St John Ambulance First Aid tips for the Easter family holiday

St John Ambulance (Qld) Manager of Health Services, Noel Matson knows the risks and infections associated with holidaying over the Easter period. He urges all holiday makers, particularly those who are camping or fishing, to know the correct first aid treatment to increase healing time as well as avoid infection and pain.

"Although nothing can substitute being trained in first aid and having a wellstocked first aid kit, I want to provide all Queenslanders and holidaymakers with some basic first aid tips that could help save a life," he said.

First aid kit and communications - When going on holiday, it is important to consider whether you will be travelling to a remote location. Ensuring your knowledge and skill in applying first aid is vital to the preservation of life. "Before going on holidays whether that is camping, fishing or on a road trip, check your first aid kit is well stocked," Noel advised.

Noel said a well stocked first aid kit could enable your family to enjoy their holiday for longer and avoid cutting a trip short to seek treatment.

"If faced with an emergency situation, the ability to contact emergency services will depend on your location, equipment and knowledge," Noel said. Noel advised planning and preparation were vital, particularly knowing UHF radio channels to contact if in a remote location with limited phone coverage. "If travelling to a remote location, investing in a satellite phone and a personal locator beacon can be the difference between life and death, he said.

"Medical assistance may be some time away, and you may need to maintain the injured or ill person for some time, so this is where your first aid knowledge and skills are so valuable," he said.

Snake bites - Regardless of the type of snake you think you might be dealing with, all bites should be treated as serious until medical aid arrives.

"Immediate application of a pressure immobilisation bandage is required as well as dialling triple zero (000) for an ambulance," he said.

"The bandage needs to be applied from 'tip to top' (tips of fingers or toes to the upper part of limb) firmly around the entire limb, ensuring there are no gaps in the bandage application," Noel said.

Noel said it was vital to make sure the casualty remains still by not moving any part of their body to delay the venom moving to other areas of the body. "Incorrect myths with snake bites include applying a tourniquet, cutting the wound, sucking the venom or attempting to catch the snake which should all be avoided." he warned.


To have to move the venue from the Allora Showgrounds because of a few Show Society members would be a very big loss to the Allora community.

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Council reaches out with community consultation

Southern Downs Mayor Tracy Dobie said Southern Downs Regional Council has made public consultation a priority following calls from the community to have more of a say on matters that affect them.

"Over the past few months Council has been ramping up consultation and engagement with communities across the region.

"We've developed face-to-face cross region forums such as our monthly 'Cuppa with the Councillors' and bi-monthly 'Council Q&A', which enable Councillors and staff to connect with residents and offer residents opportunities to have their issues and ideas for the future in their own unique and diverse communities heard.

"Councillors hosted 'Cuppa with the Councillors' at Allora, Leyburn and Dalveen and Council Q&A sessions were held in Warwick and Maryvale.

"Additionally, Councillors and staff attended the Stanthorpe, Allora, Killarney and Warwick Shows, and a number of other consultations were held, including face-to-face, online and via the submission process, on several topics, projects and initiatives," said Cr Dobie.

Public consultations and engagement activities undertaken in the period January to March 2017 include the following:

- Replacement of shelters at Pioneer Park, Swanfels
- Proposed relocation of the Leslie Memorial Gates/Glengallan
 Gates
- · Replacement of trees on Grafton Street, Warwick
- Draft Invasive Pests Control Scheme
- Proposed amendments to the Southern Downs Planning Scheme
- Heavy Vehicle Access workshop
- Proposed concept plan for the Allora Streetscape project P L Travers Park
- · Information stands at the following local shows:
- Stanthorpe 3 & 4 February 2017
- Allora 10 & 11 February 2017
- Killarney 24 & 25 February 2017
- Warwick 24 & 25 March 2017

Mayor Dobie highlighted that more than 750 people were estimated to have attended or participated in these consultations.

"The public sessions certainly offered the community the opportunity to ask frank and fearless questions of Councillors and staff, as well as to raise issues of local significance and have input into policy development.

"Face-to-face engagement is vital in a world where too much emphasis can be placed on comments made in social media," emphasised Cr Dobie.

Council's engagement and consultation process will continue with public meetings currently being arranged to allow the community to provide feedback on the draft budget and capital works program.

Mayor Dobie said it is important to have every avenue open for the community to have input into the future of the region, and highlighted that Council uses several methods to interface with the community in addition to the public consultation sessions as outlined.

"Councillors take every opportunity to connect with people at the many events they attend across the region each week," she said.

"Council collaborates with the community to formulate options and provide recommendations to Council through its eight Portfolio Advisory Committees comprised of community representatives.

"Furthermore, Council is engaging in conversations to meet the needs of different stakeholders. For example heavy vehicle access was identified as a consideration, both now and into the future as the region experiences growth in its industries. In response, Council recently held a 'Heavy Vehicle Access' workshop that provided an opportunity for stakeholders to get round the table and get to grips with what heavy vehicle access means in and for our region, and it was very well received," said Cr Dobie.

The Mayor also said it is pleasing to note that Council's MY SDRC App is gaining momentum in the community with downloads of the App currently sitting at 1626, with 108 of those occurring during the disaster period last week and into the weekend associated with Ex-Tropical Cyclone Debbie.

"The MY SDRC App offers both a communication portal with disaster alerts and news, as well as an efficient and effective way for the public to submit 'Fix It' requests for Council's attention. This function enables users to take a photo of the issue and submit it with the request and can log a GPS location, so it can be done on the spot," she said.

12 requests were submitted via the App during the disaster period, with 2 submitted via Council's website. The requests were predominantly about roads, with a smaller proportion relating to water and wastewater.

Work on the development of the Draft 2017-18 Budget has been progressing over the last several months and the draft will soon be adopted by Council. Once adopted, a period of public consultation will begin, with the Draft Budget, the Fees & Charges Schedule and Council's Long Term Financial Forecast to go on public exhibition for 28 days. During that time, public submissions will be invited and public presentations about the draft Budget are planned to be held in Warwick, Stanthorpe, Allora, Killarney and Wallangarra.

Further information will be made available on Council's website www.sdrc.qld.gov.au once timeframes and final arrangements have been confirmed for the draft Budget sessions.

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Round 2 Road reseal program start date revised following ex-TC Debbie

In the wake of the ex-Tropical Cyclone Debbie weather event and associated flooding in parts of the Southern Downs region, the start date for Southern Downs Regional Council's Round 2 Road reseal program has been delayed until 10 April 2017. Southern Downs Regional Council's \$1.4 million 2016-17 road reseal program was set to begin on April 3, but Round 2 has now begun on April 10 in northern areas of the region.

On completion of Round 2, Council will have resealed a total of 30 kilometres of the road network as well as 3900 square metres of carparks.

Council's Manager Works Construction, Mr Eric Kraak said plans are now in place with the commencement of Round 2 of the reseal program on April 10, but highlighted that the program is subject to change without notice.

"At this stage, works will continue, with the final reseal on April 19.

"But, as always, I would stress that this is subject to weather conditions, and the schedule may change without notice.

"Some delays will occur for local traffic while bitumen sealing works are being carried out.

"Council would also appreciate if residents could ensure that no vehicles are parked on the road on the reseal days so that the bitumen sealing works can proceed without delay.

"Council apologises for any inconvenience that may be caused during these works and seeks residents' and motorists' patience and cooperation during this period," Mr Kraak said.

Portfolio Councillor for Transport and Infrastructure, Marika McNichol said she was pleased to see this important work being undertaken through the road reseal program.

"Undertaking the resealing of bitumen roads in our region is vital to maintaining the condition of our road network into the future.

"While there will be some interruption to traffic on the listed roads, the end result will be worth the inconvenience," said Cr McNichol.

Change in application of State Government Emergency Management Levy to apply from 1 July

Changes to the way that the State Government's Emergency Management Levy is applied to properties in the Southern Downs region will take effect from July 1 this year.

The Emergency Management Levy (EML) is a Queensland Government charge that partially funds the Queensland Fire and Emergency Services (QFES). The EML is applied to all Queensland property to ensure there is a sustainable funding base for fire and emergency services and recognises that all Queenslanders are at risk from a wide range of emergencies including floods, cyclones, storms as well as fire and accidents. Local governments are required by the Fire and Emergency Services Act 1990 to assess and collect the EML on behalf of the State Government through rate notices.

Differing interpretations of the relevant legislation has resulted in some councils applying the EML to rate assessments rather than to each parcel (lot) that comprises the property, as interpreted by QFES.

Following advice from QFES, Southern Downs Regional Council is required to change how the levy is applied to each property. This change will affect a total of 1,429 properties across the region from 1 July 2017. Those properties affected will receive a letter outlining the change to the levy charged for their particular property.

Nepal has the only non-guadrilateral national flag. The flag is a simple combination of two single pennons. The two triangles represent Hinduism and Buddhism. The crimson red is the colour of the rhododendron, the country's national flower. Red is also the sign of victory in war. The blue border is the colour of peace. Until 1962, the flag's emblems, the sun and the crescent moon, had human faces. They were removed to modernize the flag. The crescent represents the serenity of the

Allora's Past 150 years ago April 1867

Theft in Allora

Henry Herbert, Edward Brookes, George Cooper and James Dawson were charged with stealing from the Princess of Wales Hotel at Allora, four blankets the property of Samuel Gordon the proprietor of the hotel.

Samuel Gordon deposed: To the best of his belief the property now produced was his. He had gone to the camp of the prisoners and found the blankets produced. On the same night £19, a pair of pants and vest were stolen from the complainant's house, belonging to a Mr. Miller, a lodger at the house. Sergeant Grayson deposed to taking into custody, the men who admitted to

have taken the blankets. (Warwick Examiner & Times 18th April 1867)

Allora's Past 100 years ago April 1917

W. M. Hughes in Allora A large crowd gathered in town in the

morning for the purpose of welcoming Mr. W. M. Hughes to Allora. Owing to a breakdown at Greenmount, Mr. Hughes did not arrive until nearly one o'clock by which time the crowd had considerably dwindled. Mr. Hughes, however, was met by about 300 persons, the school children being formed up to receive him. He was welcomed by the Shire Chairman (Councillor James Dean).

Following an address on the upcoming elections and the state of the war, a vote of thanks to Mr. Hughes was moved by Cr. W. H. Allen and seconded by Cr. J. Holmes. This was carried by hearty cheering.




