residence, and also a cafe and social hub. Its days as a cafe saw the building overflowing with patrons on the nights of the pictures in the Community Hall and the busy cattle sales days catering for the bustling crowds of hungry primary producers.

Stepping through the timber gate into the quaint front garden, up the few stairs to the miniature 'Queenslander' open veranda and in the front door that gives a feel of the set of Aussie television classic "The Sullivans", set in the 1930's and 1940's, will have those visiting feeling very cosy foraging for a bargain. Trish, with some assistance from good friend Kellie Jones, has managed to procure the building's cute country cottage image, blending ideally with the adjoining historical Allora Advertiser printing offices that ooze an early 1900's feel.

A stroll through the rooms and aisles, while decorated with stock, mannequins, the sparkles and glitter of jewellery complimented by furniture of yesteryear and a cutlery set and clock similar to those that adorned our Great Grandparents




loyal customers, and we hope for your continued support. Thank you all.

Masonic Tradition Alive in Allora

Allora's Masonic Centre played host to eleven visiting Masons from the Tibrogargan Lodge on Saturday, joining with local Masons from Hope Lodge.

The visiting Tibrogargan members conducted a ceremony that saw local Mason Andrew Quirke elevated to the Fellowcraft level within the Masonic system.

A local businessman, Andrew was initiated into Allora's Hope Lodge on Friday, July 8th this year, now enjoying an association with the Masonic movement he had been largely unaware of from a local point of view. He is now fueling a fascination for what he considers a movement of interesting traditions and history, and looking towards his next adavncement next year.

Hope Lodge Worshipful Master Allan Darr considers Andrew to be making admirable progress, his committment and enthusiasm encouraged by local members and hopefully additional interest from others may result.

Allora's Hope Lodge has many unique qualities according to Mr. Darr, aside from the interests and traditions of Masonry.

"Those that take a drive up Gordon Street past the Hope Lodge building should consider the structure has stood for over a century and amazingly was constructed from a single silky oak tree.'

The Masonic movement in Allora is at a low ebb membership wise. "Freemasonry is one of the oldest and largest fraternal societies. It provides a way of living in today's society based on moral and ethical standards."

Mr Darr would like to see some new members involved, and enjoy the traditions, history, fellowship and contribute to support for needy causes.

"From its earliest days, charity has been the most visible Masonic activity. Freemasons have always been devoted to caring for disadvantaged children, the sick and the elderly".

Aside from so many charitable organisations supported, of particular note was in June this year when the Geriatric Medical Foundation of Queensland, now known as the Aegium Foundation, celebrated thirty years of funding geriatric medicine. The charity is dediacted to making old age a time of greater health, greater dignity and greater potential, and funds medical research, education and innovation in care. In 1986 Queensland's Freemasons initiated the idea of a Chair in Geriatric Medicene at the University of Queensland, setting up

the Foundation with an itial \$ 1 million in funding. Even though the Foundation was conceived and initiated by Freemasonry, it is now a truly public foundation with non-Freemasons on it's Board.

From the initial \$1 million donated by Freemasons all over Queensland, the Foundation Board has been able to grow the capital invested to \$6 million.

The two main projects the Argium Foundation provide funding for currently are the University of Queensland's Centre for Research in Geriatric Medicine and Online Health, as well as the Eskitas Institute for Drug Discovery at Griffith University. Freemasonry has featured in Allora's history since the areas early days of settlement, but new members are vital to the lengthy tradition continuing.

"We have lost some very long serving and dedicated members of late, the late David Newton gave a lifetime to Masonry, as did Jim Hughes who has recently relocated to a Toowoomba nursing home aged in his nineties" said Mr. Darr.

The rain was pouring down. And there, standing in front of a big puddle outside the pub, was an old Irishman, drenched, holding a stick, with a piece of string dangling in the water.


A passer-by stopped and asked, "What are you doing?"

Allora Community Hall returned to former glory

Council is pleased to announce that the Allora Community Hall will be officially reopened by Mayor Dobie on Monday, 10 October 2016 at 9am.

The much-loved Hall has received a \$134,615 makeover in the form of a new roof, repaired gable and full external repaint. Council was successful in obtaining funding from the Queensland Government's 2015-16 Local Government Grants and Subsidies Program (LGGSP) to the value of \$67,922 to undertake the works, with the balance funded by and project managed by Council.

The repainting aspect of the project was made more difficult by the need to remove the existing lead-based paint. This required that the whole building be enclosed in plastic to contain the lead while it was being removed to ensure no risk was posed to the public. The lead containment has been successful.

"The Allora Community Hall is an important facility for the people of Allora and Council is pleased to provide support in this manner," said the Mayor, Cr Tracy Dobie.

"The new roof, repaired front gable and replaced rotten weatherboards have greatly assisted with the restoration of this building to its former glory.

"It is anticipated that these improvements will extend the life of this valued community asset for many years into the future."

A modest morning tea will be provided for those who attend the reopening ceremony.


