This meeting was held on 26 August, and Grainx and Allora weren't even on the agenda, so that makes it a bit hard to be "dealt" with. Apparently when asked why it wasn't on the agenda, Mr Blundell's response was that he'd forgotten.

At this SDRC general meeting a councilor, who wasn't at the town meeting, tried to move a motion; (back to meeting :)

THAT Council call a Special Meeting in September 2015 cordially inviting Grainx Australia to demonstrate to Council how the environmental nuisance emanating from the Herbert Street Allora site can be addressed within a nominated time frame.

This was put to the council meeting for voting, 3 were for this to occur and the rest of the councilors present (4) voted against it.

These are the 3 councilors who attended a meeting with some of the Allora residents due to having other commitments and being unable to attend the town meeting on 10 August. They had said that they would do their best to get SDRC to handle the matter with Grainx and the residents.

On speaking with one of the 3 councillors he said to me – That they were requesting a special statutory meeting with all councillors present to address the matter. They had even approached Grainx who were willing to attend and work out a programme to fix the problem. Bit different to how the SDRC reported the matter in the minutes of their monthly general meeting, isn't it?



Supervision at the Allora Waste Transfer Station has changed with supervisors Gary McGregor and Doug Scholfield starting recently. In addition, some operational changes have been introduced to improve residents' experiences when visiting this facility.


Visitors are requested to STOP at the inspection point on arrival at the facility, and will be directed to the appropriate sections for disposal of refuse.

The site has an extensive area for recycling a range of products including paper and cardboard (boxes to be flattened), plastics, glass, aluminium, metal cans, batteries and oil. Tyres can also be deposited; however a disposal charge applies. There is also a section for green waste, timber, concrete, scrap metal and all electrical products. Residents are encouraged to recycle these products to minimise the volume of waste going to landfill. By separating these items, residents will be helping the environment

and extending the life of these facilities.

Allora Waste Transfer Station is also a collection site for the Drum Muster program. Containers suitable for this program must have their lids off and be triple rinsed. Containers not meeting these requirements will be rejected.

It is a requirement by law that all loads are secured and residents are encouraged to abide by this requirement when visiting the facility, to help maintain the cleanliness of the site for all users.

Due to the workplace health and safety risks posed by scavenging, this activity will no longer be allowed at the site. However, residents may put in requests for second-hand items and the site supervisor swill endeavour to assist where possible. A Recycle Shop is also available on site, offering a range of second-hand products (electrical items excluded).

Site supervisors Gary and Doug will endeavour to make residents' visits to the Allora facility a pleasant experience. For further information about the Allora Waste Transfer Station, please contact Council's Environmental Services on 1300 697 372.

Long Term Financial Forecast Community Information Sessions

Southern Downs Regional Council would like to thank the almost 100 residents that attended the Long Term Financial Forecast Community Information Sessions that were held at Warwick, Allora and Stanthorpe. The input and opinions of the residents was appreciated. The sessions provided a good opportunity for Council Officers to provide an overview of the financial constraints under which the organisation is operating, as well as the strategies that are in place to manage and reduce debt into the future. The sessions also allowed for productive discussions about the different capital works being undertaken across the municipality, changes in the funding streams from State and Federal Government in relation to service delivery and infrastructure, and the challenges associated with delivering quality services that meet the community's expectations in a number of different geographic locations.

At each venue there were constructive conversations about the size and composition of the organisation's workforce and the role of contractors and senior officers, as well as white and yellow fleet management. Furthermore, there were informed debates about how disaster recovery is undertaken and the funds that have been expended in the past to assist in remediation works that have not been supported by State or Federal Government financially.

In all the Community Information Sessions it was made clear that Southern Downs Regional Council does not have the capacity to borrow any further funds, rather the need to reduce expenditure and retire debt are the key focuses of the Southern Downs Long Term Financial Forecast.

Southern Downs Regional Council would like to thank those residents that attended the Long Term Financial Forecast Community Information Sessions. Issues that were raised outside the context of the Long Term Financial Forecast will be followed up by Council Officers. COUNCILLORS MOVE TO SORT GRAINX AT ALLORA

Frustrated that no solution had been found to environmental nuisance from the Allora Grainx site after 9 months of negotiations by Council staff, Cr Jamie Mackenzie moved at the August 2015 General Council meeting that operators be cordially invited to a special September 2015 meeting to demonstrate how the issues can be addressed within a nominated time frame.

"We questioned why this matter was not in last month's agenda when Council resolved in June 2015 that a further report on Grainx's solutions be presented to the August 2015 General Meeting" Cr Jamie said. "Instead, we were surprised that officers refused the strategy to address issues days earlier without referring it to Council."

"So, it was time that Councillors progressed this matter as Grainx operators appear keen to co-operate to resolve issues as a good corporate citizen to appease legitimate concerns of patient neighbours who are complaining of inaction" Cr Mackenzie said.

"Yet Council did not support the move to hold a special meeting with the operators. Instead, the matter is left to officers and discussions in closed Council meetings. I am not sure why such secrecy is necessary."

"Residents of Allora deserve an acceptable level of neighbourhood amenity with agreed controls on noise, dust, hours of operation, access and storm water drainage" remarked Cr Jamie Mackenzie. "But at the same time, the tall grain silos are both an Allora icon and a traditional activity with the right to continue operations for the economic benefit of the region."

"After all, the silos will not be moved in a hurry, so Council must ensure any operator on the Herbert Street site acts reasonably." "We need a harmonious 'win-win' solution for the benefit of residents, the Council and the operators" Cr Mackenzie said. "The last thing we need is for this to be resolved through lengthy and expensive legal action."

ALLORA'S ANZACS REMEMBERED: A project by the Allora Historical Society

JAMES ALEXANDER "SANDY" McCULLOUGH

Three brothers, Robert (Bob), John and James Alexander (Sandy) McCullough, joined the Australian Imperial Force after emigrating to Australia from Ireland in 1909. Robert and John returned to their home at Punch's Creek near Millmerran, however Sandy was 'Killed in Action' in Belgium on 4th October, 1917. He is remembered on the WW1 Soldiers' Memorial in Allora.

Sandy's connection to Allora began when his parents, Robert and Isabella McCullough and their nine children, Robert, David, William, Mary, Jane (Jean), John, James Alexander, Shaw Ferguson and George, emigrated to Australia in 1909. The journey from Ireland began with a train trip from Ballymena to Belfast, and then by boat to London to board the 'Oswestery Grange', that was to be the home for the McCullough Family for the next seven weeks, as they voyaged to Australia.

Those present at the annual meeting of the Allora branch of the Queensland Grain Growers Association on Monday night last were Messrs. J. Donegan (secretary), Brown, G. Maher, D. Burns, A. W. Tickle, H. Maher and M. Lynam. After considerable discussion it was decided on the motion of Messrs. George Maher and D. Burns, that the branch should continue to function. On the motion of Messrs D. Burns and M. Lynam, Mr. George Maher was elected president of the branch, and on the motion of Messrs H. Maher and Burns, Mr. J. Donegan was re-elected secretary.

Allora's Past 100 years ago September 1915

Grotto Blessed

His Grace Archbishop Duhig, after mass on Sunday morning, blessed a

reproduction of the Grotto of Our Lady of Lourdes, which has been erected in the Allora Roman Catholic grounds. His Grace, in explaining the origin, and subsequent history of the Lourdes Grotto, stated that as it was impossible for the majority to perform a pilgrimage to the original shrine, it was the desire to build replicas of it in connection with the different churches. This aim had been worthily carried out by the Allora congregation. A very large and reverent congregation assembled at the impressive ceremony.

Allora's Past 150 years ago September 1865

The Warwick Railway The Secretary for Lands and Works has called tenders for the construction of the first section of the Warwick branch of the Southern & Western Railway being a single line, with sidings, from Toowoomba to Dalrymple Creek near Allora, a distance of about 46 miles. This may be considered to be the first movement towards extending the line of railway to Warwick. (*Darling Downs Gazette 27th September* 1865).

(Sandy), Shaw and George started school in the district, and attended the Upper Forest Springs State School in 1909 and 1910. The older members of the family found work in the area, mainly in the farming sector, and this is how the McCullough family began their life in Australia.


Land in the Millmerran district was opened for selection and Robert McCullough Snr was successful in obtaining a block. It was on marginal country, so he put in for another block and was lucky enough to secure one, which is still in the McCullough family to this day. The block was originally at an area called 'Punch's Creek', with the name later changed to 'Rocky Creek' and to 'Mt Emlyn', as it's known today.

While Isabella and the children remained in Allora, Robert McCullough travelled to Punch's Creek and cleared an area and erected a tin hut for the family to live in. Sons, Bob and Dave, joined him, and then it was finally time for the rest of the family to move from Allora to their new home, 'Ballymena' at Punch's Creek, near Millmerran. They travelled from Allora to Karara by train, and continued the journey in two sulkies. A friend also brought his wagon to the station, to collect the family's belongings, which included a 1000 gallon tank. There was no road, just a narrow bush track, through the scrub.

The Millmerran block was thick brigalow and belah scrub. It was a dense wall of trees, thick with undergrowth and nearly impossible to walk though. The timber had to be cut by axe, and Bob, John and Sandy worked hard with the rest of the family to clear the dense bush. The axes could be heard ringing in the early morning and this continued from sunrise to sundown. Ten to twenty acres were cleared at a time, and because the family was large, bigger lots were cleared.... chopping it down in Winter, and burning in Summer. After it was burnt, corn was planted with a hoe or 'waling stick' planter. The

very first crop had to be pulled and shelled by hand, and was sold for only a few shillings a bushel, but prices improved as time went on. It took a long time for the selection to be cleared, and in shape to make some money, but gradually, with the help of the boys, the McCullough's became 'real' farmers.

They were now well settled at Punch's Creek, and it was time for the older children to move on. Jean McCullough was the first to be married, and became the wife of Hugh Huston, of Allora, on 3rd July, 1912. In the coming years, Bob, John and Sandy, would make the trek from Punches Creek to visit their sister in Allora. {Sandy Huston, the third child of Hugh and Jean, was named after his uncle, James Alexander (Sandy) McCullough}

Just before the war, John and Sandy walked from Punch's Creek to Allora and Clifton, respectively, and obtained work there. After some time, the boys returned home and got work, scrub felling, nearby.

Only five years after their arrival in Australia, war was declared, and Sandy was the first to enlist on 11th March 1915 at 21 years of age. John, 22 years, followed, enlisting on 11th December 1915 and finally Bob, who was 30 years old by this time, joined the AIF on 14th February, 1916.

When Bob returned from the war, he and his brother George, rented the farm from their father, but there was no money to spare for many years. Things gradually improved and the brothers farmed the original selection block together, until Bob's death in 1953.

After the War, some of the boys who had played football in the army, started up a competition in the Millmerran district. The brothers were part of this four team competition, and the McCullough name is still prominent in Rugby League to this present day, with Brisbane Broncos player, Andrew McCullough, a descendant of Bob, John and Sandy McCullough's brother, Dave.
