

World Red Cross Day (May 8) coincides with the start of National Volunteer Week and so we're using this opportunity to thank all the volunteers who make our society stronger.

"Under this government's Volunteer Grants program, a total of \$232,523 in funds was distributed to 59 community organisations across my electorate."



It is the continued support of these sponsors and donors that enable the ADCA to reward competitors who support the event and allow contributions back to the community.



Tribute to long time educator

Coinciding with the celebration of 150 years of schooling at the Allora State School was another very special ceremony which recognised the contribution to Allora State School and to education in general of the very much loved and admired local lady, Mrs Joyce Gibson.

In 1974, at the beginning of Preschool education in Queensland, Joyce returned to teaching and became the first Preschool teacher at Allora State School. Her passion for early childhood education saw her fulfil this role on and off until her retirement in 1997. When she wasn't teaching in the Centre, she filled other roles within the Department, ensuring that the early childhood program was a vital and valued part of a child's overall education.

Joyce is remembered with affection as a quietly spoken, kind and caring teacher who concentrated on the total package that was each child, supporting them academically as well as physically, socially and emotionally.

To celebrate the career and contributions of this inspiring lady, a special plaque designed and made by Tracey Wilson, now adorns the wall of the Preschool Centre as it was known when Joyce was there and a special garden has been made in her honour in front of that building. Thanks to the tireless work of Mrs Judy Emms and Mr Shane Bowman, that garden is a beautiful monument to a beautiful lady, incorporating new plantings with existing features like the stepping stones from 2000, the children's rose planted by the Frizzell family and the trellis donated by the Preschool Parent Group.

It has been twenty years since Joyce's retirement but she will long be remembered for her contribution to Allora State School and this memory will live on in the beautiful garden which now complements the Prep centre.






