

### International workshop sharpens skills

International tourists – how to attract them, host them and keep them coming back was on the agenda at last week's International Know How workshop presented by Southern Queensland Country Tourism (SQCT) and the Australian Tourism Export Council (ATEC) in Toowoomba.

An initiative of SQCT, the workshop was funded jointly with Queensland Tourism Industry Council and the State Government and was the first of two free-of-charge 'international ready' sessions open to tourism operators in the region.

SQCT Chief Executive Officer Mary-Clare Power said the small

group workshops were aimed at assisting tourism operators to build their knowledge and skills base in order to tailor their offering to better target international visitors.

"Some of our operators have dipped their toes into the international market and many are keen to begin welcoming overseas guests and this initiative is one of the practical ways we are helping them to drive demand and grow their businesses, which of course has a flow-on effect across our regional economy," she said.

Delivered by Australian Tourism Export Council consultant Don Jolly, the workshop aimed to assist tourism operators to review their existing product offering, improve their range of saleable products in the international marketplace and enhance their capacity and capability in the inbound market.

"We engaged Mr Jolly for his depth of market knowledge and for his skill in helping industry to tap into inbound markets," Ms Power said.

Mr Jolly, an experienced international travel industry professional and former head of leading inbound tour operation, Tour East said he enjoyed passing on the tips and insights that he has gathered from a career of more than 30 years working in tourism around the world.

"We've had a very lively session which has covered everything from understanding your travel market to refining your sales skills, how to go about product presentations and the benefit of attending overseas missions and travel tradeshows such as the Australian Tourism Exchange," Mr Jolly said.

The workshop also covered such practical considerations as

packaging, international pricing and commission structures and sales and marketing plans.

The second free-of-charge 'International Ready' workshop, 'Market Insights - Singapore and China' will be held in Toowoomba on March 28. It will present detailed, separate modules on Singapore and China and aims to assist tourism operators to grasp the needs of each travel market by identifying traveller cultural characteristics and needs, presenting latest market and industry intelligence, facts and figures, and providing tips for success. #### New approach to manage invasive weeds and pest animals

Invasive pests will be managed via an innovative new approach in the Southern Downs from 1 July 2017 after Council voted in favour of adopting the Invasive Pests Control Scheme policy at its Special Meeting on 28 February 2017.

Southern Downs Mayor Tracy Dobie said that Council recognises that most landowners do the right thing when it comes to controlling invasive weeds and pest animals on their land, but their efforts are confounded by the minority that don't meet their responsibilities.

"Landowners that do not control invasive pests on their property impose costs on everyone else through the spread of untreated weeds and pest animals to other land.

"This scheme is aimed at getting that minority of landowners to lift their invasive pest control game.

"Those that do the right thing won't get charged a cent under this scheme, but those that don't will pay a charge, with monies collected to be invested in invasive pest control initiatives that provide benefit right across the Southern Downs," she said.

Council will introduce a new charge, calculated according to land valuation that will be applied to landowners that fail to meet agreed invasive pest control requirements.

All properties over five hectares in size will be subject to the Invasive Pests Control Scheme and landowners will receive information with their rates notices in late July. Landowners will be required to complete and submit a Proposed Works Form that outlines the control work they are going to undertake.

Southern Downs Portfolio Councillor for Rural, Environmental, Sustainability and Waste Management, Cameron Gow explained that there would be little change for landowners already controlling their invasive pests.

"Landowners that have pests under control on their property will simply need to tick a box on a form and its business as

"Council anticipates that this scheme will be a much more efficient approach to managing invasive pests, allowing us to direct more effort and resources towards best practice, strategic control initiatives such as aerial baiting of inaccessible country for wild dogs," he added.

Council will be holding public consultation sessions during March 2017 around the region to explain the Invasive Pests Control Scheme in more detail to landowners.

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#### Interruption to Traffic: Installation of new water main - Locke & Wallace Streets, Warwick

Southern Downs Regional Council advises that there will be interruption to traffic movements at the intersection of Locke and Wallace Streets, Warwick from Tuesday, 14 March 2017 for a period of three to four weeks, to enable the renewal of the water main located in Locke Street.

A new 300mm diameter trunk main will be installed across Wallace Street using trenchless technology. The process involves excavation of an entry and exit pit in Locke Street on either side of Wallace Street, then jacking a larger envelope pipe underground across Wallace Street at a depth suited to avoid existing underground services. After this is installed, the new water main will be placed across the road inside the envelope pipe and connected to the reticulation network on each side. This method is preferred to ensure that traffic operation on Wallace Street, a National Highway, remains uninterrupted.

The westbound lane of Locke Street will be closed to traffic between Wilga Avenue and the Warwick Hospital carpark exit. Traffic will be able to enter Locke Street from Wallace Street heading east or west; however westbound traffic will be diverted to the right hand lane on Locke Street, with normal two-way operation resuming after the Hospital carpark exit.

Traffic will be able to travel from Wallace Street east along Locke Street; however this will be the only direction of travel permitted until the junction of Wilga Avenue where normal twoway operation will resume. Short detours will be in place for other traffic on Locke Street approaching this intersection from the east or west.

There will be parking restrictions adjacent to the work sites; however access to and from the hospital carparks will be maintained

Council apologises for any inconvenience caused and seeks vour patience and cooperation during the traffic interruption period. This work is subject to weather conditions and may be rescheduled or changed without notice.





#### National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence – Friday 17 March 2017

The National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence (NDA) is Australia's key anti-bullying event for schools. The day encourages all Australian students to 'take a stand together' against bullying and violence in the classroom, in schools and beyond.

The NDA is in its seventh year and continues to gain momentum, generating a widespread anti-bullying message across Australia.

The day brings about a unified message to 'take a stand together', and highlights the many anti-bullying activities happening in schools across the country.

To raise awareness about bullying in schools and create behavioural change, it is imperative that the anti-bullying message goes beyond local school activities. It needs to become a major social initiative with a national presence involving schools, parents, students and the community all working together.

The NDA is a positive day of action that encourages school communities to say 'Bullying. No Way!' and 'take a stand together'.

What is bullying? The national definition of bullying for schools, developed by educators across Australia and included in the National Safe Schools Framework, is:

- Bullying is an ongoing misuse of power in relationships through repeated verbal, physical and/or social behaviour that causes physical and/or psychological harm. It can involve an individual or a group misusing their power over one or more persons. Bullying can happen in person or online, and it can be obvious (overt) or hidden (covert).
- Online bullying refers to bullying through information and communication technologies, e.g. the internet or mobile devices.

Bullying of any form or for any reason can have long-term effects on those involved, including bystanders.

Single incidents and conflict or fights between equals, whether in person or online, are not defined as bullying.

### Veterans to benefit from improved mental health support

Minister for Veterans' Affairs Dan Tehan was encouraged by progress on how to further improve mental health support for veterans and their families at the National Advisory Committee for the Veterans and Veterans Families Counselling Service (VVCS) meeting held in Canberra.

"We owe it to the veterans community and their families to continually build on current mental health support services, and to provide them with a range of options to help improve their quality of life," Mr Tehan said.

"We can only do this by engaging and working with both the ex-service community and health professionals."

The National Advisory Committee (NAC) brings together mental health professionals, GPs, psychologists and psychiatrists with former Australian Defence Force (ADF) members and family representatives.

Mr Tehan said the NAC highlighted the importance of early access to mental health treatment for veterans and their families and how much they valued the changes made in the most recent Federal Budget.

"Last year, the Government made treatment for post-traumatic stress disorder, depression, anxiety and alcohol and substance misuse free for anyone who has served one day in the ADF without having to prove their condition is related to their service." Mr Tehan said.

"This treatment is demand driven and fully funded, so if someone needs treatment, it is available — it is not limited by budget. To access treatment is as simple as contacting VVCS on 1800 011 046 or at nlhc@dva.gov.au.

"This initiative also provides access to VVCS, which can link veterans and their families to mental health professionals with expertise in military mental health and dealing with the impact of trauma."

Mr Tehan also attended an event to acknowledge the 35th year of VVCS services, which was attended by a cross-section of representatives from the ex-service community.

"VVCS is the legacy of our Vietnam veterans, who recognised a need for mental health services specifically for those who had served in the ADF," Mr Tehan said.

"Since 1982, VVCS has provided more than 1.6 million counselling sessions to more than 300,000 veterans and family members.

"VVCS today is a specialised 24/7 service that supports all generations of veterans and their families, which includes 26 counselling centres, an afterhours support line and a network of more than 1,100 outreach clinicians. "Importantly, this service is able to deliver quality mental health counselling

# National Walk Safely To School Day Friday 19 May 2017

Primary school aged children across Australia will make those important steps towards a healthier future by participating in National Walk Safely to School Day on Friday 19 May 2017.

National Walk Safely to School Day is a community initiative that aims to raise awareness of the health, road safety, transport and environmental benefits that regular walking (especially to and from school) can provide for the long term well-being of our children. Apart from the physical benefits, regular walking also has a favourable impact on their cognitive and academic performance.

The annual event, now in its 18th year, encourages primary school aged children to build walking into their daily routine, by walking to and from school, not just on Friday 19 May, but every day.

Harold Scruby, Chairman and CEO of the Pedestrian Council of Australia said: "The extremely disturbing childhood obesity epidemic continues to affect 1 in 4 children at critical levels across Australia."

"Unless teachers, parents, carers and the community generally get behind this event and its objectives, it is expected that numbers will reach 1 in 3 by 2020. The best exercise for all of us is regular walking. Children require at least 60 minutes per day of physical activity. We should encourage them to include walking at the beginning, during and end of each day", he said.

The national initiative also promotes improved diets (by asking schools and P&Cs to Host a Healthy Breakfast), positive environmental action, better use of public transport with reduced car-dependency and the vitally important road safety message: "Until they are 10, children must always hold the hand of an adult when crossing the road".

It also encourages parents and carers to walk more, reducing dangerous traffic congestion around schools, while minimising the risk of Australian children developing heart disease and diabetes.

### Public consultation to determine future location of Glengallan Gates

Public consultation will be undertaken by Southern Downs Regional Council to determine the future location of the Glengallan Gates, currently in place at Leslie Park, Warwick. This decision was made at a Special Council Meeting held

today, during which Council considered a request from Glengallan Homestead Trust to relocate the Glengallan Gates located at Leslie Park, Warwick to the Glengallan Homestead. The Glengallan Gates are located at the south-western entrance to Leslie Park, Warwick. The four sandstone pillars and the iron gates were gifted to Council by the then owner of Glengallan Homestead, Oswald Slade, in 1940 to mark the centenary of the Leslie Brothers settling in the area.

The Glengallan Homestead Trust is seeking the return of the Glengallan Gates to the Homestead for its 150th anniversary later this year.

Southern Downs Planning and Property Portfolio Councillor

Neil Meiklejohn said in terms of current planning requirements, the gates are not a building and as such the Planning Scheme does not apply.

"Whilst the Planning Scheme does not apply to this proposal, and there is also no particular requirement for public notification, given the prominence of the gates and the length of time they have stood in Leslie Park, coupled with the knowledge that there are differing opinions in the community about whether the gates should stay or be relocated, Council has decided to invite feedback from the public to inform its decision." he said.

"The Glengallan Homestead Trust has indicated that if the proposed relocation proceeds, they would cover all costs associated with the relocation of the gates to the Glengallan Homestead and the reinstatement of

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the Leslie Park memorial site, along with interpretive signage. "Council encourages the community to get on board and have a say about the proposed relocation by making a submission during the public consultation period," said Cr Meiklejohn.

It is anticipated that the public consultation period will open on Thursday, 16 March 2017 for a period extending at least 15 business days; however, further details about the public consultation will be made available on Council's website www. sdrc.qld.qov.au.

The public consultation will include:

- Placement of a sign on or near the gates advising of the proposal to remove the gates from Leslie Park;
- A public notice published in a local newspaper advising of the proposal and that submissions about the proposal can be made to Council during a period extending at least 15 business days after publication of the notice;
- Media releases; and
- · Information on Council's website.

Council has received previous requests for the gates to be relocated back to Glengallan Homestead. Previous Council decisions to retain the gates in Leslie Park were based on factors including that the gates were gifted to the Warwick community; the condition of the gates and whether they would be damaged during the relocation process; the extensive period of time that they have been in Leslie Park and are now part of the heritage of Leslie Park; and the impact that the removal of the gates would have on the aesthetics of the Park. # Southern Downs Planning Scheme – Changes to residential uses within 1km of intensive animal industry

Southern Downs Regional Council is proposing to make a range of amendments to the Southern Downs Planning Scheme and is welcoming public submissions as part of the community consultation process.

The Southern Downs Planning Scheme was adopted in 2012. A major review of the scheme commenced in 2015 and, following a State interest review of the proposed amendments which commenced in March 2016, Council has recently been advised by the Deputy Premier that public consultation of the proposed amendments can now be undertaken.

One of the proposed amendments will significantly restrict new residential uses, including dwellings, being established in the Rural zone within one kilometre of an intensive animal industry, such as feedlots, piggeries and poultry farms.

Southern Downs Portfolio Councillor for Planning and Property, Neil Meiklejohn explained that the proposed amendments would protect intensive animal industries from conflict with other uses, particularly residential uses.

"At the moment a proposal to construct a dwelling within a specified distance of an intensive animal industry triggers the requirement for Council planning approval. An application is subject to code assessment, but does not require public notification.

"Such an application would usually be approved subject to conditions such as planting tree buffers to reduce dust and installing air conditioning to reduce odour impacts.

"Various separation distances currently apply to the different types of intensive animal industries and these distances also depend on the number of the animal units on site.

"The proposed amendments will ensure development does not increase the number of people residing or being accommodated within one kilometre of an existing or approved intensive animal industry.

"This means that any applications for residential uses like community residences, dwelling houses, relocatable home parks, and retirement facilities among others, within the one kilometre separation distance, would be subject to impact assessment and would require public notification.

"The amendments to the planning scheme will significantly restrict any type of residential uses being constructed within one kilometre of an intensive animal industry.

"Council has developed a fact sheet specifically about the proposed changes to residential uses, being established in the Rural zone within one kilometre of an intensive animal industry. It outlines the current requirements as well as how to make a submission

"The consultation period is open until March 31, so I would encourage people to consider the draft plan and the supporting documentation and to make a submission to Council if they're passionate about something in the proposals," he said.

The public consultation period is open until 31 March 2017. There are various ways in which the public and potentially affected stakeholders can be part of the consultation process. During the consultation period, the Draft Amended Planning Scheme, planning scheme maps and a range of fact sheets will be available at the Council's Warwick and Stanthorpe Community Contact Centres, and on Council's website www. sdrc.qld.gov.au.

Additionally, members of the public are welcome to make appointments with Council's Planning Department to discuss the proposed amendments.

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
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
