For readers who lived through Brisbane's 2011 floods, Bundaberg's 2012 flooding, and Central Queensland's 2014 Cyclone Marcia it'll be no surprise that a staggering one in three of people face at least one natural disaster in their lifetime. 

Allora's Past 100 years ago September 1916

No Cotton - No Shells

This was the title of a circular distributed amongst members of the Central Downs Agricultural & Horticultural Association. It was produced to impress on people the necessity of growing cotton for munitions purposes. The Agriculture Department

would provide seed free of charge and the Government would guarantee a price bush. People were urged to plant a couple of bushes, a small patch, or better still 1 acre or more thus helping along the war effort by establishing their own little munitions factory.

(Cotton was reported to have been grown at Spring Creek from 1868. The 1869 crop was not as big as the previous year as most farmers considered that the profits realised was not commensurate with the care and attention required to ensure a good crop. Even so, Mr. Brennan had an 8 acre crop that was considered to be better than any growing below the Range. Although considered too much trouble to grow, the 1870 crop brought 10³/₄ to 11¹/₄ d per lb on the English market.

There was no further reference in the Darling Downs newspapers to cotton growing in the Allora district until 1906, when the Allora Progress Association moved to write to the Department of Agriculture requesting information on cotton growing. The Abernethy family of Spring Creek must have one to experiment with growing cotton. One of their paddocks was later known as the "cotton paddock").

Review of aged care funding cuts a relief for rural doctors

The Rural Doctors Association of Australia (RDAA) has welcomed the Government's announcement that it would be reviewing the \$1.2 billion aged care funding cuts presented at the last Budget.

Dr Ewen McPhee, RDAA President, said that the proposed cuts would have placed many rural aged care facilities at risk. "Industry statistics show that nearly 40 per cent of all aged care facilities are already not financially viable," Dr McPhee said. "It is often the rurally located facilities that are most at risk,

simply because of their lower number of residents. "When rural towns can no longer afford to offer aged care accommodation, it has a very traumatic effect on members of

the community. "Elderly people are forced to move to accommodation that may

be hundreds of kilometres away leaving them isolated, with friends and family finding it difficult to maintain contact.

"This can have catastrophic impacts on both their physical and mental health, often speeding their decline."

Dr McPhee said he was relieved to see that the Government had agreed to review the proposed cuts.

"The proposed cuts to the aged care sector would have been massive and would have had to be met by increased contributions from the elderly," Dr McPhee said.

"A lot of residents simply do not have the means to contribute at this level, and so many rural aged care facilities would have been forced to close.

"To hear that the cuts are now under review is a huge relief for rural doctors, as many of us are involved in geriatric care within our communities.

"We hope that this review will result in meaningful engagement with the sector to forge a path that allows providers of aged care to remain viable, particularly those in smaller rural communities.

Council calls the ARTC out on its Inland Rail 'track-tics'

Southern Downs Regional Council is calling for the Australian Rail Track Corporation (ARTC) to reconsider the options for the Melbourne Brisbane Inland Rail, in light of a report tabled in Parliament last week by the Member for Southern Downs, Lawrence Springborg.

The report was prepared by the Snowy Mountains Engineering Corporation (SMEC) in July 2015 and highlighted concerns with the proposed Inglewood/Millmerran/Toowoomba route, favouring a route through the Southern Downs from Inglewood via Karara and Leyburn to Toowoomba.

"Southern Downs Regional Council has been advocating for months that the proposed route via Millmerran was not the optimum route," said Southern Downs Mayor, Cr Tracy Dobie. "Our region has effectively been frozen out of discussions about the Inland Rail.

"The ARTC has chosen to ignore us, and it's astonishing that they have said they were aware of the 2015 SMEC report, but that the alternative didn't demonstrate any advantage.

"Instead they're choosing to continue pushing for a route option from a report prepared five years earlier in 2010.

"The SMEC report, which favours a route through the Southern Downs, is evidence that there is significant merit associated with using an existing rail corridor.

"Surely it makes sense to use an existing line, particularly when the development costs stand to be far less than building 100 kilometres of new track.

"And, why build a new line across a fertile agricultural flood plain in Millmerran when there is an alternative route that follows an existing railway line in the Southern Downs?

"Southern Downs Regional Council proposes that the inland rail uses the existing line.

"The existing line from Warwick to Toowoomba is becoming more important to the Southern Downs region as the delivery of our produce becomes more time-critical and we use containers to move that produce.

"Toowoomba is developing into a large logistics hub and it's important that Southern Downs is synchronised with Toowoomba.

"However, at the core of this issue is the lack of transparency around the consultation processes, and the ARTC now needs to step up to the plate.

"Above all, it's clear that the options must be revisited in an open and transparent way that engages all stakeholders, and the ARTC must seriously consider the Southern Downs route before any final decision is made," said Cr Dobie.


