Kathy Griffiths Hopple, a descendent of local pioneers Joseph and Grace Sharpe, travelled to Allora last week to visit the Historical Museum and explore the town's history.

After reading letters from her Grandmother, Kathy was intrigued and wanted to find out more about the history of Allora.

Kathy's son Nick is undertaking a university course in Brisbane, giving Kathy and her daughter Emily from America, a reason to visit Australia.

Local historians Col Lingard and Lyn Wright were delighted to welcome the visitors and detail the history of Joseph Sharpe and his contribution to Allora below:

Sharpe Joseph first came to Allora in 1890 as foreman for the Brisbane firm of J. Hack & Co. to build the Queensland National Bank in Drayton Street. On ...Continues inside on page 2

the completion of the job he stayed on in the town and formed a partnership with William Leggatt as Sharpe & Leggatt, building contractors and timber merchants. The firm built many private houses in Allora as well as commercial buildings such

as the Allora railway station and Francis Kates' flour mill in Forde Street.

In 1897 Joseph's first wife Louisa died at the age of 36 and he remarried Grace Galton. There were a total of eleven children from both marriages. Joseph Sharpe opened a timber mill in Kates' former flour mill in Forde Street in 1901. This mill was reputed to have been one of the largest and up-to-date on the Downs and boasted one of the largest steam cranes in the Southern hemisphere.

When the old School Reserve was sold in 1912,

Joseph Sharpe bought the allotment on which the school residence stood. In 1916 he built and opened the Central Hall. The Star Picture Company was formed in 1919 with six shareholders including Joseph and Grace Sharpe, Harry Reppel and Hubert Deacon. Joseph Sharpe was elected to the first Allora Shire Council in 1915.

Joseph died in 1919 and his business interests and large property portfolio were carried on by Grace. She was well known for her charitable works. She was the foundation secretary of the Allora branch of the Q.C.W.A. and was the president for 10 years. The first meetings were held in her Central Hall until the Rest Rooms were built.

Beryl ("Bee") Sharpe, Joseph and Grace's daughter, conducted the "Mirrabooka" private hospital in a building which still stands at 20 Forde Street. "Chislehurst" the Sharpe family home stood next door but was demolished after Grace's death in 1934.

"Of Coal, & Calorific Values & Good Intentions & Self-inflicted Wounds"

Dear Sir

Coal is a natural resource, that has powered world-wide industry for centuries, and will continue to do so in developing country, for many decades to come. Until recently, we in Australia have considered ourselves economically favoured to have large and accessible deposits of this valuable commodity. All fuels, including coal, have a measurable calorific value, which is a measure of the available energy per ton utilised. All energy production by burning fossil fuels results in the release of "Greenhouse Gases", atmospheric pollution, and contributes to global warming. I offer no argument. Soft coals, such as the Yallourn brown coal - almost peat - have a very low calorific value, and when used, are major polluters.



Power stations using this low C.V. fuel have been, rightly, closed. Victoria has renewable energy alternatives. North Queensland has not, and without coal-fired power production will lose most, if not all, of its industrial capacity, with increased unemployment and population drift.

S.E. Asia has mostly low C.V. coals, such as Burmese coal. If high quality Australian coal is not made available, developing industrial economies like India, will use them; so that restricting exports of high quality Australian coal to these regions will result in INCREASED and not decreased, atmospheric pollution. If we close down coal, Australian jobs will be lost forever, and our Balance of Trade will deteriorate, with no benefit whatever.

Any impulsive action, taken without sufficient thought, to improve our circumstances, and which had the opposite effect, was known as "Shooting yourself in the foot".

Please, all who read this, help to save the Australian coal industry, so as not to impose this possible self-inflected wound on yourselves and the whole Australian economy.



SDRC looks to the future and 'strikes a balance' with 2019-2020 Draft Budget

Southern Downs Regional Council is calling for community feedback on the 2019-2020 Draft Budget which proposes the lowest General Rate rise in more than 10 years.

General Rates will increase by 2% and SDRC plans to extend the early payment discount period to 60 days to assist residents impacted by ongoing drought conditions.

Deputy Mayor and Councillor for Finance, Governance and the Arts Jo McNally said the Draft Budget builds on the strong financial foundation Council has created and promotes future growth and sustainability.

"Our goal is to balance providing services and secure infrastructure to residents without our overburdening our ratepayers, and this Draft Budget strikes that balance," Cr McNally said.

"The 2% General Rates increase will help Council meet the ongoing rising costs of doing business that Council has faced over the last 12 months.

"With the lowest General Rates rise in 11 years, Council will need to carefully manage finances, but with the sound financial practices this Council has established, we should still be able to put money into infrastructure reserves and decrease our debt while continuing to provide high quality services to our residents."

Council's financial sustainability has supported by the enormous success SDRC has had in securing government funding.

Utility charges for water, sewer and waste will not change from the 2018-2019 Financial Year and remain at 2.75% which will go towards renewing and maintaining infrastructure.

SDRC will \$35.58 million to capital works projects in the region to ensure that Council provide continues tο essential services for residents.

"Council is always looking for new ways to improve the region's liveability for our residents and communities and that's why the Draft Budget focuses on spending significant funds on roads, water and wastewater, waste management and community facilities for our residents," Cr McNally said.

"Some of the proposed include street projects sealing in Glen Alpin. replacing Palmer Bridge at Freestone, commencina work on a new waste transfer station for Stanthorpe and extending the region's recycled water network."

Southern Downs Councillors endorsed the Draft Budget at a Special Council Meeting in March and are now seeking input from the community before finalising the budget for the next financial year.

Throughout April, SDRC host information sessions across the region and provide an opportunity for residents to share their views and ideas. Residents can also submit feedback via the "Have your Say" form on Council's website.


"These information sessions and feedback forms are the community's opportunity to suggest how Council should spend funds and tell us what projects

are important to them." Cr McNally said.

"In past years, residents have suggested projects during the feedback process that Council then funded and delivered in that financial vear.'

There indigenous 'pioneers' on the list. They lived and worked in and around Allora after white settlement. Bert Sims in his book "Allora's Past" tells of Queen Charlotte and Kitty Kitty living in an old bark gunyah on the banks of the Dalrymple Creek. Marjory Deacon in her book "Allora's Hundred Years" records that the pair were held in great affection by the townsfolk amongst whom they found employment. In their later years Charlotte and Kitty were cared for by the people of the town. When they died they were buried in the Allora cemetery. Their graves remain unmarked.

The Allora Historical Society had a visit only this week from Patricia Conlon who is part of a team who are recording the history of the indigenous people of southern Queensland. knows Patricia descendants of Charlotte and Kitty. She is planning to bring them to Allora in the near future. It may be possible to have a ceremony and place plagues on the graves during Allora's 150 Year Celebrations.

Great News. Tony Morris is organising a cricket match between Victoria Hill and Allora, rivals for many a year, on Sunday 21st July. He is rounding up teams of players to represent both cricket clubs. Leave your name with Perry at the Sports Club to nominate for a place in the team.

The Allora & District Historical Society, with the support of the Southern Downs Regional Council, is organising the 150 Year Celebration to carry on the tradition as in 1919 and 1969. celebrating the proclamation of the municipality of Allora. Allora Shire will submit new information to the Local Government Commissioner, Greg Hoffman, regarding external shire boundary changes. Shire chairman, Jim Deacon, said he questioned Mr. Hoffman's "moral right" to change facts in his last report in order to furnish his recommendations. Shire clerk Gerard Kennett will compile a submission of new information which will include the shire's intention to become debt-free in 1994 and to improve the community water supply through the discovery of a new bore. The submission will also re-affirm the community objection to any boundary change.

Allora's Past 75 years ago March

Cunningham Seat

Whatever the outcome of the poll, the Cunningham electorate will have a new representative in the Legislative Assembly from April 15. This seat has been held since 1920 by Mr. W. A. Deacon, whose death occurred on December 26th 1943. In this electorate there will be a straight out contest between Mr. M. McIntvre. of Mt. Tvson. the Country Party candidate, and Mr. J. G. M. Hilton, the Labor nominee. Mr. Hilton, station master at Allora, has been an employee of the Railway Department for the past 36 years. This is the second time that he has contested the Cunningham seat. Three years ago he resigned his position as station master at Allora in order to oppose, as the Labor candidate, the late Mr. Deacon M.L.A.

Allora's Past 100 years ago March 1919

Old Old Rivals

A local cricket team journeyed to Victoria Hill on Saturday afternoon to play a return match. The Victoria Hill representatives batted first, and early in the game it was evidenced that the

wicket was not a favourable one for large scores. For the home team A. Y. Gillam 35 and D. Keleher 17 were the principal contributors. The innings closed with a total of 82 runs. Allora commenced badly, four wickets falling in quick succession for a total of 4 runs. Lionel Laws and William Gilmore steadied matters by stone-walling tactics, the latter subsequently succumbing after a useful score of 14. Lionel Laws and Andrew Hamilton played out time, both being not out with 11 and 12 runs to their credit. The total for 7 wickets was 47. In bowling for the home team, Sedgwick captured 6 wickets for 13 runs, and A. Y. Gillam 1 wicket for 1 run. For the visitors McDermott 3 for 21. Benstead 2 for 16. Rickert 1 for 18. Deller 3 for 8 and Kates 1 for 5.

Allora's Past 150 years ago March 1869

The Warwick Examiner & Times of 20th March 1869 contained a report or the rail journey from Gowrie Junction to Allora (Hendon). The report on the local section of the line reads:

"At forty miles Spring Creek is again crossed by 380 feet of bridging. The embankment at 41½ miles contains 10,000 cubic yards with the excavation of 8,000. Three miles further on Mr. Clark's residence may be seen; he has a siding for produce. Dalrymple Creek is at 45 miles and the bridge is very substantially constructed. It is 200 feet long. There is quite a little village of tents and humpies here. The latter part of the line is not in the same neat trim as the first twenty or thirty miles, but it is not yet quite finished. About a mile further on is Allora. Only one goods shed is finished, or nearly so, but the other requisite buildings are in the course of construction. The total length from Gowrie Junction is 46 miles and the contract price was £194,000.".

Robert and Leonard's great-grandfather .lohn Hoey inr. was elected to the





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



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
