Thank you for printing the date for the town meeting at the town hall which was held yesterday afternoon (10th August). Thank you also to the Lord Mayor Peter Blundell.

I am very concerned about issues of this meeting. Some points to make:

- 1. GrainX representative was NOT at this meeting.
- 2. There were no health issues addressed in the Environmental Team's enquiries. Although the main topic for those residents was their health concerns.

Miss Brooke had already said to me on my enquiries that no health issues are to be addressed, ONLY dust, noise and nuisance. She was not knowledgeable on many of the questions asked of her.

3. That the overall comment made by an Environmental officer was that other than a brothel starting up, industrial operation can operate in an existing property even in a residential area, because of the law.

Well this law needs to change. This is not protecting us, the residents of Allora, and those especially living in Herbert and South Streets

I urged people at the meeting to phone and/or write to the Federal Government as this is a Federal issue when it is concerning health of residents other than dust, noise or nuisance, which is all council is addressing. Most people at the meeting did not vote on compliance but to have GrainX moved elsewhere.


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Environmental Protection Act, done. Dead-lines are given and the date passes by, with more time and dust passing, back and forth between SDRC and Grainx. They still haven't agreed on anything. It still hasn't been approved and accepted. It still isn't fully clear whether it's Grainx or SDRC holding things up and why.

Since the meeting on 10th August 2015 various people have been contacted and some documents on the subject gathered together. The date on the first thing, a complaint, is December 2012. One letter, complimentary, dated February 2014. Some one in Allora could have earlier or additional letters / documents that could be added to what has already been gathered.

If it turns out that the regulations are not being followed there are further steps to take, the more people and information the easier the steps will be.

This has also been sent directly to some of the councillors at the SDRC and the Directors of Grainx, in the hope that open and honest communications can be used to sort this problem out. Once a response is gotten from them a date will be set for this meeting.

and the new officials for Allora are president Sharon Hannah, treasurer Trish Thornberry and international officer Alison Payne. After a light lunch several attended the Annual General Meeting at Condamine Valley branch in the afternoon.

Three members attended the Division Hats and High Tea in Warwick to celebrate the 93rd anniversary of the CWA on 11 August. A sister city of Warwick for two decades, and now the Southern Downs, the Japanese centre of Kumiyama is a town located in Kuse District, Kyoto Prefecture on the island of Honshu and has a population of close to 20,000.

ALLORA'S ANZACS REMEMBERED: A project by the Allora Historical Society

NORMAN LESLIE WEYNAND

Henry Weynand came to Queensland from France in 1878. He started a general blacksmith business opposite the Town Hall near the corner of Warwick and Forde Streets. Later he was an agent for Massey Harris. (Tom Maher, Michael's grandfather, purchased the blacksmith business).

Henry and Frances Weynand (nee Anderson) had four children. Frances was only 44 years old when she died in 1897. Norman. who was born in 1894, would have only been three years old. In 1909, Henry retired and moved to Wynnum and planned a trip to Europe. He then married his second wife, Elizabeth. Norman Leslie Weynand enlisted for active service on 18th August 1914. He had served with the 4th Infantry of the Moreton Regiment. When he signed his attestation papers, Norman was only 20 years and 6 months old and was working

Campaign from Alexandria'. On 28th April 1915, Norman was promoted to Sergeant and one month later promoted to Company Quarter Master Sergeant. A further promotion was noted on 9th November 1915 on the Gallipoli Peninsular making Norman a 2nd Lieutenant.

After he was evacuated from the Gallipoli Peninsular, Norman had all his curios placed in a box and had them left at Cook Tour's office in Cairo. The family never received this box.

He received a further promotion to Lieutenant on 20th February 1916. He proceeded aboard the "Saxonia" to Marseilles on 3rd April 1916. Norman Weynand was killed in action

in the Battle at Pozieres, France, on the 23rd July 1916. An article in the Allora Guardian headed -- 'Lieutenant Weynand' reads "W. W. Anderson has communicated to us the news that Lieutenant Norman Weynand, son of an erstwhile highly respected resident of Allora, has been killed in action in France. The messenger adds that his brother Sydney has been wounded. Both were Allora natives and did credit to the town of their nativity wherever they went in after life".

The details on Norman Leslie Weynand's grave at Villiers Bretonneux read -

> WEYNAND Lt. Norman Leslie, 9th Bn 23rd July 1916. Aged 22. Son of Henry and Elizabeth Weynand of Church Street, West End, South Brisbane. Born at Allora, Queensland.

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HONOURING AUSTRALIAN VIETNAM VETERANS SECONDARY SCHOOL COMPETITION

The Minister for Veterans' Affairs, Senator the Hon. Michael Ronaldson, has announced on Tuesday, 18 August, a one-off school competition to honour Australia's Vietnam veterans. The Honouring Australian Vietnam Veterans secondary school competition encourages students in years 9 and 10 to explore the service of Australia's Vietnam veterans, and to reflect on the importance of remembering their involvement in the conflict.

The Vietnam War saw some 60,000 servicemen and women deployed overseas, and more than 500 Australian lives lost, in the longest 20th century conflict in which Australia participated. "Today (August 18), as we mark Vietnam Veterans' Day and

the 49th anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan, I encourage secondary school students to participate in this opportunity to learn more about the bravery and determination of our Vietnam veterans," Senator Ronaldson said.

"By entering the competition, students will learn about the many battles and engagements involving Australians, including the most significant battle for us, the Battle of Long Tan, which sadly took 18 Australian lives.

"They will also learn about the difficulties many of our Vietnam veterans endured when they returned from service and importantly." Senator Ronaldson said.

The competition is open until Friday, 8 April 2016, giving students two full terms to participate. Winning students will be invited to attend a three-day Canberra Commemorative Programme in August 2016 where they will visit cultural institutions and attend the national commemorative event marking the 50th Anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan.

"The Honouring Australian Vietnam Veterans schools competition is one of several initiatives linked to the Australian Government's Anzac Centenary national programme. A key aim of this programme is to improve education and awareness about Australia's wartime history, especially among younger Australians, and initiatives such as this one are vital to its success," Senator Ronaldson said.

Mr Scott said applications for grant funding will be assessed against the Programme Guidelines by the Department of Infrastructure and Regional Development to ensure approved projects represent value for money.

Community groups can apply for grants up to \$5000 to deliver electrical safety or energy efficiency projects in regional Queensland.

Applications are now open for Ergon Energy's Community Fund with grants between \$200 and \$5000 available for individual organisations and \$50,000 in total to be shared.

Community Strategy Manager Sara Collins encouraged local not-for-profit groups to develop innovative ideas that could benefit them and inspire their local community to adopt energy efficient and electrically safe behaviours.

Examples of the sort of projects that could attract funding include those that:

- · Reduce energy consumption, particularly during the peak period between 4pm and 8pm.
- · Upgrade equipment to more energy efficient models.
- · Educate and encourage people to change the way they use energy.
- · Use or promote renewable energy alternatives (solar, wind, hvdro and biomass).
- · Adopt energy management systems to monitor, measure and control a building's electrical load.
- · Keep the community safe around electricity.

Last year, 14 community groups from Cooktown to Pittsworth received funding for projects as diverse as solar heating a swimming pool, insulating ceilings, installing LED lighting and recvcling water.

"Grants were awarded to schools, sporting groups, a men's shed, charity organisations, community halls, a history museum, an aged care facility and a plant nursery," Mrs Collins said.

"Most projects will not only improve facilities for members of the groups that successfully applied for grants, but many other local residents in those areas will also benefit directly or indirectly.

"The projects will also serve an important role in educating the wider community on the importance of electrical safety and enerav efficiency."

Applications for the next funding round will close at 5pm on Monday, September 14.

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Residents take advantage of rates discount

Southern Downs residents are taking advantage of the discount offered by Council for payment of their rates before the September 4 due date.

Residents were lined up in Council's Stanthorpe and Warwick customer service centres to pay their rates when notices started to hit mailboxes on August 3. Rates payments are steadily being received, with almost 17 percent of total rates already paid in a week and a half of notices being issued, showing a good acceptance of the rates.

Southern Downs Regional Council's Mayor. Cr Peter Blundell said the feedback from staff is many people are keen to pay their rates and get their discount, and the level of complaints

received about the increases is about the same as in previous years.

"In relation to complaints, I understand that some people are disappointed with the rate increase; however Council has to take steps now to redress the financial situation to improve things for the future.

"I would also urge people not to take out their frustrations on Council's customer service and rates staff. Staff are doing their very best to answer ratepayer questions and provide advice on payment options for those finding it difficult to pay their rates.

"Council is quite prepared to consider payment agreements, and anyone wishing to explore this option can drop into Council's customer service centres, or call our 1300 number.

"Information about payment options has also been promoted in our Council News page this week and on Facebook, and I would encourage residents to contact Council sooner rather than later to discuss the options," Cr Blundell said.

Ratepayers also have the option to receive their rates and water notices through BPAY View and this year Council has added the option to request these notices by email.

"We've had a great response from ratepayers about the option to receive rate notices by email in the future, with 130 requests submitted to date, and now have almost the same number registered for BPAY View," he said.

Business interest in reticulated natural gas sparks further investigations

Southern Downs businesses have indicated interest in seeking access to natural gas to reduce the costs associated with heating and manufacturing processes in a recent survey by Southern Downs Regional Council.

Council officers sought to gauge the level of interest from potential users of a reticulated gas system. Responses were received from businesses in the private sector, as well as a number of public sector organisations.

Southern Downs Regional Council's Mayor, Cr Peter Blundell said the provision of the infrastructure to provide reticulated gas from Toowoomba to Warwick would be undertaken by a third party infrastructure provider, with no financial contributions being made by Southern Downs Regional Council.

"At present there appears to be enough interest from businesses to continue with the investigation process.

"It has been determined however, that there will be an additional level of consultation with businesses and communities along the proposed pipeline route, thereby including areas

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south of Toowoomba, as well as townships in the Southern Downs region, such as Allora.

"There has also been an indication that should the pipeline become feasible, based on the majority of the supply being dedicated to business consumption, there may be the opportunity to connect residential areas, based upon demand and the route of the pipeline," Cr Blundell said.

Council officers will continue to liaise with representatives from both the Department of State Development and the infrastructure provider to determine the potential for the pipeline and consult with businesses and residents in the additional areas.

Cr Blundell went on to say that the provision of natural gas offers businesses the potential to lower production costs and may assist in attracting new businesses to the region.

"It is important that a full suite of infrastructure services is made available to existing businesses and those considering a move to the Southern Downs region. If one of the indirect benefits of the installation of this infrastructure is the provision of gas to residents, then that would be a great outcome.

"Whilst Council is only in the early stages of the feasibility investigation, if the project was to come to fruition there would be welcomed employment created as part of the construction process and the long term management of the infrastructure, as well as the potential benefits to businesses," said Cr Blundell.

Southern Downs' communities to benefit from graffiti removal kits

Communities across the Southern Downs region will benefit from access to graffiti removal kits being made available by Southern Downs Regional Council.

Council was successful in obtaining funding from the Queensland Government for a 'Graffiti Stop' project, which aims to stop ongoing graffiti problems within our communities. Southern Downs Regional Council's Manager Community Facilities, Mr Michael Bell said the funding has enabled the purchase of a number of graffiti removal kits which will be offered to community under a partnership approach.

"Council is keen to partner with schools, businesses and community groups across the region to raise awareness about graffiti and the impacts it can have on urban and regional areas.

"In support of this approach, Council is providing the graffiti

A match sealing try by Wattles brilliant halfback Matt Duggan on the full time hooter at Platz Oval on Sunday provided the Wattles Warriors

After the win that consolidated the 'National Farmers Warehouse' Warriors perch at the top of the Hutchinson Builders A


Grade ladder, Coach Luke Duggan was calmly overwhelmed by his side's performance, especially the second half.

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Allora's Laura Leads Diamonds to World Championship

Among Allora's greatest ambassadors, Commonwealth Games gold medallist Laura Geitz continues to gain honours on the world stage, most recently captaining Australia's national Netball team the Diamonds to World Cup victory.

While Laura's family and many of her friends were among the world record crowd of 16,752 at Sydney's Allphones Arena, almost the whole of the Allora community, and indeed the Southern Downs, experienced the historic achievement of victory in the World Cup final in some way. The Australian Diamonds 58 - 55 success delivered their 11th world title in the pulsating final of the 2015 Netball World Cup at Sydney




Olympic Park from 7 to 16 August. For the Diamonds it was a hat-trick of world titles, successfully defending their crown from 2007 and 2011.

A blistering opening guarter set up Australia's victory and the Diamonds withstood a spirited second half fightback by New Zealand to emulate the feats of the 1991 Australian team in winning the world title on home soil.

Veteran defender Julie Corletto bowed out on a high in her final Test match for Australia, winning her third world title along with goal attack Natalie Medhurst.

It was Australia's highest regulation score in a Netball World Cup match against New Zealand, eclipsing the 53 scored in the triumphant 1991 Final.

Australia's accuracy was the difference between the two sides

as the Silver Ferns had 11 more shots on goal than the Diamonds. Caitlin Bassett finished the match with 47 goals and praised the work done by the players in front of her.

"The drive to the circle was amazing; the girls were bringing the ball down really quickly and Nat did a great job in keeping goal defence busy which kept me in a one-on-one situation which was perfect." Bassett said.

Australian captain Laura Geitz said she was proud of her team for bouncing back from their loss earlier in the tournament to the Silver Ferns.

"To finish like that in front of our home crowd, to have family here and to play with that particular group of girls, to play with Julie Corletto, it's wonderful to step into the defensive circle

with such a wonderful athlete." Geitz said.

Unlike their earlier encounter, the Diamonds were the dominant team early as they jumped to a six-goal lead.

Corletto and Geitz were at their miserly best in defence and Bassett and Medhurst were only too happy to convert their turnovers in attack.

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A 4-0 run late in the quarter saw the Diamonds open up a ninegoal lead which they took into the first break as New Zealand was held to just seven goals, its lowest-scoring quarter of the tournament.

Australia led by as much as 12 goals mid-way through the second quarter as the Diamonds wings Renae Hallinan and Kimberlee Green continued to have a major influence and Bassett was standing up to the intense pressure of the New Zealand defence.

But some brilliant long-range shooting by Maria Tutaia late in the quarter saw the Silver Ferns cut the margin to eight goals at half-time.

The two countries traded goal for goal to start the third quarter and it was New Zealand who gained the first decisive break,

the Silver Ferns continuing to make in-roads on Australia's lead.

They cut the gap to four goals late in the term before the Diamonds steadied with the last two goals to head into the final term with a six-goal advantage. That was the same margin between the two sides last Sunday, but in New Zealand's favour.

The Silver Ferns made one late rally but the clock beat them and the Diamonds enhanced their ranking as the world's undisputed number one netball nation.

Malawi goal shooter Mwayi Kumwenda was named the Player of the Tournament for the Netball World Cup SYDNEY 2015.

Federal Minister for Health and Minister for Sport Sussan Ley congratulated the world-conquering Diamonds on behalf of all Australians.

"Our netballers have long been a unifying force in Australian
