A third wicket partnership between Philip Bell and Matthew May produced 68 runs and a fifth wicket partnership between Bell and Lindsay May made 76 runs, Lindsay May hitting successive sixes in a score of 36 off 22 balls. Allan Robin was Allora's best bowler with two for 42 off 10 overs.

Chasing 298 runs Allora lost its first wicket in the second over. The second and third wickets fell to Jason Sparksman with successive balls before Allan Robin avoided the hat-trick. With Allora six for 46, Mark Eelkema (44) and Paddy Maguire (27) rallied the side but to no avail. Jason Sparksman had destroyed Allora's top order with four for 44. Matthew May took four for 24 off seven overs to end Allora's challenge.



Make a free Mobile Women's **Health Clinic appointment in April**

Darling Downs Hospital and Health Service mobile women's health nurse Kathrvn Anning will visit a variety of locations in April to conduct free clinics.

Mobile Women's Health clinics offer a range of services including cervical screening tests, breast awareness, sexual health testing, and advice for issues such as continence, menopause, contraception and general wellbeing. The service is free, confidential and available to all women.

Ms Anning said it is important for women to prioritise their health and make time for regular check-ups and tests such as the new cervical screening test.

"Regular cervical screening tests are the best protection against cervical cancer," she said.

"This test replaced the Pap smear test from 1 December 2017, and is a simple procedure to check the health of the cervix, is more accurate and needs to be done less

"The test looks and feels the same as the Pap test, but tests for the human papillomavirus, known as HPV.

"A woman's first cervical screening test is due two years after her last Pap test and after that, if results are normal, women only need to have the test every five years. "From 1 December 2017 all women over the age of 25 should start having cervical screening tests and will receive a letter inviting them onto the national cervical screening program."

Wattles Claim Victory in a Nailbiter

Wattles went to the half time break leading 12 - 6, despite a collection of frustrating unforced errors throughout the first stanza.

Co-skipper Ryan Duggan is in great form and combined with brother Matt Duggan to post first points of the second half to extend Wattles lead to 18 - 6 in the 44th minute.

Five eight Travis Burns forced his way over to score ten minutes later, before Ryan Duggan snatched his second four-pointer from a dummy half dart in the north east corner of Platz Oval after winger Dale McAntee had been hauled down centimetres from the tryline.

The Warriors appeared to have their second win of the season in the bag by the 65th minute

with a healthy 26 - 6 lead. The Gatton side found gaps in Wattles defence in the latter stages and had the home side hemmed in their own guarter for two hectic sets where the Hawks saw a possible try disallowed. That all out defensive effort by Wattles can be considered to have won them the game as their opponents finished with wind in their sails.

An altercation occured in the 73rd minute that saw two players sin binned, one Wattles centre Jake Hargreaves, reducing both teams to 12 players. The Hawks responded by running in three touchdowns to trail 20 - 26 igniting a hotly contested final five minutes.
