# Council to trial new on-call arrangements for critical services

Southern Downs Regional Council will trial new on-call arrangements for critical Council services required after hours, for a three-month period starting on June 21.

Solution in classifieds section

Southern Downs Regional Council's Chief Executive Officer, Mr David Keenan said the new on-call arrangements included a reduction of the number of staff rostered as after- hours on-call personnel, and offered considerable operational savings.

"The trial is the result of a comprehensive review by Council staff of the after-hours on-call personnel arrangements that have been in place for a long time.

"The review of these arrangements was done in consultation with staff and is part of Council's ongoing commitment to identifying efficiencies and savings within the organisation," he said.

The trial will reduce existing on-call manning of 18 personnel to eight on-call staff from Monday to Saturday, and four on-call staff on Sundays.

Mr Keenan emphasised that the trial arrangements would ensure that critical Council services are supported effectively and appropriately, while providing savings.

"The new system will deliver enormous savings estimated at \$200,000 per year

"To achieve a comparable sum through active revenue raising would require a rate rise of about one per cent, and we know that simply would not be well received by our ratepayers and the Southern Downs community.

"Instead, Council is engaging a proactive approach to drive continuous improvement and further productivity gains through revised systems and processes, such as the new on-call arrangements," he said.

Mr Keenan added that Council anticipates that the on-call changes would boost productivity through a more effective, targeted use of the skill sets of staff within the organisation.



# Women's health nurse takes services on the road

Darling Downs Hospital and Health Service mobile women's health nurse Kathryn Anning will visit a variety of locations this month to conduct free clinics.

The service is free and confidential and is available to all women.

"A pap smear every two years can prevent the most common form of cervical cancer in up to 90 per cent of cases and is the best protection against cervical cancer," Ms Anning said.

"All women who have ever had sex should start having pap smears between the ages of 18 and 20 years, or two years after first having sex, whichever is later."

Ms Anning also provides a range of other services including breast awareness and sexual health testing as well as advice for issues such as continence, menopause, contraception and general wellbeing.

Allora's Past 25 years ago June 1991

#### **Shire Boundary Review**

Mr. Tom Sherman, chairman of the Electoral and Administrative Review Commission, told a hearing in Warwick that changes would only come where tangible benefits could be seen. Allora Shire Chairman, Mr. Jim Deacon, said that Allora did not want boundary changes but if this was decided upon, then Allora would prefer to be aligned with Warwick, rather than with Clifton and/or Camboova Shires. The Allora Shire Council suggested that if amalgamation was necessary, then two new rural shires based on Allora and Killarnev be formed. along with the Warwick City Council. "This would save costs, maintain employment and provide a compromise in the best interest of the Southern Downs," Councillor Deacon said. He expressed concern about "getting the message through" if a larger council was in authority.

# Allora's Past 75 years ago June 1941

#### Allora P.O.W.

Private Herbert Edward Whitton, a son of Mr. Joseph Samuel Whitton of Allora, was taken prisoner of war while serving with 1 Corps Transport Supply Column. Private Whitton was amongst a large number of Australians taken prisoner of war in Greece and Crete. After being incarcerated in German prisoner of war camps for up to 2 ½ years they were repatriated to Australia in December 1943. The former prisoners were unanimous in stating that the Red Cross parcels saved them from a very bad time. One of the men said that the treatment in the German camps had been better since the Russian situation

Burge; committee, Mrs. R. Kennedy, Miss E. Holmes, Rev. M. I. Young and Messrs Robinson and S. Tickle; Captain, Rev. M. I. Young; Lady Captain, Miss M. Burge.

#### **Football Match**

On Saturday last Greenmount and Allora football teams met on the Allora Recreation Reserve. The Greenmount team arrived at 12 o'clock and after a short ramble around the town, adjourned to lunch at Mr. John Kelly's Royal Hotel. At 3 o'clock sharp the game started. In the first half a nasty accident happened to one of the most promising players of the Allora team named Harrison, a youth of 15 years of age who was playing a splendid game. He came into collision with Culhane and had his leg broken above the knee. This stopped the game for a short time. Dr. Pain, who was playing the game, set the broken limb. Allora played a splendid game considering that it is their first game for this season and there is no doubt that with plenty of practice they will be the premier team of the Downs. At the call of time the scores were Greenmount 12, Allora nil. In the evening the Allora team entertained the Greenmount team to a splendid spread at John Kelly's hotel. The Greenmount team subscribed £2 to a fund raised for young Harrison who was injured.

## More than just a check up – change the way we perceive Men's Health

Blokes from Men's Sheds nationally will be participating in Men's Health Week (June 13-19) this year with many Sheds opening their doors and hosting male screening programs called 'Spanner in the Works'? Utilising local Health Service or volunteer medical professionals the Spanner programme provides a brief, men friendly Men's Health check and key Men's Health information that is aimed at promoting men to identify health issues early as well as encouraging men to have a full annual check up with their GP.

The Spanner programme provides some key health messages to men in a form that is understandable and achievable. Spanner is not about telling men what to do but sets out some things that they can do (or not do) to improve their health and the chances of a longer and happier life. It gives men the opportunity to make adjustments as they see fit.

Each check takes about 15 minutes and includes assessment of diabetes risk, emotional wellbeing, blood pressure and waist measurement as well as some reminders about keeping on top of issues such as exercise levels, cholesterol, skin checks and bowel cancer checks. At the end of each check the man is provided with up to four key and achievable recommendations to improve their health. Hopefully each man will take the results along with them to discuss the issues further with their GP.

Men are usually quite fastidious about maintaining their vehicles with scheduled services not being missed. Men realise what the implications can be of poor maintenance. Yet when it comes to looking after the most important piece of machinery, ourselves, men can often overlook the annual check-up and preventative maintenance which may lead to dire consequences later on.

This is just one initiative that the Australian Men's Shed Association has taken to improve the health of Aussie Men but there is still a long way to go. "5 men die every hour in Australia from preventable causes and almost 5 men die by suicide every day" AMSA CEO David Helmers stated, "In the lead up to this year's election it is time for Government to take firm action to address these issues and commit to funding Men's Health programmes"

"Men's Sheds and the role they play in reducing social isolation and improving mental health, especially in older males, are well known. The Men's Shed movement has grown over 300% in the past 4 years with 957 Men's Sheds now operating in Australia with a further 600 plus operating in Ireland, the UK and New Zealand. Despite an estimated 150,000 men participating in Sheds we are only reaching a small percentage of our men. One of the things that is required is broader Male Health programmes aimed at early detection and prevention." Last October the AMSA launched a new website named after our highly successful Male Health screening programme 'Spanner in the Works?"'.

www.malehealth.org.au provides a single access point to over 52 Male Health partner organisations including Andrology Australia, The Heart Foundation, beyondblue and Foundation 49. Mr Helmers added that "This website has been a huge success with 55,000 visits to the site since becoming operational. The site has filled a void in the web when it comes to finding accurate information on Men's Health but we need to address the larger issues and focus more on preventative health initiatives"

#### Financial support available for those affected by drought.

New funding has been released as part of the Community Drought Support Package for 2016. The Package has three key elements and the first to be rolled out will be flexible financial hardship support to community members experiencing hardship in the drought declared communities within the Southern Downs Regional Council area.

This funding will be delivered by Condamine Headwaters Landcare in conjunction with The Salvation Army Warwick Corps. Funding support will be targeted to cover those items not eligible under existing support programs and include, but are not limited to, training, vehicle registration, payment of overdue accounts and accounting fees. There is a cap on the amount of funds available and once used, the assistance program will be closed.

Landcare Coordinator, Catherine Travers said "We are very happy to be able to offer support in this way to all residents affected by drought throughout the Southern Downs Region. The very nature of flexible funding means that if residents are having trouble paying certain accounts, we would encourage them to seek assistance to determine their eligibility. Landcare is very pleased to partner with The Salvation Army to deliver this program that will contribute to helping our land managers get back on track".




