We held our final Packing Day on 24th November. Thirty enthusiastic ladies attended to pack 160 kits. The good news is that 100 of these are already on a ship to the Philippines to be distributed within the next six weeks to the girls of a small mountain village. This has been made possible through a Vale View contact who travels there to distribute the kits.

The remaining kits will be delivered to Boonah next week and are destined for the Solomon Islands. Boonah also facilitated the kits packed in September to Cambodia and the balance is on its way to Laos. Kits packed earlier in the year have been distributed in Nepal. As you can see our international involvement is quite extensive. We are pleased to report that the distribution has become much quicker.

This year we packed 885 kits bringing our two year total to 1250. We hoped to double our output this year (365 for first

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Building Better Regions Fund set to grow Maranoa communities

The entire Maranoa electorate is set to benefit from new Federal Government funding, announced last Wednesday 23rd November, specifically targeted to improve and increase liveability in regional communities.

Maranoa MP David Littleproud - whose vast rural electorate covers about 42% of Queensland - said the \$297 million Building Better Regions Fund (BBRF) program would provide a huge boost.

"I've advocated for rural communities across Maranoa and I believe we're represented in the Coalition Government's new BBRF as major capital cities have been excluded in the funding's guidelines," Mr Littleproud said.

"The BBRF has been divided into two streams. The Infrastructure Projects Stream will invest in new infrastructure construction or project to upgrade the extension of existing infrastructure; and the Community Investments Stream is about strengthening liveability.

"This government understands our nation is made of more than steel and roads - that's why the Community Investments Stream might help expand a local festival, attract a theatre production or major sporting event to boost local tourism, or it might be leadership or business training for young locals.

"A new social benefit criteria will also allow applicants to demonstrate how a project will make their region a more attractive place to live or improve community connections.

"These changes recognise the valuable contribution our rural communities make to our national economy.

"With three regional councils in Maranoa alone contributing more per capita than Brisbane City Council, it makes sense our regions should be supported.

"Whether it's the food you eat, the fibre you're wearing or the gas and coal used to power your home or business - Maranoa has produced the lot and we're the ones who keep our cities

"Our capital cities would grind to a halt within an hour if these investments ended. Of course these investments in the city are not seen as "bailouts" - they're sensible ongoing investments, and this is the mindset which must be adopted to government investment in rural, regional and remote Australia," Minister

"Projects in remote and very remote areas will receive a loading on their project score, and also will not need to produce 1:1 matching funding. The Government will provide up to 75% of the investment for remote and very remote projects.

"Also, projects will now be assessed against projects of similar size, so small community projects are not competing against huge projects worth tens of millions, for example."

Report highlights Council is achieving improved financial position

The latest Finance Report considered by Southern Downs Regional Council at its General Meeting held last Thursday highlights that Council's financial position is continuing to improve.

Southern Downs' Shadow Portfolio Councillor for Governance and Finance, Rod Kelly has commended the Council team on the year to date result but cautioned that Council must continue with a conservative fiscal approach.

"We have seen great improvements in the financial health of Council, as reflected in the recent 2015-16 Annual Report.

"Southern Downs Regional Council has a huge responsibility to its ratepayers and communities across the region, and performs many activities in providing the level of services that it does to the community.

"To do this, Council needs money and it shouldn't be forgotten that Council is a business. like all other businesses. It must remain liquid and have financial sustainability.

"That has of course come with its challenges in doing more with less. We have seen significant reductions in expenditure and at last there are now funds set aside in reserves.

"However, it must be stressed that this has to continue, not just this financial year, but into the future. As they say, 'one swallow does not make a spring," said Cr Kelly.

Cr Kelly pointed out that the Finance Report for the period to 31 October shows clear evidence that Council's finances are in a healthy situation.

"The net operating position is \$3million over the estimated position for the financial year to date.

"Expenditure is \$2.7million under the year to date estimate with employee costs approximately \$1.6million under budget. Materials and services are also \$1 million under the year to date budget.

"Of key note are the working capital, operating surplus, net financial liabilities and interest coverage ratios which are all pleasingly green.

"This is now a regular monthly trend which demonstrates the financial sustainability that Council needs to maintain now and into the future," said Cr Kelly.

Cr Kelly also commended Council's Chief Executive Officer, Finance Manager and staff for their close adherence to Council's financial budget and their understanding of the significance of meeting the budget and returning a surplus.

These sentiments were echoed by Deputy Mayor, Cr Jo McNally who also praised the efforts of all members of the Council team in playing their part to improve Council's financial position.

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Council Advisory Committees off and running

Southern Downs Regional Council's Advisory Committees are getting down to business, with many having held their inaugural meetings over the last month.

Community representatives were officially appointed to the eight Council Advisory Committees at a special meeting of Council in September 2016.

Southern Downs' Mayor Tracy Dobie said the majority of the committees have now met at least once and have commenced development of their strategic priorities for the region.

"The aim of these committees is to provide guidance and advice to Council on community strategic expectations.

"At their inaugural meetings, the committees revisited their Terms of Reference and are now set to work towards creating a vibrant vision and strategy for each of the areas they manage," said Cr Dobie.

Shadow Portfolio Councillor for Economic Development, Rod Kelly acknowledged the professionalism of his fellow committee

Cr Kelly, also Portfolio Councillor for Regional Promotion, Tourism and the Arts, said he was very excited about the energy and enthusiasm of the new Regional Promotion, Tourism and the Arts Advisory Committee, which also met in

"This is a very passionate group and although the first meeting did sway a bit more to tourism, I'm confident that we have the right people to set the scene for tourism, arts and regional promotion," he said.

Council's Deputy Mayor, Cr McNally highlighted how impressed she was with all of the under 25 year representatives.

"They're not intimidated by the other members. They are confident and very keen about putting their views forward and I believe they will be a great asset to all of the committees," she

The new Events, Sport and Recreation Advisory Committee met on 1 November 2016. Yve Stocks. Portfolio Councillor for Events, Sport and Recreation said the committee discussed a range of topics.

"Key to discussions was the Committee's role to grow events, sport and recreation to gain economic benefits, and how to leverage off the strengths we currently have, and identify opportunities to build on," said Cr Stocks.

Portfolio Councillor for Rural, Environmental, Sustainability and Waste Management, Cameron Gow, and Chair of Council's Pest Management Advisory Committee highlighted that this committee is a transition from the former working group, which is a legislated group that maintains the Pest Management Plan. "The committee members are an exceptional group of professionals with an interest in pest management. The committee is very keen to not only maintain, but improve its place in the sphere of operation in which it works," said Cr Gow. The inaugural meetings were largely focussed on the consideration of ideas, opportunities and challenges, and future meeting will have a greater focus on actions.

The role of the Advisory Committees is to provide strategic rather than operational advice to Council, and the advice should be in relation to the entire region. Advice provided through Advisory Committees will be reported back to Council through the Minutes of each committee.



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Council proposes electronic voting and Local Government run elections to ECQ review

An electronic voting system for future local government elections could be on the cards if a proposal by Southern Downs Regional Council to the Electoral Commission of Queensland (ECQ) Review panel gets the nod.

The ECQ Review panel requested feedback from councils which undertook postal voting only, on the 2016 local government election process and the future of postal voting or possible alternatives.

Southern Downs Mayor Tracy Dobie said Council has proposed two recommendations in its submission to the ECQ Review panel

"Council has recommended that the Electoral Commission of Queensland undertakes a feasibility assessment of electronic voting for future Local Government elections in Queensland.

"In an age of constantly advancing technology and the growing population of tech-savvy public of all ages, Council believes that electronic voting is the way forward.

"The success of this method used by the ACT Electoral Commission over the past five Legislative Assembly elections certainly supports this as a sensible and viable option in Queensland.

"There is an opportunity to offer a unique service to residents as part of the on-line voting process by enabling voting at Library facilities owned and operated by Council.

"This has several benefits: it allows for people unaccustomed to using computers to access computers to do their voting in a familiar and recognised environment, and in a safe and secure environment.

"It also provides ready access for those people that do not have computers or smart devices, or internet service to be able to cast their votes

"Council has also recommended that Queensland Local Governments become the responsible authority for all future elections with the Chief Executive Officer appointed as the Returning Officer.

"We are of the view that Local Government authorities have the capacity, experience and capability to successfully run local government elections and therefore councils should become the responsible authority.

"However, if the management of the elections continues to be outsourced, councils should be provided with a fixed cost estimate so that this can be accurately included in budgets and forecasting." said Cr Dobie.

The Mayor also highlighted that there were some significant issues with the postal voting only system conducted by the ECQ for the Southern Downs' 2016 local government election. "Many voters were frustrated by the process. 25,254 registered voters were forwarded ballot papers but, for reasons unknown, 5,424 voters failed to return the documentation.

"Moreover, informal votes for the election of the eight Councillors totalled 6,304, which equates to around 31.7% of returned

ballot papers; a very poor result.

"Voters tended to bring their complaints about the election and voting process to Council, which Council then had to refer on to the ECQ. This created delays and caused voter frustration and created the unfair impression that Council was 'blameshifting'.

"If Local Government had full responsibility for the election process, as has been the case in the past, Council believes there will be a more streamlined process with less voter frustration and confusion," said Cr Dobie.

Southern Downs Deputy Mayor Jo McNally supported the Mayors comments. "This is an important submission because it relates to the future of our voting system.

"The last two local government elections have been hindered by the State Government. In this year's election they included a referendum, and in the one before, they decided to hold the State election at the same time the local government election was scheduled to be held.

"In both cases, the State Government did not provide the necessary level of resources or funding to ensure smooth and trouble-free election processes." stressed Cr McNally.

Feedback from the Southern Downs Returning Officer for the 2016 Local Government elections indicated that confusion amongst registered voters with the process of completing the voting documentation was a major reason for votes being declared informal.

This, combined with the large number of voters who requested replacement ballot papers, has resulted in the Returning Officer recommending that postal voting be discontinued for future local government elections.

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




Family silver comes back to Glengallan Slade family silver and 19th cents

Slade family silver and 19th century silver trophies for prize stock found their way home to Glengallan this week.

Melbourne resident Adrianne Butler, one of the three daughters of Adrian and Vera Slade, felt it was time for her family to share the fascinating items with visitors to Glengallan, the birthplace of her father and home to grandparents W.B. Slade and his wife, Sophie, for more than 40 years.

The engraved trophies tell a story of Glengallan stud stock success from the Marshall & Slade era of the 1870s through to the early 1920s, while family silver speaks of an age of elegance at Glengallan and later Slade family properties Glenbar, The Glen and Glenelg.

Mrs Butler said she had watched the progress and development of the heritage tourism operation through the involvement of her sister, Jane Morse, in the Glengallan Family History Centre: "The time was right" for return of the artefacts to Glengallan and she and son Chris Owens were looking forward to returning for Glengallan's 150th anniversary celebrations in September 2017.
