Dear Editor.

At the council meeting last week "Emu Swamp Business Case" was received and noted. Cost of the dam and infrastructure is now \$121.5 million (including interest) for the recommended "Scenario 2", with "Customers" contributing 35%, customers being Irrigators (22%) and SDRC (13% ie \$15.8 million which equates to a one off cost for urban use of \$21 000 per Ml.) The ongoing operational and maintenance costs are not taken into

Many have been led to believe that the dam would be funded wholly by Government money, eg, National Water Infrastructure Development Fund (NWIDF)

Approvals have not yet been given for the preferred scenario. The report states that "Further work is needed to determine the project's feasibility and NWIDF funding will be important in this

Council is in debt. An additional amount of up to \$7 million of the "Customer's" money has already been spent previously on endless consultants' reports and studies.

The consultant's "Next step" apparently has not been taken ie "On 14th January 2016, SDRC will apply to the Queensland Government for Australian Government (NWIDF) funding as further work is needed to determine the project's feasibility". Have the customers applied to the government for an extension

Surely a full feasibility study is one of the first steps after such a proposal as Emu Swamp Dam is put forward and therefore should have been done years ago? Who is driving this?



I am a participant in series of meetings around the small communities within the region and the response has been quite alarming. The people are extremely pleased that we have made the effort to come to them - they rarely if ever see their councillors. They have been very glad to have someone who is willing to try to understand the issues in their communities.

I have a desire to see all those communities flourish. If even the small communities are flourishing, then the region flourishes, as do the state and the whole country.

The rises in rates and charges are excessive and unaffordable. Rises should be no more than the national cpi and should be frozen in the first year of the new council. Currently rates are budgeted to rise by 4% for the next 10 years. Disposable income of ratepayers and businesses has been whittled away by these excessive rate increases in the past several years. I believe that councillors should therefore have their salaries cut accordingly and take a 10% pay cut immediately. They need to share the pain they are causing.

The high rates together with the high fees and charges of setting up a business in the region are deterring businesses from coming here. High rates make businesses less profitable. Council must return to its core business.

In May last year I addressed council on its wasteful spending. Since then I still see ratepayers' hard-earned money being wasted and spending out of control. POTENTIAL TURN AROUND ON **Grainx ISSUES AT ALLORA**

Cr Jamie Mackenzie was pleased that the Southern Downs Regional Council reversed its decision at its January 2016 General Meeting and is now prepared to meet with the operators of the Allora Grainx site at a special meeting to address concerns over on-going environmental nuisances.

"Finally we might get somewhere" remarked Cr Jamie "but it is frustrating that it takes 3 council meetings since last August to get dialogue rather than legal action."

"The operator raised no problem with tabling committee discussions in open Council and is keen to meet with Council to resolve outstanding issues including landscaping of the Herbert Street frontage of the site, the hours of operation of the grain elevator, loading and unloading of grain both during and outside of peak harvest periods."

"A Special Meeting will hopefully resolve what the committee has not. I am disappointed that residents told us first, rather than the Consultation Committee, that empty container loading was still happening on the Herbert Street site and not at Council's Allora depot as required by the Memorandum of Understanding" Cr Mackenzie said.

"All we seek is some balance" Cr Jamie Mackenzie said. "Grainx operations close to the centre of Allora has created employment and generated income for the town but at the same time, residents of Allora deserve an acceptable level of neighbourhood amenity."

Cr Mackenzie said "the tall grain silos are both an Allora icon and a traditional activity with the right to continue operations for the economic benefit of the region. After all, the silos will not be moved in a hurry, so the operator must act as a good corporate citizen and Council must ensure any operator on the




