Talented teens tested at Science **Experience**

Wearing a white coat and safety googles, Ella Gartery could be mistaken for a University of Southern Queensland (USQ) science undergrad hard at work in the laboratory.

But the Allora State School Year 10 student is actually visiting USQ on her school holiday break to take part in a wide range of science and technologyrelated activities at The Science Experience.

A group of 15 Year 9 and 10 students from Toowoomba. Oakey, Allora, Warwick, St George and Bundaberg visited USQ Toowoomba for the threeday event (September 20-22).

USQ Vice-Chancellor and President Professor Jan Thomas said the event was designed to give students interested in science an opportunity to meet scientists who work in a broad

range of related fields (science, technology and engineering). "In addition to the event activities, the students learnt about careers in science and technology; and met new friends," Professor Thomas said.

In 2016, topics included 'Investigations of the structure and function of living cells', 'Synthesis of Fluorescein', 'UV Radiation', 'Viewing the Night Sky via Telescopes', 'Searching for Life outside our Solar System', and 'Big Data and Data Science'.

Ella Gartery said the event had opened her eyes to many different aspects of science.

"It has been a great experience. And not just all the science but meeting so many new people as well," she said.

Fellow Allora student Austin Lack said he chose to attend the Science Experience because one day, he would like to be a physicist.

He said it was a fun event and was particularly interested in one of the sessions on astronomy.

To the Editor.

I write in response to Shadow Health Minister John-Paul Langbroek's comments on Queensland's new nurse to patient

Prior to the introduction of minimum nurse to patient ratios on July 1, there were no laws that governed how many patients could safely be allocated to a single nurse in Queensland's public hospital system.

Queensland nurses and midwives know first-hand how under staffing can impact patient lives. Having enough nurses or midwives on staff to monitor patient outcomes can mean the difference between life and death.

The Queensland Nurses' Union (QNU) campaigned for legislated minimum nurse to patient ratios because the existing staffing tool, set up to determine how many nurses should be on ward at any given time, was not legislated and was not consistently or appropriately applied. As a result, nurses and midwives were not able to deliver safe, high-quality care to Queenslanders.

The QNU campaigned for legislated minimum ratios to improve safety for patients, nurses and midwives.

International evidence has found seven-fold differences in the likelihood of patient mortalities between hospitals with varied nurse to patient numbers. Public reporting of nurse to patient ratios and patient outcomes will be an essential future accountability mechanism so Queenslanders can be assured they are receiving safe care. Our ongoing campaign aims to see ratios rolled out to private hospitals and aged care facilities where no such laws exist.

Mr Langbroek's inability to understand the irrefutable evidence or the hospital staffing system is extremely disappointing.

In addition, contrary to his comments, the Queensland Nurses' Union (QNU) does not make political contributions to any political party as is demonstrated by publicly available reporting of political donations relating to the 2015 state election.

The funeral took place this morning, the mortal remains being interred in the Allora cemetery.

There is a large area of land under wheat

in the Allora district this year, and on some of the farms first taken up, it looks promising. On the north and south of the creek and on the Goomburra Exchange Lands, the wheat crops, on the whole, look remarkably well. Messrs. Kennedy Bros, F. Schriek, T. Grayson, W.J. Rooney, T. Lynam, T. Sullivan and many others have wheat from 8in to 20in in height. Mr. Abernethy, of Forest Plain, has a very promising field of 70 acres and as usual, Mr. Gilmore of North Branch, Goomburra, has a large area and it promises to yield heavily.

The town is still growing in population, consequently new buildings are being erected. Mr. Reppel has just had two neat shops completed. Mr. John Kelly has gone to Rose Hill farm for a short stay until a new two-storied hotel is built opposite the one lately occupied by him. There are to be large additions to the Royal Hotel now occupied by Mr. David Holmes by having some rooms added to the east end and also a second story covering the whole building. Mr. John Holmes has purchased Mr. Hardwick's property on the corner of Herbert and Drayton Streets for £900. So much for the value of town lands in Allora.


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friends Geoff & Lynne White also from the Sunshine Coast to join them with their van on Friday 16th September.

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Connect With Your Kids This School Holidays, Say Experts

In this busy world of drop-offs, weekend sports, late night homework and a hundred and one other tasks, many parents look forward to a break from the busy term-time routine to connect with their kids, yet taking the time to connect is often a challenge, and school holidays can often end up as a disappointing 'disconnect', say experts.

"We live in the age of 'connection' yet many parents feel disconnected from their kids because they are time-poor and school holidays give them a chance to complete other tasks. All too quickly the holidays draw to a close and we haven't achieved what we had intended, leaving both children and parents unfulfilled." says Nicole Pierotti, psychologist.

Nicole says that rather than making grand plans to go on a round of excursions, movies and trips, to plan some 'downtime' that allows parents and kids to spend time connecting on

"Connecting is just about spending meaningful time together. The time where you really listen or just be together without jumping up to flip the dinner, feed the cat or hang out the washing," says Nicole.

Nicole says that just ten to fifteen minutes is all we need to connect with our kids.

"That connected fifteen minutes will be the fifteen minutes that they will remember about their day. They won't remember the washing, the meals, the tidying but they will remember you sitting down with them and gazing at them and really listening to what they are saying, making or sharing. Even if you have to work this school holidays and they need to go to vacation care, you can still connect with your children at the end of the day and spend some meaningful time together," says Nicole. Here are Nicole's top tips to connect with your child this school

- 1. Simply sit together and draw. Whether it be scribbles for two year olds, shapes for three year olds, tracing for 4 year old and colouring in for school kids.
- 2. Grab the play doh, add a placemat and get busy having fun. Try asking your child what it is they want to make and let them take the lead.
- 3. Take in some fresh air and play outside: find a ball and kick. throw, bounce and catch, kids of any age love this time.
- 4. Pick up a bucket of chalk and find a piece of concrete or pavers and draw. What to draw? It can be a road to ride their bike on, a shop, their name to trace over, or a picture of
- 5. You can make car travel your connecting time, spot words on signs, letters on number plates, brands on cars.

Bankruptcies and Defaulters Big in Allora and Darling Downs

With Allora one of Queensland's main areas for people facing financial trouble, there is a new solution that may help many barred from mainstream financial lenders, get their names off the credit blacklist.

The most recent Australian Financial Security Authority (AFSA) report shows there has been a 30 per cent increase in Allora and Darling Downs residents declaring bankruptcy in the last quarter.

Credit compliance expert Laurence Barlow said this has contributed to a massive credit crunch in the region.

"One in 10 people in Allora and the Darling Downs have been banned from borrowing with mainstream financial lenders because they've been late, or haven't paid bills from mobile phone companies, utilities or credit providers," said Mr Barlow. "There is a growing number of cash-strapped locals getting themselves into financial trouble," said Mr Barlow who is part of the team that created the new DIY app. Credit Reboot, which helps people get off the financial blacklist by cleaning up their

"When you can't use the traditional sources of borrowing to set up a phone account or open a gas connection on your new home, for example, it can lead to all sorts of problems."

"The majority of these credit problems stem from an unpaid mobile phone bill - the Telcos are brutal."

"If you're more than 60 days late paying a telephone bill that's more than \$150, you can be blacklisted from getting traditional credit for five years."

"Most people don't even realise what's going on - they only find out when they next try to apply for a credit card or set up a new utility account."

"They are turned away."

"A couple of unwise decisions later - like resorting to payday loans - and things can quickly spiral into a vicious cycle of more debt."

Mr Barlow shared the most common reasons Allora residents are on the credit blacklist:

1. Telco bill: This is the main area where locals get into strife and the big players are the worst. If they want to play hardball they can mark your credit file if you're more over 60 days late on a payment of \$150 or more.

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- 2. Credit cards: A credit card or personal loan payment made more than 14 days late can mean your credit rating is downgraded; after 60 days you can get a default which stays on your file for five years.
- 3. Utilities: Late payments for utility bills such as gas or electricity can affect your credit score if you're 60 days or more overdue on payment.

The AFSA report shows that the number of people who went bankrupt rose 11 per cent across the country last quarter.

Credit Reboot is a DIY app which takes users through a series of questions to identify where the faults are in their credit file; it then runs an automated search through the complex Credit Reporting Code to identify where the credit provider has made errors in marking the consumers the credit file. Documents are then electronically prepared and emailed to credit providers who are then required as per the regulations to repair their

Allora QCWA International Day Country of Study: Clothing in Greenland – Past and Present

Today in modern Greenland the wearing of western clothing is predominant. In traditional Inuit society, the Inuit used only furs for clothing. There were two layers, the inner one placed the fur against the skin and the outer one had the fur on the outside which providing an insulated layer. Babies were carried almost naked against their mother's skin. The skills of the women in preparing skins and sewing clothes were highly valued. Good seamstresses had better marriage prospects than those less proficient as it was essential that clothing was very well made to ensure the survival of the men out hunting in the harsh environment.

Traditional clothing varied across the three regions of East Greenland, West Greenland and the Arctic region of Thule, the latter not using embroidery or beads. Beads were a form of currency in Greenland for over 200 years and strands of white and blue were traded for sealskins, blubber and whale oil. These beads became used to decorate clothing. Festive

garments did not exist in the traditional pre-Christian times but slowly evolved as influences from the church and western visitors were incorporated into design, until the concept of "The Sunday Suit" or best dress emerged. Expensive national costumes with intricate beadwork and sewn by Inuit women became prestigious garments and reflected a feeling of identity. By the late 1800's European textiles and embroidery work began to be used in the design of anoraks and blouses. Coloured textiles and beads were added and developed into a blouse with the classic extended bead collar. The beginning of the 20th century saw the adoption of this characteristic decorative style all over Greenland.

What has become recognised as a national dress is reserved for special occasions and tourists. Nowadays, when dressed in their "Sunday Best", men will have a white cotton anorak (a closed jacket with or without a hood) for confirmations and weddings and maybe a black anorak for extra ceremonial occasions added to dark textile trousers and boots. Women do not wear dresses but have similar clothing to men with Kamik (soft boots), shorts, top with beaded cuffs, and beaded collar. A complete costume with the distinctive bead collar costs between 3000 and 35000 euros (\$4460-\$5200 approximately).


