Allora Brothers Bring Home National Medals



Proud Allora grandparents, Col and Val Willett, were tuned in to the live telecast of the School Sport Australia Swimming Championships recently to cheer on their two grandsons and former local school students, Cooper and Bailey Harm.

The two brothers competed in Hobart as members of the Qld School Sport 10-12 years Swimming Team, and both came home as Allora's newest National Medallists.

School Sport Australia events bring together competing swimmers from all Australian states and territories and are considered the highest level of sporting competition for school students. Queensland is highly regarded as powerhouse in the swimming arena which makes selection

to the Queensland Swim Team very competitive. Swimmers need to place in the top 3 in QLD to secure a position on the swim team.

Bailey swam five events in Hobart, coming away with five top 5 finishes. Bailey swam the freestyle leg of the 10 years boys medley relay which won the national gold medal. He was the opening swimmer for the 10 years boys 4 x 50m freestyle relay which bought home a silver medal as well as being a part of the Qld boys all age relay which placed 4th overall. Bailey secured a 5th place in the 50m freestyle final and backed this up with 5th placed swim in the boys 10 years 100m freestyle national final.

Cooper bought home a silver medal as the backstroke

swimmer in the 12 years boys medley relay. He also swam the 4 x 50m freestyle relay which placed 5th overall. He swam the 12 years boys 50m Backstroke to place 6th in the finals in his form stroke. This was Cooper's third School Sport Australia National event, having competed in Sydney

for high jump in 2016, swimming in Adelaide at the Pan Pacific School Games in 2017 and joining his brother at the 2018 Swimming Championships.

The Harm brothers have set local, regional and Darling Downs records this season



and hold over 35 pool records between them for the 9-12 years age groups. Cooper and Bailey were recently awarded Sports Darling Downs Incentive Awards for their sporting endeavours this vear.

Cooper and Bailey were both awarded Age Champions at the Toowoomba Grammar School swimming and athletics inter-house meets this year and will now focus their

sporting involvement on the upcoming Qld Track and Field Championships to be held in Cairns in October. Keeping it in the family, the two brothers will be competing in the high jump event, alongside their older sister Molly who will also be competing in the high jump at the 13-19 years Championships at QSAC. Cooper and Bailey will complete the track and field season before diving in to a new swim season in October.

Allora Red Cross 1914-2018

It is with deep regret that I have to inform the Allora community that after 104 vears the Allora Branch of Red Cross is closing down.

This has only been done after a lot of discussions and soul searching, but our Membership is at an all time low, and age is catching up with us all.

The Australian Red Cross was formed in Canberra on the 13th August 1914, a few days after the beginning of World War One by Lady Helen Munro Ferguson. The Queensland Branch was formed a few days later, while Stanthorpe holds the honour of being the first regional Branch, I am sure Allora was not far behind. The first Meeting records I have is of a Meeting held in the Town Hall on Tuesday 22nd September 1914. This meeting was presided over by Mrs. James Dean the wife of the Mayor and there were 30 ladies present. It was decided to hold meetings weekly and Dr Pain would be conducting first aid classes


At the 1915 Annual General Meeting Mrs James Dean was elected President and the Vice Presidents were Mesdames Kates, Marshall, Stodart and Dunsmore. Secretary was Mrs. E. C. Dean and Treasurer was Mrs. H. G. Deacon. According to my records Mrs. Dean remained President and guided the Branch through the four years of the War. Other office bearers mentioned were Mesdames McMillan, Weber, Clarke, Hamilton and Kennedv.

Without going into a lot of detail Allora Branch worked very hard during the War Years raising money and sending parcels to our Soldiers over seas to England and Europe.

After the War ended in 1918, it was resolved at the 1919 Annual Meeting to go into recess until information was received from Head Quarters as to disbandment.

However the Secretary of the local Repatriation Committee wrote soliciting the assistance of the Red Cross Ladies to form a Sub Committee of the local Repatriation Committee and that they call themselves "The Ladies Repatriation Help Society". It was resolved that the Red Cross Branch adopt this suggestion. These ladies began catering for many functions including the Victory Ball, the Jubilee of Local Government and many welcome home functions for

servicemen, all proceeds going to the Repatriation

Funds.

In 1939, at the outbreak of World War Two, a well attended meeting was held in the Shire Hall to reform the Allora Red Cross Branch. Mrs C E Sapsford, the wife of the local Doctor was elected President, Secretary was Mrs. W Budd and treasurer Miss M Hamilton. Vice Presidents were Mrs W A Deacon and Mrs Muir. Sub Branches were formed at Goomburra, Berat, Forest Springs, Spring Creek, Mt Marshall. Hendon, Victoria Hill and Massie, total membership was 250.

Many functions such as Dances, Balls, Street Stalls, Garden Parties and Fetes were held to raise money for the War effort and to send parcels to our Serviceman overseas, and this continued

until the war ended in 1945. After the War ended and travel became easier all the Sub Branches closed down but Allora Branch continued to flourish thanks to the few dedicated Members and the Allora Community.

When I first moved to Allora

and joined the Red Cross in 1963 Mrs. John Hoey wife of the Shire Chairman was President, and according to the minutes she was previously a Member of the Berat Sub Branch, Marjorie Deacon was Secretary and Lyn Slatter was Treasurer.

When Mrs Hoey passed away in 1967 Mariorie Deacon was elected President and Kay Graham was elected Secretary, a position she still holds, a total of 51 years. Lyn Slatter was still Treasurer. When Lyn resigned as Treasurer due to ill health Miss Pickin was elected Treasurer.

When Miss Pickin passed away in 1972 I was elected Treasurer, and have held that position ever since, a total of 46 years. When Mariorie Deacon passed away in 1990 Heather Slatter was elected President and has retained that position for 28 years, both June Lawson and Dorothy Free have filled the position of Vice President in recent years, Dorothy Free is the present Vice President.

During the years we have held Street Stalls, held an Easter

But Red Cross also fights many other challenges such as Youth and Children's Services, Family Assistance, Mental Health and Social Isolation, Teaching First Aid and help with Missing Persons.

Our present Members believe we have been privileged to have worked together to keep the Red Cross flag flying in Allora and we do say a big "THANK YOU" to the people of Allora and District for

Obituary

The death occurred in Allora on September 3 of Mr. Alexander Barnes Lumsden at the advanced age of 91 years. The late Mr. Lumsden had lived in Allora for the past 57 years and was very well known to an earlier generation of farmers and residents of Allora as a particularly good blacksmith. Born is Scotland, Mr. Lumsden came to Australia with his wife and family 65 years ago and took up work



with Mr. George Anderson at Mitchell helping him carry out a big contract with the Railways. He came to Allora in 1886 and set up a blacksmith shop at the northern end of Herbert Street before shifting to a site in Warwick Street opposite the railway yards. Mr. Lumsden was a thoroughly competent tradesman, trained in the old school, and possessed of an inventive turn of mind. His most successful invention was the "Lumsden" corn planter, a machine which proved so excellent that he manufactured it in large

The following are some examples of what Nathanial achieved for his communities.

Palm Beach Community Christmas Lunch - From the age of 15, Nathanial dedicated his time to helping those in need on Queensland's Gold Coast.

With no prior event management experience or knowledge, armed with only his Year 10 education when the event started. Nathanial conceived the idea of a Christmas event to bring cheer into the lives of homeless, lonely, isolated and vulnerable people locally.

For three years, he ran the Palm Beach Community Christmas lunch, growing it from a BBQ in the park for 15

people to a packed room of over 200 people. From organising the sponsors, to the venue and entertainment. to recruiting volunteers, Nathanial did all that was needed to make Christmas Eve one to remember each vear

Even in the year of his year 12 graduation, he prioritized the Schoolies over celebrations.

The Australian Anti Ice Campaign (AAIC) aims to, in their own words, put the freeze on ice.

Pacific Seeds to combat climate change

with the University of Queensland (UQ) and the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries to 'unlock' available heat-stress tolerant genes in sorghum to deliver new varieties that are better adapted to our future climate. The project has just received \$605,000 in grant funds from the Australian Research Council and aims to deliver a

solution to climate variations significantly impacting broadacre farmers.

Pacific Seeds managing director Barry Croker said rising temperatures are a problem in many maior sorghum growing regions.

"A recent study from USA showed that every degree centigrade increase in temperature can lead to 10 per cent yield reduction in sorghum," said Mr Croker.

"We are excited to be working with UQ to develop a platform to screen sorghum for heat stress and extend our research to make sorghum growers

more profitable in the face of climate change, and make sorghum a profitable choice in a number of regions in Australia particularly those that are currently excluded due to high temperatures.

"The exciting thing about this project is that the plan isn't to just produce a research paper, but also develop a commercial product that farmers will directly benefit from.

"The initial three year research phase aims to create better understanding of the basic genetics and physiology of heat stress tolerance so that the principles developed can be extracted and pursued in the future to improve the heat tolerance of various other crops including corn and wheat."

UQ director of plant science research and project leader Professor Graeme Hammer said the increasing effect of higher temperatures on grain yield is a growing concern.

"What is unique about this project is that it brings together

multidisciplinary experts and tries to connect basic discovery and applied breeding works in one go, making the research process efficient both in terms of time and resource use," said Prof. Hammer

"The plan is to identify

physiological and genetic mechanisms underpinning heat stress tolerance and then use the resulting knowledge and tools to develop heat stress resilient sorghum that ensures better productivity in hotter growing conditions."

Australia's young agricultural scientists, innovators and researchers are being invited to submit their agricultural research project ideas for a chance to share in up to \$286,000 in grant funding.

Minister for Agriculture David Littleproud said the Science and Innovation Awards recognised the regional innovation that drives rural industries.

"Research and innovation will help us capitalise on global food demand," Minister Littleproud said. "Innovation drives productivity

in Australian agriculture and helps us push towards the NFF's vision of a \$100 billion agricultural industry by 2030. "Each winner from the 13 industry award categories will receive a grant of up to \$22,000 to help with their work or study in Australia's agricultural industries.

"Since 2001 the Science and Innovation Awards have helped more than 230 18-35 year olds turn their ideas into

"Last year's winner of the Minister for Agriculture and Water Resources' Award recipient was PhD student Rhys Pirie, who grew up on a cattle farm near Harden, NSW. "Rhys' project focused on ways to turn organic waste like livestock manure, sugarcane mill mud and cotton gin trash into low cost and efficient fertilisers.

"I encourage passionate young scientists, researchers and innovators to submit the ideas they have to improve the productivity, competitiveness and sustainability of their industries."

Applications close on Friday 12 October 2018. The recipients of the awards will be publicly presented as part of the Australian Bureau of Agricultural and Resource Economics and Sciences (ABARES) Outlook 2019 conference in Canberra.

RURAL AREA POLICE REPORT (June / July / August 2018)

1. A spate of Entry and theft offences occurred across the area at the end of June / start of July.

The first occurrence was a breakin to the Leyburn dump, Donovan Road Levburn over 25th to 27th June. Unknown persons forced entry through the padlocked gate to the dump compound. Damage was caused then gaining further entry to the locked office. A generator and a number of smaller items were taken – as were a number of deposited vehicle batteries being held for recycling The very next night of 27th June, the Clifton dump situated in Logan Road at Clifton had its facility entered - again by cutting the padlocked front gate. On this occasion, 52 vehicle batteries kept for later recycling purposes was taken

Finally, then on the night of 28th June, the Allora dump situated beside the highway off Burges Road, had its facility entered. A small quantity of diesel fuel was taken from the dump's backhoe, before the Offender/s again stole a number of vehicle batteries kept for recycling

Investigations are continuing with several reported sightings of a suspicious utility in the area during these times, but with no real details reported. Each vehicle battery is worth \$10 at local recyclers.

2. On 12th July 2018, Police attended an early-morning, singlevehicle traffic crash along Yankee Gully Road, Bony Mountain. The crash occurred when the male driver lost control of his vehicle. alleged not driving to the conditions of the extremely rough bush road The two elderly occupants of the vehicle were taken to hospital with minor injuries. The vehicle - a Holden Rodeo twin-cab utility was a write-off. The 86vr old driver was issued formal caution for driving without due care and attention: not

driving to the road conditions

3. A serious, single-vehicle traffic crash then occurred on the morning of 17th July 2018 on the Toowoomba Karara Road, Ellangowan, (north of the Levburn Clifton Road intersection). Police were called and attended at the time. Investigations determined that the vehicle with its sole male driver was travelling north along the Toowoomba Karara Road. After negotiating a left-hand sweeping bend, the vehicle left the roadway and collided with a nearby tree. The 69yr old male driver from Texas, died in hospital a fortnight after the crash. While the cause of the crash is under investigation, it is extremely difficult given the lack of any witness to the occurrence or any version from the driver Given his condition as a result of the crash, he was never able to be spoken to by Police

4. As a result of Police investigation into an incident occurring in Leyburn on the 21st July 2018, a 39vr old Levburn man has been charged with drug possession and child sex offences. At time of approach of the man in relation to the child-assault allegations, Police located him in possession of a small amount of cannabis.

5. On the afternoon of 3rd August 2018, a 50yr old Mt. Marshall resident was arrested by Police for the offence of "Obstruct" when the man tried to interfere with their investigation of a reported domestic violence incident at the address. Similarly, on the morning of 21st August 2018, a 22yr old Hendon man was arrested by Police for the offence of "Obstruct" when the man tried to interfere with their investigation of a reported domestic violence incident at the address. Both are to appear in the Warwick Magistrates Court on the 12th September.

6. On the 22nd August, a report of boat and trailer theft was made by family members of a recentlypassing member of the Allora community. Family members have stated that a boat and trailer was taken from the rear yard of their

father's residence in Warwick Street (nearby to the town centre), sometime before the death of the local resident and potentially during a period of hospitalisation for the man. While the matter is being investigated, it seems highly irregular given the location of this residence.

7. Reported to Allora Police, that overnight on the 5th September 2018, a Darling Street resident had a quantity of unsecured tools taken from the rear of his open utility tray. The vehicle had been parked inside the residence vard and directly beside the house. It appears the Offender has entered the fenced yard, walked up to the vehicle and taken the items from the back of the ute, before leaving. No one has been seen in the area. This is the first of this type of offence reported for a while. In light of this - and generally -Police would remind and urge all local residents with respect to ensuring their property security. Most offences reported of this nature are an opportunistic thing. If people take the time to simply put away and lock what they can. most often times any outside "interested" party will simply walk-

8. On the 6th September 2018, two drug-related search warrants were executed by local Police on properties within the Hendon area Small amounts of cannabis (with the requisite smoking utensils) were located. Both a 61yr old man and a 22yr old man have accepted drug diversion counselling for the respective offences committed.

(Drug diversion counselling is a "once-only" offer, for Offenders found in possession of less than 50 grams of cannabis and / or smoking utensils)

(b) Matthew SWAN, Senior Constable - Officer in Charge of Levburn Police Station. Arrived from Yarrabah Station.

(c) Matthew SHIELD, Senior Constable - Transferred from Allora Station to Warwick Station. General: -

(i) There will be a new, second Officer arriving at Allora, hopefully between October / November That will mean a full complement of Officers between the three area stations of Allora. Clifton and Levburn

It is the intention of the local OIC's (Officers in Charge) to work closely together. This will mean that residents should see more of a regular, visible policing presence; across the district, through town, the roads and rural areas between the towns and on the highway

(ii) There is a zero-tolerance to matters of drink-driving.

(iii) Police will urge residents to LOCK IT or LOSE IT in terms of personal and property security at all times.

While these communities are by and large good communities, the old days are pretty much gone where residents can afford or expect to leave valuable items unsecured outside in the vard, or their vehicles and houses unlocked; whether at home or uptown. Given our proximity to the highway and the fact offenders are travelling more widely and readily than ever, means that towns like Allora can be subject to target even just on a passing-through basis

Owners take a risk that they may not be covered by insurance in the event of loss, if they have been found not to have taken all reasonable precautions in the security of their own vehicles and property.

(iv) At all times, as OIC Allora Police, I would like to be made aware of any issue or incident arising - or information in general. Police cannot help or know to look out for something if we're not aware of a potential issue to begin

At the current point in time and until a second Officer arrives here. it is difficult to maintain office-open hours while also trying to cover a range of shifts and callouts to jobs in between shifts. At present, I am trying to maintain station counter officially open at least 9am to 12 midday every Monday. I will be at the station of course, at other times during a week and weekend, but cannot maintain formal open hours as such. This should change with the arrival of the 2nd Officer.


