Pittworth Men's Shed Visit



Dear Editor.

Re: Best Little Town on the Downs – Allora was The Best Little Town on the Downs once

After World War 2, Allora was a town of buy what you want, without going outside of the town - new cars, trucks, tractors, farm machinery, livestock, and equipment. There were 4 oil & grease and fuel agents - Mobil, Shell, Atlantic, BP Fuels and Castrol Oils, 3 cafes, 2 hairdressers - 1 mens and 1 ladies, 4 pubs (1 mysteriously burnt down early 50's), saddler, blacksmith, plumber, a taxi service in the town run by Alic Bursteed in a 1952 Ford Consul Car (also ran a service into the country if needed). Also big shopping places where you could go and buy weekly goods. The site of Holmes & Co.'s 2-storey building was on the corner of Warwick & Herbert Streets where the current IGA is but much bigger. It sold groceries, vegetables, millinery, dresses, workwear for men, material for curtains etc., also produce buyers of grain and hay and sellers of piping and water troughs & fittings.

A second big store serviced people of the district with food of all sorts (including Warwick butter at the time) made locally at the Allora Butter Factory and sold through shops, plus the Warwick Co-op Store that was on the corner of Forde & South Streets where now stands a workshop of Denny's Engineering.

Plus Warwick Co-op sold bottled milk and supplied cafes as well. There were many staff that worked in the 2 buildings of the Warwick Co-op.

A 3rd (smaller) grocery shop was in the middle of Herbert Street, owned by a Mr. Collin Laws, which sold the same goods only on a smaller scale, but was a handy shop for elderly people who never owned a car or could not drive

L.A. Gunn Chemist Shop was in the shop where now is a real estate agent near the Frog & Swallow Cafe. A clothes dry cleaner was located between the Council Chambers and Wilson & Rigby Motor Body Repairs.

Allora had weekly livestock sales in agent's own yards.

In the mid 1960's Allora began to die slowly. When bulk milk came along dairy farmers had a choice - use bulk milk refirgerated vats or go out of dairying. Most of the cream suppliers changed over to bulk milk vats and became suppliers to Warwick Co-op Dairy Association at the time.

The Pig & Calf Sales ended and the 3 agents closed their doors. When the then council of the 70's got the idea of building municipal sale yards, not all

councilors agreed with the idea. My late father Cr . Len Weier did not support interfering with free enterprise.

The idea Allora Council had back then was to build municipal sale yards and have the livestock agents buy from the council a permit to use the yards and renew the license every year. Agents said no way, so the yards council built got pulled down. Only a small part remains. All livestock sales from Allora area now go to Warwick or Toowoomba.

So many businesses that Allora once had are now gone. Christmas time was a busy time in Allora. The Shop next door to the Railway Hotel where the Chemist is now was called Hanson-Gilbert. Everyone went there to see Santa Claus, especially the children to put in their order for Christmas. The store was a sports goods and toy store and sold other goodies. It was at the back of this store where Les Masters had his mens hairdressing service for men and boys. In another room was a billiard room or snooker as it is known today. This all went in the 1950's-60's.

How the town has changed. 3 Banks once - now only 1 and a credit union. The original Allora Motors on the corner of Herbert & Drayton Streets sold Holden, Chevrolet, Pontiac, Oldsmobile, Dodge, Vauxhall, plus trucks (G.M.C., Chev and Dodge), plus tractors (Caterpillar, Oliver, John Deere, Lanz Bulldog). While Greswells on the corner of Forde & Warwick Streets sold Ford trucks, cars and tractors and serviced motor vehicles.

The team at Allora Motors consisted of owner Andrew Carney, brother-in-law Dick Hansen, also chief mechanic plus Mal Graham, Col Bisshoff, Norm Fictnor, plus others as well. There were 2 secretaries in the office, one was Kay Slatter, who went on to marry the late Mal Graham, who kept a mechanic business going in Allora until his passing.

Whites Garage in Drayton Street sold fuel and serviced motor vehicles in the shop now owned by Mr. Hentshel.

These are only some of the things from Allora's history. That was the Best Little Town on the Downs 65 years ago - now?

Allora's Past 100 years ago November 1915

Show Abandoned

At a meeting of the Central Downs Agricultural and Horticultural Association held on the 22nd November 1915, it was moved by Mr. T. Muir that no show be held in Allora next year, seconded by Mr. W. J. Abernethy and carried.

(This was only the second time in the over 30 year history of the Allora Association that the show had not been held, the first being in 1903. The decision was made due to the extremely dry conditions prevailing. Only 16 ½ inches of rain was received for the whole of 1915 and overshadowing this, was the world's greatest war, and the committee felt it unwise to hold the show)

Allora's Past 125 years ago November 1890

Allora Police

Only two policemen are stationed in this district, and their jurisdiction is of the most comprehensive nature. Sergeant Roe is chief, and acts as clerk of petty sessions, registrar of births, deaths and marriages, immigration agent, electoral registrar etc. etc. His solitary assistant has to patrol the

district from King's Creek, near Toowoomba, to the Glengallan boundary near Warwick; from Goomburra to where the Condamine River separates the Allora police district from Leyburn. "There's not a better or more honest class of people that what's here" Sergeant Roe stated. That only twenty-one persons - mostly "travelling loafers" the sergeant explained - were locked up last year bore out the truth of his assertion. The clerical work and the multiplicity of returns which have to be sent in from the district must occupy a very large portion of the sergeant's time, and it is evident that extra assistance will have to be granted before long.

Spring Creek Reserve

We are glad to perceive that the reserve at Spring Creek is now being laid out in farms by Surveyor Weale of Toowoomba. The site is on the north side of Table Top Mountain, on the Clifton run. It has a gentle fall towards the large plain and the soil is of first-rate quality, well adapted for wheat. The distance from Warwick to Spring Creek is about 20 miles. (Ipswich Times 18th November 1865)

This time in history will be re-enacted in Warwick thanks to Southern Downs Regional Council, with funding provided by the Queensland Government as part of the 2014-2018 Anzac Centenary program.

Southern Downs Regional Council's Mayor, Cr Peter Blundell said the event will allow people to experience the energy and community support shown 100 years ago to farewell the original Dungarees.

"From 5.30pm the events of 1915 will be re-enacted with a parade led by local bands and cadets from the 139 Army Cadet Unit who will be stepping off the following morning. Marchers who participated in the 1998 re-enactment and descendants of the original Dungarees, are invited to participate as well," he said.

"Following the parade, the program will then move into the Warwick Town Hall for an authentic re-enactment of the original program including songs of the time provided by local performers. With his talent for wit and humour, local poet and yarn spinner, Marco Gliori, will take the audience on a journey back in time to 1915. This is an event not to be missed!

"It's so important to commemorate the 28 Warwick and Stanthorpe men who volunteered to fight for our country in 1915, and Council encourages everyone to come down and enjoy the events," Cr Blundell said.

For those who don't secure a ticket, the program will be livestreamed to big screens outside Town Hall. Residents are invited to bring a chair and view the program under the stars. Supper will be served outside Town Hall with Anzac biscuits courtesy of QCWA Border Division and Warwick RSL Sub-Branch.

"At the time of competing, Brodie was in the throes of finishing his apprenticeship as a Diesel Fitter with Council, and has since taken up a Mechanic's role with Council.

"Brodie's 'Gold' Medal is a credit to his commitment and dedication to his trade, and on behalf of Council I would like to congratulate him. When asked about his reaction to the win, Mr Ellery said "I'm pretty happy, proud and a little shocked. I'm excited to get the opportunity to go to the National Competition to see and experience the standard of other apprentices from across Australia, and I've always wanted to go to Melbourne to see the big city," said Mr Ellery.

The Heavy Vehicle Mechanics regional competition, held at the Warwick Campus of TAFE QLD South West, included five entrants from across the South West region, with competitors from Warwick, Gatton, Dalby and Chinchilla.

David Wyvill, Automotive Teacher from the Warwick Campus of Tafe QLD South West said the mechanics participated in six rounds of competition.

"The rounds were planned to test their diagnostic skills on workstations involving engine management, air brake systems, automotive electrical faults, hydraulics, roadworthiness, and steering and engine measurements and diagnosis.

"The competition was very close with only five points separating all competitors," said Mr Wyvill.

Fellow competitors Shane Hunkin from Nolans Transport received the Silver medal and Hayden Haidley from Haidley's Coach's took out the Bronze medal.

The regional WorldSkills competition is held every two years with winning competitors then getting the opportunity to participate in national and international level competitions.

Mr. McCallum later presented the Year 10 class with their graduating medallions.






Council staff know the value of a hairy lip, with many committing to growing a 'mo' this month to help change the face of men's health.

Warmer conditions bring home fire risks

With summer soon approaching, RACQ has called on Queenslanders to ensure their fans and air conditioners were safe to use.

RACQ research revealed faulty electrical appliances were the cause of 13.8 percent of home fires last year.

Executive Manager Insurance Communications Mike Sopinski said as the weather heated up, fans and air conditioners were being put into rapid use.

"Queenslanders need to be aware of the potential fire risks posed by cooling devices, particularly those that have been stored for some time and may be overdue for a safety check," Mr Sopinski said.

"Many householders are taking dangerous risks, admitting to leaving fans and air conditioners on (43.7 percent) while away from the home.

"The greatest danger time for a home fire is between 4pm and 5pm followed by 11am and noon."

Mr Sopinski said improperly installed, damaged or misused equipment were frequent sources of preventable fires.

"Before switching on these types of appliances, Queenslanders should check for damaged cords and blocked filters, particularly in older equipment," he said.

"They should also be careful when buying second-hand electrical appliances by thoroughly checking the unit is safe to use."

RACQ insurance claims data showed December was the most likely month to experience a fire in the home.

Rising temps spark health care advice

St John Ambulance (Qld) is warning Queenslanders to keep drinking non-alcoholic fluids to ensure sufficient hydration during times of sustained high weather temperatures.

St John (Qld) CEO Noel Gillard said during heatwaves it was

important to stay well hydrated, particularly children and the elderly who are at most risk of being affected by the extreme weather conditions.

"With temperatures rising across all of Queensland, it is important we look after ourselves as well as our family and friends," he said.

"Although anyone can be at risk of heat stress or heat stroke, family members or carers need to ensure all young children and the elderly are properly taken care of."

Heat stress can occur within a few minutes and may lead to fatal heat stroke. To avoid heat stroke, keep well hydrated by drinking about 500mL of water every hour.

Signs and symptoms of heat stroke include:

- dry skin
- confusion
- headache
- · dark yellow urine
- · small production of urine
- nausea

To avoid symptoms of heat stress or heat stroke, it is best to ensure that you are always protected from the sun.

"Wear a hat, sunscreen and cool, loose fitting clothing at all times – even when it's cloudy," Mr Gillard said. "It is also essential to increase fluid intake by drinking plenty of water."

Mr Gillard said tradespeople, sports people and those working outdoors were also at a higher risk of developing heat stress or heat stroke

"A casualty of heat stroke will have hot, dry skin which indicates a critical medical emergency," he said.

"After calling triple zero (000) for an ambulance, start to loosen tight fitting clothes and cool the casualty down by dampening their skin with a wet sponge or fanning them.

"If you begin to feel unwell, dizzy or have a headache, then it is best to stop, rest, hydrate and cool down. The risk of heat stroke can increase significantly if these steps are not followed." St John (Qld) offers first aid training across Queensland to deal with medical emergencies such as heat stroke. In a first aid
