Huge drug bust at Old Tal

Vietnamese nationals have been charged with producing over \$5 million worth of cannabis at Old Talgai, as a result of a search warrant executed as part of an ongoing police operation targeting the production, distribution and trafficking of cannabis.

Operation Papa Cider, ongoing operation conducted by State Crime Command's Drug Serious Crime Group, targets the production and distribution of dangerous drugs in Queensland.

As part of the operation, detectives from the Drug and Serious Crime Group, assisted by Leyburn, Clifton and Allora Police, members of Warwick CIB and Toowoomba Dog Squad executed a search warrant at a Kessler Road address at Old Talgai on March 26.

During the search, police 1,825 located cannabis

plants with an estimated value of \$4,562,500 and over 139 kilograms of dried cannabis with a value of \$918,000.

Wednesday, 3rd April 2019

Three people were arrested at the location and were charged with production and possession of dangerous drugs.

Representatives from the Australian Border Force (ABF) attended to conduct migration status checks, to interview persons of interest, and to check for other border-related offences.

The ABF confirmed that two of the individuals were unlawful non-citizens and one was working in breach of a Bridging Visa.

On Wednesday March 27, a 48-years-old woman, two men, both aged 46, and a 45-years-old man were arrested following the interception of vehicles in the Levburn area.

Four of the offenders were charged at the Warwick Watchhouse and held in custody to appear before the Warwick Magistrates Court.

The search warrant at Old Talgai came about

following the location of \$1.5 million cannabis inside a van during a routine traffic stop at Minden in March.

Detective Superintendent Jon Wacker of the Drug and Serious Crime Group described Operation Papa Cider as multifaceted.

"Operation Papa Cider is about more than the production and trafficking of dangerous drugs on our streets," Det. Superintendent Wacker said.

"We have been working closely with our partners at the ABF and the Australian Federal Police to target the exploitation of unlawful non-citizens for the sole purpose of producing and manufacturing these drugs.

"Our approach is to target the high level distributor who is reaping lucrative benefits from an illicit drug all the while removing themselves from the crime and reinvesting the profits into other illicit activities directly impacting on our community."

Warwick Acting Inspector Jamie Deacon described the closure of the illegal operation at Old Talgai as an overwhelming success.

"The find is significant in terms of disrupting the local drug distribution network, as well as helping to dismantle organised crime within Queensland," Act. Inspector Deacon said.

"The location of this crop came about following the interception of a van on the Warrego Highway at Minden on March 11, so our attention has been on the property for the last couple of weeks.

"The set-up was very commercial grade, was a very sophisticated operation, with irrigation and hydroponics.

"Significant police resources were drawn on to shutdown this particular site, the operation involved a lot of work from the state drug squad, detectives from Warwick as well as local police from Leyburn, Allora and Clifton."



Time Capsule opening

Plaque marking location of time capsule buried near Allora Sports

A time capsule buried at Allora will be opened in April ahead of the town's 150 years celebration in July.

The capsule was buried near the Shire Chambers, now Allora Regional Sports Museum, to mark Allora's Centenary in 1969.

While initially slated to be opened in 2069, the time capsule will be opened 50 years in advance on April 27, 2019, with a public day at the Allora Sports Club to mark the occasion.

At the public day in April, people will be able to view the contents of the original time capsule, as well as record messages to go in the new time capsule.

The contents of the time capsule includes a cassette tape, currency, newspaper clippings, photos and roll of Allora Shire citizens.

The contents of the time capsule will be on public display for almost three months, before they will be re-buried with modern content in a larger time capsule at the town's 150 year celebrations on July 20. 2019.

The time capsule to be buried at the town's 150 vear celebrations will be opened in 2069.

Allora locals are also encouraged to donate items for the new time capsule.





The past 100 years have been celebrated at Sacred Heart, Deuchar



Warwick Saleyards looks to the future with major upgrade and master plan

The future of the region's livestock industry is looking bright with Warwick Saleyards set to receive a \$276, 000 facelift.

A new Warwick Saleyards Master Plan and the construction of new infrastructure will ensure the saleyards continue to thrive and maintain a competitive market position in the future.

At its March General Meeting, Southern Downs Regional Council awarded a tender for the design and construction of five new sheep loading ramps as well as new lamb selling pens to help meet an increased demand in sales.

The Warwick Saleyards is the only facility in Queensland that still holds weekly sheep and lamb sales, and the recent success of cluster fencing programs across the region has enabled producers to take more livestock to market.

The improvements will significantly promote a safer work environment for loading and unloading livestock as well as provide positive animal welfare outcomes.

The upgrade works

will include:

- Replacement o existing ramps
- Construction of an additional 24 lamb selling pens
- Two auctioneer catwalks with alcoves and steps
- Two water holding yards with troughs.

Αt the March meeting SDRC also resolved to undertake the development of the Saleyards Master Plan. The master plan will ensure the saleyards continue to be sustainable business operation and investigate ways in which to further enhance and develop the facility.

Deputy Mayor Jo McNally said the upgrade works and the master plan will play a crucial role in the future of the saleyards and the region's livestock industry.

"The Warwick Saleyards plays an integral part of the agriculture sector and the region's economy, and it's also an important part of the social fabric and the connectivity of our rural and agricultural community," Cr McNally said.

"It's vital we have a

plan for the future of the saleyards and develop a business model to ensure its longevity.

"This master plan will assess the saleyards current operation and look at the whole picture; consider how producers, agencies and industry groups want to move forward and what's happening in the industry itself both in and outside the Southern Downs.

"As the industry changes and evolves, we need to evaluate the saleyards current

business model and ensure the region has quality facilities which meet animal welfare and best practice standards, and stay ahead of industry trends."

The Warwick Saleyards Master Plan will support funding applications for the future development and revitalisation of the Warwick Saleyards.

apparent deliberate drowning of three infant children by their mother. The three children Mary Magdalena 5½, Ellen Gertrude 4½, and Thomas McVeigh 14 months, were found laid out on the bed by their father Patrick McVeigh, "Bellview", Allora. Their best clothes were laid out nearby along with a note from their mother. Magdalena Frances McVeigh was charged with the children's murder and brought before the Toowoomba Circuit Court on the 9th September 1919. She was found "Not guilty due to insanity" and returned to the Brisbane Prison, to be held at His Majesty's leisure until her fate could be determined by the Queensland Government. She was released on the 27th November 1920, less than two years after the deaths of her

the course of Polynesian labour to penetrate a little further on to the Downs. About ten days past, a batch of about eighteen of these savages arrived at the Allora terminus, destined to do their time on Talgai Station. However much such a class of labour may be required on the plantations it is certainly quite out of place up here; and it is no longer surprising that every steamer conveys numbers from the colony, besides the many who are trudging it across the border, when a system is being carried on rendering the very name of Queensland a by-word and open to reproach. 
