Write-off scammers this tax season

With tax season upon us, the Office of Fair Trading (OFT) is reminding Queenslanders to never give out bank details or credit card numbers after answering the phone, even if being offered an incentive like a larger or quicker tax refund. Fair Trading Executive Director Brian Bauer said the OFT often received reports at this time of year from Queenslanders who had received phone calls supposedly from the Australian Tax Office (ATO).

"If you receive a phone call and you are unsure if it's legitimate or not, never give away personal information such as bank details, credit card numbers or even addresses," Mr Bauer said.

"Scammers can be very good at sounding legitimate, and tempting you with fake incentives.

"If in doubt, ask the caller for their name and the organisation they work for, end the phone call and call the organisation back using the phone number listed on their website or in the phone book."

The OFT recommends the following to minimize the risk of becoming a phone scam victim:

- Do not let anyone pressure you into making decisions over the phone. A scammer may try to create a sense of urgency, by creating a deadline or threats of legal action.
- Don't give your banking details or tax file number to a stranger over the phone.
- Always be cautious of 'government agencies' calling you to say you are entitled to money, as most will write. Get enough information on the organisation and the caller and then find independent contact details so you can check the legitimacy of what you have been told.
- Get a second opinion. If someone is requesting money from you and you have any doubts, discuss it with a trusted and reliable third party.
- Contact the ATO if you receive a tax-related email or SMS you think is a scam. Be alert to spelling errors, grammatical errors, and incorrect phone numbers.
- Never, under any circumstances, direct deposit money into the account of a person or business you don't know. If you have, call your bank immediately.
- Remember, the ATO will not threaten you with immediate arrest, or ask you to:
 - pay money to receive a refund or payment
 - pay a debt via pre-paid credit cards, store gift cards, or iTunes vouchers
 - provide personal information, such as your tax file number (TFN), via email or SMS
 - pay money into a personal bank account
 - open attachments in unsolicited emails or download files from the internet.

If you think you have been a victim of a tax-related scam, call 1800 008 540 or forward the email to ReportEmailFraud@ato.gov.au.

Council considers request to proceed with rezoning of South Street land in Allora

At its General Meeting in Stanthorpe yesterday, Southern Downs Regional Council reconsidered its decision not to rezone land situated at 22 and 22A South Street, Allora from the Low density residential zone to the Industry zone, following a request to proceed with the rezoning.

On 24 May 2017 Council decided not to proceed with the proposed rezoning of 20 Herbert Street (the GrainX site) and 22 and 22A South Street Allora, the site of Denny's Engineering and Welding Pty Ltd. This decision took several factors into consideration, including the strong community objection to the proposal highlighted during public consultation from February 10 to March 31 in relation to proposed major amendments to the Southern Downs Planning Scheme.

Southern Downs Portfolio Councillor for Planning and Property, Neil Meiklejohn said since making its decision in May, Council has received a request from a representative of the landowner of the allotments at 22 and 22A South Street, for Council to change its decision and, instead, to proceed with the rezoning of their land.

"The request to reconsider the decision not to rezone the Denny's site raises a number of matters and as a request has been received, it must be considered by Council, and we have done so at the General Meeting on July 26.

"Council acknowledges that there is community opposition towards the rezoning proposal, so we want the community to know that this request has been received, and was on the agenda.

"However, we do wish to make it very clear that Council is not giving any further consideration to rezoning the GrainX land," he said.

Council's General Meeting was held at the Stanthorpe Council Chambers, 61 Marsh Street, at 9am.

Looking Back...

Allora's Past 25 years ago July 1992 Medal Returned

A gold medal which was presented to Sergeant Charles Deacon by the citizens of Allora on his return from the Boer War in 1901, was this week returned to the town. The medals were presented to each of the men who returned to Allora from the war and were paid for by a local Patriotic Fund. Sergeant Deacon served with 3rd Queensland Bushman's Contingent and was present at the Relief of Mafeking. After Charles Deacon's death in Allora in 1957, the medal was worn by his daughter

Miss Marjorie Deacon, and is believed to have been mistakenly thrown out in a clothing clean out. The medal turned up in a Brisbane antique shop where it was noticed by a medal collector with Allora connections who approached the Allora and District Historical Society. The Society, with the help of the Allora Shire Council, Allora Apex Club, members of the Deacon family and Mr. Albert Blake a former U.S. serviceman, was able to raise the funds to have the medal returned to Allora.

Allora's Past 75 years ago July 1942 Profiteering

Remarking that it was necessary that a deterrent penalty should be imposed as profiteering was rampant in many places, Mr. R. C. F. Byrne S.M., in the Court of Petty Sessions at Allora, yesterday fined the firm of Holmes & Co, storekeepers, £25 for have committed a breach of the National Security (Prices) Regulations in that they sold declared goods, to wit, potatoes on September 1, 1941, at 9d. per seven pounds whereas the maximum fixed price was then 7d. per seven pounds.

Allora's Past 100 years ago July 1917 Stag Shot at Allora

A fine deer weighing 4 qrs. 10lbs with splendid antlers, has been put on view at the Ipswich Poultry and Fruit Depot. This animal was shot near Allora a few days ago and the person who sent it to Brisbane writes to Mr. Bain, the manager, to state that he can supply one or two stags per week if a market can be found. The venison of the deer in question has already been all sold at 1/6 per lb.

Allora's Past 150 years ago July 1867

ALLORA POLICE COURT

Wednesday, July 17
Dennis Connolly v. Robert Cooke – The defendant was charged with illegally branding a red cow. From the evidence it appeared that the cow was impounded at Allora in April last, and there being no brand then visible except W. Mr. Wightman, of Warwick, on seeing the advertisement, believed the cow to be his property and sold her to the defendant. It having been proved that the defendant came honestly by the cow, the case was dismissed.

Councillors to connect with residents and offer residents opportunities to have their issues and ideas for the future in their own unique and diverse communities heard."

Council has also hosted events designed to make living, working and doing business in the region easier, including the recent forums.

The Southern Downs and Granite Belt Tourism Forum was held in Stanthorpe in July, at which 100 people attended. The Sport and Recreation Forum, at which Shane Webcke was a guest speaker, attracted about 100 people. The recent free workshop on winning government tenders was also well-attended.

The Council opened up the 2017-18 Budget for public consultation for the second year, and about 120 people responded, while the Invasive Pest Control strategy consultation period saw about 250 people in total attend sessions in locations including Stanthorpe, Dalveen, Allora, and Killarney. Council also asked local communities to have their say on how their towns would look, with consultation evenings held for the Killarney streetscape project, the Allora streetscape project, and the Swanfels shelter replacement project. Almost 100 people attended these sessions to make their voices heard.

Council is committed to the health and well-being of the region's residents. The recent free screenings of That Sugar Film attracted over 150 people, some of whom have embarked on significant lifestyle changes as a result. The film was screened around the region, including in Allora, Stanthorpe, Warwick, Wallangarra and Killarney.

When it comes to how services are run in the region, Council has invited community consultation, including the Waste Reduction & Recycling Strategy, the Wallangarra Urban Design Project and the Aerodrome Improvement project, which saw about 200 people have their say.

In total, that's over 950 people who have responded to the Council's invitation to have their say – and Council appreciates all those who took the time to make their views known.

In addition, the Council's MYSDRC app has now been downloaded 2000 times, which shows that it's an effective means of communicating with residents. Check your notifications – the 2000th download will receive a prize, with the recipient to be advised shortly!

"The MY SDRRC App offers both a communication portal with disaster alerts, news, as well as an efficient and effective way for the public to submit 'Fix It' requests for Council's attention," said Mayor Dobie.

The Mayor said that Council is committed to ongoing community consultation.

"Face-to-face engagement is vital in a world where too much emphasis can be placed on comments made in social media," emphasised Cr Dobie.

New Grants to Community – Round One closing soon

Southern Downs Regional Council is reminding not-for-profit organisations in the region to ensure they get their applications submitted by July 30 for Council's 2017/18 Grants to Community. Council recently held two Grants to Community Information Sessions for not-for-profit organisations which were well attended in Warwick and Stanthorpe, with 48 organisations represented across the region.

Southern Downs Mayor Tracy Dobie said the attendance numbers are a very good indicator that Round One of the grants is going to be very competitive.

"Council often receives applications for more funding than is available, so it's crucial that applications address the grant criteria, and these may be different for the different funding streams.

"And my top tips for any prospective applicant are, don't leave it to the last minute, and make sure you have all of the information on hand that you'll need to complete your application," said Cr Dobie.

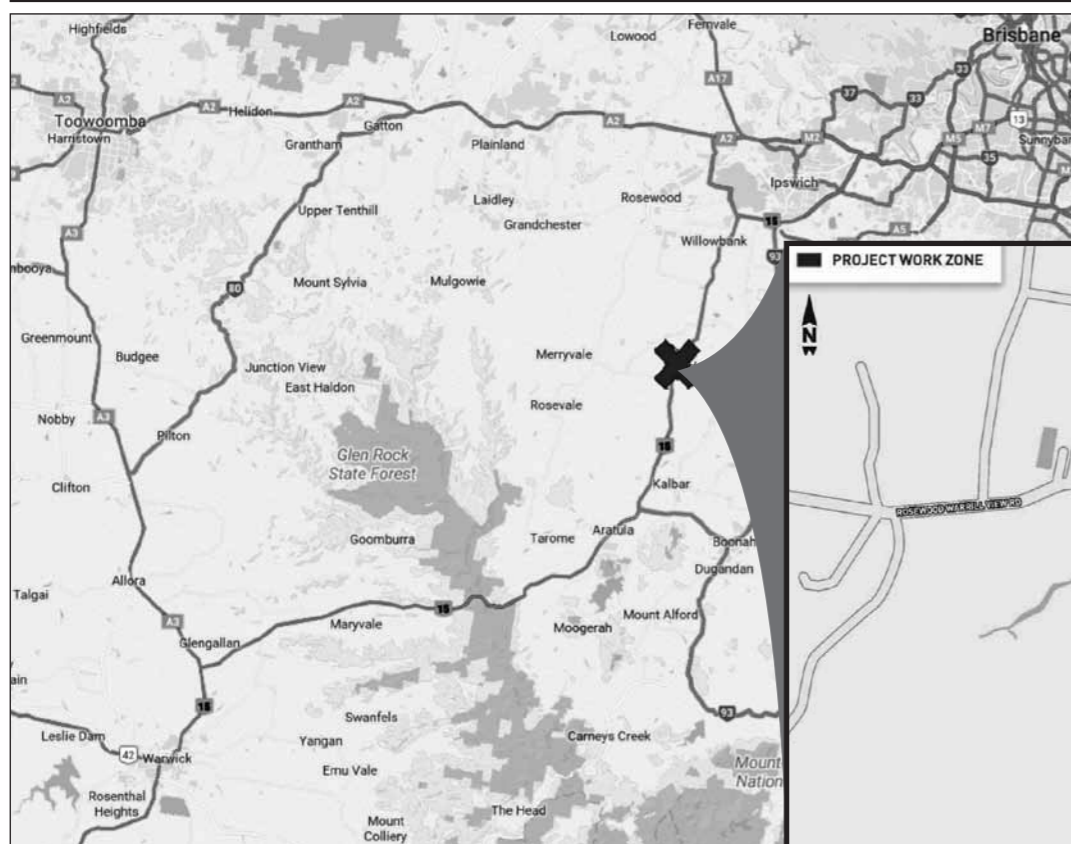

Scots PGC College Appoints New Principal

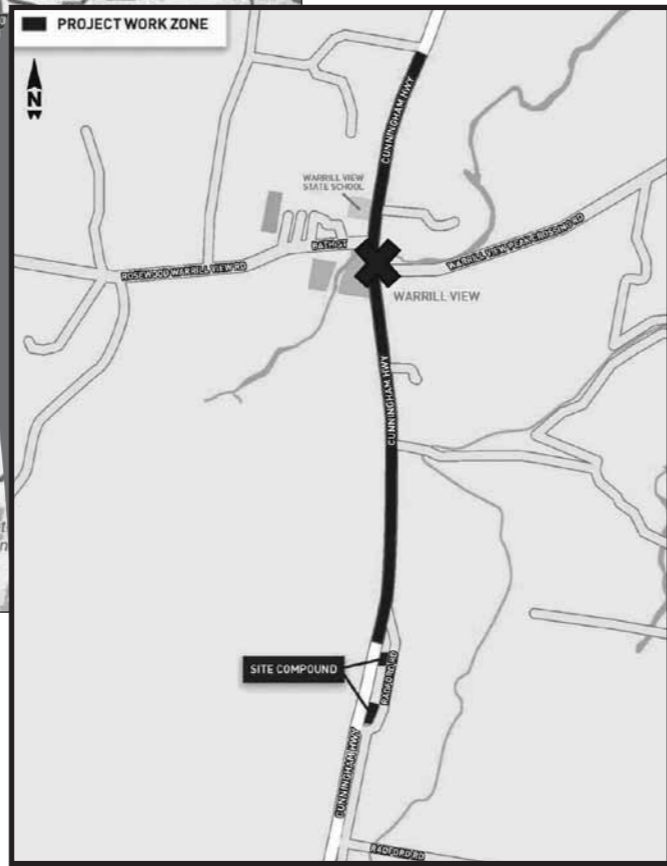

Waroolaba Creek Bridge on the Cunningham Highway closed to wide load vehicles. No access for wide load vehicles 24/7 from Monday 24 July 2017 to Sunday 30 July 2017. Wide load operators should plan their journey and seek alternative routes during this time.



Works Notification: Cunningham Highway Pavement Rehabilitation Access closed for wide load vehicles - Warrill View

FKG Pty Ltd is currently constructing the Warrill View Pavement Rehabilitation Project on behalf of the Department of Transport and Main Roads. Construction on the 3km section is progressing through Warrill View, and the project is expected to be complete mid to late 2017, weather permitting.

- From 6:00am Monday 24 July until 6:00pm Sunday 30 July, access will be closed for wide load vehicles travelling on the Cunningham Highway across the Waroolaba Creek Bridge in Warrill View (see map) to facilitate pavement works either side of the bridge.
- All wide load vehicles measuring in excess of the below measurements will not be able to pass due to road surface width restrictions on the bridge.
 - 2.5 metres width (wheel to wheel)
 - 3.5 metres load width, maximum half metre overhang
 - 1.2 metre clearance from ground to underside of load.
 - Access for wide load vehicles is prohibited in both north and

- south directions - there is no ability to turn around.
- Wide load operators must plan their journey and seek alternative routes during these works.
 - Wide load operators are encouraged to contact QLD Traffic 13 19 40 for advice on alternate routes.
 - Speed will be reduced down to 20km/h through this area and delays are expected.
 - The bridge will remain in operation under reduced lanes and changed traffic conditions for all other vehicles.

Stay warm while saving money during winter

Winter is not just coming – it's here, especially in western and southern Queensland as temperatures plummet and people turn up the heating to keep warm.

Ms Hopkins said that when it came to buying heaters, it was important to consider options before making a quick decision.

"There are many inexpensive heaters on the market but look for the star rating – the more stars the more energy efficient and the heater costs less the run," she said.
