The subject of reintroduction of Divisions is a popular topic throughout the Southern Downs and needs to be considered by Council.

The role of a Councillor on the Southern Downs Regional Council will be no less challenging in the coming term, than it has been over the past eight years. Amalgamation issues continue to linger and will do for some time to come, as will the

The Editor.

On March 19 Queenslanders will be asked to make an important decision about our state's future.

Held on the same day as the local government elections, you will be asked to decide whether the term of our State Parliament should be changed from an unfixed, three-year term to a fixed,

I am supporting fixed terms because they will provide far greater certainty for Queenslanders and take away any political opportunism that can play a part in government decisions on election timing. This reform will put a 'leg-rope' on politicians who are used to calling elections at a time that suits them, and often well ahead of when an election is due.

There are solid practical reasons to introduce fixed, four-year terms. Over the years I've had many people approach me asking for greater clarity on this issue given the significant impact an election can have on the day to day running of businesses and people's personal lives; whether it be planning holidays around an election or simply deciding how to place vour vote.

Fixed terms will also remove the constant election date speculation from our political process and provide the certainty and confidence to business that we know drives investment and job creation in our region. Voting yes will mean the voters of Southern Downs and right across Queensland will know exactly when an election will be held and can plan accordingly. Finally, I am certain fixed terms will deliver better government and policy making for all Queenslanders as decisions will be made in the interest of better outcomes and improved services for the community, rather than for short term political gain.

I encourage you to give strong consideration to this important question, and in the interests of all Queenslanders vote yes on March 19 to four-year fixed terms.

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

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Southern Downs' arts and culture supported through RADF funding

A diverse range of creative arts and cultural projects will unfold around the Southern Downs as part of one of the State's most active arts programs, the Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF).

The RADF is a partnership between the Queensland Government and Southern Downs Regional Council to support local arts and culture in regional Queensland.

At its General Meeting held last week, Council approved six projects from across the region which will benefit from more than \$33,800 in funding under the second RADF Round for

Southern Downs Regional Council's Director Planning, Environment and Community Services, Mr Ken Harris said Council was pleased with the high standard of applications received.

"In the main. Council continues to receive not only well developed but exciting applications for projects which will continue to strengthen the important arts and cultural fabric of our region," he said.

Premier and Arts Minister Annastacia Palaszczuk said the Queensland Government is providing \$2.08 million in 2015/16 for the Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF), a state and local government partnership with 59 local councils across

"The \$2.08 million will leverage approximately \$1.8 million from local councils, and means an anticipated total of \$3.9 million will be available for arts projects across the state," the Premier

"Each year around 500,000 people are involved in RADF projects as practitioners, participants or audience members, helping to ensure that Queenslanders can engage with arts in their local community.

"RADF supports arts, cultural and heritage projects throughout Queensland, ranging from local festivals and celebrations, to training, education and employment outcomes for Queensland

"The revamped RADF program developed in consultation with local councils has opened the way for an expansion of the arts at a local level with public art commissions, access to touring productions and more training opportunities on offer," she said. Round Two successful RADF grant recipients are:

Stanthorpe Pottery Club - To engage local prominent sculptor Maggie Brockie to conduct a "Feathers & Fur: Sculpting Nature" workshop to up skill participants in naturalistic 3D modelling, \$1,400.

Stanthorpe Regional Art Gallery - To engage professional street art muralist Travis Vinson to undertake a Stanthorpe Street Art Project during the 2016 Apple and Grape Festival, \$4.200.

Stanthorpe Camera Club – To conduct of a two-day Photoshop course facilitated by an accredited trainer and photographer for local photographers, \$3,960.

Granite Belt Choir - To engage Graeme Morton, Director of Brisbane Chamber Choir to facilitate workshops for musicians and singers, \$1,316.

Jumpers and Jazz Organising Committee - To support engagement of jazz musicians and ensembles for the Jazz program of the 2016 Jumpers and Jazz in July festival,

Allora Photography Group - To engage Bluedog Photography tutor to conduct a two-day environmental portrait workshop to enhance participants' knowledge and skills, \$2.875.

"Council is satisfied with the diversity of projects supported this round and that the funding will deliver ongoing arts and cultural benefits to a number of communities within the Southern Downs." said Mr Harris.

As a result of the Round Two approvals, the 2015/16 RADF program funds have been fully allocated, and there will be no further rounds offered for the 2015/16 financial year.

He has served for over three decades as a region representative of local community organizations, local regional & State sport and workplace employees at regional & state level.





Looking Back...

Allora's Past 25 years ago March 1991

Trough in Park

A large wooden water trough, built in 1948, has been placed in Dalrymple Park. The trough, with a capacity of 1200 gallons, was cut by Jack Busiko and Bill Blocksidge from a dead bloodwood tree in the Pechey State Forest. Jack Busiko worked for the Stark family at Pechey until 1940 when he moved with the family to Ellinthorp. He returned to work in the forest at Pechey in 1944. In 1948 he arrived at Ellinthorp with the trough as a birthday present for Mr. Watty Stark. It was carried on the back of an ex-Army GMC 6x6 truck.

The Stark family sold the Ellinthorp property in 1980 and the current owners, Don and Margaret Duff, have donated the trough to the Allora Shire Council. Allora

Shire Chairman, Cr. Jim Deacon, accepted the trough on behalf of the Shire. Denny's Engineering, and crane driver, Mr. Don Crawford, played a significant role in the task of transporting and installing the trough in the park. Jack Busiko and members of the Stark family were present to see the trough placed in position.

Allora's Past 50 years ago March 1966

Allora-Clifton Football Club

Mr. George Webb, an extremely popular resident of the district, passed away suddenly at his home at Headington Hill on Sunday night, the cause of death being heart failure. The deceased gentleman, who was in his 63rd year, was an Englishman and came to Australia while a young man, taking up pastoral pursuits with his brother, who predeceased him by a number of years. Some years ago he purchased several portions of the Headington Hill Estate, which he converted into a very fine property and on which he successfully carried on mixed farming with dairying as a speciality. He was also prominent in sporting affairs, and coursing in particular owed much in its palmier days to his generous patronage. His kennels supplied the victor of many a sternly contested event. He leaves a widow and grown-up family to mourn his loss, with only the youngest son residing at "Bundarh", Mr. Webb's home. The internment took place in the Allora cemetery on Tuesday, the Rev. S. Baggaley officiating at the graveside.

Fire trails to blaze ahead with funding boost

Southern Downs' residents will stand to benefit from the construction and maintenance of more fire trails in the region, with funding confirmed by the Queensland's Deputy Premier, Jackie Trad.

At last week's General Meeting, Southern Downs Regional Council noted correspondence from the Deputy Premier approving a contribution of \$31,680 to Council under the Queensland Government's 2015-16 Community Resilience Fund for fire trail construction and maintenance.

Southern Downs Regional Council's Mayor, Cr Peter Blundell said the funding was welcomed and, along with Council's in-kind contribution of more than \$20,000, would help to protect residents from the devastating effects of bushfire, through disaster preparedness and risk mitigation.

"Council is very pleased that our application to the Community Resilience Fund was successful and will enable Council to proceed with the additional fire trail construction and maintenance in partnership with Rural Fire Service Queensland (RFSQ)," said the Mayor.

Council's Disaster Management Coordinator, Mr Mark Saunders, said the bulk of the funding is earmarked for use in the southern end of the Southern Downs region.

"Three new fire trails, of approximately 13 kilometres, have been identified for construction in and around Ballandean and Eukey, and some maintenance of existing trails will also take place in these areas.

"Some of the funding will be used to undertake maintenance of the existing 42 kilometres of fire trails in the ranges east of Warwick, which were built during the fires of 2009," said Mr Saunders.

Southern Downs Regional Council worked in partnership with the Stanthorpe and Warwick Groups of RFSQ to identify and prioritise construction and maintenance of new and existing fire trails across the region.

"Significant work was undertaken by RFSQ staff and volunteers and Council officers in mid-2015 to develop the application to the Community Resilience Funds, and it's a credit to all involved that the application has been successful," added Mr Saunders.

Michael Welsh, Group Officer for Warwick Group and Acting Bush Fire Safety Officer with RFSQ said fire trails allow Rural Fire Brigades to access areas that are generally inaccessible so they can attack and cut off fires.

"If we can get resources closer to the fire then we can attack it earlier. Less land will be burnt out and the safety of our volunteer fire fighters is markedly improved, allowing them to get home and get back to work sooner.

"Fire trails can also be used as control lines for hazard reduction burns during operation Cool Burn" said Mr Welsh. The first project meeting of key stakeholders was held last week, to determine the schedule of works. It is envisaged that



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
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
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
