
Goodwill Music

Will another peaceful rural area of SDRC be sacrificed?

A notice of a Proposed Development for a three thousand five hundred Cattle Feed Lot on Warfield Road, Allora, appeared on a property fence on 22nd February. Submissions regarding this development close on the 14th March, allowing residents and interested parties very little time to rally and discuss potential adverse effects of such a development.

Short and long term landowners in the vicinity, would like to draw your attention to the consequences such a project could have on residents and their farming activities.

Our concerns include environmental damage to soil, vegetation, water storage dams and most frightening, the underground water-table: the danger of overflow effluent, treated or otherwise, to surrounding waterways, especially in wet weather: the ambience of clean, unpolluted air being spoilt by offensive odours: the noise factor: the health risks to residents from dust from the roads and grain deliveries: disastrous effects for people suffering from asthma or allergies: possible devaluation of land: increased traffic, mainly semi-trailers delivering grain and livestock: traffic using a road of dubious quality which is also part of a school run: new residents and retirees chose the area for it pristine attributes and these are now threatened causing stress and related mental issues

It is unexpectedly happening in our back yard, perhaps yours will be the next!

St. Patrick's Day Celebrations

Irish born residents of Warwick and district celebrated St. Patrick's Day with the traditional fervour and enthusiasm. The Warwick celebrations took the customary form of a procession, an official luncheon, a race meeting and climaxed at night by an Irish national concert.

Wartime restrictions curtailed the procession, there being no floats, but hundreds of school children paraded to the racecourse. The Irish jaunting car was again prominent in the procession, conveying five sturdy pioneers whose ages collectively ran to 399. Eldest of this quintette was Mr. Jeremiah Collins an Allora veteran who has not missed a St. Patrick's Day gathering in Warwick since arriving here in 1872, and who today, with 91 years behind him, is probably the

Medal Presentation

Mr. William Deacon, foundation Head Teacher of the Allora State School fifty years previously, was invited to present the King Edward Memorial Medals for 1916. The medals were instigated after the death of King Edward VII in 1910, and presented each year by the School Committee to the best boy and girl of that year. The 1916 winners were Frank Laws and Mamie Burge. The chairman of the School Committee said that it was interesting to note that three members of the current committee, Mr. Robert Gordon, Mr. William Anderson and himself were foundation pupils of the Allora State School. In his presentation address Mr. Deacon outlined some of his memories on the beginnings of the school.

1867

New Hotel

Rotary Allora honours lifetimes of community service



- Are an Australian citizen or lawfully entitled to reside in Australia during the Relay period (25 December 2017 – 4 April 2018).

"Baton bearers nominated by the public will champion the power of the community.

"This is an opportunity for Australians of all abilities to join a remarkable journey that starts next week on Commonwealth

Day, and I encourage you to nominate someone in your life that you believe is worthy of the honour," he said.
