives and on average they reunite 40 families each week.

Around 38,000 people are reported missing every year in Australia. Most of these are found, however of these 1,600 will still remain disconnected from their families and loved ones. It's also estimated a further one-third of a million are affected in some form or another from someone declared missing within the Australian community.

Maria says The Salvation Army Family Tracing Services is one of the oldest and most trusted family tracing services in Australia. The service also plays an advocacy role.

"If the relative is located then mediation is provided, as needed for reconciliation and additional support if offered for people whose relatives cannot be found," Ms Merle said.

"The Salvation Army also run 'special search services' on behalf of the New South Wales and Queensland State governments for adults who were separated from their families as children through adoption, foster care or being placed in children's homes."

The Salvation Army's Family Tracing Service has networks in over 100 nations, registers over 2,000 new searches each year and has located thousands of missing persons across the
