But years back, this land was sold for redevelopment and D. L. & M. J. Denny bought it for building on the site a much bigger workshop for their business of manufacturing.

GrainX was originally the Wheat Board Storage Silos before becoming GrainX. If these residents find living in a rural town too hard to take, they can always move to Warwick or Toowoomba to live where the homes are not near the rural industry of a rural town.

The tranquil Allora Cricket Ground, the venue for so many white flannelled battles over so many decades will be officially named the 'Keith (K. O.) Masters Memorial Oval'.

The official naming will occur on Sunday October 25th at 9.30 am at the Allora Cricket Grounds where Keith's widow Mrs. Maureen Masters will unveil the sign announcing the cricket oval's new title. The official naming will be followed by a 20/20 cricket match between a Masters family Invitational side and the Allora Cricket Club.

Allora and Central Downs community members are invited to the naming ceremony and the following celebrations that recognise the tremendous contribution made by Keith Masters to the sport of cricket locally and across the Darling Downs.

A well respected and instantly recognised gentleman in the Allora community, and throughout much of the wider area, Keith Masters passed away aged 84 on September 14th, 2013, after a lengthy period of illness. Keith, popularly known as 'K.O.' has many family members in the Allora area, being a father, Grandfather & Great Grandfather. He and wife Maureen were married for 59 years, and resided at the same Raff Street address in Allora all their married life, a couple of good cricket ball throws from the Allora Cricket Oval.

Since the reforming of the Allora Cricket Club, Keith was a regular at the Allora Oval for weekend fixtures with his remarkable wit and amazing knowledge of the game of cricket. He himself played countless games over his sporting life at the Allora Oval

He was a long serving Patron of the Warwick Cricket Association until his passing, a Life Member of the Eastern Downs Cricket Association (Toowoomba, Warwick etc), an organisation he presided over for many years, a delegate to the Queensland Country Cricket Association and is the only Life Member of the reformed Allora Cricket Club.

In his younger years he loved playing sport around the district. His sports were cricket of course, hockey and tennis, gifted at all of them, but his great love was cricket. He was an outstanding batsman, and excellent wicketkeeper, and was a

Matt Duggan Scoops Third Player of the Year Award

Community Digs Deep for Shoebox Appeal

Allora resident & community volunteers Allan & Marg Darr from St David's Anglican Church is currently coordinating the annual "Love In A Shoebox" charity program, which is part of Operation Christmas Child run by Samaritan's Purse International Relief.

The program aims to collect shoeboxes filled with items to send overseas to some of the poorest countries in the world. A shoebox gift tells a child in need that they are loved and opens up life-changing opportunities for them, their family and their community.

Every year thousands of children are displaced from their homes by natural disasters, acts of war or poverty. Many of

them are separated from their families out of economic necessity or have become orphans. The season of Christmas can be especially difficult for children who cannot afford to purchase their own clothes or hygiene items, let alone a toy or two. When Cyclone Pam devastated much of Vanuatu in March this year, one of the hardest hit areas was Tanna Island where 50% of the homes and 147 schools were badly damaged or destroyed. Thousands of people, many of them women, children & babies were left in desparate need of shelter, water and food. Samaritan's Purse provided emergency supplies for more than 30,000 people a month, including the distribution of World Food Programme food parcels during the three months after the disaster while crops

were re-established.

To address this worldwide need, several Christian charities and organizations have developed special programs called shoebox ministries. This is a charity for children in need. Every year, thousands of volunteers agree to purchase clothing, hygiene items and small toys for these needy children. All of these gifts are packaged into shoeboxes, along with some money to defray the cost of shipping. Trained missionaries in foreign countries receive these shoeboxes and distribute them during special Christianity-based services.

This shoebox season it is planned to send 5,000 Operation Christmas Child shoebox gifts to bring joy and hope to the children of Tanna Island who have nothing and have suffered so much.

Locally forty boxes were collected this year, thanks to the generosity of the Allora & Clifton area Anglican parishioners & district community members.

Sterling community supporters the Scope Club of Allora kindly assisted by donating for the gift boxes and freight costs.

Globally, more than 100 million boxes have been delivered to children in over 130 countries since the program began in

Allan extends a most sincere thank you to everyone who supported the appeal and contributed, thus adding to the impressive tally of boxes collected over the past twenty-two years, and he looks forward to an even larger collection in 2015.

Council success in 'Get Out Get **Active' funding**

Women and girls across the Southern Downs region stand to benefit from Southern Downs Regional Council's success in gaining funding under the State Government's 'Get Out Get Active' program.

Southern Downs Regional Council's Mayor, Cr Peter Blundell said Council was very pleased with last week's announcement from the Minister for Sport and Racing, The Hon. Bill Byrne, that Council is one of the successful recipients of funding under Round Two of the State Government's Get Out, Get Active program.

"I am delighted Council's application has been approved for \$19,200 of Get Out, Get Active funding for our regional 'Women and Girls Doing It For Themselves' 10 week program, which is aimed at increasing women and girls activity in sport and

"The priorities to be addressed under Council's 'Women and Girls Doing It For Themselves' program include: confidence and self esteem; cost barriers; health and wellbeing; positive social interaction; feeling safe; and poor access to, or availability of, activities in our smaller communities," he said.

Cr Blundell emphasised "This program is supported through partnership arrangements with a number of local organisations including Queensland Health, Southern Downs Industry Education Association, Community Development Services Inc,

Warwick headspace, Warwick Indoor Recreation and Aquatic Centre, Stanthorpe YMCA Stanthorpe, senior citizens associations, and regional schools."

The 10 week fitness program will offer a total of 90 places targeted to women and girls in the following age categories: under 30, 30 to 54 and 55+, and will utilise existing equipment, including ParkFit, walkways, and existing programs along with the provision of access to qualified trainers.

"A 'Women and Girls Health and Fitness Passport' will be produced as a guide and resource to the program opportunities and the program will run from February to May 2016.

"The allocation of the funding is very welcome and it will enable Council and its partners to undertake a project which, we envisage, will have a significant and positive impact on women and girls, their engagement in sport and recreation activities and, their health and wellbeing," said Cr Blundell.



ALLORA'S ANZACS REMEMBERED: A project by the Allora Historical Society

DUNNE, EDGAR BERNARD

Edgar Bernard Dunne was born at Monkland near Gympie on the 22nd May 1893, the second child of six children of Edward and Mary Anne Dunne (nee Geraghty). His father was an Irish born engine driver. Edgar attended the Monkland State School and the Christian Brothers College in Gympie. At the age of fifteen he obtained a job with the Queensland Public Service. He worked in the Clerk of Petty Sessions offices in Clifton and Allora for some years and was Acting C. P. S. at Normanton when he enlisted in the A. I. F. on the 9th October 1916.

On his enlistment papers Edgar stated that he was a public servant aged 23 years 5 months. His next of kin was his father, Edward Dunne of Monkland, Gympie. He was given the regimental number of 4511 and assigned to the 12th Reinforcements of the 31st Battalion.

The reinforcements embarked in Sydney on the H. M. T. "Demosthenes" on the 22nd December 1916 bound for England, Private Edgar Bernard Dunne trained with the 8th Training Battalion in England before embarking for France. He was taken on strength with the 31st Battalion on the 1st August 1917. Edgar allocated 3/- per day of his pay to his mother, Mrs. Mary Anne Dunne.

Private Dunne was wounded in action in Belgium on the 28th September with multiple gunshot wounds to the thigh, hand and arm. He died of his wounds in the Casualty Clearing Station and was buried in the Lijssenhoek Military Cemetery 1 ¾ miles south west of Popenghe, Chaplain Rev. H. S. Clarke attached to the 10th C. C. S. officiated. moved

Things slowly in the Base Record Office. probably indicative of the huge volume of correspondence that they would have received. On the 5th

November 1917, Edward Dunne wrote to Base Records applying for the death certificate of his son Private Edgar Dunne. He stated that the certificate was required before insurance and Lodge payments could be made. On the 20th March 1918 he again wrote that the death certificate was urgently required to fix up legal matters. The certificate was sent on the 22nd March 1918.

Mrs. Mary Anne Dunne wrote to Base Records on the 7th December 1918 asking for a photo of her son's grave. She wrote again on the 2nd January 1920 saying that it had been almost two years since she had written asking for a photo of her son's grave. On the 8th January Base Records replied that three copies of the photo of the grave would be sent free of charge to the registered next of kin as soon as they became



Allora's Past 100 years ago October 1915 Obituary

There passed away at Sandgate on Friday 15th October Mrs. Dorothy Wright, for many years a resident of the Goomburra district and maternal head of the family bearing that name. The late Mrs. Wright, who was aged 82 years, was born in the county of Yorkshire, England, and came to Australia with her husband and family over 40 years ago. The greater part of that term was spent in this district, first on old Goomburra station, and later on the farm which the late Mr. Wright who died in 1895, took up at Goomburra.

The late Mrs. Wright leaves a family of three sons - Messrs T. W., H. F. and S. E. Wright, who are settled in the Goomburra district and six grandchildren. She was predeceased by her husband and two

October 1890



On Tuesday 7th October 1890 at 2 a.m. it was discovered that a skillion attached to the main building of Messrs. Kennedy Bros. steam flour mill was on fire and burning rapidly. The alarm was given and the possibility of saving the mill looked small indeed. If the fire had caught a thorough hold of the main mill building. Mr. J. Nemeth's house (now site of Pettigrew's house) must have gone, and as Mr. P. Kellev said, nothing could have saved his premises (Tattersalls Hotel). But due to the perseverance of everyone. including the ladies, who formed a bucket brigade, the building was saved. Some machinery was destroyed and parts of the walls of the main building were burnt through and the damage bill is estimated to be about £200.
