
Allora Mountain Display in **Herbert Street**

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Advice for residents to "stay cool" in hot conditions

Healthcare workers are reminding residents to be mindful of their health as the region braces for a possible heatwave at the end of this week.

Darling Downs Public Health Unit Director Dr Penny Hutchinson said hot weather could lead to dehydration, sunburn and other more serious heatrelated illnesses such as heat stroke.

"Heat stroke occurs when a person's core body temperature becomes high and doesn't cool down," Dr Hutchinson said.

The condition can be caused by not drinking enough water, spending too much time in the sun and not being able to cool down guickly.

"All Queenslanders are at risk during periods of hot or prolonged high temperatures, but some people are at a higher risk of harm, such as the elderly, especially those who live alone, babies and very young children, pregnant women and breastfeeding mothers, as well as those who are physically active, such as manual workers or people who play sport.

"Some of the symptoms of heat-related illness include dizziness, headaches, bright or dark urine which indicates possible dehydration, nausea or vomiting,

"In extreme cases, heat stroke can lead to confusion or slurred speech, a rapid pulse, vomiting and diarrhoea, and a loss of consciousness.

"If this occurs, it is important to call triple zero (000) as soon as possible." Dr Hutchinson also believes it is important to remember sun safety messages in the summer months

"It's important to wear a hat, keep out of the sun between 10am and 2pm, wear long sleeves and light clothing and apply sunscreen.

"In times of high temperatures it is also important to keep an eye on family, friends and neighbours, especially those who may be more susceptible to the various forms of heat-related illness," she said.

How to prevent a heat-related illness:

- Drink plenty of fluids: cool water is best. Don't wait until you are thirsty to drink, but instead drink regularly throughout the day.
- · Urine colour is a good guide to hydration. It should be clear to light strawcoloured, not dark or gold.
- · Stay indoors in very hot weather, preferably in an air-conditioned building, or ensure there is good airflow with fans and open windows.
- · Public venues, such as air-conditioned shopping centres and pools, can provide refuge from the heat.
- · People can also stay cool by taking cool showers or baths, soaking their feet in a basin of water or wetting a bandana or washer and wrapping it
- Take time to adjust to the environment, pace yourself and limit strenuous outdoor activity where possible.

In Science, Queensland fell far behind the ACT and Western Australia

In Maths, Queensland ranked behind all other States and Territories except Tasmania and Northern Territory - and fell below the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) average.

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Australian Red Cross Won't Let **Christmas Pass In Silence**

Red Cross's national network of Telecross volunteers will be busy Christmas morning, making a phone call to bring joy to a stranger's day. However, joy and goodwill are not the only things Red Cross will be sharing through the festive season. Volunteers will be checking on the safety, security and wellbeing of aged and socially isolated people - who rely on daily contact from Red Cross.

Australian Red Cross' Social Support Services Manager for

Queensland, Rhee Duthie, said Telecross supports frail, aged, disabled and isolated people to live in their own homes in communities they know and love.

"For people who have limited contact with family or friends, a phone call from Red Cross on Christmas Day makes a world of difference. It's especially important at Christmas, which can be a really tough time for many people.

"That reassuring phone call translates into better health. happiness and safety," Ms Duthie said.

Two thirds of the daily Telecross phone calls go to people aged over 80 with a further 27 per cent to people aged between 65

The daily phone call lasts a few minutes and is made by a trained volunteer, who can activate an emergency response if a call is unexpectedly not answered.

Australian Red Cross chief executive officer Judy Slatyer said the strength of Telecross is in the trained volunteers.

"We're founded on a spirit of volunteer service," Ms Slatyer said. "People see us in emergencies but they might not know we're quietly working away at creating safe, healthy, secure communities," she said.

Red Cross has launched its festive season fundraising appeal, calling for supporters to donate to local social inclusion programs, like Telecross, and other community-led programs around Australia and in our region.

Allora's Past 100 years ago December 1916

East Talgai Road

The long running dispute between Mr. G. C. Clark, owner of the East Talgai property, and the Allora Shire Council over the road resumed by the council through East Talgai was finally resolved in the Warwick Land Court. The road resumption

involving approximately 18 acres of land was made by the council to give the residents of Talgai West and Victoria Hill more reasonable access to the town of

The case occupied a day and a half in the Warwick Court and was called to resolve the claim by Mr. Clark for compensation of £700 for the loss of the land in question, severance from water for the land to the north of the new road, damage to cultivation paddocks, fencing etc. Messrs C. E. McDougall and P. Donovan appeared as witnesses for Mr. Clark. Mr. W. A. Deacon and Mr. P. J. Higgins (Crown Land Ranger) appeared for the Council. The Council's case involving much detailed work, was prepared by Mr. Andrew Hamilton (Shire Clerk).

The Court finally decided that, taking into consideration the value of other closed roads ceded by the Council to Mr. Clark, an amount of £339/7/0 was due to Mr. Clark as compensation. A claim of costs of court was refused to the claimant.

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Council releases info sheet about mowing of nature strips

Mowing of nature strips has been a topic of interest recently, with Southern Downs Regional Council receiving some enquiries from the public about maintenance responsibilities.

In response, Council has put together a Mowing of Nature Strips Information Sheet, which reinforces the understanding that residents and businesses have a role in maintaining these grassed areas around their properties.

Southern Downs Director Engineering Services, Mr Peter See said there has always been an understanding that residents and businesses would maintain the nature strip, or frontages, of their properties.

"Generally, most residents take responsibility for mowing their nature strips and this has been the case for many many years. "Council welcomes and very much appreciates this type of maintenance by residents to present their homes, and their streets, with a degree of civic pride.

"Likewise, many businesses, commercial and industrial, do the same, and this creates a sense of professionalism for their business as well as a welcoming environment for their customers and the general public.

"It's also great to see those residents and businesses that engage local contractors to do this maintenance as part of their overall property mowing and maintenance, as it supports local employment," he said.

Mr See said Council certainly encourages this proactive approach to continue, but noted that not everyone may be aware of their role in maintaining the local amenity of towns in

"As new people come into our communities as residents or business operators, there may not be the same level of understanding about the need to take care of these areas, so Council's information sheet aims to provide that clarification,"

The information sheet emphasises the important and valued role residents and businesses play in taking responsibility for mowing these nature strips, which are mostly at the front of a property, but may include the side or back of a property depending on its particular location in a street. It also notes that there is an avenue available to persons to contact Council where there are exceptional circumstances that prevent them from being able to undertake this maintenance. It also highlights that opportunities may exist for not-for-profit organisations with substantial areas to maintain to access low-cost assistance through the Women in Custody Program.



Government and the Embassy of the Kingdom of Belgium in Australia.

The Australian Government has provided a grant to transport the exhibition to regional areas, including Launceston, Warrnambool, Dubbo and Hervey Bay.

Mr Tehan said "Memorial Museum Passchendaele 1917" was part of the Australian Remembrance Trail on the Western Front and the Australian Government had helped fund the museum's recent extension.

"The title of the exhibition reflects the deep appreciation and gratitude of Belgium for the sacrifice Australians made during the First World War," Mr Tehan said.

"The Flanders Offensive cost Australia some 38,000 casualties. Those who fought and died in these battles are remembered nightly by the sounding of the Last Post under the arches of the Menin Gate at Ypres.

"In September 2017, Australia, with the assistance of Belgian authorities, will honour the service and sacrifice of those who fought in the Third Battle of Ypres with a Dawn Service on the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Polygon Wood. This service will commemorate the centenary of the 1917 battles in this region, and will be held at Buttes New British Cemetery at Polygon Wood.

"The ceremony will again highlight the close relationship between the people of Belgium and Australia. The oversight of the Belgian Federal Government at a time when many countries are commemorating the Third Battle of Ypres is very much appreciated

"The Belgian touring exhibition and the 2017 planned anniversary at Polygon Wood, demonstrate that both nations will never forget the soldiers who fought so far from home."
