A model of an idea for farmers

The University of Southern Queensland's Agricultural Systems Modelling Research Group (ASMRG) is working on a range of tools to help farmers and managers make better decisions when they are in the paddock and the office.

This new group is headed by senior researcher Dr Keith Pembleton, who said the tools ASMRG are developing include apps to be used on hand-held technology such as smartphones and tablets.

"The office might be where farmers and managers order their fertiliser or their seed, but the paddock is often where production decisions are made, and the tools we're developing are aimed at giving them greater confidence in making those decisions," Dr Pembleton said.

"What we are doing is bringing the power of agricultural modelling tools literally into the hands of decision-makers, including broadacre grain producers, cotton growers, sugar producers and graziers."

ASMRG has been established as part of USQ's Broad-acre Agriculture Initiative with the Queensland Department of Agriculture and Fisheries (QDAF), and its modelling incorporates big data from a range of sources, including NASA, the





Australian Bureau of Meteorology, CSIRO and state governments.

"We're working across a range of other areas to investigate ways to increase farm productivity while minimising environmental impact."

ASMRG is part of USQ's Institute for Agriculture and the Environment, and is working with other USQ centres to develop tools which collect and interpret data.

In collaboration with USQ's Centre for Crop Health, the National Centre for Engineering in Agriculture (NCEA), the International Centre for Applied Climate Sciences, and the Computational Engineering and Science Research Centre, and QDAF, it means ASMRG can work across a broad range of disciplines.

This enables ASMRG to investigate areas including crop physiology and pathology, and the effect of the environment on areas like production, soil, climate and management to give us a better idea and prediction of crop yields.

Dr Pembleton said ASMRG app development aimed to supplement and build on farmer and manager experience to bolster the rationale behind decisions which fall into two areas, tactical and strategic.

"Tactical decisions cover areas like when to irrigate and how much water to use, and how much fertiliser to apply. Strategic decisions look at what rotation of crops to follow, whether to invest in irrigation infrastructure and what enterprises to run. We want to help producers make the right call with regard to these decisions."

Dr Pembleton expects ASMRG's first prototype tools will be ready for testing by June or July.

Projects ASMRG is currently working on include PADcast, a decision-support system for use in the cotton industry, which allows the evaluation of trade-offs between fertiliser inputs, irrigation use, crop yield and losses of nitrogen and phosphorus to the environment.

In separate projects, ASMRG is collaborating with QDAF to develop Agricultural Risk Management (ARM) tools to explore climate variability and crop-yield expectations so producers and managers can make better-informed decisions with regard to what and when to plant, and the use of nitrogen and phosphorus fertiliser.

ASMRG is also providing crop-modelling support to QDAF in relation to irrigated agriculture developments in the Gulf Rivers region of North Queensland and with funding from Dairy Australia Ltd, is working with the Tasmanian Institute of Agriculture to improve productivity of pasture-based dairy farms.



Webinar to help landholders

understand new UWIR report

AgForce Projects will deliver a free webinar to help landholders understand the 2016 Surat Basin Underground Water Impact Report (UWIR), released by the Office of Groundwater Impact Assessment (OGIA) in March this year.

The webinar 'Underground Water Impact Report: What does it mean for you?' will be held on Wednesday 27 April from 1.00pm to 2.00pm.

The UWIR report is the next iteration of the first groundwater model released in 2012 and predicts the immediate and long term impacts of the CSG industry on aquifers and water users across the Surat Basin Cumulative Management Area (CMA). Project Leader Daniel Phipps said it was important for landholders and communities in the Surat Basin CMA to understand the reports predictions and what it means for them. "Landholders need to know whether their bores are predicted to be in the Immediately Affected Area (IAA) or the Long Term Affected Area (LTAA) and to understand the Make Good framework that follows," Mr Phipps said.

"It's also important for landholders to understand the groundwater monitoring process which has been developed as a result of the UWIR report."

Mr Phipps encourages landholders to consider getting their bores registered, to ensure they are included in future reports, noting the UWIR is updated every three years.

"The UWIR only covers registered bores in the Surat Basin CMA. If your bore is unregistered it will not be included in the UWIR predictions. This means for a Make Good agreement to be triggered for an unregistered bore, either proactive monitoring by the landholder or the company needs to identify a change or impact on the bore and that impact must be proven to be a result of CSG activities."

During the webinar CSG Project Leader Daniel Phipps will discuss the modelling process and help landholders gain an understanding of the predicted impacts and what this may mean for you.

Landholders that are unable to attend the webinar are encouraged to register anyway, as the session will be recorded and provided electronically to all registrants along with other

April is time to test your Safety Switch

Master Electricians Australia has urged Australians to test that their safety switches are working, and say that early April is a very sensible time to do it.

MEA State Manager Gary Veenstra said testing safety switches was a minor inconvenience, but an important part of electrical safety at home.

"We know that safety switches save lives. If there is any electrical incident, they will cut the power in thousandths of a second," Mr Veenstra said.

"Unlike circuit breakers – which protect electrical cables – safety switches are designed to prevent death or serious injury from electric shocks.

"But they can only save lives if they are working properly, and that's why you need to perform a very simple and safe test every now and then, just to check they are functioning as they should.

"All you need to do is open your switchboard and press the "Test" button on each of your safety switches. If they are working properly, the power will instantly trip off on that circuit. "Some houses will have safety switches on all circuits, and some will only have them on the light or power circuits. If you don't have a "Test" button for every circuit, then your home is not fully protected.

"If your safety switch doesn't immediately trip the power, you should urgently call a licensed electrician to have it replaced. And if you don't have a safety switch on every circuit, you also should talk to an electrician about ensuring you and your family are fully protected."

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School's back and so are school zones

Queensland's peak motoring body has reminded motorists to slow down around schools, as classes resumed across the state

RACQ said it was vital motorists stick to the 40 km/h speed zones to ensure the safety of children and adults alike.

RACQ spokesperson Lauren Ritchie said school zones were in place between 7-9am and 2-4pm as they were the busiest times around schools.

"Roads surrounding schools become a hive of activity as kids are dropped off and picked up, or are walking, skateboarding and riding bicycles to and from school," Ms Ritchie said.

"There are children of varying ages and road experience, so slowing down is a must."

Ms Ritchie also reminded parents about how their behavior could impact their children's safety.

"Parents should always aim to park on the same side of the road as the school and encourage their child to use the 'safety door', to minimise the circumstances where children have to cross the road," she said.

"They should also avoid calling out to their kids, where there is a risk the child might run across the road without looking.

"We also encourage parents to teach their children to wait with their hand on the rear passenger door until an adult is able to lead them safely across the road".

Deputy Mayor McNally said it is an honour to serve the community and thanked councillors for their confidence in electing her Deputy Mayor.




