Strategy for Invasive Pests approved

At the General Meeting held on 28 September 2016, Council adopted the Invasive Pests Strategic Plan 2016- 2020 and the Invasive Pest Action Plan 2016-2020 (the Plan), which guide the management of invasive pest weeds and animals in the Region.

The Plan, prepared by Council's Environmental Services Pest Management officers, fulfils the requirements under the Biosecurity Act 2014 which commenced on 1 July 2016, for all local governments in Queensland to have a Biosecurity Plan (formerly known as a pest management plan).

Community input to the Plan was received via the Pest Management Advisory Committee which reviewed the documents and recommended that they be adopted by Council.

Under the new Act, landholders are still responsible for controlling pests on their lands, including Council, government departments and other agencies.

The Plan includes a new initiative which sets the minimum expected standards for all invasive pests. For example, all landholders in prescribed areas are expected to participate in wild dog coordinated baiting programs, unless they can demonstrate genuine reasons preventing them from participating. Similarly, all landholders are expected to control all African boxthorn on their land, unless a staged control strategy has been outlined by Council in a Biosecurity Order (formerly a pest control notice).

The Invasive Pests Action Plan documents where Council will be undertaking invasive pest control on its own lands and where Council will conduct inspections of private property to ensure invasive pests are being adequately controlled. Compliance action may be taken if this is not the case, including Council undertaking control work at the landholder's

"Council recognises that most landholders are controlling pests," said Cr Yve Stocks, Shadow Portfolio Manager for Rural, Environmental, Sustainability & Waste Management.

"However, those not undertaking control are contributing to the spread of these pests to neighbouring lands.

"These pests are declared because of the impacts they have on the economy, environment and amenity of the Southern Downs Region.

"Council is committed to having all declared pests on all lands being adequately controlled."

If you have declared pests and require assistance, please contact Council on 1300 MY SDRC (1300 697 372) to speak with a Pest Management Officer, who can provide advice on the most effective and economical long- term control methods for all declared pests.

The mobile service will be located at the Warwick Hospital from 28 November to 22 December 2016.

Ms Hobbs said women aged 40 and over should have a breast screen every two years. "In 2015 more than 15,000 Australian women were diagnosed with breast cancer," she said.

"One in eight Queensland women will be diagnosed with breast cancer and of those 90 per cent will have no family history of the illness.

"That's why we encourage all women aged 40 and over to have a free breast screen every two years, and also be sure to carry out regular breast checks.

A doctor's referral is not required.


Additionally, the Southern Downs community is served by the Darling Downs Hospital and Health Service's Mobile Women's

Looking Back... The Final Word

In an attempt to try to find out if there had ever been any coal mining activity to the north of Hillside Road, I contacted Tom McVeigh whose family owned land in the area for about 60 years. As his reply indicates, the entry to the mine was on the southern side of Hillside Road. Even though the mining companies had leases on the northern side, by the time that they had mined the 200 metres or so to the road, and then under the road, there would have been minimal activity to the north of the road. The people now living in the area need to have no fears of renewed mining activity, with a seam in places only 450mm thick and at least 13 metres below the surface, they shouldn't expect a call from BHP-Billiton any time soon.

Tom writes:- My recollections cover a host of ideas. Portions 37 and 38 were owned by members of my family and I resided on Portion 37. They are separated from Portions 10 and 11 by a road and I would doubt very much, given the topography and soil types, if there was ever any mining on Portions 38 or 10 and 11 - it needs to be understood the mine was on a very small scale in any circumstance. You can be assured as I will write, access to the coal on Portion 37 was through an entry point on Portion 35 close to the boundary with Portion 36, no doubt to minimise the damage to agricultural practice. It would appear it was thus as the owner of Portion 37 did not want a mound on his land – hence the approach some 80 yards from the road to allow some type of gradient to get the coal out. In my early days Portion 35 was known as Stav's and Portion 36 as Dick Ruhle's. The mound was about, perhaps, 30 yards long and of round shape. Mr. Dan Riordan, who worked for my father and his brother lived in a house on the roadside of portion 35. bred Alsatian dogs, and did work, as written, as a bag sewer and corn puller for my Dad and uncle. On the mound was a trolley which ran from west to east on top of the mound on tram lines. I am unaware of how these skips were brought out from underground - by horse or winch. Quite often with mates from town Dan Riordan would allow us, and help us, ride the skip. No doubt trucks backed into the end of the tramline and skips were put into it. and tailings dropped onto the mound. The loads would have been taken to the Allora railway yards where there was a loading dock at the end of the line adiacent to Warwick Street.

On a few occasions Dan Riordan took us down the entry to the mine for about 30 yards where the roof was supported by rough timber until the shaft had fallen in. Quite obviously the shaft ran in a northerly direction across the road into Portion 37 underground. Close to the windmill some 50 yards north of the road there was a small mound with pieces of coal, stone, and coloured rocks which may have been some type of air entry, or maybe it was where the entry of the mine was initially intended until there, in my view, may have been a difference of wishes between the owners, hence the entry on Portion 35 and boundary with Portion 36. I can guarantee the shaft ran north from there. but obviously I do not know how far. The water from the mine was first class super for vegetable and making a cup of tea – as good as rain water. Having pulled it up several times to change the worn out leather buckets, it was three standard lengths of piping deep and there were always heavy deposits of minute particles

of coal on the bottom

For many years behind the house where Dan Riordan lived, there was a usual farmer's shed of the era, in which for many years there was housed a solid wheel truck with a winch mechanism for unloading it as a type of tip truck and owned by Mr. H. W. Stay who had the contract for carting the coal to Allora. I went away to boarding school for several years and I can remember the truck was not there when the property was purchased by Mr. Selwyn Howell and family. There were plans to extend the railway line from Allora to the mine site but I am unaware of any details of

plans and route. You have my assurance, from the direction of the shaft which I personally saw, it was directed towards Portion 37. My memory is that the mine was closed because of water entry. One can understand that from what I have told about the depth of the mill on Portion 37. I note the Allora Mining Company was floated in 1873. My father and his brothers came to Allora in 1908 and Dad told me that he or they would go down the mine and get a sugar bag of coal for the clothes boiler or to light the fire for the horse and cattle brands. There would appear to be some confusion, unless even in those days, there was a heap of red tape to traverse between intention and action. But the mine did operate, the shaft ran in a northerly direction which I can vouch for because I have seen it - probably the only one alive to do so.

On top of the mound there were a lot of posts, the use of which I am unaware of. It is some years since I have been past the mound but I was advised it is still there. Both Colin Muir – a truly great man and family friend - and Bramwell Tickle often thought of levelling it but did not do so. Some later owner may well have done so - must drive past next time I am up

That is all my knowledge about the mine. I have no knowledge about dates, just activities. A few lovely little stories - Dad would never let us go near the mine because he said that there was a man buried there and his ghost might frighten us - thank heavens for Dan Riordan. I did not tell Dad how Dan showed my mates and me the mine, nor did we tell our parents what Dan had shown us. We call it, I suppose, "secret men's business.".

Their main aim is to give the animals the best life possible before they are sent to market to become choice, juicy cuts of meat for you to enjoy. Find out more at www.tamworthpigs. com.au/

Belinda says "Our pigs get to be pigs. Naughty, snout digging, wallowing, happy, stress-free pigs. And as for the sheep? Well they think they own the place." Currently they pay a local butcher to cut up produce however the couple aims to change that. By building an on-farm fully accredited butchering room, they would have further control over the supply chain and be able to honour their animals while on their paddock to plate journey... This facility would provide the "last fence" in their "final paddock".

To do this they are running a crowd funding campaign. What a great present a gift voucher for Tillari Trotters pork and/or lamb would make, or perhaps give vourself or a friend one of the great Baa-Ewe-tiful calendars for Christmas.

Farming in drought, flood, then

drought again over the past ten years has not been easy for these two young farmers. So they are not rich, not sitting back with labour to do all the work. Belinda is up by 3.30 am in summer to ensure the wallows have enough water in them to prevent their rare breed Tamworth pigs suffering from heat stress and getting sunburnt. Tim says "I do long hours in the ute taking produce to Farmers Markets in Brisbane and on the Darling Downs. But I love meeting the people who value our meat and care about how it is grown."

This means it is their own love that goes into every package of meat you buy at the markets, or will receive in return from your

contribution via their crowd funding page at: https://pozible. com/project/on-farm-butchering-room to make the butchering room a reality. And it's their own love and care that goes into all the poddy lambs and piglets, who have amazing names like Snuff and Secret, and who get fed from birth by Belinda. When you have up to 30 piglets and lambs to feed several times a day, it's no small task. Understandably these ones don't go to market, they are kept as breeders. But that is what you do - it is my job to care for them.

Through this crowd funding for the butchering room, they are not just asking for straight donations, although these would be readily accepted. You will see on the website that there are various packages, ranging from \$10 to \$2,000. Son's CPR Saves a Local Dad's Life

A life time of hard toil, and the past 25 years of concerning health issues has certainly provided 80 year old Bruce Wilson with more than his share of challenges. Challenges that include open heart surgery and twice overcoming battles with cancer. At 5.45pm on Sunday July 31st 2016, he faced yet another such challenge while relaxing with family members, suffering a heart seizure on the veranda of his Forest Plains Road home on the outskirts of Allora, the little piece of paradise that is home to Bruce and wife of 56 years Cathie.

But for the presence of son Garry Wilson, Bruce may well have been on his way to an eternal paradise, essentially saved by Garry's actions and Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) until the arrival of three Queensland Ambulance Service units that saw the wily old cattle handler whisked away to be treated at the Warwick Hospital, and later the Wesley Hospital in Brisbane.

Garry & his wife Kaye had been visiting and helping on what had been an afternoon of normality at 'Wybaleena' that included weighing a few Droughtmaster weaners followed by some family relaxation. It was laughs and chatting aplenty when suddenly Bruce made an unusual breathing sound. Seconds later it occurred to Garry that "Dad's not breathing" and he commenced what would be lifesaving CPR.



"It's amazing how a situation can change instantly" said Garry. Bruce's recollections have him enjoying a good laugh and a yarn after returning some cattle to the paddock and enjoying a couple of beers. Then everything is blank. I can't recall the seizure at all or the events that saw me arrive at the hospital, or for that matter not a lot from the following four or five days." "I can't recall but I'd reckon the beers were nice though"

"Garry worked on me for better than twenty minutes doing CPR, while Kaye phoned and spoke to the ambulance and medical people as to what was happening, contacted family and comforted Cathie"

"Given only a small percentage survive a heart seizure, I was so very lucky to have my family with me when it happened."

"We love where we live" smiled Bruce, "Cathie & I have been here for eleven years, we say we have come back to the mountains."

"It took us a long time to find 'Wybaleena', we actually first looked at it on Valentine's Day and I sure wasn't ready to leave the world that Sunday a few weeks back and leave it all

Before arriving in the Allora area Bruce and Cathie were at Bullarah, west of Moree in New South Wales for 45 years, Bruce working in the agriculture industry and Cathie running a shop and also working with the Australian Bureau of Statistics. The Wilson family are well respected members of the Allora community, especially for their voluntary contributions. It is

ironic given Bruce's health event the family had contributed so significantly to raising funds for the construction of the Allora Medical Practice, and Garry currently the Secretary of the Practice Support Group.

Thanks to the alertness of Garry and his knowledge of CPR Bruce will be tending his Droughtmasters for some time to come, and tallying up the hours in his favoured John Deere 4755 tractor. Alas the work load will have to diminish for Bruce who kept himself busy not only with the cattle but growing oats and making hay for his herd.

'Wybaleena' and it's beautiful rural views is a 'Home Sweet Home' indeed for the Wilson's, along with the Droughtmasters, geese, chickens, guinea fowls, cats Paddy & Sambo and kelpie dogs Mitch & Bella. Another home comfort for Bruce & Cathie is that Garry & Kaye and their children Lauren and Jack are only a glance across a green paddock to the north.

Bruce has recently returned to tending his cattle and property after another brief stay at the Wesley Hospital, but he wants to express how grateful he is to his loving family, caring neighbours & fellow community members, the QAS paramedics, Allora Medical Practice staff, and hospital staff at Warwick and the Wesley Hospital for the wonderful care he received in these recent weeks.

Both Bruce and Cathie wish to thank Garry for saving Bruce's life and thank God daily for the blessing of life Bruce has

But as Garry raises, "there is a message in what happened to Dad for everyone, and for us as a family, and I would like to think a message for the community also."

"Dad has dealt with numerous health issues over the past two decades, and earlier this year he underwent cardiac surgery at Brisbane's Wesley Hospital."

"Obviously in Dad's case and so many other elderly there can be ongoing concerns, but situations can arise where anyone can suffer a heart stoppage or cease breathing, regardless of age or incident."

"It certainly makes you realise you don't have your loved ones forever and you can lose them at the blink of an eye. I am still coming to terms with how fortunate I was to have the opportunity to save my Dads life on this occasion, simply because I had the awareness and basic first aid training sufficient enough to get the job done."

"Quite simply if I hadn't had the training, I would have had no idea what to do. It all fell in Dads favour that day as we had access to contact 000 and (my wife) Kaye was able to calmly make the call and keep clear communications with the QAS



whilst I was working on Dad."

Had Bruce been in the paddock on his own the event may have ended very differently.

Garry was fortunate enough to carry out CPR on a 22 year old South African man when he and Kaye were in Africa on holidays in 2015. He had dived into a pool at a resort and hit his head and was in the bottom of the pool.

"I happened to be on the spot and carried out CPR and got him going."

"He still keeps in touch with us via emails" smiles Garry, "Dad tells me that young South African was a trial run for his event to make sure I got it right".

Also involved in the cattle industry and Pest Management Officer with the Toowoomba Regional, Garry is hoping he doesn't have to perform CRP again in his lifetime, "however if I do, I certainly hope I will keep my 100% success record, it's a special thing to be able to do, especially on your Dad.

"Time is of the essence in such a situation as we well know, but the basic knowledge of CPR is available to everyone."

CPR is a vital life skill as far as Garry, Bruce and all of the Wilson family are concerned, "we'd like the community to be aware of our experience" explained Garry, "and take steps to learn the basic skills that may very well save a life, a life that could be a family member."The training is not difficult, it is designed for all ages and clearly steps out the basic requirements to assist in saving a life.

Further information regarding First Aid training and CPR can be obtained from the Queensland Ambulance Service as well as private training companies in Warwick and Toowoomba.
