Over 3 million Australians are living with chronic pain every day, an often overwhelming condition that can have a negative impact on all aspects of a person's life. Mood, relationships, ability to work and general enjoyment of life can all be seriously impacted by chronic pain. In a double blow, the experiences of people with chronic pain are often discounted or minimised simply because it can't be seen by others - what we call 'the invisible challenge'.

In reality, chronic pain is arguably the fastest growing medical condition in Australia and affects people of all ages, a fact our Ambassador, cricketing legend Michael Clarke, knows all too well. He's been living with chronic pain since he was just 17 years old, and is encouraging people to seek the help they need.

"Seeking help has changed my life and allowed me to achieve everything I have through my career. It is all about learning as

much as you can to manage the pain as effectively as you possibly can," Michael Clarke said.

Apart from the impact on individuals and families, chronic pain is also estimated to cost our economy at least \$34 billion each

Thanks for coming to visit. We are looking forward to seeing vou in August.



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

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Council gets green light for roll out of cycle network plans

Southern Downs Regional Council has welcomed news that it has been successful in securing funding under the Queensland Government's Cycle Network Local Government Grants program to establish and develop cycle network routes in and around the Stanthorpe and Warwick central business districts. Southern Downs Regional Council's Planning and Engineering officers worked with the Department of Transport and Main Roads (DTMR) to develop a Principal Cycle Network Plan (PCNP) for both Stanthorpe and Warwick and were notified last month that the applications to the Cycle Network Local Government Grants program had been approved for \$38,000 in funding, with Council to contribute \$43,000 to the projects.

The PCNP is a coordinated program whereby DTMR works with regional councils to develop cycle networks that will encourage more daily cycling trips by connecting origin and destination points. The plan uses both State and Local Government controlled roads to build safe, direct and connected cycle paths.

Southern Downs Mayor, Cr Tracy Dobie congratulated staff on another successful bid for grant funding.

"This is a great outcome. The funding will enable Council to establish and signpost cycle lanes, informing road users of the presence of cyclists.

"Securing funding from the State Government to help improve infrastructure within our region is a fantastic start to the new

"It means we can continue to develop our region without it being at full cost to ratepayers," she said.

Cr Dobie also believes the cycle network will help to promote the Southern Downs region and potentially attract more visitors and residents to the region.

"Cycling is certainly a growing sport and recreational pastime in our community both in terms of interest from local cyclists, and the number of cycling events that are occurring in our region such as 'That Dam Ride', and the recent Brisbane Camperland Queensland Road Team Series event.

"The cycle network plan aligns with our community plan, and



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offers another opportunity to promote a healthy, more active lifestyle here in the Southern Downs and that is a great drawcard for tourists and residents to the region," she said.

Director of Engineering Services, Mr Peter See, said there are a number of environmental and economic benefits to the cycle network.

"If we make the roads safer for cyclists, we will see more cyclists on the roads and more cyclists effectively means less cars and trucks out there.

"This obviously helps to reduce carbon emissions and is a good thing environmentally, but it also means that if we have less vehicles on our roads we have less road damage and consequently less road maintenance," he said.

In consultation with DTMR, Council's planning and engineering staff investigated a number of potential routes that followed DTMR's roads to and from the central business districts in Stanthorpe and Warwick.

The routes were analysed using data based on safety, demand and connectivity and moderated to incorporate local knowledge, priorities and cost effectiveness. After physically being cycled, to test user experience and vehicle encounters, a shortlist of

proposed cycle networks was developed for Stanthorpe and Warwick.

The Mayor highlighted that the locations chosen are pathways to connect residents to and from schools, shops, sporting and recreational centres.

"Improved infrastructure and greater choices in transport is what our community needs, and the implementation of these cycle networks in Stanthorpe and Warwick is another positive step in that direction," Cr Dobie said.

Warwick Hospital Director of Nursing Anita Bolton said Ms Reid went above and beyond in her work to improve the health care

the Warwick community by improving their access to services," Ms Bolton said. "As the nurse unit manager for emergency, Janet ensures that

clients and is flexible in her approach to this work. "She also acts as a leader to

other staff members, ensuring that the care provided is culturally sensitive and that there are linkages made with Indigenous health workers at the hospital, if needed."

New bridges smooth the way for safer travel in the Southern Downs

Two major Southern Downs' bridge replacement projects were completed last week, with the new Bellinghams Road and Mullins Road bridges now open and accessible to residents and road users.

Last year Council was successful in its bid for funding from the Queensland Government's 'Royalties for Regions' program, receiving \$2.64 million, on a 75:25 basis for four bridge replacement projects with a total estimated cost of \$3.52

Southern Downs Regional Council's Mayor, Cr Tracy Dobie was very pleased to see these projects finalised.

"Council has a number of old timber bridges within our road network and staff have worked hard to prepare submissions for funding of new bridges or bridge repairs.

"Receipt of the Royalties for Regions program funding was definitely a coup and has contributed towards the replacement of two old timber bridges in our region; Bellinghams Road Bridge and Mullins Road Bridge, which were previously load-limited, with new and improved concrete structures, along with a further two currently under construction," she

Mayor Dobie highlighted that the new bridges would provide a range of positive outcomes including increased driver safety and freight efficiencies for movement of local produce and access by farm machinery; and environmental improvements to the creek areas and floodways.

"For the residents and surrounding communities in the vicinity, these new concrete bridges will make a huge difference to people's daily lives.

"Both bridges are important transport links for not only residents, but farmers and producers, and local husinesses

"The upgrades will improve both the road network and safety of road users, and allow better access to these communities for emergency services," added the Mayor.

Southern Downs Director Engineering Services, Mr Peter See said Council had engaged Ozwide Bridge Rail and Civil Pty Ltd in January 2016 to undertake the design and construction of the two replacement bridges along with the associated road approaches and civil works and the demolition of the existing

"The newly completed Bellinghams Road and Mullins Road bridges are both single span, two lane concrete bridges.

"All bridge and road works for both projects were completed within the timeframes and within budget, at an estimated cost of \$667,000 for Bellinghams Road Bridge and \$605,000 for the Mullins Road Bridge.

"Ozwide has done a great job bringing these projects in on time and on budget, and with a quality finish" he said.

The former bridges were single span, single lane timber

bridges and structural condition surveys had identified that both bridges were no longer suitable for traffic.

The old Bellinghams Road Bridge, which crosses the Condamine River on Bellinghams Road (Elbow Valley), operated under a load restriction of 5 tonne, and the former timber Mullins Road Bridge, which crosses Campbell Gully on Mullins Road (Womina), had been closed to traffic, with a road operating through a side track adjacent to the bridge.

Construction is continuing on the Sandy Creek Road and Tummaville Road bridge upgrades, and both projects are expected to be completed later this month.

The replacement of the Bellinghams Road and Mullins Road bridges has been made possible through funding from the Queensland Government's 'Royalties for the Regions' program.

A BAD CASE OF 'HEALTH APATHY' Australians urged to take control of their own health

Research recently released has revealed that an 'it won't happen to me' attitude is threatening the long-term wellbeing of those with a family history of conditions such as diabetes and chronic kidney disease.

Findings from the Amcal Consumer Health Barometer showed that almost four in 10 (39%) of those with a family history of serious illness refused to get tested with a fear of hearing the results named as a significant deterrent to health checks.

Perhaps more worryingly, an alarming number of Aussies choose not to visit their GP due to cost, inconvenience and a belief that they simply will not get ill.

Despite one person every five minutes being diagnosed with diabetes and close to a quarter (24%) of Australians having a genetic predisposition, the research indicated that a high number of Aussies have little - if any - idea about why the condition occurs and how to recognise the symptoms.

Half of the population had not heard of gestational diabetes – a subset of type 2 diabetes which affects thousands of pregnant women each year and generally disappears after the baby is born. Furthermore, an alarming one in ten people assumed you must be overweight or obese to develop the condition.

Additional findings suggest that many Australians have experienced possible symptoms of diabetes including excessive thirst and urination (18%), blurred vision (19%) and leg cramps (39%). Worryingly, most did not investigate the cause with their GP or pharmacist.

With diabetes on the rise and the associated complications of the condition including kidney disease, sleep apnea, blindness and, in severe cases, loss of limbs, Dr. Cindy Pan said she was alarmed by the lack of awareness around the disease.

"Diabetes is the fastest growing chronic condition in Australia

and with 280 new cases of diabetes diagnosed each day, it is important that people know and understand both the risks and path to prevention," she said.

"If one of your parents has diabetes, that will double your risk and if both parents are affected, that could increase your risk

"Gestational diabetes in pregnancy is also increasing and can lead to a greater risk of the mother developing type 2 diabetes in the future."

Dr Cindy Pan added that while type 1 diabetes cannot be prevented, Australians can help reduce their risk of type 2 and gestational through healthy eating and daily exercise.

"Given that it is a progressive disease, early warning signs such as increased thirst and urination, lethargy, weight changes and slow healing wounds should not be neglected, and ongoing management is required to prevent complications," she said.

With more than one in ten (12%) Australians admitting to ignoring early warning signs of illness and skipping regular GP check-ups due to cost and inconvenience, Amcal Senior Pharmacist James Nevile said that it was important to take proactive measures, rather than waiting for symptoms to worsen before seeking medical advice.

"It is concerning that people are dismissing symptoms of potential illness and only asking for expert help once a condition begins to affect their quality of life," he said.

"If you are at risk of diabetes, or suspect you might be, then it is recommended that you see a health professional to investigate possible symptoms and discuss diagnosis.

"As a first step, you may wish to have a blood test to screen for any obvious indicators that you might be at risk. This can be done by your GP or at an Amcal Pharmacy, and you may be referred to a specialist for further assessment."




