Clifton is gearing up to celebrate 150 years of its railway station, the second oldest working station in Queensland, on Saturday March 9.

In 1869, the Southern Line to Clifton was declared open by Governor Samuel Blackall, thus allowing settlement on the fertile Darling Downs.

The line and station became busier over the years, with Clifton earning the 'Million Bushels of Wheat District,' moniker after a remarkably successful season in 1928/9.

The wheat harvest of 1928/9 produced one million bushels, a record at the time, with all of this grain despatched from the railway station.

By 1957, the rail site had a telephone connection. weighbridges. cattle. sheep and pig yards, five grain sheds, signal cabin, overhead bridge, cranes, shelter/cream/goods shed, with loops to the flour mill, butter factory, fuel depot, trucking yards and grain sheds.


After a period of significant growth, traffic began to trend downwards at the railway station with passenger train services to Clifton ceasing in 1972, with the station closing to goods in 1998.

Some people of note who have walked the platform include King George VI, former Prine Minister Deakin. Richard Alfred Chamberlain. Archbishops Dunne and Duhig, Sister Elizabeth Kenny, the Duke of Windsor and Dame Nellie Melba

To celebrate history of the railway station, the Clifton and District Progress Association has organised a fun filled day out for the whole family.

The day kicks off with street markets at 8am, before the grand arrival of the steam train from Warwick at around 10am.

The official ceremony will take place at approximately 10.30am. with Toowoomba Regional Council Mayor Paul Antonio to cut the ribbon and Town Crier Kevin

the future town of Allora. He found Mr. and Mrs. Neil Ross and their daughter Grace living in a cottage near the banks of Dalrymple Creek. Neil Ross had 1.200 head of sheep grazing on the Goomburra run squatted on by Ernest Elphinstone Dalrymple in 1840, on land occupied for thousands of years by the Giabal aboriginal people.

The land for the township of Allora was resumed from Goomburra Station in 1859. In January 1869, at a public meeting held in Michael Erhart's Queen's Arms Hotel, Edward Anderson moved that Allora be made a municipality. This was proclaimed on the 21st July 1869. Edward Anderson served as Allora's second mayor in 1870/71.

RURAL AREA POLICE REPORT

(Dec 2018 - Jan 2019. part 1 of 3)

1. Premises Entry - Allora Tennis Club and Swimming Pool - On the night of the 3rd January 2019, the premises of the Allora Tennis Club in Darling Street and the pool in Raff Street were subject to separate entry offences. In the case of the tennis club, the offender gained entry via a locked side-window before stealing cash from inside the premises. Minor damage was caused. In the case of the pool, it appears the offender has accessed the complex after climbing the fence from rear parkland and forcing entry to the canteen via its roller-door. Stolen from inside was cash, a quantity of soft-drinks and lollies.

In this instance a 17yr old Mt. Marshall man has since been arrested and charged with two (2) counts of Unlawful Entry to Premises and his matters placed before the Warwick Children's Court

2. New Year's Eve Disturbance - Shortly before midnight on Monday night 31st December, Allora and Leyburn Officers were called to attend a disturbance occurring in Herbert Street. Allora. Upon attendance, Police determined a fight had occurred on private property in Herbert Street; between parties from two adjoining residences.

The disturbance was discontinued upon Police arrival due Officer intervention. It was determined to be alcohol-related, alleged started because of damage to one resident's vehicle. At this time, no formal complaint has been made in relation to any matter and no charges preferred against any person

3. New Year's Eve Drug Arrest -Prior to that, shortly before 8:00pm on New Year's Eve, Officers from Allora and Leyburn Stations performing co-joint patrols of the general area, had reason to intercept a vehicle in Logan Road at Clifton. As a result of suspicions formed, a search of the vehicle ensued which caused the finding and seizure of approximately 17grams of bagged cannabis.

The 42yr old male owner and driver of the vehicle from Kearney's Springs was interviewed on the roadside during which time, certain admissions were made with respect to the cannabis. He was served Court attendance notice for the offence of Unlawful Possession of a Dangerous Drug and was to appear in the January sittings of the Warwick Magistrates Court.

4. GRACE - UIL Clifton - On Sunday afternoon 6th January 2019. Allora Officers were once

again out-and-about performing patrols of the back roads between Allora and Clifton, when they had reason to intercept a Toyota utility travelling towards Clifton. As a result of a positive roadside breath test conducted, a 20vr old Clifton man was taken back to Clifton Station for the purposes of further testing. He returned a positive blood alcohol reading of 0.075% and was subsequently charged. His licence was suspended for 24hrs. He is to appear in the Warwick Magistrates Court. This situation is one of the reasons Police do actively conduct morning and daytime RBT. In this case, the 20yr old man, had simply had a "big night" the night before, concluding his drinking about 2am. At the time he drove, some 10hours later, he reasonably thought he was okay to drive. People need to be aware of the effects of alcohol and how long it may stay in the system particularly after a "solid drinking session"

5. Drug arrest & drug drive -Shortly after 2pm on Monday

afternoon the 7th February Allora Officers intercepted a vehicle in Raff Street. As a result of speaking with the 24yr old male driver. Police conducted a subsequent vehicle search. This search located and caused the seizure of approximately 4grams of methylamphetamine (ice), a set of scales and a pipe used to smoke the drug. The Stanthorpe man was interviewed and served Notice to Appear for the offences of drug possession, utensils possession and possessing things used in connection with a dangerous drug. As a further result of the interception, the man is alleged to have tested positive to the presence of a drug in his system and was served further court notice for the offence of drug driving. He is next to appear in the Warwick Magistrates Court in March



At a meeting held in Allora last week a war loan committee was formed. Members of the committee are Messrs. H. E. Hunter (chairman), W. Holmes (deputy chairman), F. R. Lonsdale (secretary), C. C. Wynn, J. Hilton, G. Thompson, W. Collins, D. Cahill, C. A. Stay, A. Hamilton, A. C. Lickiss, H. G. Deacon, P. F. Donovan, together with shire councillors.

The meeting discussed the forthcoming First Victory Loan and tentative arrangements were made for fostering the campaign. Mr. T. Lunt (war loan organiser in Warwick and district) addressed the gathering and in his remarks stated Allora's that quota for the £150,000,000 loan would be announced next week.

It was proposed by Samuel Hegarty, and seconded by Mr. Hardwick, that a deputation be formed to wait on Mr. Macalister to present the views of the Allora electors to him. The deputation consisted of Messrs. J. C. S. Hegarty, Newelles, Hardwick, Rippingale and Holmes.

(Brisbane Courier 10th February 1869) (The Crown Inn was opened by John Holmes in 1867. In the 1870's and 1880's it was owned by Patrick Cranitch and called the Criterion Hotel. H. J. Gwvnne added a double story section in 1890 and renamed it the Club Hotel).






