It is my understanding that any other prospective candidate



We MUST cut the debt

Candidate for the Southern Downs Regional Council election, Marika McNichol, has warned that the Council's huge debt is scheduled to get worse if action isn't taken immediately.

"Council currently carries more than \$27 million debt on an operating budget of \$66 million and has run an operating deficit for four of the past five years," Marika says. "This means that every year, ratepayers pay around \$2 million dollars in interest to banks - it's dead money!"

Queensland Treasury Corporation recently confirmed how perilous the situation has become when it announced a Credit Risk Review of the Southern Downs Regional Council.

"Clearly they are not only worried about our current debt but also Council proposals to increase our debt. Increased debt is just not on. I'm hearing this from every resident and business person I listen to. Voters must make the message loud and

Marika is encouraged that the new CEO of the Southern Downs Council, David Keenan, seems keen to rectify the mess.

"Mr Keenan's recognition that the state of our finances is "dire", as he put it, suggests he wants a sustainable solution. I'm hoping electors will vote in councillors who will give him the support he needs to implement a genuine debt reduction plan. I will certainly support such a plan."

Marika says reducing debt requires responsible management and budgetary discipline. She advocates a review of services the Council supplies, aiming to make them quicker, more effective and at a cost ratepayers can afford.

"We've seen numerous examples where Council gets these things wrong. They are closing smaller waste transfer stations and upgrading key ones... that sounds fine until you discover the new system will cost ratepayers more than the one they are replacing.

"That's the kind of madness we have to stop. People from Allora to Wallangarra are telling me that."

As a councillor, Marika will make it a top priority to urge Council to adopt fiscally responsible policies that will ensure balanced operating budgets and reduced debt.

Motor Bike Rally

More than 90 motor bike riders from Queensland, N.S.W. and Victoria, on machines ranging in age from 1918 to newer models, descended on Allora to compete in a rally. Heavy rain caused many of the competitors to pull out of the race but 35 riders left the Railway Hotel at one minute intervals to attempt the first stage. Flooding in the Clifton area disrupted the course and only Allora locals, Scott Mitchell on a Honda CBR 1000 and Les Schellenberger on a Honda CB 1100R safely negotiated the water. After completing the second stage of the race the bikers returned to the Railway Hotel for a barbeque lunch and presentation of trophies. The organizers, including Railway Hotel licensee, Geoff Keevers, received a number of requests for another rally to be held in the future.

o'clock mass by His Grace, Archbishop Duhig, assisted by Father O'Carroll, parish priest. Father O'Carroll read a statement which showed that there was only a balance of £293 owing on the convent. During the short time that he had been parish priest, over £2,400 had been spent in improvements which comprised a new Presbytery, Grotto, Statues and the new convent.

Archbishop Duhig tendered a hearty welcome to Allora to the Sisters of St. Joseph and outlined some of the history of their Order. He congratulated Father O'Carroll and his people on the magnificent building that they had opened that day. The collection at the opening of the convent was £100. The ladies provided light refreshments.

Allora's Past 125 years ago January 1891

Freight Rates

One of the largest and most representative meetings of farmers and businessmen ever held in Allora assembled for the purpose of considering the effects of the new railway freight rates on the trade of the district. Messrs Barnes, Archibald & Co had already commenced to cart wheat

to Warwick by road. Messrs Kennedy Bros. had abandoned plans to enlarge their Allora flour mill in consequence of the increased rates. (In the reminiscences of Mr. J. H. Gwynne he recorded that Kennedy Bros. had contracted him to carry 200 tons of flour to Toowoomba as evidence that carriage by road could be as cheap as by rail. He delivered the first load himself and the remaining trips were completed by his sons).

The meeting unanimously passed a motion that a protest be lodged with the Government about the increased freight rates on farm produce. A committee of Messrs. Harvey, Deacon, Kennedy, Kelly, Cooke, Collins, Kelleher, Banks, Shannon and Dalton was elected to carry out the objects of the meeting.

Allora's Past 150 years ago January 1866

Minister Appointed

The Rev. Thomas Kingsford, Presbyterian minister, lately officiating in the town of Warwick, has been appointed to the charge of Allora and surrounding districts. (*The Brisbane Courier 20th January 1866*)

- 5. Plant inventory to be taken and surplus equipment sold.
- 6. No new equipment purchased until condition of machinery is determined.
- 7. All surplus council land sold so new rates can be received.
- 8. No open parks used by the people to be sold (Brisbane is now having to buy back parks that they sold years ago.
- 9. Councillors wages to be frozen for term of office.
- 10. A critical look at a 5 year business plan for council.
- 11. All expenditure of council to be totally transparent.
- 12. Tourist visitors to be welcomed, Warwick to be RV friendly.
- 13. Create incentives for new business to come to Warwick.
- 14. Re instate rate discounts.
- 15. Calculate amount of monies required to pay out redundancies for employees wishing to retire and set a procedure to raise that money.
- 16. No more borrowing by council until deficit is reduced considerably and is under control.
- 17. Community groups to be involved in special projects around the area in parks and gardens.
- 18. No more council waste in double handling of projects.

First World War project seeks 'citizen historians'

A global project has been launched which will research the lives and wartime service of 'Geordies' – from the North-East of England - in the armies of Australia, New Zealand, Newfoundland, and Canada during the First World War.

'Dominion Geordies in World War One' – funded by the Arts and Humanities Research Council – will seek to 'crowdsource' research by recruiting volunteer researchers in Australia and overseas.

Dr James McConnel, History Lecturer at Northumbria University, explained:

"The first stage of the project will involve collecting information that will help us build a comprehensive and fascinating insight into the stories of so many of the local men and women of the North East who, having left their native land in the three decades or so before the war, found themselves volunteering to return and fight for the homeland in the campaigns of the war across the world.

"By better understanding their complex identities, we hope to get a clearer picture of a fascinating aspect of the First World War that has been almost completely forgotten."

The most famous 'Geordie' in any of the Dominion armies is John Simpson Kirkpatrick – known as the 'man with the donkey' – who earnt this epithet when he used a donkey to ferry his injured comrades to safety during the Dardanelles campaign . He served with the Australian army and the fact he was originally from South Shields, Tyne and Wear (UK), is well known, but he was one of a much larger contingent of English men and women whose stories have been sadly lost.

The research will consider not only individual 'migration histories' but also the way that individuals and communities saw their own identities - as 'Geordies' and Britons, but also Australians, Canadians, or New Zealanders.

The information for the database will be gathered by 'citizen historians' and the



12-month project is open to anyone – all you need is an interest in the First World War.

Using this information, the project organisers plan to produce a short film and write a number of research papers in order to profile the men of the North-East who fought in the armies of the Dominions.


"It will be an interesting and challenging project to work on," said Dr McConnel,

"And we want to get as many people as possible involved - from experienced researchers to first-time historians. Participants will have the opportunity to learn the skills necessary to research the lost stories of these service men and women's lives and to work with other researchers across the world.

"We are confident that anyone who can take the time to learn just a little about the scale and impact of the war will be encouraged to play a part in the project."

Consultation period opens for proposed Planning Scheme amendment

Southern Downs Regional Council is proposing to make an amendment to the Southern Downs Planning Scheme and is welcoming public submissions as part of the community consultation process.

At its General Meeting on 24 June 2015, Council resolved to make a major amendment to the Southern Downs Planning Scheme to include additional land in the north of Warwick in the Specialised centre zone, and subsequently provided details of the proposed amendment to the State Government along with a request for a State interest review.

Southern Downs Regional Council's Director Planning, Environment and Community Services, Mr Ken Harris said that Council had received confirmation from the Queensland Government that the relevant State interests have been integrated into the proposed amendment, and that Council may undertake public consultation.

"The proposed amendment is now available for community consultation, and any person is welcome to make a written submission to Council on any aspect of the proposed amendment during the consultation period, which is open until 5pm on Friday, 11 March 2016.

"The purpose and general effect of the proposed amendment is to include more land within the Specialised centre zone to consolidate the area already within this zone and to provide areas of land of adequate size to accommodate larger developments, such as showrooms and homemaker centres, which would accord with the purpose of the Specialised centre zone," he said.

Submissions to Council on the proposed planning scheme amendment must: (a) be in writing and, unless the submission is made electronically, signed by each person

making the submission; (b) be received on or before 5.00pm on Friday, 11 March 2016; (c) state the name and residential or business address of each person who made the

submission; (d) state the grounds of the submission and the facts and circumstances relied on in support of

the grounds; and (e) be made to Southern Downs Regional Council at PO Box 26, Warwick Qld 4370, or mail@sdrc.qld.gov.au



2016 Australia Day Award Winners NORTHERN REGION

Citizen of the Year – Robert Keogh

Warwick's Australia Day Citizen of the Year for 2016 is awarded to Robert Keogh.

Robert or "Bob" as he is more widely known is proudly Warwick born and bred. He is one of the founding members, Past-President and current Vice- President of the Southern Downs Steam Railway Association, a volunteer, not-for-profit tourist heritage steam railway based at the Warwick Railway Precinct. With a long held vision for the reintroduction of steam rail travel in the Southern Downs region Bob worked tirelessly, rallying old friends and railway acquaintances to the renovate an old steam locomotive and was instrumental in the formation of the Southern Downs Steam Railway in 1996. Bob was heavily involved in the enormous task of not only restoring the locomotive and carriages, but lobbying government at regional, state and federal levels to achieve sufficient funding which, coupled with innumerable volunteer hours, resulted in Southern Downs Steam Railway achieving certification to run on the main Queensland Rail line in the heart of the picturesque Southern Darling Downs and Granite Belt regions.

Southern Downs Steam Railway has carried in excess of 3000 passengers in 2015, showcasing the Southern Downs to tourists and locals alike. The volunteer work carried out by Bob has shown vision, commitment and strength of leadership in his many community achievements, including as member of the Knights of the Southern Cross, Patron of the Warwick Recreation Aero Club, former Board Member of the Warwick Fire Services, and former Chair of the local National/LNP Branch for several terms.

Bob's tenacious spirit is also evidenced by his overcoming of significant personal and financial barriers to gain his pilot's licence at age 19 and his Senior Commercial Pilot's Licence at age 34, following which he established the Downs Flight Centre, educating and mentoring pilots over the course of 40

years.

Bob is an exemplary role model and a very worthy recipient of the 2016 Australia Day Citizen of the Year Award.

Junior Citizen Award – Millie Hauff

The Australia Day Junior Citizen for 2016 is Millie Hauff. This award recognises Millie's considerable dedication and service to community. Millie embodies the character of a great young citizen -she is community-minded, enjoys participating in a range of sports, has a passion for volunteering for the betterment of others in the community, and demonstrates a maturity beyond her 15 years of age.

Millie is an active member of several community and sporting groups, including the Warwick Cancer Council; Warwick Relay for Life, St Vincent de Paul, Warwick's Riding for the Disabled, Killarney School of Dance, Warwick Gymnastics Club, and the Warwick Swimming Club of which she was captain in 2014 and 2015.

A strong hope that a cure for cancer will be found has driven Millie to help establish and serve enthusiastically on the committee of the Warwick/Southern Downs Relay for Life in 2013, 2014 and again in 2015, and she is a keen fund raiser for the local Cancer Council Queensland branch in Warwick.

Millie has a passion not only for helping people, but caring for animals and works part time at a local Vet Clinic, as well as volunteering and assisting children to experience the joys of horse-riding through the Warwick Riding for the Disabled program.

Volunteering is a key feature in Millie's life, and she regularly assists with events held by the St Vincent de Paul group at Assumption College, and volunteers each year to assist with water stops and marshalling at the Warwick Pentath events.

Millie's selflessness, dedication, enthusiasm and community spirit render her an excellent role model for young people and she is a most deserving recipient of the Junior Citizen Award for 2016.

Cultural Award – John Telfer

The 2016 Australia Day Cultural Award is presented to John Telfer. John has contributed to extending and protecting the cultural heritage of Warwick over many years.

In particular during 2015 John has made a tremendous effort to keep the Anzac legend alive. He submitted stories of the local men who enlisted from the area to the Warwick Daily News. This led to a flood of requests which resulted in him writing over 30 profiles on local World War One and World War Two heroes. Among his many other achievements, he has also written a history of the Scots College cadet unit which is to be published later this year.

John also made a significant contribution to the successful delivery of the "March of the Dungarees 2015 – Demonstration of Support" event.

In a similar vein, John was co-opted by the Warwick Choral Society to be part of the concert organisation where some of his wartime poetry and stories were read out at the Anzac tribute concert in November 2015.

John has been an active volunteer for many local organisations including the Warwick Woodcutters Group, the Anzac Day organising group and many other groups who continue to deliver a service to veterans or that continue to uphold the memories and achievements of local war veterans.

His significant work on collecting and preserving the Anzac stories, along with his active volunteering and generosity of spirit make John a well deserving recipient of the Australia Day Cultural Award for 2016.

Sports Award – Adam Byrne

The Australia Day Sports Award for 2016 is presented to Adam Byrne.

Adam's sporting involvement includes memberships of the Warwick Hockey, Cricket and Touch Football associations, the Warwick Car Club and the Warwick Cowboys Rugby League Football Club.

For 30 years, Adam has been actively involved in and



contributed to the rich sporting fabric of Warwick through many roles as player, coach, umpire and supporter, but Hockey is clearly where he has excelled.

Adam's love of Hockey started early when he joined Warwick juniors at age six and went on to play for Queensland teams each year from the age of 12 to 20, including one national under 18 championships held in Warwick.

Adam has played for numerous teams including the Queensland Blades, Gold Coast and East Ballina. Following his selection at the State Titles, Adam played in the Queensland over-35's team, which came fourth in the nationals in Cairns last year.

Adams' sporting prowess has been recognised with his recent selection to the Australian Over 35's Hockey Team which will complete in the Masters Hockey World Cup in Canberra in March.

David's amazing drive, commitment and dedication to the sport is greatly admired by his cohort and recognised through his nomination for the 2015 TRL "Clubperson of the Year".

David is a well deserving recipient of the Australia Day Sports Administration Award for 2016.

Community Event of the Year – March of the Dungarees 2015 – Demonstration of Support

The Australia Day Community Event of the Year for 2016 is awarded to "The March of the Dungarees 2015 – Demonstration of Support".

2015 was a year of national significance in commemoration of the Anzac Centenary. The March of the Dungarees 2015 – Demonstration of Support event was selected as a signature event by the Queensland Government through the Commemorative Events funding program. The event, held in December last year, is unique to Warwick in that it re-enacted an event held 100 years before in Warwick on the night before the original First World War Dungaree recruits stepped off on their march to Brisbane.

The re-enactment of The March of the Dungarees 2015 – Demonstration of Support event brought the Warwick community into the spotlight displaying it as a vibrant and active community, and was made possible through the collaboration of an outstanding team of community representatives, and through the support and contribution of numerous community groups, organisations and individuals:

Southern Downs Regional Council; The Warwick and District Historical Society Inc; Warwick RSL Sub-Branch; Combined Services Clubs of Warwick; 139 Army Cadet Unit; 11th Light Horse Montrose-Warwick Troop; Qld Police Mounted Unit; Warwick City Brass Band; Warwick Thistle Pipe Band; students from Warwick Christian College, Scots PGC and Assumption College Drama Group, Warwick Lions Club Inc; The Salvation Army; Allora RSL Sub-Branch; QCWA Border Division; and entertainers including Warwick Choral Society; The East Street Singers; Norma O'Hara Murphy; Susan Needer; Bob Townshend; Erin Hilton, Brendan Babbington, Anu Woodruff-Becker, Margaret Bryant, and Marco Gliori.

As Master of Ceremonies, Marco Gliori's outstanding talents enabled him to weave the past and the present to re-create an authentic representation of the original 1915 Demonstration of Support event.

The 2015 Demonstration of Support event showcased local talent and informed the community of the significance not only of the 1915 Dungarees March; but the participation and support of the community at that time. The 2015 event was privileged to include Mr Don Meneely, son of original Dungaree Mr Harold Meneely, and Mr Harry Anstey, son of original Dungaree Mr Henry Anstey, in honour of their heroic fathers.

The community response to the event was overwhelmingly positive, with people expressing how it touched their hearts and made them cry. They learned so much about the original event and felt they were transported back in time to 1915.

The delivery of this outstanding event was achieved through the combined knowledge, passion, and enthusiasm of all involved, and is a commendable recipient of the 2016
