An explosion, believed to have been caused by a faulty hot water system, partially destroyed a house on Goomburra Road. The house was owned by Mrs. Margaret Geaney and no one was at home at the time. The hot water system, which was believed to have been about 30 years old, appeared to have exploded causing major damage to the kitchen and laundry. Debris was scattered over a radius of 75 metres from the house and the shock wave was felt up to 11/2 kilometres away. Allora Police Sergeant Kel Timms said that SWQEB officers had been called to disconnect power to the house and that investigations into the cause of the explosion were continuing.

Horse down a Well

A horse belonging to Messrs Holmes & Co. fell down a well about thirty feet deep, on Sunday morning last. Election Meeting in Allora

Mr. J. D. McLean, candidate for Eastern Downs in the upcoming Queensland elections, addressed a meeting of electors at Allora on Wednesday evening last in Mr. Gordon's hotel. The room was crowded. Mr. F. Kates occupied the chair and stated that he hoped that his brother electors would give Mr. McLean a quiet hearing. He had no doubt that the gentleman would answer any guestions that he may be asked after he had stated his views. Mr. Kates went on to state what the requirements of the district were viz. a school, a court house and a public pound showing the inconvenience of having to go to Leyburn or Warwick to get stock out

of the pound. He also said that it would be to the advantage of both reserves if the Spring Creek Reserve was annexed to Allora as the settlers of Spring Creek had to go to Toowoomba to get all police business settled.

Reid Family Visit Museum

Members of the Allora and District Historical recently welcomed to the museum three visitors whose family history on the Darling Downs can be traced back to the early 1840's. Brothers, Ian and Glen Reid, and their cousin Nigel Haig's great great-grandparents, Edward Anderson and Jane Donald, were married on Canning Downs Station in 1845. Their great-grandfather, William Walter Anderson, was born in Allora in 1863. Grandparents, Herbert Gillam Reid and Susan Frances Anderson, were married in St. David's Church in 1915.

lan and Glen presented to the Society a folder outlining the scouting achievements and police career of their father, Eric Clifford Reid who was born in Allora in 1937. Eric Reid joined the Boy Scouts in Allora in 1948 and advanced to be a Patrol Leader in the Second Allora Scout Group. He joined the Queensland Police Force in 1952, and after a distinguished career, retired as Inspector in Charge of the Roma Police District in 1988.

The brothers also presented their father's original Boy Scouts badge that was issued to him when he joined in 1948. This will be fixed to a Boy Scouts hat and set up in a display in the museum.



Savings made with eco-friendly change to wastewater treatment

An environmentally friendly change to operations at the Warwick Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) has resulted in significant savings to Southern Downs Regional Council.

Since July last year, Council has been working with Oceanic Bio to improve the treatment process at the WWTP. The project has involved the use of 'Eco-Tabs', an environmentally friendly proprietary product that keeps wastewater treatment plants running efficiently.

Southern Downs Manager Water and Wastewater, Mr Tendekai Mapeza, said that trialling the use of Eco-Tabs has been very successful.

"Using Eco-Tabs has improved the quality of our tertiary water. "Not only that, but we have seen significant savings to the costs of our wastewater operations.

"An annual chemical saving of over \$34,000 and electricity cost saving of over \$11,000 has been achieved by using Eco-Tabs," Mr Mapeza said.

Southern Downs Supervisor Wastewater

Treatment, Mr David Neal, said that using the Eco-tabs has reduced the need for frequent and costly operations at the WWTP.

"There's been a reduction in bio solids being generated and there is also thicker sludge in the sedimentation tank.

"It's pretty clear that there has been an increase in the overall system efficiency.

"If Council continues to use this product, there will be reduced use of chemicals and electricity, and the recovery time of the bioreactor after sudden shock inflows from the catchments is also now eight times faster. Recovery used to take two hours before." Mr Neal said.

Eco-tabs are simply dropped into the wastewater treatment tanks. The tablets fall to the bottom of the tank and dissolve slowly over time to oxygenate the water, which then reacts with the toxic contaminants to turn them into non-toxic substances and remove odours.

Southern Downs Regional Council mechanic, Brodie Ellery, has received top honours, taking out the 2016 Apprentice of the Year award for the Darling Downs South West region.

Mr Ellery was one of three regional finalists selected as part of the in the 55th Queensland Training Awards (QTA), to contest the Harry Hauenschild Apprentice of the Year, at the Darling Downs South West regional awards ceremony on July 22 in Toowoomba.

The Harry Hauenschild Apprentice of the Year award recognises people of the highest calibre who have achieved great things locally in their apprenticeships. Mr Ellery completed his Diesel Fitter apprenticeship with Council in November last year, achieving a Certificate III in Heavy Vehicle Commercial Vehicle Mechanical Technology.

Education/training bursaries open to Queensland young carers

Young carers in Queensland are being encouraged to apply for a Young Carer Bursary (applications opened 2 August) to help them with their education and training costs.

The Young Carer Bursary Programme provides young carers across Australia with the opportunity to apply for financial support so they can remain in, or return to, education or training while continuing their caring role.

Young carers between the ages of 12 and 25 are eligible, and are able to apply for a bursary until 14 September.

There are more than 30,000 young carers in Queensland, caring for a sibling or parent who has a disability, mental health issue, illness, or who are frail aged. Young carers may help out with cleaning or cooking, getting a relative or friend about the house, helping with medication, keeping them safe, showering or dressing them, or just watching out to make sure they're OK. More than 300 bursaries at \$3,000 each will be awarded nationally thanks to support from the Australian Government. Last year the scheme received more than 900 applications nation-wide.

"Feedback from successful bursary recipients is heartwarming and an indication that even the smallest funding support can make a huge difference in the life of a young carer," says Jim Toohev. President of Carers Queensland.

Before the bursary, James was doing night shifts in a factory and then going straight to school. He was failing at school - not handing in assignments; falling asleep in class; and was called the '20%' boy; averaging a D minus. Had given up his sport and also fought with his brother a lot because of tiredness.

The bursary allowed James to give up his night shift, as a result he is much healthier and happier. He is back playing sport and his coach is amazed at the difference - James has now represented his school at sport - something which had never happened before. He is handing in his assignments before they are due and has gone from D minus to C+/B grades. James is looking to the future, taking on more responsibility as a senior student, and the student welfare officer says she does not need him on her books anymore.

"This response is typical of the feedback we receive. These bursaries are making a real difference to the lives of young carers, and this flows on to their family environment," Jim said. Young carers who are looking to continue studying at high school or TAFE, an apprenticeship or as an undergraduate at university can check the eligibility requirements and apply for a bursary from 2 August 2016. 


