Former NRL Star Travis Burns Goes Out a Winner at Platz Oval

The 'National Farmers Warehouse' Wattles A Grade side defeated the Highfields Eagles at Platz Oval in front of one of the biggest crowds of the season on Sunday in a thrilling come from behind win on the back of outstanding performances by halfback Matt Duggan, front rower Dale Perkins & fullback Jackson Green.

The day also saw a reunion of the 1968 Allora-Clifton (now Wattles) Under 16 Toowoomba Rugby League Premiership winning side, 50 years after their 17 - 7 win over Toowoomba's All Whites.

The A Grade match was preceded by a minutes silence in honour of former Allora based rugby league identity and Bulimba Cup player Ron Gwynne, while half time saw the official presentation of jerseys to the Zone 5 Championship winning Central Downs Under 35 kg team.

Player/coach Travis Burns was sent out a deserved winner in what was his last game as a player on Wattles turf, after making his A Grade debut in 2001 and going on to play 215 NRL/British Super League games in a glittering career.

Burns couldn't speak more highly of his charges after the win over Highfields and is now looking forward to the challenges of the finals series. "Highfields had a great game plan today that saw them ahead at the break, we altered our game somewhat and produced what was necessary for a great win, a mighty effort by all the players."

"We can now look to a weekend off in the first Round of the finals, but we'll be keeping an eye on next weeks A Grade finals and also supporting our Reserve Grade side."

Matt Duggan's kicking game and sensational attacking play in the second half turned the match in favour of the home team,

Long striding bookend Dale Perkins made endless gains with his powerful relentless gallops into the defence, the front-row co-captain named Toowoomba Rugby League 'Player of the Round.'

Jackson Green opened the door for Wattles second half revival with a try on the end of some great play by Matt Duggan and centre Nick Van Der Poel in the second minute of the new stanza.

Green was outanding throughout, the Warriors last line man's purple patch of form continues as Wattles enter the business end of the season.

The match featured some tremendous defence, but Wattles banked their second half opportunities and proved their superiority across the final 40 minutes crossing for five tries to Highfields two.

While the end result indicated a healthy Warriors win, the first forty minutes was not all the home side's way.

Highfields surged to a 10 - 0 lead after eleven minutes with tries by centre Sean Hamel and live wire fullback Denzel Burns.

Former Texas junior Hamel showed what a tough competitor he is running in the Eagles backline, while Burns was a constant danger with the ball in his hands.

Wattles could boast plenty of

Top tips for winter wellness and avoiding the flu

The typical flu season peak from late August to early September is fast approaching, prompting a call for people across the region to be proactive about their health now to increase their chances of staying well.

Darling Downs Public Health Unit Director Dr Penny Hutchinson said everyone is susceptible to the flu and while some people may think they will be fine, influenza can become a very serious illness. "There are a few simple steps you can take to protect yourself and avoid the misery of being laid up with the flu or having your case progress into something more severe," she said.

Dr Hutchinson's top tips for winter wellness (and avoiding the flu) are:

- 1. Get vaccinated: the influenza vaccination is your best protection against getting the flu. It is not too late to get an influenza vaccination – see your GP or pharmacy to organise a jab
- Remember to hydrate: in winter we tend to be less thirsty, but it is still very important to keep fluids up – aim to drink one to two litres per day
- 3. Get enough fruit and veg: eating a nutrient rich diet can help to boost your

immunity

- 4. Get some exercise: studies show people who engage in regular, moderate exercise have increased immunity
- 5. Rest up: getting a good night's sleep is also a known immunity booster.

If you think that, despite your best efforts, you have picked up a case of the flu, it is important to look after yourself and protect others from catching your bug.

- Dr Hutchinson recommends: 6. Self-care: rest at home, take treatments to relieve symptoms and keep up your fluids. If there is a worsening of your symptoms or you are not getting better, phone 13 HEALTH, see your doctor, or in an emergency dial 000 7. Help stop the spread of the virus:
- Stay at home if you have influenza symptoms
- Use a tissue your hands a very good at spreading viruses onto surfaces and other people. Make sure when you cough or sneeze to use a tissue, dispose of the tissue in the bin and then wash your hands with soap and water (or if this is not available use an alcohol hand rub)
- Wash your hands thoroughly

 it takes at least 20 seconds to wash your hands properly.

Influenza symptoms can include fever, sore throat, dry cough, headache, muscle and joint pain, and tiredness or extreme exhaustion. In elderly people, the only symptoms of flu may be confusion, shortness of breath, and / or worsening of a chronic

Submission date for control works forms extended after show of support for Invasive Pests Control Scheme

Southern Downs Regional Council has extended the submission date for Invasive Pests Control Scheme (IPCS) Control Works Forms.

The due date for the submission of Control Works Forms was 30 July 2018; however Council will continue to accept Control Works Forms until 10 August 2018. Councillor for Rural. Environmental, Sustainability and Waste Management, Cameron Gow said the community has showed its support for the scheme, with Council continuing to receive 2018-19 IPCS Control Works Forms.

"Council is extremely happy with the response from landowners and acknowledges and supports the efforts of those who participate," Cr Gow said.

"The aim of the scheme is for all landholders to be involved in active control measures with a coordinated approach, so the impacts of invasive pests are reduced across the entire region.

"By extending the deadline for submission, Council encourages even more landholders to take part and I urge all landholders to get their forms in and to also contact Council for advice, assistance or any feedback where needed. "Landholders should contact Council as soon as they see invasive pests on Council land, so they can be dealt with accordingly."

Landholders can submit their Control Works Form at the same time they pay their rates or online via Council's web page.

Cr Gow asked that landholders provide feedback to Council on the IPCS.

"Council is always looking to improve the IPCS and welcomes feedback from the community to enable positive change across the entire region," he said.

"Have your say; please let Council know what you think about the IPCS by completing the online survey."

Backing producers in Toowoomba to work smarter, not harder

- Producers in the Toowoomba region will benefit from Landcare Smart Farms Small Grant funding to adapt to change, innovate and become more sustainable.
- Federal Member for Maranoa David Littleproud said South Myall Catchment Landcare Group would receive \$24,050 to help reduce erosion and improve soil condition by increasing nitrogen in the soil through planting legume based pasture.
- "Producers and community groups in the Toowoomba region have an intimate knowledge of the land they work and live, so these grants are about giving the tools and technology to be more sustainable," Mr Littleproud said.
- "This grant will help reduce erosion on medium risk erosion country by planting 160 hectares of legume based

pasture in the Highgrove and Wutul area using a crocodile seeder to plant seed on rough unprepared sites."

- Mr Littleproud said Aussie producers have a huge job managing 61 per cent of this nation's land.
- "The grants of between \$5000 and \$100,000 will support Landcare groups and farmers through new tools, methods and technology they need for their world-leading sustainable practices," he said.
- "The first round of funding was highly competitive, attracting over 800 applications. I strongly encourage those who missed out under round one to apply under future rounds."
- The National Landcare Program phase two is an investment of more than \$1 billion to 2023. Landcare was first launched in 1989 and has had bipartisan support for nearly 30 years.

"You mean the Sahara Desert?"



Obituary

Mr. Richard Doyle, an old resident of the Spring Creek district, died at his home at the age of 82 years. He was a native of Ireland, being born at Thurlees, in the year 1836. He came to Queensland in the ship "Darling Downs" and after a voyage of four months landed in Brisbane towards the end of 1875. Shortly after arrival, Mr. Doyle obtained employment with the Government as Inspector of Works, and in that capacity, remained for five years. He subsequently took up farming, and went to the Yangan district where he remained for four years, ultimately selecting land in the Maryvale Valley. When the Headington Hill lands were thrown open for selection some years later, Mr. Doyle was the successful applicant out of 15 for the land on which he built his home and has resided for the past 30 years. The deceased married before coming to Australia. He leaves a widow and family of three sons, William, Richard and Patrick, and four daughters, Mrs. W. Chandler (Upper Forest Springs), Mrs. C. J. Gorry (Allora), and Mrs. W. P. Collins (Allora) ...

Watch Your Mouth this Dental Health Week


This Dental Health Week (DHW) (6 – 12 August), the Australian Dental Association (ADA) is reminding everyone to 'watch your mouth' due to the latest national survey conducted by the ADA showing that Australians are not prioritising their oral health.*

Earlier this year, the ADA launched Australia's Oral Health Tracker which responded to data showing half of Australians (52%) are only brushing once a day instead of the recommended twice daily and nearly two in five (38%) never floss or clean in between their teeth. Australians also need more regular dental check-ups, with 69% only going to the dentist

when they have a problem. Tooth decay is Australia's most common disease. One in five adults have untreated tooth decay and one in five also have gum disease, with oral cancer rates also on the rise.

Dr Hugo Sachs, ADA President said Dental Health Week is an opportunity for people to take a look and learn more about why a healthy mouth is so
